FT. HOOD (NOT NORTH) TO REACH 40,000 OR MORE: FINGER ON 49TH ARMORED

RETAIL SALES TAX RATE

The law requires the retailer to collect a tax of 2 Per cent from the purchaser. Some items are exempt from this tax. The schedule below applies only to taxable items.

Although individual items of less than 25 cents are exempt, when several of these items are purchased at a time, tax must be collected on the total purchase.

Purchases 1 cent to \$50.24

NOTE: For purchases totaling more than \$50.24 add 1 cent of tax for each additional 50 cents of purchase, or fraction thereof.

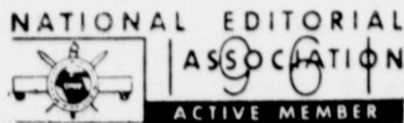

"I'm an ordinary wife of a Ford worker," she said, "and I think I'm entitled to speak—WHY DON'T YOU ALL GO BACK TO WORK?"

There were scattered boos and catcalls. But Mrs. Smith had

scored. In a subsequent vote the strikers elected to defy their leaders and return to work.

Said Mrs. Smith, "I was fed up seeing my husband sitting around miserable at home. The union leaders don't represent the men any more."

This has resulted in a shocking weakening of our government's internal security programs, and it has hampered congressional committees investigating Communism. The anti-anti communist ideology prevailing in government policy-making levels played a very important part in the establishment of a communist government in Cuba, 90 miles from the shores of this nation. On August 30, 1960 former Ambassador to Cuba, Earl Smith, told the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee that "Without the United States, Castro would not be in power today . . ."

On April 13, 1961 newspaper reports informed Americans

that the Defense Department had ordered changes in a speech to be given the next day before the Houston, Texas Navy League by Rear Adm. Samuel B. Frankel. Arthur Sylvester, assistant secretary of defense for public affairs, read an advance copy of Frankel's speech and found parts of it "unacceptable." What Sylvester found objectionable were portions of the speech suggesting that "anyone who thought he could negotiate with the Russians was deluded, was obviously mistaken, was being taken in." Of course anything in Adm. Frankel's speech suggesting such was 100 per cent correct. Cold facts regarding the communist attitude towards negotiations, and their record of following their stated attitude, place beyond doubt the utter impossibility of fruitful negotiations with these lying conspirators. Yet, a high ranking U.S. Navy officer was forbidden to use these facts in a speech.

Maj. General Edwin A. Walker was suspended as commander of the 24th Infantry Division in Germany for circulating anti-communist material to his troops in order that they may know their enemy. Truly, the anti-anti communist outlook reigns in government policy-making circles today to the joy of the communist conspirators.

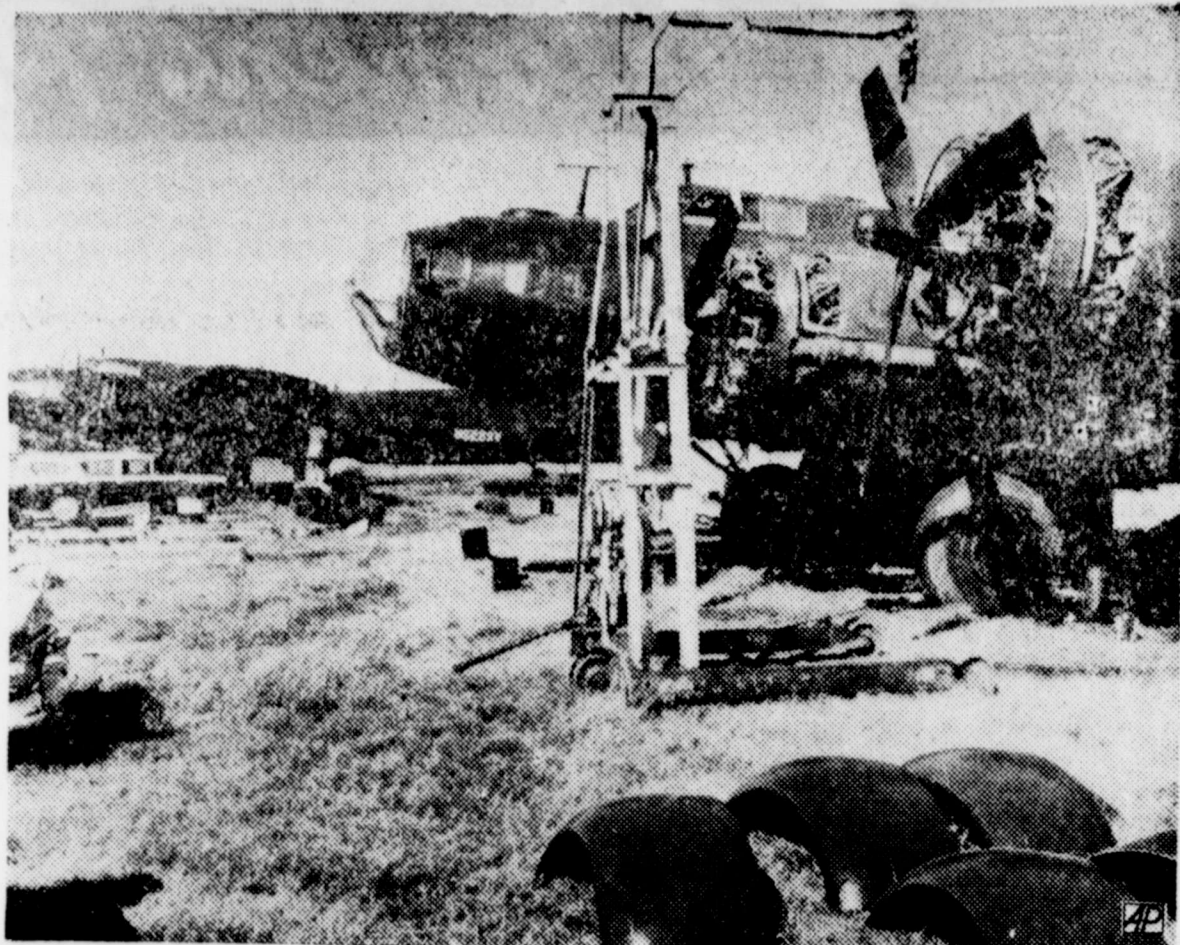

from our Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Dear Friends:

At this time of the year conversation begins to revolve around the date of adjournment. The Congress does not set a date long in advance, as is often the case in State Legislatures, but when the necessary appropriation bills are passed and the so-called "must" bills are acted upon, everything else is likely to be ignored. Again, this does not mean that all the pending bills are dead as it does at Austin. On the contrary, all pending bills will still be before Congress when it reconvenes in January.

Actually, the Congress stays in session too much of the time. As I see it, it is just as important for a Representative to spend time at home as it is to spend time in Washington. No one can really "represent" a District unless he knows the district. In addition to knowing his district, every Representative should in these days of world tension have all the first hand knowledge he can get about the rest of the world. It is not sufficient to simply vote against foreign aid. As I have pointed out, I have repeat-

edly done this and I voted against the conference report on the Foreign Aid bill just yesterday (August 31), but we are going to have a Foreign Aid program, and I think I should know as much as I can about the needs of the world and that I should do all I can to make the program work. This means that Congressmen should have more time both at home and in other parts of our country and of the world.

Earlier this week an effort was made to pass a limited Federal Aid to Education bill. It is true that the measure did not go nearly as far as was first proposed in the amount of federal aid and that it contained a renewal of the aid to impacted areas and the College Loan and Scholarship programs, both of which are popular and both of which I have supported. It did not, however, firmly establish the principle of general Federal Aid to local schools. I do not believe that we should turn our schools over to the Federal Government. I realized that this bill was only an effort to get a "foot-in-the-door" and that it would be followed by a more far-reaching bill. I voted against Federal Aid.

I am sure that a bill providing for payment by the Federal Government for the extra costs incurred by local districts where Federal installations have placed an extra burden on the schools will be brought up next week. I expect to support such a measure.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

"It is about time we recognize that we have a genuine crisis in our country and to follow policies which go beyond the realm of being a generous free world leader which will ultimately weaken the strength of the free world."

This statement, made by Rep. John Ashbrook of Ohio, was part of his remarks on his observations so far as a member of the House Special Com-

C. W. Harder is investigating the Impact of Imports and Exports on Employment in the United States.

He reports that the State Dept. gets too many people to listen to them when it is brought out that restricting imports of residual oil will help employment in the coal mines of America. State Dept. says this will create a crisis in Venezuela. But crisis that exists in American coal communities is not, presumably, supposed to be recognized.

Rep. Ashbrook points out that we allow Canada to ship oil into the U. S. duty free, but if we ship coal to Canada, the Canadians charge 30 cents per ton duty.

He also takes a broad swipe at the bureaucratic news releases that say the balance of world trade is in favor of the U. S. If that were true, he points out, we would not be continuously losing gold reserve.

As a matter of fact, Rep. Ashbrook says, in 1960 our give away items, counted as part of world trade, not only knocked out \$5 billion dollar

balance favoring U. S., but left deficit of \$3.8 billion.

In addition, the U. S. under the farm programs is selling cotton abroad for 30 to 40% of the world price, last year shipped 600 million bushels of wheat with a subsidy of 65 cents per bushel. Without the half billion dollar subsidy on these two products alone, there would not have been \$2 billion worth exported. Thus, figures on American import-export trade are fallacious.

Rep. Ashbrook also points out that Russia reneged on paying into the United Nations its share of the costs that have so far been incurred in keeping things quiet in the Congo. The United States picked up the Russian share of this tab totalling \$15 million. Where did the money come from?

Here is Rep. Ashbrook's answer "Congress would never appropriate this sum for such folly so that takes \$5 million from the President's contingent fund and \$10 million from the foreign aid fund and literally gives it away to aid our enemy. Congress has already appropriated these amounts so we have no check on them. A logical question, however, is just who is obligating us to help pay the communist's share. Again we see a sign of our national weakness. We should insist that the Reds pay up or get out but instead the communists make mockery of the U. N. and we blithely make our own beleaguered taxpayers the fall guys once more. In effect, this means we are financing both sides of the Congo operation."

This all seems to add up to one thing.

America's future appears to depend on an aroused Congress.
