

**CIVIL DEFENSE SCHOOL
"STUDENTS" COMPLETE
12 HOURS TUES. NIGHT**

Some 200 Corvell County citizens completed 12 hours of Civil Defense classes Tuesday night which were held in GHS Auditorium and were conducted by Mr. McIntosh, Consultant from the Texas Education Agency.

Topics discussed were: purpose and objectives of Civil Defense; responsibility of the individual and government agencies; family planning; fallout, chemical and biological warfare; shelters, family and larger, construction and stocking.

Several teachers from most of the rural school took additional training and are available to conduct adult classes in Civil Defense protection. These classes may be formed by contacting the local superintendents.

Only the back gate was damaged. Another truck came and picked up most of the load, altho some cattle are thought missing.

Seven SSBs got out Wednesday night and so far, 2 have been picked up near Coryell City. No cars are reported missing.

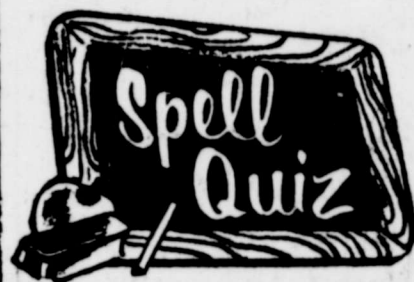
White Sworn In. Earke Turns In Badge-Gun: Opinion By Mears To Hwy. Dept.

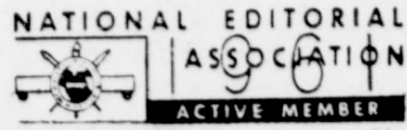

What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

In an official order, Attorney General Robert Kennedy has announced that from now on, until further notice, in cases of anti-trust violations, where the government is entertaining accepting a consent judgment from the defendants, the proposed consent judgment will be made public at least 30 days before it is entered in court.

This is perhaps a step forward in the objective that has been sought by the C. W. Harder nation's independent businessmen voting through the National Federation of Independent Business.

As it has been in the past, the government could find some operation guilty of a violation of the anti-trust laws. The defendant corporation, rather than having the matter go to trial, can accept the government's findings and agree to a consent judgment. This judgment has been entered in the court and the case and its records then closed, with usually the defendant agreeing to cease and desist, and sometimes paying a nominal fine, in addition.

From the standpoint of independent competitors who have been severely damaged, or ruined by the practices to which the defendant pleaded guilty, there is then no opportunity, from a practical standpoint, to exercise the right of the injured party to sue for triple damages.

Of course, the injured small competitor does have the right to sue, but from a practical standpoint, the injured com-

petitor does not have the funds to carry on long and expensive search for evidence that the government has engaged in, usually with the assistance of the FBI.

It has long been the viewpoint of independent businessmen, that inasmuch as Federal tax funds were employed to dig up the findings that causes the guilty party to agree to a consent judgment, that this evidence, gathered at tax expense, should be available to the injured small competitors in bringing damage suits.

While this new order by the Attorney General does not accomplish this full objective, it at least means that it will not be possible, as in the past, for a guilty firm to engage in private negotiations to cease illegal practices, and to have the matter handled with the utmost of discretion.

Inasmuch as some 70% of the anti-trust cases have been handled in this manner, the issue is quite large here.

The purpose of the order is to permit injured competitors and other persons and government agencies, to comment upon the case at issue. Justice Dept. on the basis of such additional information received, will reserve the right, if it is deemed to be proper, to withhold the government's sanction to a consent judgment, and thus bring the matter for a full scale trial.

Probably the greatest gain for independent business gained here is a forthwith recognition by government that violations of the anti-trust laws are illegal, and that before government should accept a plea of guilty and then consent to a modest penalty, the parties injured by the action should be heard from.

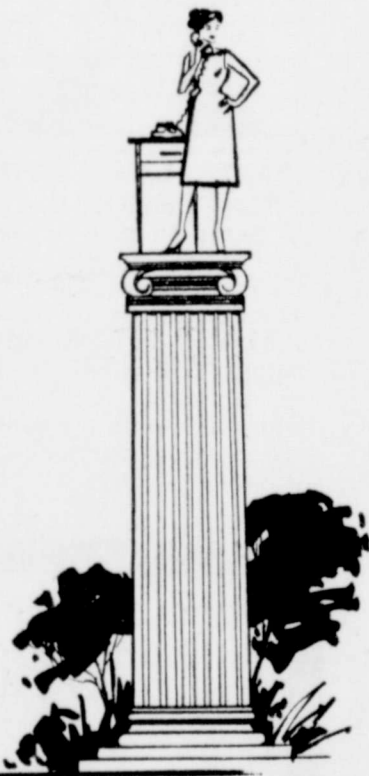

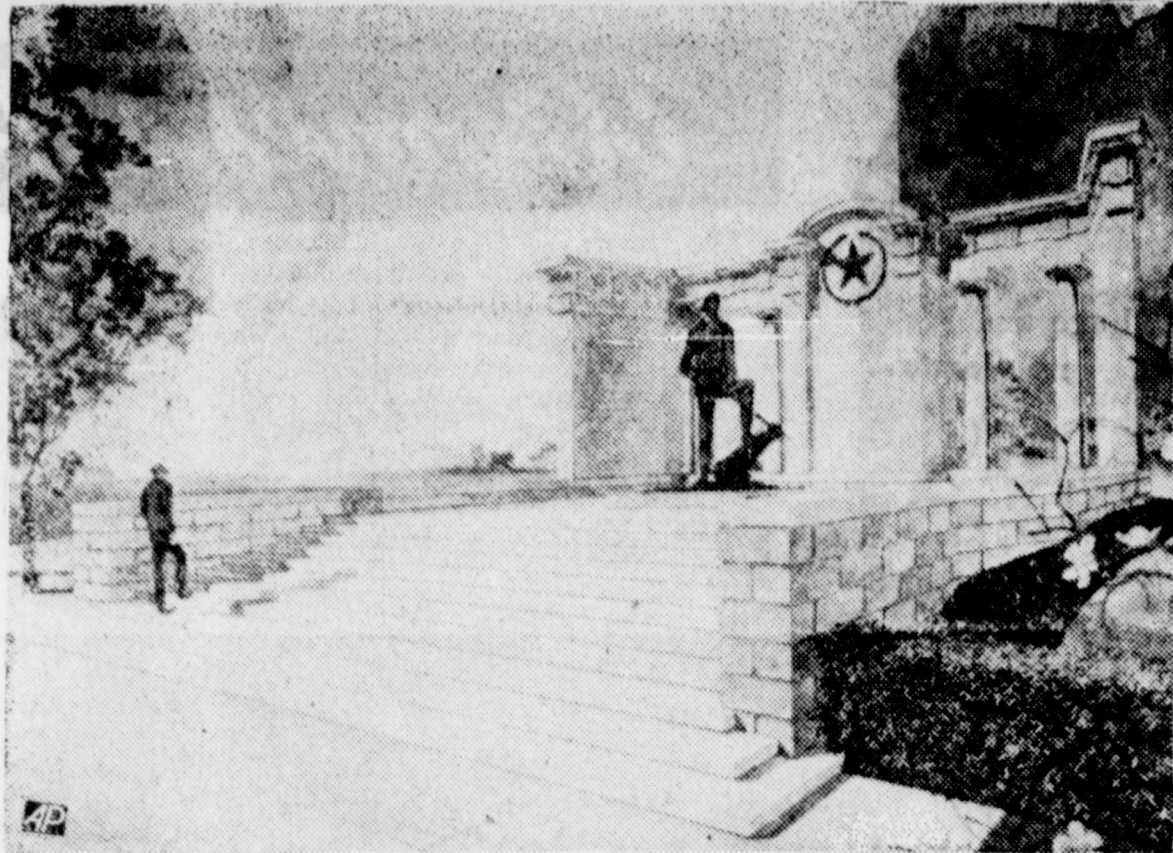

from our Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Dear Friends:

In recent weeks there has been a great deal of uninformed criticism of the sale of obsolete planes and the training of some Yugo-Slav pilots at Perrin Field. I am sure that most of the people who have protested are very sincere and are deeply concerned. I believe, however, that many of them do not know the reason for the action.

First, it must be remembered that while the Yugo-Slavs are Communists, they are not international communists. Unlike the Russians, they simply claim the right to practice any economic system they want in their own country. We claim the same right. They have not tried to force Communism on anybody else. Indeed, they still do most of their business with the Western World. There is deep friction between Yugo-Slavia and the U. S. S. R. It is, of course, true that we cannot rely on the Yugo-Slavs to help us, but neither can Russia. It has seemed desirable to encourage a wider breach between Yugo-Slavia and the U. S. S. R.

Second, the Yugo-Slavs maintain the second largest army in Europe much larger than our own army. This force lies directly on the Russian flank. Russia could not invade Western Europe without leaving 30 to 50 divisions to neutralize this force. We have helped we felt that we were tying down more Russians for less money than we could any other way.

Third, Yugo-Slavia is going to have an Air Force. It is going to get its planes either from the West or from the Communists. The so-called neutrals cannot supply. If Yugo-Slavia uses Russian-built planes, it must depend on Russia for parts and replacements. Under such circumstances, the Yugo-Slavs would be under lots of pressure to line up with Russia. If on the other hand, she uses U. S. planes, they will be effective only so long as she can get parts and replacements from the U. S. It is not probable that with U. S. planes, she will be far less likely to line up with the Soviets? And if worse comes to worse and she joins the U. S. S. R., won't an Air Force dependent on U. S. parts be far less use to our enemies than a force which they could supply?

It is for these reasons that the U. S. first gave Yugo-Slavia planes and is now selling them. We are, of course, taking a risk but it seems a good gamble. No one has tried to "sell us out to the Communists." Both responsible Republicans and Democrats have tried to do what seemed most likely to strengthen America. Both have recognized that we cannot rely on Yugo-Slavia to help us, but we have tried to keep them from helping the Bear. I hope that none of our over-enthusiastic citizens will force the Yugo-Slavs into Russian arms. This could hurt us far more than the planes we have sold.

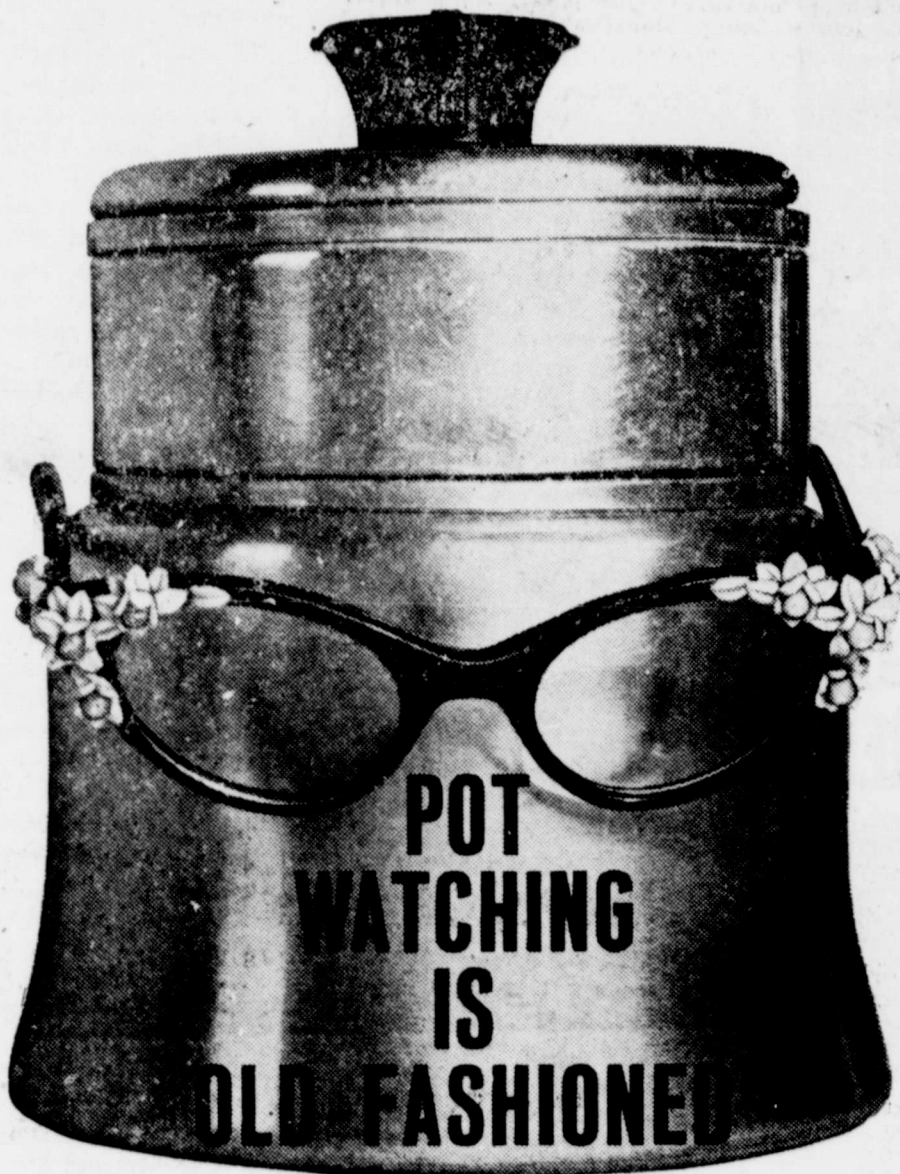
