

Lowe, Sarter Charged With Murder In Death Of Billy Malone After Baseball Bat Attack, SSB

Charles E. Lowe, 17, of Sundown and Robert Lee Sarter, 17, Mesquite, were charged with murder, Sheriff Winfred Cummings said late Wednesday afternoon, as a result of the death of Billy Malone, 43, retire Air Force sergeant, who had joined the Gatesville staff 14 months ago.

Malone was lured into the boys sleeping quarters Sunday night and it on the head with a baseball bat. He died in Hillcrest Hospital, Waco, at 8:40 a. m. Monday.

Nine boys escaped after the beating and were Ray Soliz, Jimmy Flores, Ronald Morris, all of Harris County; Alfred Lee James, Grayson County; Clifford Dean Sheets, Bell County; Johnny Haswell Talbert, Smith County, Levi Guzman, Travis County, and Lowe and Sarter.

Arrested Monday, 2 at 10 a. m. and 3 at 3:30 p. m., the first 2 5 miles from SSB, and the other 2 10 miles away, were Ronald Morris, Levi Guzman, Clifford Dean Sheets and Johnny Haswell Talbert.

River Oaks Patrolman Bill Skidmore, and other Ft. Worth Police officers picked up the 5 in the river bottom of the east fork of the Trinity River when they aroused suspicion because they were 'dirty, scratched, tired and hungry.' They did not resist. They'd walked a long way, making their way, it is thought, in a '50 GMC pickup missing from R. E. Gallegly's near Turnersville. The truck was missing between 12:30 a. m. and 2 a. m. Tuesday.

Admits Hitting Malone

Lowe admitted he hid the bat

under his bed as a part of the escape plan, but denied killing Malone. "I hit the guard one time on the back of the head," he told arresting officers. "I barely hit him enough to knock him out. I know I did not kill him because he came to and was talking with this other boy."

Lowe blamed the "other boy" for killing Malone.

Lowe said he hit Malone "a couple of times on the back" when he regained consciousness, but that the "other boy" hit the guard over the head.

In their escape, they drove the GMC to Hamilton, took a gun from another pickup and got about 15 gallons of gas from a farm storage tank, and clothes from a ranch house near Hamilton, and headed to Ft. Worth, running out of gas 15 miles out on Hwy. 377, and walked in. They threw the gun away in front of a new house just before they were arrested.

It's Nothing New

Flores, The Houston Chronicle reports, has been arrested 29 times since 1952—twice for carrying a pistol, and broke probation and was sent to Gatesville 3 months ago for 2nd offense of burglary and felony theft and auto theft, police said. He's 17 Aug. 10.

Norris has been arrested for runaway, burglary and felony 9 times, and was wnted as a parole violator May 12 and was sent to Gatesville May 13.

Soliz had been arrested 10 times since 1957 for burglary, felony theft and auto theft. School officials, Sheriff Win-

fred Cummings, County Attorney Don Nugent, Texas Ranger Capt. Clint Peoples and Ranger John Krumnow and other Rangers have been questioning the group since they first were caught and it is reported by officers who investigated that Sheets also helped beat the guard with the bat. He will be 17 in September and will be held to await trial after that date.

OTHER UNREPORTED ACTS CAUSE ACTION BY BSB EMPLOYEES

"Twenty-eight men, most of them attendants and employees of SSB met in Meeks Drive-In Cafe Wednesday and signed a letter to Governor Price Daniel asking for protection for personnel at the school", according to Scott Brookshire, Managing Editor, The Temple Daily Telegram.

They said a murder plot, identical to circumstances in the Billy H. Malone case had been uncovered within the last 24-hours with attendant George Stubbs as the target this time.

Weldon Meeks, case worker, joined with Stubbs in giving this account:

Two boys have confessed a plot to murder Stubbs with a baseball bat late at night in a dormitory he guards. They said they planned to lure him into the dormitory by starting a fake fight.

Stubbs said both boys have been placed in a detention barracks known as Oak Grove, for 90 days, as a result of a school discipline committee decision when a supervisor got confessions on the plot.

This was July 16, the day of the mass break. He had 50 "Spanish Boys" awaiting church, and one put a belt around his neck from behind and two others pinned his arms. Help arrived in time to assist him in breaking free.

Attendant E. D. Hight, said, "We have information that they may try it tonight, in any company out there."

Meeks said Wednesday, "We need protection in a hurry," and he had not reported for work Wednesday, because of his work with the group seeking protection. Hight said: "We want armed protection outside the building—not inside."

Supl. O. F. Perry is quoted: "I still feel like we have complete control here, and if I need the Rangers I'll call, but I won't call until I really do need them".

At the attendant's meeting these incidents were reported besides the murder plot against Stubbs: An attack with a chair on attendant Johnny Johnson last week; an attempt to attack attendant Pat White by placing a belt around his neck at supper-time Tuesday; an attempt to hit attendant Buck Brim with a fan; an incident where Hight told a boy to change places at the breakfast table and the boy said he wouldn't. Hight slapped him with his open hand, and the boy got up with a dinner knife and came after him. Hight knocked the boy down with his keys, cutting a gash on his head. This was reported to a supervisor and was told to forget it—that he would be protected from censure over the incident.

Perry told reporters, after the assault, and the boys have already started a collection for Mrs. Malone and her 4 children amounting to some \$200.

District Attorney Truman Roberts of Hamilton, vacationing in New Mexico, has been in contact with Coryell officers by telephone the last 3 or 4 days.

The Temple Daily Telegram reports Gatesville citizens have retained attorney Harry Flentge to assist Roberts in any investigation or prosecution of the case.

Lowe, sitting handcuffed on the floor of the sheriff's office awaiting questioning Tuesday night, was told Gatesville residents had heard a radio interview where he reportedly said he had no remorse for the guard being killed.

Pressed for a comment, he said simply, "I wouldn't do it over."

Lowe said, quotee by an AP wire report from Ft. Worth, he and others "want to go to jail, any jail, but not back to Gatesville."

"We know they'll beat us and stomp us as soon as we get back, they'll probably put us on the work detail. I'm going to run the first chance I get."

"I'm sorry I did it," Sarter said "But I feel about the same way when that those guards feel when they beat us up. It doesn't hurt them any when they hit us. It doesn't bother me that I hit him."

An officer in the Coryell sheriff's office summed up his feelings about the case and its related version of what had happened by looking at the 5 youths and saying, "They're wful liars."

Dr. James A. Turman, executive director of the Texas Youth Council at Austin, told The Chronicle he will urge the prosecution of all nine youths, and is also quoted: "This is a tragic, brutal crime. I will insist that the ones responsible for this murder be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law."

Sheriff Winfred Cummings said also Wednesday that the investigation of the crime was not yet complete and would probably be continued thru Tuesday of next week.

On Channel 10, TV, attorney Harry Flentge is reported to have called a meeting for 3 o'clock in the district court room to urge more discipline at the Gatesville institution.

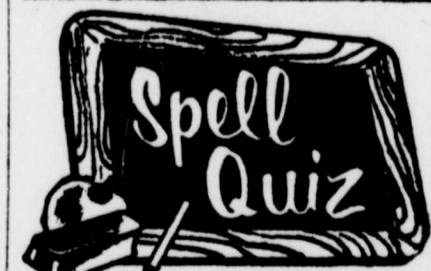

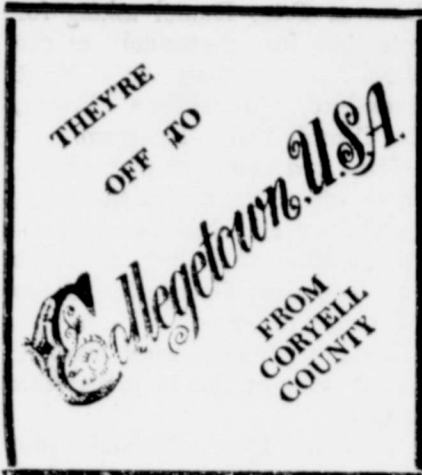

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

By the time this appears, U. S. may, or may not, have a man orbiting in outer space. As scientists say that instruments put into orbit gather much more information than a man can, it probably does not make much difference if a man orbits or not, except for some propaganda value, which is dubious.

Russians have done very well beating the tub for their not inconsiderable scientific achievements, and in doing so, have created in certain quarters of nation a dangerous trend of thought.

These apologists for America being second in some of these areas shout loud and clearly that "of course in a dictator system things can be accomplished more efficiently than in a free society."

The fallacy of this thinking rests on the fact that in many fields at present, there is not a free economic order. The indictment returned against General Motors by a federal grand jury charging the firm with violations of the antitrust laws to monopolize the diesel locomotive industry could well be used as a case in point.

The diesel principle of internal combustion engines is so far most efficient way yet devised to turn petroleum into motive power. In industrialized nations of Europe great strides have been made in this field.

But Department of Justice charges that General Motors has monopolized the electric

locomotive building field to the extent that last year it sold 84.1% of all diesel locomotives sold, increasing this share from 47.1% in 1946.

Justice Dept. charges that inasmuch as General Motors is possibly the largest shipper of freight in the U. S., it has informed railroads that unless they bought their locomotives, competing lines would get their share of GM freight business.

It is also charged that Baldwin-Lima-Hamilton, a famous old locomotive builder, has dropped out of the field. Also Fairbanks-Morse & Company has dropped out.

This despite the fact that Fairbanks-Morse developed for railroad use the opposed piston diesel engine which leading engineers throughout the world acclaimed as one of the greatest developments ever made in diesel engine design.

Only one other builder remains in the field, Alco Products, which only gets the business General Motors does not have. According to the Justice Dept. it would appear profits of monopoly are vast. Alco, it is claimed, makes only an average profit of 1.9%, the GM diesel division makes 20.2% profit.

Thus, it is quite erroneous to say that a dictatorship can make scientific advances faster than a free society.

But by the same token, it is not erroneous to claim that a dictatorship can make faster advances than a system where developments and improvements are stifled by the control of a monopoly. Trying to progress through monopoly is like an ant trying to move forward through a stone wall.

Dear Friends;

Most of you heard President Kennedy declare the United States position to the world. He stated in effect that he does not carry an umbrella and that there would be no appeasement, as at Munich. Appeasement always means war or surrender further down the line. He in effect said that if the Soviet is determined to have war that they can have it now, rather than at some future time after they have swallowed up many of our European allies.

On the other hand, he made it plain that we would start no war; that we would not allow Russia to wipe out our rights in Berlin or elsewhere.

It was necessary that what the President said be said. I believe that his stand will tend to reduce the probability of war. In the past our enemies have involved us in war because they thought we would not fight. President Kennedy wants to be sure that this mistake is not repeated. In this I

am certain the Congress will give him full support.

Last night the House finally passed the omnibus farm bill by a voice vote. The Senate had acted on a very similar bill the night before. We hope that the Conference committee can work out agreement of our differences next week.

The bill as passed contains no new approach. It does strengthen enlarge and improve many existing programs. It continues the Feed Grain program for another year and adds barley. It requires a cut of 10 per cent in present wheat allotments and then allows wheat producers to retire up to an additional 30 per cent on substantially the same terms now accord-

ed feed grain producers. It extends the law providing for the sale of surplus commodities for foreign currency for three years. It extends the Wool Act. (direct payments). It rewrites the Farmer's Home Act and organizes this important agency so as to make it more effective. It extends the Great Plains program. It makes it possible to give surplus foods to state and local governments for use in correctional institutions. It adds a few commodities, including peanuts, cranberries and several fruits to the list of crops which can use marketing orders if the producers want to.

All told, it is not a spectacular bill, but it does deal with wheat and feed grain in a manner which

is expected to greatly reduce the tremendous surplus of these crops. The price and volume of these largely control the price and the volume of livestock and livestock

products, and taken together account for the larger part of the income of American Agriculture. The bill is, therefore, of far-reaching importance.
