**CITY LOOKS TO FEDS  
FOR SEWAGE PLANT  
ENLARGEMENT**

City Council was notified Tuesday it's application for a grant from the US Public Health Service for aid in construction of a new sewage disposal plant and enlargement of the sewer system has been approved, but there are 2 qualifications to be met.

The city must furnish documentation that a successful bond election has been held, or other financial arrangements have been completed by Feb. 15, 1962; and, must submit for review, plans and specifications meeting Texas State Department of Health approval before Mar. 15, 1962.

It was reported a grant covering 30 percent of the construction costs can be obtained.

A bond issue for the sewer system has been discussed and a bond election tentatively set for early February. Cost mentioned is \$300,000. Aldermen will push the study of water and sewer rate charges as one step toward the bond issue, to pay off the bonds, and employment of a fiscal agent to handle technicalities of the bond election and issue.

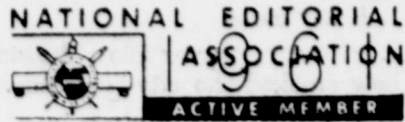

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## VIEWS and NEWS



from our Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Dear Friends:

This is written as I fly over the mountains of Northern California. We have just passed over Mt. Shasta on one side and Lassen Peak (the only active volcano in the Continental United States) on the other. I am returning with a wonderful look at the National Forests of the Northwest. The Agricultural Committee has jurisdiction over the National

Forests, but few of us realize just how important those forests are from an agricultural standpoint.

First, the National Forests cover a substantial part of all of our Western and a lesser area in most Eastern states. Second, those forests produce a very important part of our lumber and wood products. Third, the National Forests have long supplied grazing for a substantial number of cattle and sheep—especially summer range. Fourth, our National Forests are contributing very significantly to the prevention of erosion and the protection of our water resources. Finally, the National Forests are protecting scenic beauty and providing recreational opportunities on a scale quite comparable to our National Parks.

It is my belief that our National Forest should render even broad-

er and more varied services to our people. Definitely, there are not simply wood lots and should not be treated as such. On the other hand, the conflict between uses naturally brings on disputes which Congress must ultimately settle.

Right now there is a bitter dispute going on as to the amount of land which should be reserved for "wilderness" areas. These are areas in which the land can never be used and which no road can

be built. I think there is a clear duty on our society to protect wilderness areas of special beauty for the future generations. I think that it is desirable to maintain areas in all parts of our country in its natural conditions, but I think that it is a serious mistake to set aside too much land. To do so denies most people of this generation any opportunity to enjoy these scenic resources, for very few indeed have both the money and time to "pack" into a wilderness area. Most of us are dependent on roads and automobiles. We must, therefore, as in so many other matters of government, try to achieve and maintain a proper balance. Our Committee is trying to determine the proper balance. Our committee met in Spokane, Washington, Monday morning and drove across the state with representatives of the Forest Service. We visited a number of forests as well as sawmills, hard and soft board plants, paper mills, etc. We came on to Oregon where I have been greatly pleased at the tremendous volume of timber still available, as well as with the excellent conservation job which both public and private forests are generally doing.
