



The store stands three stories high behind a taller false front. Between the porch and the rails of the MC&SA is a dirt lane which is Main Street for Camden.

Everybody in Camden works for the company, but there are always a few spectators - silent Coushatta Indians from the nearby reservation, company wives or kids down to see the train off.

"No tickets. Just give me your money," says conductor Carl Vincent as you board.

The passenger conveyance is a wooden combine coach which the Long Island Railroad thought it had worn out when the MC&SA got it in 1927. It's a flaky red color with indications that the roof once was green. The ghost of the former ownership - the words "Long Island Railroad" shows throught the remaining paint.

Built, like the railroad, in 1898 the coach has its original rattan seats and the big tanks and gauges used with the old carbide lighting system.






