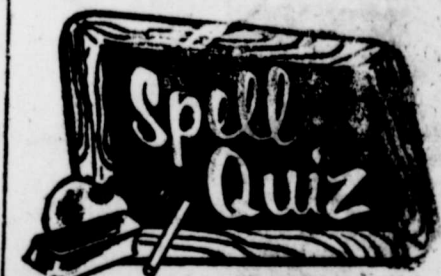

A \$7,000 expansion program has been started at the Coryell Community Center in East Gatesville with the work ticketed for completion in time for the facility to house the big Central Texas Polled Hereford Show Jan. 17-19.

What if David had said, "My neck is too valuable to risk under the sword of such a mighty warrior as Goliath?"

Would it have mattered?

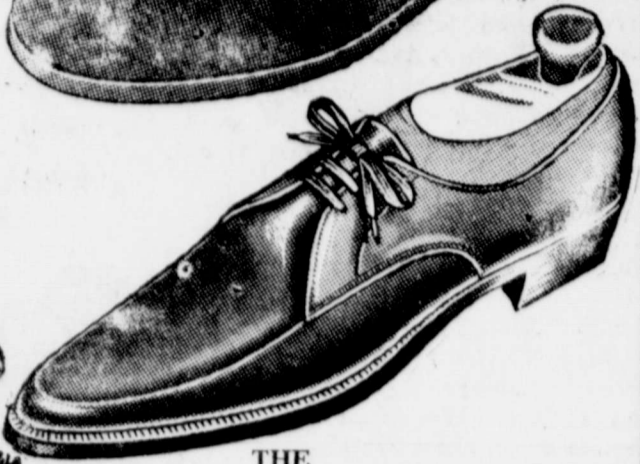

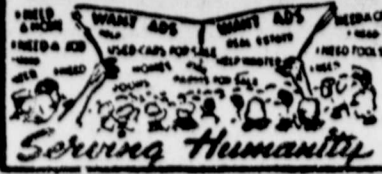

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

The United States Post Office is quietly studying possible action on the anti-monopoly front which if it takes action, could go a long way into alleviating one vicious situation.

It would be quite humorous, too, if the Post Office, not charged with enforcing anti-trust laws, did take action in an area in which the Federal Trade Commission, specifically C. W. Harder charged with this responsibility, has failed to act.

In the constant drive of a few big packers and manufacturers to eliminate regional competition, bigger competitions for prizes are being launched.

The big prizes are often big, such as a new home, a trip abroad for two, new cars, et al.

In fact, postal authorities are quietly questioning those who judge the entries in these contests to determine how much skill, and how much luck, enters into deciding the winners. If the winners are determined largely by chance, then it is against postal regulations for magazines, other publications entering the mails to carry the details on a game of chance.

This element of chance factor injected by the Post Office is interesting. Let it be supposed that a mythical product named Crunchies decides to put on a contest.

Now if the makers of Crunchies decide they have fooled around with local competitors long enough and now is the time to drive them off the retail shelves, they might very well dream up a contest with huge prizes given to those who send in to them, with a box top, in 25 words or less, stating "I like Crunchies because..."

This kind of a contest, advertised heavily enough in all magazines, et al, can easily bring in a million entries.

Now first of all, it is hard to imagine any manufacturer paying for the manhours necessary to carefully evaluate a million entries. But this factor is even more important.

It is safe to assume that out of a million entries, at least 5 or 10 thousand will be "I like Crunchies because they're really crunchy," or some other slogan that will win.

After all, there is a limit to the variety of things that can be said about most products, and it is certain that whatever is picked as the winner bit of language, thousands of the contestants sent in the same thing.

Thus, in any given contest of this type, there must assuredly be some element of chance employed in deciding which one of the writers of the line "I like Crunchies because they are really crunchy" gets the all expense world tour for two. Obviously the company is not going to give 10,000 free trips away. Thus, it would appear, the Post Office is on the trail of a very hot issue.

Supporting Gatesville

Merchants who do not advertise are invited to read the following from the American Bankers Magazine, as it might give you a new slant on business, your own business, as well as the matter of building Gatesville.

"No business man in any town should allow a newspaper published in his town to go without his name and business being mentioned somewhere in its columns. This does not mean you should have a whole, a half, or even a quarter page in each paper, but your name and business should be mentioned, if you do not use more than a two line space.

"A stranger picking up a newspaper should be able to tell what business is represented in Gatesville by looking at the paper. This is the best possible advertising. The man who does not advertise his business does an injustice to himself and the town. The man who insists on sharing the business that comes to town, but refuses to advertise his own, is not a valuable addition to any town. The life of a town depends on the live wide-awake and liberal advertising business man."

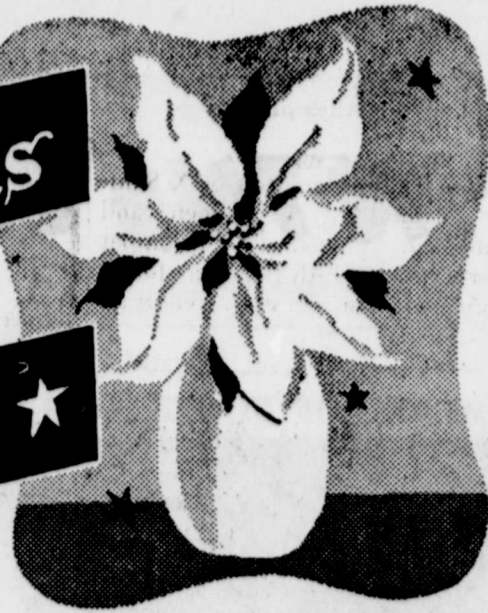

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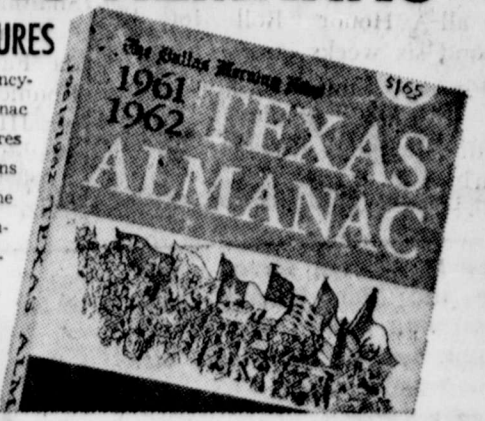
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GRASSROOTS OPINION

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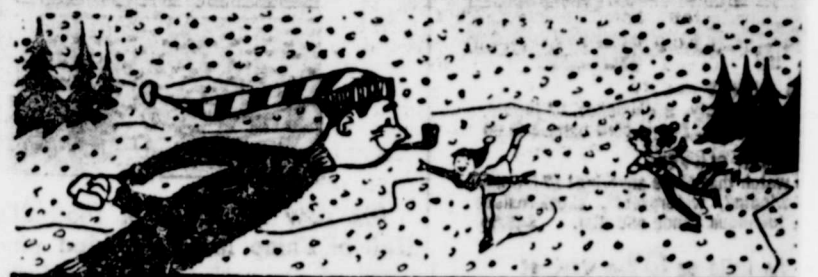

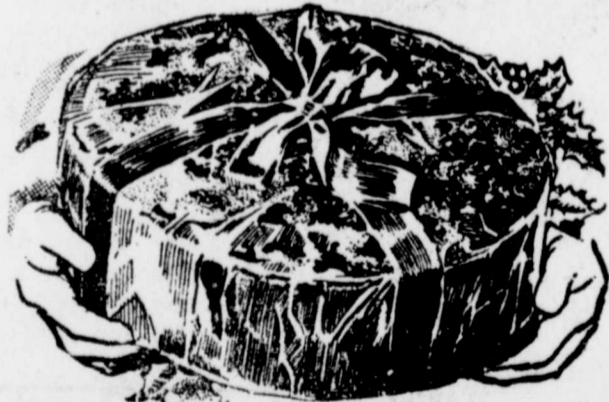
