

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OURT DECIDES HWY. DEPT. ERRED IN ROAD MOVE IN EVANT

The State Supreme Court held Wednesday the State Highway De partment had overstepped its aushority in trying to build a highway on private land without acquiring title to the land.

Two private owners in Corvell brought suit against county officials, the State Highway Commission and the Department. The highway commission argued the ac tion represented a suit against the state without the necessary leyislative autority.

"Acts of officials which are not tawfully authorised are not aits of the state," said Judge Ruel Walker by law. in writing the court's opinion.

If the present suit could not be vel County. maintained without legislative con sent, officials of the state would never have to condemn land legalty. They could simply appropriate it ant the land owner would be entitled to no compensation unless The Legislature granted him permission to sue," Walker said.



WOOD WARPING

Warp is a common term aplied to lumber which has changd from its flat form to a bent hape. Thin boards tend to warp nore rapidly than thick boards. Frequently, the condition is not he fault of the lumber, bu results rom improper conditions of use. Properly manufactured and seasoned lumber, when applied in a dry condition and kept dry, will not warp.

Warping can assume several forms. Cupping of lumber describes a condition which resembles a soda-straw cut in half DED - Austin attorney Hardy lengthwise. Bowing refers to a Hollers tells the Texas Election

of a rocker on a rocking chair. Crook is the same sort of deformation as bow, but in an edgewise direction. Twist is the condition of lumber somewhat like that of a twisted leather strap. Warping often causes wood to tear loose from its fastening.

Warping of lumber can be controlled by treatment with water repellents, by use of pains or oher finishes, and especially through the installation of dry lumber and the maintenance of a suitable moisture content level.
