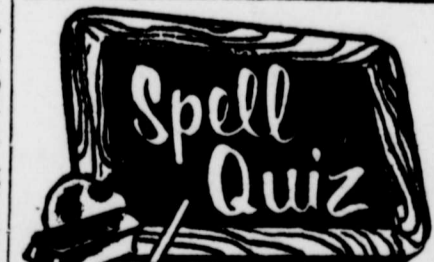

Copperas Cove school board hired 8 new teachers for the 1961-62 season, and school will begin August 28.

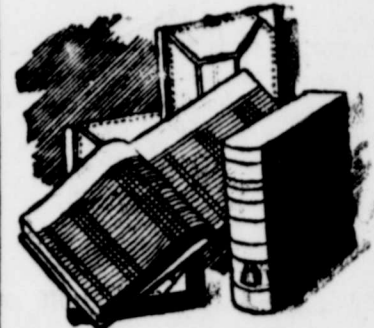

**HOW TO PUT YOUR FAITH INTO ACTION**

Have you ever heard someone say, "I just don't have any faith?" I have heard this often.

Perhaps you feel that you have no faith. But, don't you expect the sun to come up every morning and to slip away in the evening just before the moon and the stars appear in the darkening sky? When you start down your front steps, you are not in the least surprised when gravity keeps you from floating off into space. When the trees become bare, the grass turns brown and all outdoors shivers under winter's icy blasts, you are confident that in a few weeks spring will come and the earth will blaze with new life.

"But that's not faith! Those things always happen by natural law," you say. But isn't natural law actually a part of the law of God? When you believe in the normal functions of what we call natural law, you are expressing faith — faith in the law of God.

We went to a friend's house to spend the night. He told us

that he had sold his house and that the man was coming that evening to close the deal. Suddenly, I had the funny feeling that I was sitting in the house God wanted me to have. I thought, *How absurd. I have \$25, no income, and I want to buy a house that is already sold.*

The man who was to buy the house didn't show up. The next morning my friend asked, "Oral, do you want this house?"

I answered, "Oh, maybe."

"I'll let you have it for \$6,500."

"That's too much," I replied.

"I'll give you \$5,500." I had only \$25.

"I'll split the difference with you," he said. "You can have it for \$6,000."

"Sold," I exclaimed.

My friend went to the bank to get the papers for me to sign. When he got back he said, "I want \$3,000 down and you can take up my mortgage." Startled, I didn't know what to say.

As we looked over the papers, he suddenly said, "I'm not building my new house until next year. Why don't you pay the down payment a little later — say half of it in six months, the other half in twelve months?"

I caught my breath and said, "Oh, just as you say." Because I put my faith into action and because God is good, what I believed for came to pass.

Your faith can be just as powerful. Just use it — put it into action. You are not taking a chance when you use your faith.

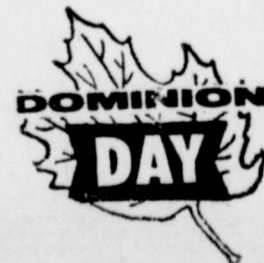

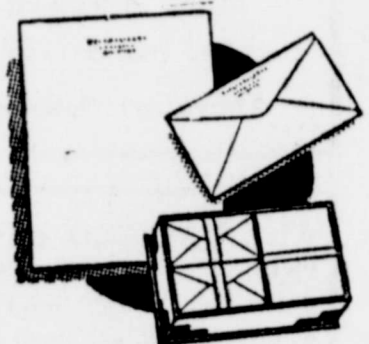

**A GREAT UNIVERSITY HAS LOST ITS FOUNDATION**

For many years the motto of Harvard University was "Veritas, Christo et Ecclesiae" which means Truth, for Christ and the Church. This motto was printed on the title page of every Harvard catalogue. However, around the year 1931 this was changed and the single word "Veritas" (Truth) used. Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ was eliminated, and He was also eliminated from the motto in the catalogue of the Harvard Divinity School which is supposed to be dedicated to Him.

Of course Jesus Christ was also eliminated from the teaching at Harvard. The Christian principles under which our nation was founded and has prospered have been practically abandoned at Harvard during the past 50 years. Along with this, the basic principles of Americanism have also been largely lost in the confusion. Harvard has lost its foundation.

In order to get a clear picture of how far Harvard has gone from its original basic foundation, let us think about the following statement made by John Harvard during 1638 in connection with his will leaving half of his estate to the college which was named in his honor the next year. John Harvard died in 1638. In his bequest to the college he stated: "Let every student be plainly instructed and earnestly pressed to consider well the main ends of his life and stud-

ies; to know God and Jesus Christ which is eternal life, and therefore to lay Christ in the bottom as the only foundation of all knowledge and learning, and see the Lord only giveth wisdom. Let everyone seriously set himself by prayer in secret to seek Christ as Lord and Master."

This basic principle set forth by John Harvard was adopted by Harvard College in its Bylaws and Precepts published during 1638. We quote from these precepts: "Let every student be plainly instructed, and earnestly pressed to consider well the main end of his life and studies is to know God and Jesus Christ is eternal life; and therefore to lay Christ in the bottom, as the only foundation of all round knowledge and learning... Everyone shall so exercise himself in reading the Scriptures twice a day, that he shall be ready to give such an account of his proficiency therein... as his tutor shall require..."

Not only Harvard, but also many other great American colleges and universities have lost the solid foundation upon which they began. Herein lies one of the most important reasons for the continuing success of international communism's plot to destroy America.

#### Selected Investments In An Uncertain Market

At least two of the three important forces that have caused stock market rise since the beginning of the year are diminishing. Investor faith in the new Administration has perhaps

been on the premise that pressures are being put on business which could force deterioration of profit picture. Fears of inflation are also diminishing as cost-steel and paper prices lag in the government's industrial deficit spending program. Adequate productive capacity lines is not conducive to an inflation. Even the investment of institutional funds is diminishing somewhat as uncertainty rises during these currently high levels in the stock market. A prescribed pattern there is one of caution and we generally recommend avoiding so-called secondary glamor stocks: is, stocks of many of the larger companies in electronics, computers and other glamorous areas that are selling at price/earnings ratios that are relatively high even when projecting earnings into 1961. Now is the time to give more consideration to fundamental values and to select stocks at low price ratios and of fairly liberal yields which will be beneficiaries of the business recovery.

session it has shown an uptrend in earnings every other year since 1951. At 46 the stock sells only about 18 times 1960 earnings.

Another product receiving careful attention from the housewife is food, especially the prepared and pre-cooked variety. Any cut in food expenditures is unlikely except in event of a serious curtailment of family income. Quaker Oats has shown increased earnings every year since 1952 and at 75 is not unreasonably priced for a quality growth stock.

Sheets and pillowcases are hardly glamorous in a financial sense, but *Pepperell Mfg* should be attractive for the individual seeking a sheltered investment. At 80 the stock yields 5% selling only slightly above its net working capital value of \$60 per share and at a discount to its book value of \$105. per share.

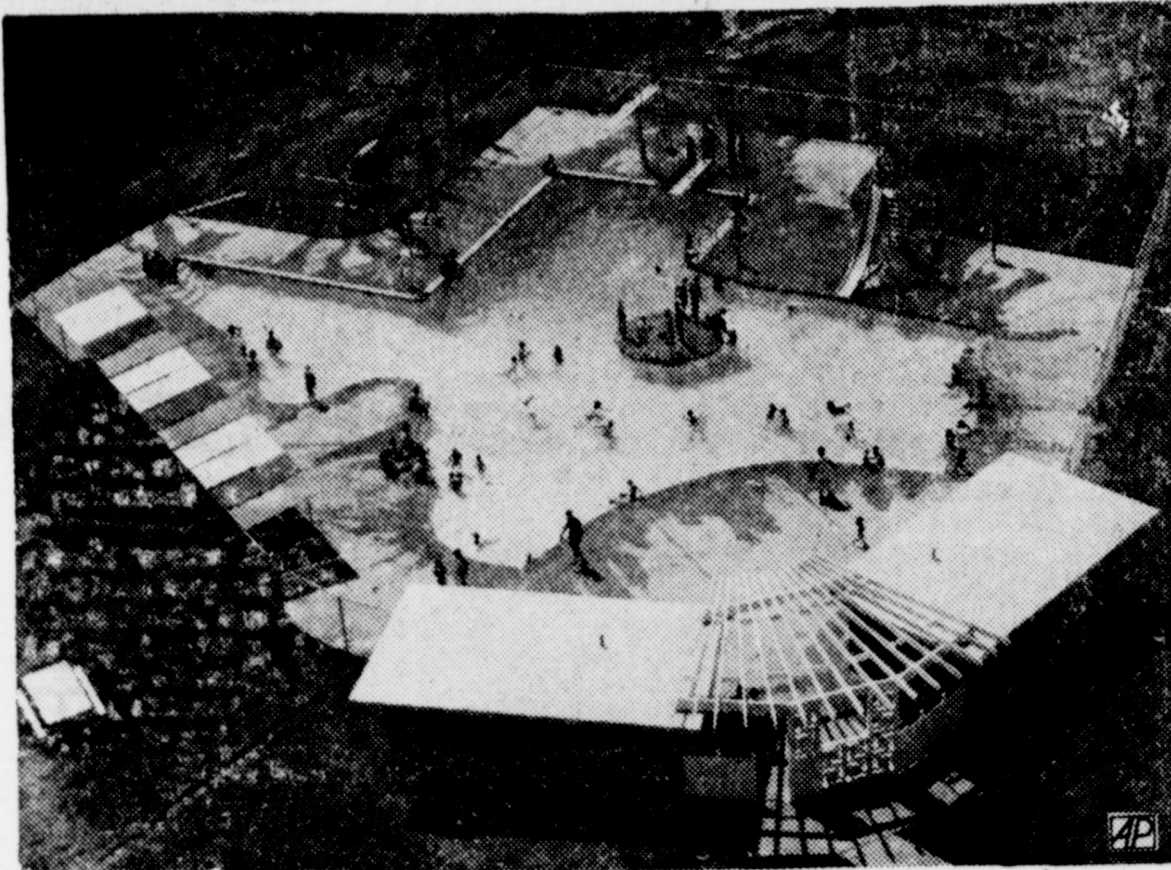
