

GATESVILLE MAN GETS HIS PART OF \$21,000 GIVEN AWAY BY UNCLE HENRY

S. C. Willingham of Gatesville is \$1,000 richer due to a gift of that amount—a \$1,000 cashier's check from his uncle, W. H. (Uncle Henry) Willingham of Ft. Worth.

Mr. Willingham, 86, who worked and saved during his life, came to Waco last Friday to the home of his nephew, Leland Willingham at 3017 N. 24th st. and passed out \$21,000 to nieces and nephews from all over Texas.

He'd quit school in the 4th grade and went to work to help support 16 brothers and sisters, working as a farm and ranch hand and steam fitter. He took a little saving from each pay check for 45 years, and sometimes as much as \$100.

The nephews and nieces gathered, thinking it was a family reunion and one was in a hospital in Kerrville, another in Boston, Massachusetts, and another's whereabouts is unknown. Before springing the surprise, he asked Rev. Len Layne of Brookview Methodist Church, who he'd asked to come, to lead the family in prayer. Then, he distributed the cashier's checks.

One request he made was that they save the money, and "Don't put this money into any automobile".

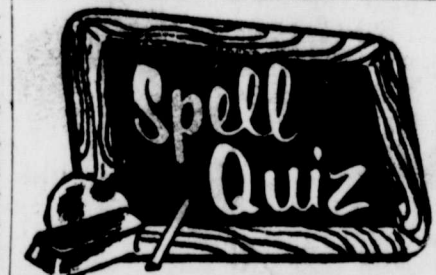

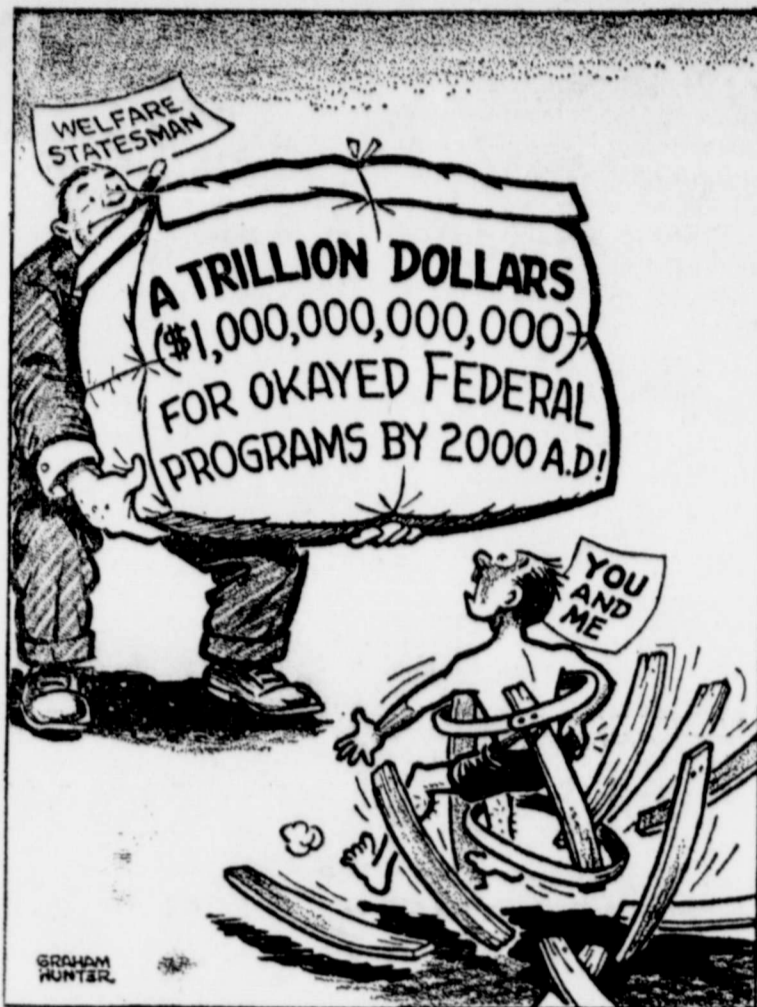

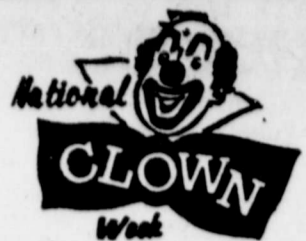

Another item, a cab permit was transferred from Riley Ross to Lloyd Logan.

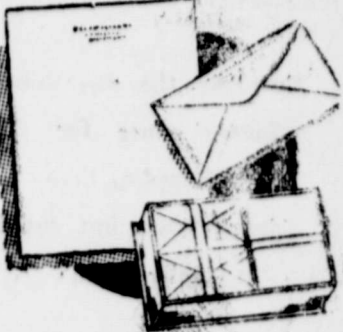

August 6, 1930 - New York State Supreme Court Justice Joseph F. Crater stepped into a taxi in Manhattan and disappeared into complete oblivion.

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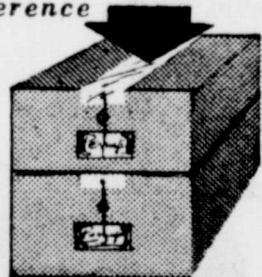

Pittsburgh Plate Glass offers the conservative but growth-minded investor considerable appeal at present levels. Not only is the company one of the two major producers of flat glass, but is also the leading manufacturer of paints. Presently, it is expanding

production of paints and chemicals and recently entered into a venture with another firm for the solution mining of potash. Its \$2.20 dividend appears secure and the company will probably continue its policy of an annual 2% stock dividend in addition to cash.

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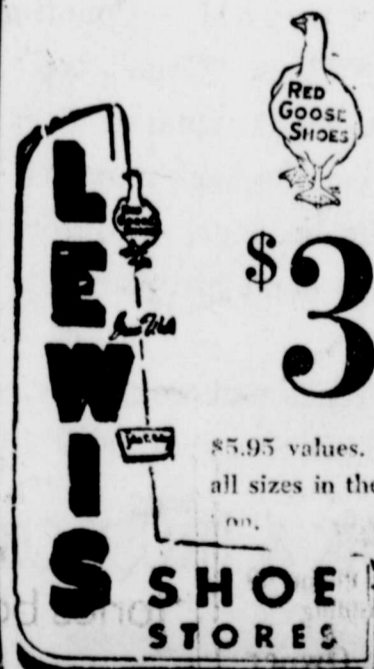

What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

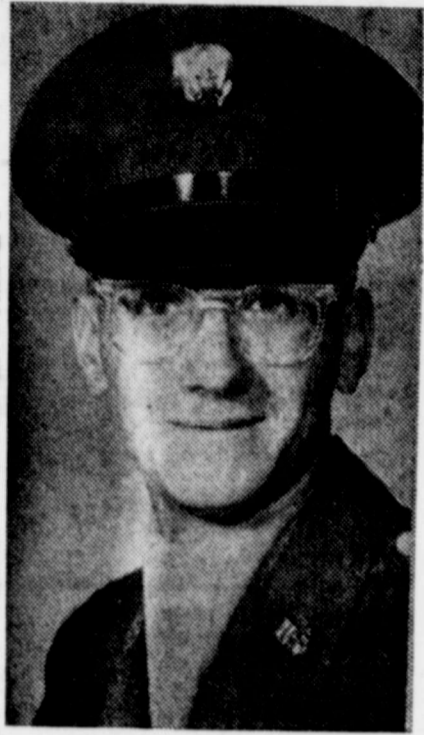
