

**Seventy-Seven Name List
Handed Governor Daniel
Monday By 11 Men**

A 11-man delegation led by Weldon Meeks, a caseworker at SSB, visited Governor Price Daniel Monday and handed him a 9-point petition signed by 77 employees.

Included was an 8-hour day, 2 attendants at each dormitory, and an armed patrol in the school area, elimination of the speaking of Spanish at the school, elimination of the count system, elimination of state talk-prison-type slang.

Daniel asked if they'd talked to Supt. O. F. Perry, and they said no; they'd tried to, but their supervisors wouldn't listen. Daniel called Dr. Turman and they talked to him and two of the members of the TYC. Turman told them the meeting should lead to "sane conclusions."

He said he'd received no request from the superintendent or supervisors for SSB changes, and that the Council was vitally interested in the school's operation and would not "tolerate brutality, or on the other hand, coddling."

The greatest crime a boy could commit was attacking a guard and the worst crime a staff member could do was mete out discipline. He said the school had a committee for that.

Turman said he would not be intimidated by anyone, up to and including the governor, in carrying out the laws of the state.

G. B. Davis said the last thing they were told when they left Gatesville was that they would lose their jobs. They also said if they took appropriate measures to control the boys, they would be fired, and if they didn't they'd be fired also.

Turman told them changes were currently being made to alleviate somewhat their grievances.

**Nathan Curry, 16 Cisco
In SSB Wednesday Between
3 and 4 P. M.**

Nathan Curry, 16 of Cisco received a hearing at 9 a. m., Wednesday before County Judge John Hart. He arrived at Gatesville State School for Boys, according to Superintendent O. F. Perry between 3 and 4 p. m., Wednesday, and was immediately processed.

He was charged with delinquency in connection with the June 29 slaying of Mrs. Florence Hussey, 53-year-old divorcee and secretary of the First Baptist Church in Cisco.

The hearing was 'closed' and DA Earl Conner, Jr., said he would announce the hearing was completed.

Highest penalty the youth could receive in the hearing was assignment to the Texas Youth Development Council and placed in Gatesville State School for Boys, which he was.

If officials desired he could be held until he is 17 and then be charged with murder and given a regular court trial as an adult.

The youth's parents, X F. P. Curry, declared the son is innocent.

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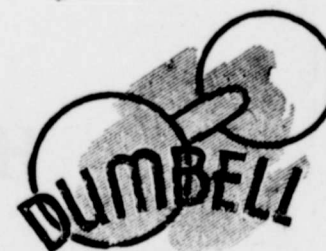

from our Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Dear Friends:

On yesterday both the House and the Senate approved the "Conference Report" on the much discussed Farm Bill. The President is expected to sign it shortly. For those of us who served on the Conference Committee, it was the end of many weeks of work.

As I have explained before, there is no new approach to the farm problem in this bill. The wheat section is new, but the methods used to try to reduce the accumulation of unneeded surplus are but an expansion and refinement of long-used practices, but the bill is vital to every taxpayer because without it our expenditures would continue to mount. We simply cannot have price support for unlimited production over a long period of time. This bill tries to more nearly balance supply and demand.

Events over the past few days in widely separated parts of our country have clearly demonstrated that we must give more attention to the basic virtues which we have historically associated with the American home. The mass escapes from the Gatesville State Reformatory culminating in the brutal killing of a guard may seem to have no connection with the recent rash of airplane hijackings, I think the two are related and they reflect a terrible weakness in the moral training of too many of our young people.

Many of us have properly criticized the derelictions of the Cuban government and have talked about what we should do to Cuba. I agree that if we could get a clear case where the world could see and understand that Castro's government was responsible for stealing our planes that we should follow them right into Havana, but the sad fact is that of the 3 hijackings of last week, two were committed by Americans — and the boys who have been killing and defying the law at Gatesville are all Americans.

I feel that most of this crime stems from one of two sources: first, a complete failure of some of our parents to accept responsibility for their children's training and second, the failure of our courts and juries to deal adequately with those who flaunt our laws.

In other words, I think that we must deal firmly with both domestic law breakers and with international hoodlums like Krushchev and Castro, and I fear that we won't be able to command much respect on the international scene until we clean up our own domestic 'hoods'.

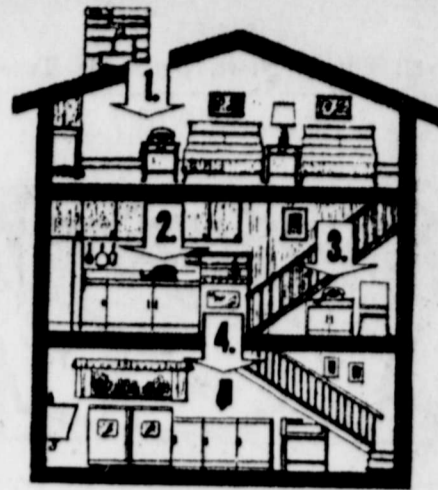
