

CEN-TEX SAFETY BODY ORGANIZED HERE FRIDAY: 400 ATTEND MEETING

Four hundred citizens attended a meeting in the district court room Friday at 3 o'clock and a Central Texas Safety Committee was organized, each member paying \$1 dues, and an estimated 200 paid.

One petition was signed asking Governor Price Daniel and the Legislature to abolish the Texas Youth Council, which administers SSB.

Another, also asked that a board of trustees be formed, the trustees empowered to hire a superintendent to manage and control the school and "restore discipline" without receiving instructions "by remote control from Austin".

Harry Flentge, lawyer, who called the meeting made a 45-minute speech blasting at the governor, the youth council, some of the newspapers, and legislature. He was elected president of the committee and said he will appoint committees to carry out the organization's purpose.

He displayed a butcher knife, gun, a small pistol, table knives that had been filed to sharp points, a garrotte, and other weapons he said were taken from the boys at the school. He said: "Here's some of the things taken off your angels out there."

He charged Dr. James Turman, executive director, Texas Youth Council, runs the school by remote control from Austin, and called for stronger discipline, saying if they'd make the boys work harder days they wouldn't run off nights, and proposed military drills as a way of getting better discipline, and that they're fed better than the average citizen of Coryell County.

"The money collected," he said "would be used to investigate occurrences at the school, hold court of inquiry when needed and possibly to back a candidate who will help us get what we want."

RESOLUTION WAS INTRODUCED FOR SSB INVESTIGATION

"A resolution calling for immediate legislative investigation of the situation at Gatesville State School for Boys, was introduced Friday in the House. "Speaker James A. Turman referred the resolution to the state affairs committee, and Rep. Bob Johnson of Dallas, the sponsor, said he would request public hearing immediately.

"Johnson said he was not satisfied with a joint statement by Governor Price Daniel, Dr. James A. Turman, executive director of The Texas Youth Council, and Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger, chairman of the investigating committee, said, however, he did not feel the probe is needed.

"The resolution, if adopted, would instruct the House General Investigating Committee to:

"Make an immediate complete and thorough investigation of the Gatesville school, the physical plant, the administrative policies, and disciplinary practices in an effort to determine the validity of these conflicting accusations and allegations from the inmates, guards and citizens."

"On the heels of the Chronical Story, Daniel, Turman and Garrison conferred on the matter most of Thursday and issued a joint statement: "Every precaution will be taken to prevent another mass escape or other incidents."

One senator said juvenile offenders have been treated "too lightly." Another urged establishment of a state psychiatric hospital for emotionally disturbed children; another two said separation of the more serious juvenile offenders is imperative and one called for passage of the "discretionary juvenile trial" bill; one was sympathetic to the plea of attendants at the school that they be given armed protection. All this, according to The Houston Chronical.

A former resident of Gatesville, he was a brother of Mrs. Ruth Morse of Gatesville.

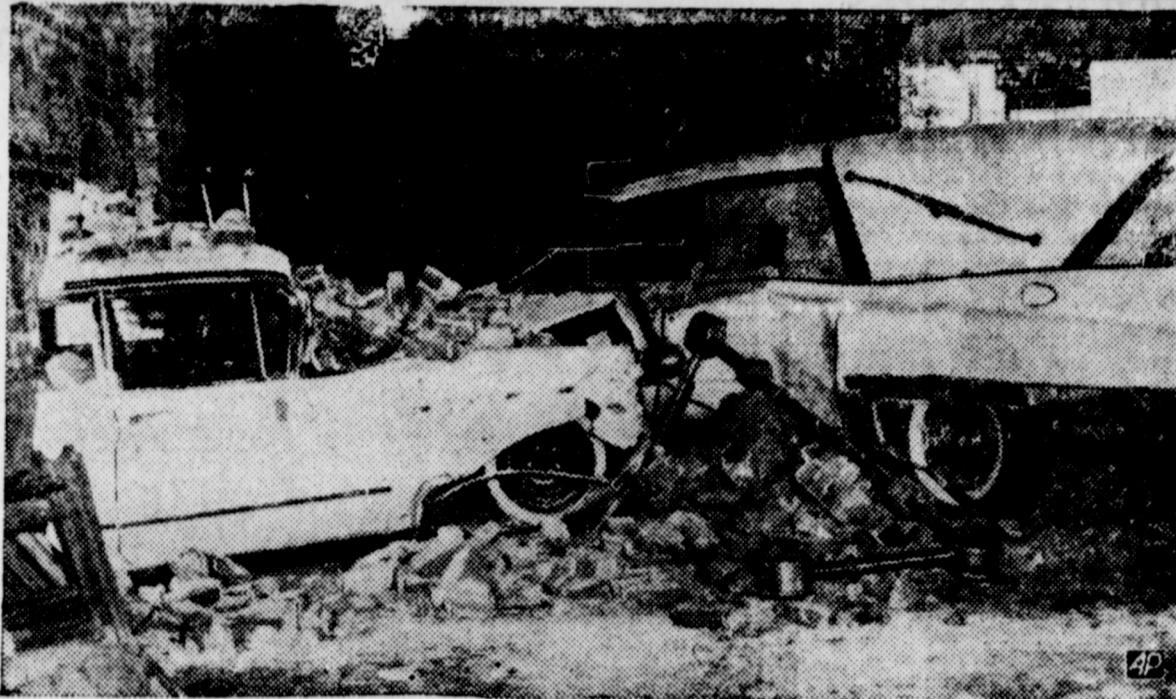
He was a native of Ellis County and taught school in Johnson County. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

If their idea is proved wrong, they accept the fact and make an intelligent change in belief. Those who move are leaders and influence others. They are not easily swayed by chang-

ing public opinion but stand up for their convictions.

I read an article recently about an editor and publisher of an old and influential newspaper in another country.

When Communism first came to power, the editor supported it by printing what he believed to be the truth. Within a week, however, he began to realize that Communism was bringing hatred to his country instead of the freedom it had promised.

Even though he knew he would lose his paper and possibly his life, he began writing editorials about the things he thought incorrect in the communistic regime. He moved by writing the truth.

Forced out of his own country by the threat of death, he is now living in a neighboring country. He is publishing his newspaper once again. Moving against injustice, he is taking a strong stand for his beliefs.

Christ is the supreme example of a man who moved. He moved not only by His teachings and miracles but also by His daily life. His kindness, forgiving spirit and helping hand stirred men's hearts more than the most powerful words.

By letting Christ become the master of your life you can become one who moves. He will give you the strength and power you need. He will give you abundant life.

The Berlin Situation and Its Possible Effect On the Stock Market

Recently Berlin has been prominent in the news and we will not attempt to evaluate this situation other than to state the belief that a crisis of some sort may occur this fall, the outcome of which is rather hard to predict. This situation, however, has caused enough concern to the Administration so that we may expect several actions that would affect the securities market. A partial mobilization appears to be in the cards along with a step-up in the defense program. These two steps in turn could lead to greater government controls and perhaps higher taxes. The question is of course how would the investor be affected and how can he best protect his financial interests.

It would seem likely that if the Berlin situation turns very serious there will be some deterioration in investor confidence generally and lower stock prices may result, especially in view of the high price/earnings at which most stocks are selling. Particularly vulnerable would be the glamour stocks selling at prices based on earnings for the future, especially when one considers these may be especially vulnerable to an excess profits tax. The stocks that will benefit primarily from peace-time activities as well as stocks of companies subject to government regulations or currently under investigation are also likely to suffer. On the other hand, depressed

issues such as textiles and railroads might benefit considerably from a partial mobilization and would be candidates for purchase at the present time. Secondary stocks in heavy industry selling at reasonable statistical values should also do rather well. Larger investors might look to tax-exempt bonds with the threat of high taxes in the offing along with possibilities of easier money during a defense economy.

This is probably the time when investors should review their portfolios carefully bearing in mind what may lie ahead and try to switch into stocks that are most likely to benefit, eliminating those that might be most vulnerable.

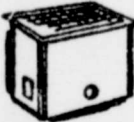

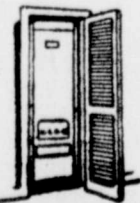

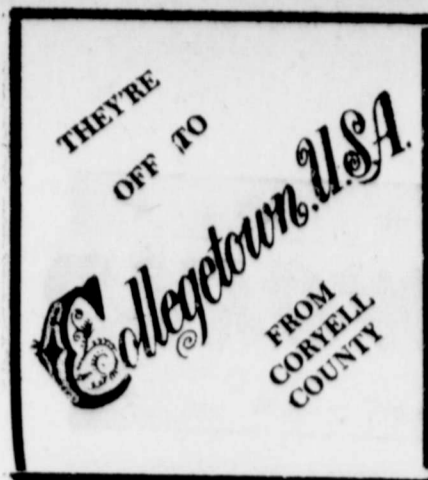
