

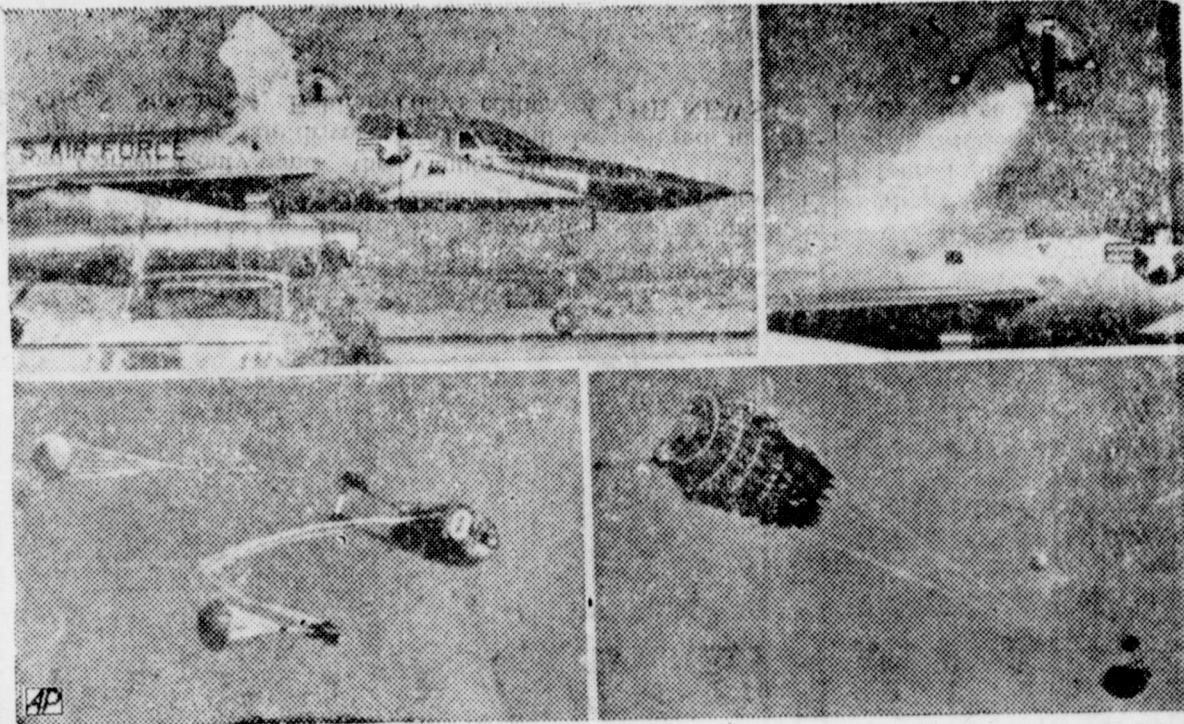
DYING OR CANCER



"Mr. Sam"—Hoose Speaker Sam Rayburn 79, is dying of cancer in Baylor Hospital in Dallas. Hospital test showed Thursday there was no hope, but doctors say they "haven't given up hope".

A sample from his groin showed a "metastatic malignancy". That meant the cancer developed somewhere else and that the cells have broken loose and spread the malignancy to other parts of his body, and a spokesman said "has probably spread to most of the lower half of his body." "No further surgery is anticipated. He thinks he has "lumbago".

He was first elected to Congress in 1912 and reelected every 2 years since, being there longer than any other man in history and speaker twice as long as any other man. Eight presidents came and went while he served in the House. "Mr. Sam" acknowledged his own power saying he served "with" instead of "under" the presidents, and his power was exceeded only by the president.

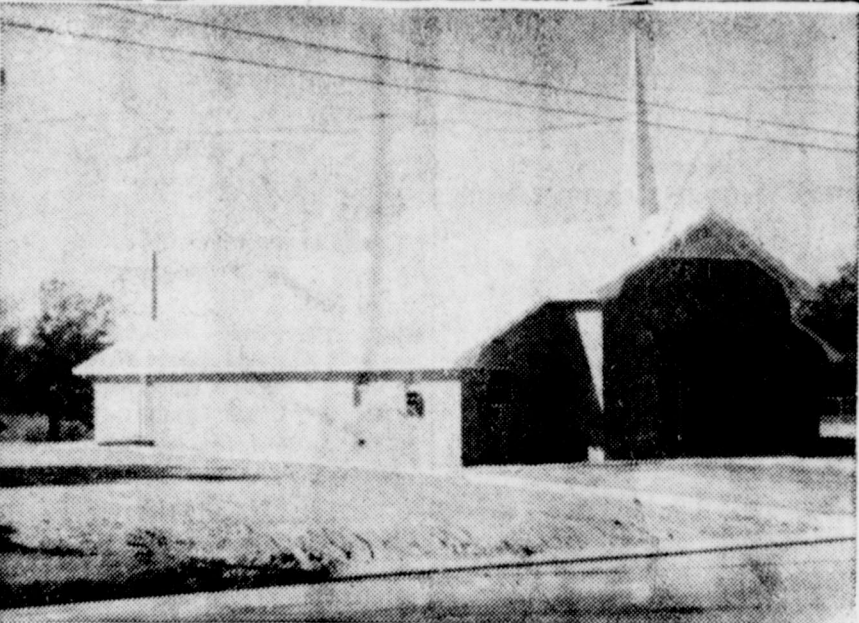

YOU'RE THE POOR FISH!

News Item: House of Representatives votes \$20 million to build new aquarium for the District of Columbia.

Now, let it be understood that we aren't against fish. And we're not against aquariums either. In ordinary times it might be a dandy idea for the residents of Washington to have a fine new aquarium.

But these aren't ordinary times. Our nation is fighting a cold war; government spending is astronomical and growing more so every day. Every hour of the the day the Federal government is spending \$1 million more than it takes in. A \$10 billion deficit is in prospect.

With the government spending that kind of money, one might ask "what's wrong with a mere \$20 million for a badly needed aquarium?" Again we say aquariums are fine—we like to look at

fish, too—and for all we know \$20 might not be an unreasonable figure.

But it is unreasonable, we believe, to spent millions—either a few millions or many millions—for nonessentials, for unnecessary luxuries, in an era when the interest on the public debt alone costs us taxpayers \$9 billion a year.

Yes, we taxpayers are the poor fish and that aquarium at the nation's capital would be just a symbol to remind us of it. We have enough reminders already—high taxes, extravagant spending, waste and inefficiency, undue federal regulation, unwanted federal welfare programs, creeping socialism—an endless list.

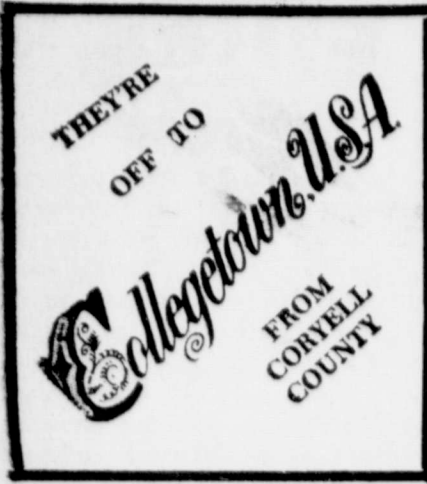

"Fire might hit my house, don't be ridiculous!"

Yet the possibility of fire in your home isn't so ridiculous when you look at the annual figures: some 550,000 U. S. and 50,000 Canadian homes destroyed by fire, more than 6,000 deaths in home fires, according to National Fire Protection Association estimates.

One effective answer to this threat to our homes is good family habits about fire.

Good family habits include such matters as care with matches and smoking, keeping heating and cooking equipment in good order, proper use of electrical fuses, appliances and extension cords, and frequent cleanups of combustibles.

High on the list of family safety measures is a carefully prepared and rehearsed escape plan for fire emergencies, with alternate routes from every room.

A nightly inspection at bedtime also makes good sense. This is the time to make sure, for example, that no smoldering cigarette is wedged in the corner of an upholstered chair or sofa, that appliances and portable heaters are turned off, that all interior doors are closed to help keep any fire from spreading.

The fire-safe family doesn't gamble with fire. It knows the odds are in the fire's favor.

Children home alone, the youngest ones especially, would be helpless to escape if fire should strike while you're away.

This tragedy happens every day and actually is the cause of one out of every three child fire deaths.

Never leave small children alone. Even if it is necessary to leave the house for only a few minutes ask a neighbor to stay with the children. And whenever you must go out for a longer time, leave the children in the care of a baby sitter who not only has been told what to do in case of fire but who is also physically and mentally capable of carrying out such instructions.

Clothing can burn

A little girl was seriously burned when her dress caught fire because she was too close to an electric heater. An elderly woman's dressing robe was ignited when the loose sleeves brushed the burner of a kitchen stove. A small boy playing with other children was fatally burned when he fell or was accidentally pushed into a bonfire.

These are typical cases from National Fire Protection Association files.

Clothing fires are a major cause of fire deaths each year, as well as thousands of painful, sometimes disfiguring injuries. The most frequent victims are children and the elderly.

The trouble starts when people fail to keep a respectful distance from flames, sparks—any source of intense heat. Among them are matches, smoking materials, stoves, heaters of many types, fireplaces, outdoor fires.

Some types of clothing and fabrics are more prone to catch fire than others. Be careful of lightweight, loosely-fitting clothes, ruffles, flounces, long and loose sleeves, filmy nets and gauzes. Some sweaters with brushed long fibres ignite easily. Little girls flared and many-petticoated party dresses are risky, as are many improvised children's costumes.

If clothing does catch fire, the first and life-saving rule is this: **DON'T RUN. ROLL ON THE GROUND OR FLOOR. SMOTHER THE FIRE WITH A COAT OR BLANKET.**

Anyway, it's the BIG GAME, the final toughie for both teams in the District 17-AA play.

Stanley Everett scored 28 points after two kick off returns of 80 and 83 yards, to lead the Hornets to a victory of 50 to 18 here Friday night.

Gatesville's jower house of an offense was sparked by quarterback Bob Scott's passing and skill in running, who threw for one touchdown and ran from the one for another. Everett took the opening kick off and ran it back

80 yards for a thrilling start. Starting on the Lions 41 yard-line was the beginning of what was to be a TD for Bob Scott who scored from the one on a quarter-back sneak.

Teague's first TD came when Mike Seale passed to Mark Steen for a 38 yard pass and run play which was good for 6. The next scoring play by Gatesville covered 23 yards, this time on Scott's pass to Petty. Everett ran for the two points.

Fullback Roy Capers dashed 56 yards for a tally to close out the half.

In the third quarter Gatesville got right back to work by Everett climaxing a 37-yard drive by scoring from three yards out. Scott passed to end David Martin to make the conversion. The Hornets did some substituting in the fourth quarter but this didn't hurt their play, sub quarterback Kenneth Schaub hung 6 more on the board for the Hornets by circling right end for 10 yards.

Gatesville is still as big a threat to the District as it was last year.

Teague fumbled on their 9 yard line and the Hornets recovered setting up the next TD. First they

pushed to the 7 and then sent the hard driving back up the middle for the 6 and then around right end for the conversion.

Teague roared back with another scoring pass and run play, from Seale to end Jim Hendon for 60 yards. Everett took the ensuing kickoff and ran 83 yards for a touchdown.
