THOUGHT WED CONTINUE THE CONFUSION ON SALES TAX DUE SEPT. 1

Since nobody seems to know, we thought we'd add to the confusion on the purported sales tax due to hit you Sept. 1. That's sudden!

"The bracket rate provides: 1 to 24 cents, no tax; 25 to 74 cents, 1 cent; 75 to \$1.24 2 cents; \$1.25 to \$1.74, 3 cents; \$1.75 to \$2.24, 4 cents; and on each additional 50 cents or fraction, an additional 1 cent."

If you get into the exemptions, that's another question, and they don't know in Austin, yet, and this is the 21st.

We'll probably give you something more official-later. Some folks are buying (and advertising) now, to beat the tax.

In Case You Want To Beat Your Wife It Cost One Man \$195.

AUSTIN — Bus trips on Southwestern Transit Co. to Gatesville will come under the 5 per cent rate increase granted recently by the Railroad Commission, but trips between Fort Hood, Killeen, Belton and Temple were exempted Friday.

The Rate Division of the Commission issued an order taking Gatesville out of the list to which the increase will not apply. The order was made effective Aug. 18

Governor Says Sixteens Should Stand Trial

Gov. Price Daniel, disturbed over violence at Gatesville State School for Boys, said Friday, Texas should enact laws permitting "hardened offenders" to be tried as adults at the age of 16 rather than the present minimum of 17.

"... Juvenile courts simply should have the authority to turn over to the district courts some cases involving 16-year-olds," he said.

He said he will again urge such action by the legislature at a special session he said he will call later in the year.

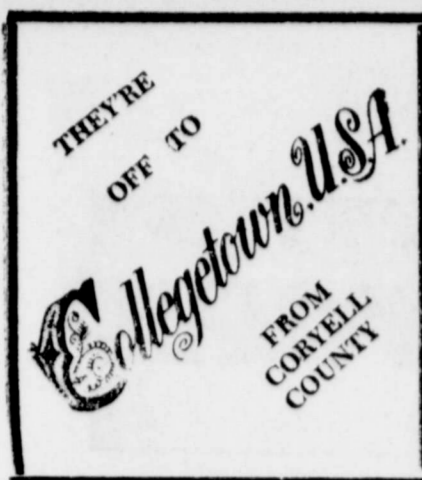
Here is a very clear and important comparison. Our appeasement-minded leaders refuse to give any hope to the enslaved victims of the interna-

CHANGES
 IN
 SOCIAL
 SECURITY

There was one recent change in the social security law that, while minor, directly or indirectly may affect everyone under age 72 receiving old-age or survivors insurance benefits. This was a change in the so-called "retirement test."

Under the old law, a person could earn \$1200 and receive all of his monthly social security benefits. \$1 in benefits was withheld for each \$2 he earned from \$1200 to \$1500 and \$1 for each \$1 earned over \$1500. Under the new law only \$1 is withheld for each \$2 earned from \$1200 to \$1700 with an additional dollar withheld for each dollar earned over \$1700.

This means that under the new law a person eligible for social security benefits may earn up to \$1,700 and receive more in total earnings and benefits than under the old law. Of course, for each \$1 earned over \$1700, \$1 is withheld in benefits.

An important part of this change, too, is that it applies to earnings for this year. People who are receiving benefits and earning \$1200 or more may get more information about this by writing or visiting the Temple Social Security Office at 909 First National Building.

There is no change in the provision that, regardless of how much a beneficiary earns in a year he will get a benefit check for any month in which he is over age 72 or in which he neither earns more than \$100 in wages nor performs substantial services in self-employment.

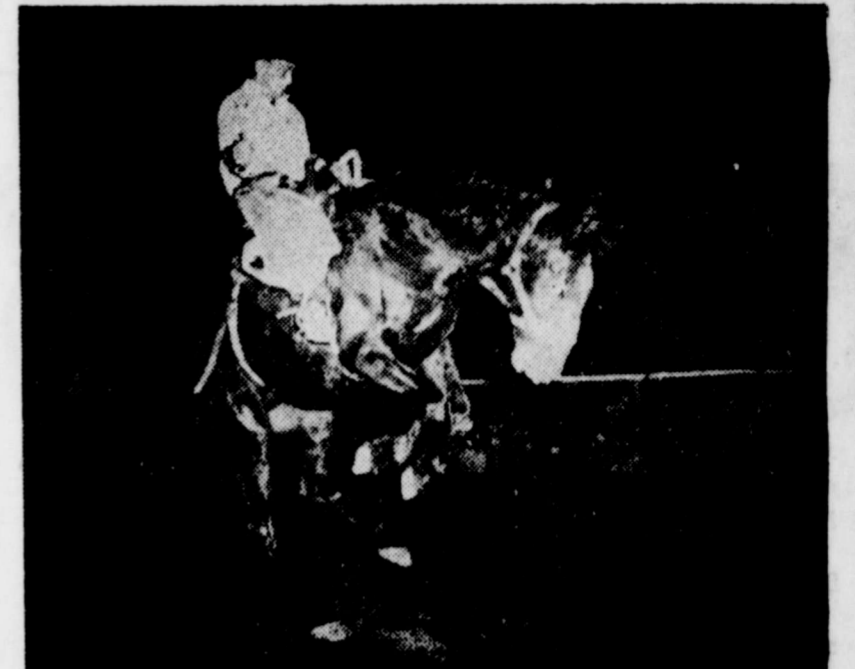

MR. CARUTH 100 YEARS

Mr. Caruth (C. F. Sr.), Gatesville's centegtnarian, became 100 years of age Saturday, August 19th, and that afternoon, said: "I've done everything I wanted", but quickly added: "I'm starting on the next one".

A resident of Gatesville the past 67 years, he told relatives and friends at age 90, he'd make it, and he did.

Born in Collins County, one of 8 children of X George M. Caruth. His father fought with the Confederacy, and in 1865 on a trip to Memphis, Tenn., he stuck his head out the covered wagon and yelled "Hooray for Lincoln!" Men crowded around the wagon and he ducked for cover, and the Tennesseans made him "take it back".

He was married to Miss Neely Bone of Gatesville he met while she was visiting relatives in Celina, and they were married Dec. 28, 1886 and lived there until 1891, and she persuaded him to buy a farm in Coryell County "out of the mud". He moved to town in 1894, and was manager of the Gatesville Water Co., a stock company, at \$35 a month, quitting nine years later at \$75. He was one of the chief stock holders of Gatesville Power & Light Co., becoming president after the death of Dr. J. R. Raby and the company sold to Texas Louisiana Power & Light Co., in 1924.

He was a bank director 30 years, with the Gatesville National and later the National Bank of Gatesville. Mrs. Caruth died in 1956. He is a member of the Christian Church.

He received a broken hip in 1952, from which he recovered, moving around with a walker and last December he had cataracts removed from his eyes, and still reads stock market quotations in the dailies.

TEXAS LABOR DAY DEATHS PREDICTED

AUSTIN — The State Department of Public Safety predicted Saturday that 30 persons in Texas will be killed in traffic accidents during the Labor Day week end.

In making that prediction, Col Homer P. Garrison warned motorists that records show this three day period to be one of the most dangerous times of the year on the highways.

Garrison suggested four ways drivers can cut down the toll: allow sufficient time for travel, obey all traffic laws, anticipate dangerous situations and stay alert.

The highest Labor Day holiday toll since World War II was in 1951 when 46 persons were killed in 33 accidents. The lowest was in 1949— 23 killed in 19 accidents.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

In the recent survey of independent business sentiment on the President's proposed 10 point tax reform program conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business among its district chairmen, the one point they were overwhelmingly in favor of, by a whopping 93.4% was the recommendation to place cooperatives under same tax laws as private business with which they compete.



Under today's system when money is power, and money represents the power to modernize a business to continue to compete, or to expand to also survive, a private business can only retain that part of its earnings remaining after taxes to make any necessary improvements. First earnings must be diverted for taxes before anything else.

But cooperatives who are competing with private independent business are permitted to retain even 100% of the earnings in the business. Members are given I.O.U.'s on which they pay no personal tax until such time as the paper is picked up for cash.

Thus, it is no problem for cooperatives to continue to expand, while their privately operated competitors, unable to escape taxes in this fashion, are greatly handicapped.

Commenting on this measure, one district chairman, a leading businessman in northwest, claims over 40% of nation's business now moves through tax-free cooperatives.

To many businessmen... the widespread growth of business enterprises under the guise of cooperatives, there is a strong drive toward socialism in the country.

As one district chairman commented, "Am definitely for taxing cooperatives the same as every other business. These co-ops are a form of socialism and socialism has about ruined Sweden and every other country where it exists."

Others commented unless cooperatives are put under the same regulations as independent business, in due time, there will not be employment producing enterprise. The survey showed quite a concern among businessmen on the question of providing more jobs for Americans.

On the president's proposal to tax undistributed income U. S. corporations derive from foreign plants, 71.9% voted in favor of this reform.

As one of the businessmen—district chairman commented, "If labor costs keep driving industry into foreign locations, there eventually won't be any source of taxes here."

Another commented "American plants in foreign countries are there for two reasons, first, to exploit cheap labor; and second, to avoid taxation."

Or as another substantial businessman — district chairman commented "I have checked on the number of American owned plants abroad, and it looks like more to come. No wonder there is so much unemployment here." In the 240 page survey report there is ample evidence everywhere, thinking citizens are asking "There may be problems in Timbuctoo, but what about us American folks at home?"
