Too, this is Coryell County's only District Champion and possibly the only Bi-District or higher contest it'll be our privilege to see.

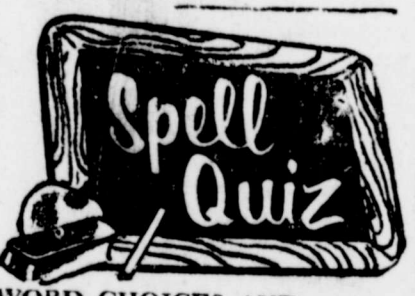

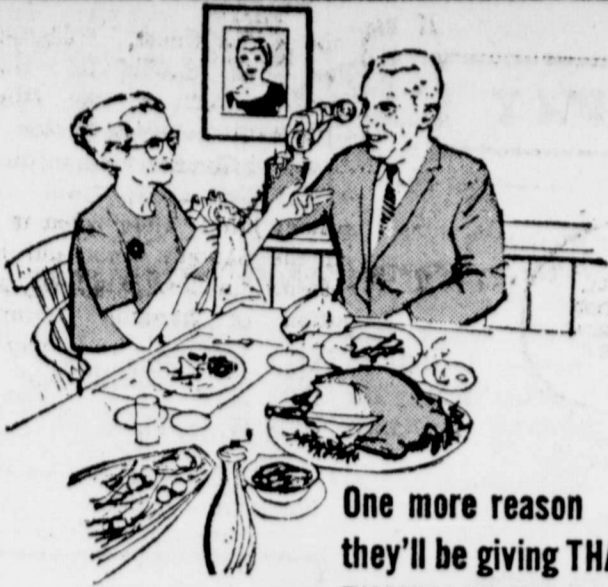

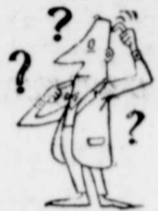

Screwworm Program Target For CA Vo-Ag Teachers In Texas And Coryell County

Look out screwworms! Screwworms which are costing stockmen an estimated loss of 100 million is being attacked by a movement initiated by County Agent LeRoy Hoermann and Vocational Agriculture teachers, Raby Smalley, Sam Adams, Carroll Smith, Jim Dagherty, Robert Hopson, Leslie Sheldon, James Daniel and R. D. Mitchell.

At a meeting of interested persons, M. J. Hanna was named chairman, W. D. Cooper, secretary, treasurer and a County Committee Jack Saunders, Albert Jacobs and Marshall King, Virgil Lockhart, Tom Callaway.

They will support the new Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation in its drive to improve this situation—screw

worms receiving and disbursing funds, sponsor research and educational programs on animal health including diseases, insects and parasites to end the hazards to livestock.

First, they will attempt to control the screw worm, teamed up with the USDA, by release of sterile male screwworm flies over the State which results in infertile eggs and elimination of the fly population.

Producers are asked to contribute 50 cents per head for cows, horses and steers and 10 cents for sheep, goats, swine and deer, which can be made to any member of the committee.

Animal health not only affects producers but the economic loss affects business and consumer. The overall program is expected to cost several million, but if the screw worm can be eliminated,

the annual savings will amount to several times the cost.

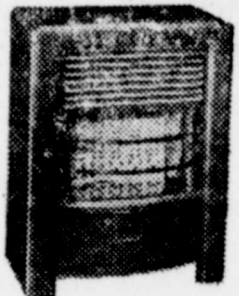

YOU CAN SURVIVE ATOMIC ATTACK—4

Rael Shelter Is a Real Life Saver

By Prof. Willard F Libby

The more comfortable and elaborate you can make your shelter the better, in order that you may remain inside for two weeks if need be.

After the first two or three days, the X-radiation from the fallout would not kill you. In very heavily dusted areas it might be strong enough to cause illness, or shorten life if you got too much exposure. Genetic effects on later generations might follow also.

Acting on Civil Defense radioed instructions, you might be able to move away from a small, cramped shelter to areas which had not been so contaminated and were safer.

With no harm, you could make quick trips in and out to hunt necessities. Particularly so if you had a small, compact basement shelter. For the rest of the basement likely would be receiving less radiation than the remainder of the house, or outdoor ground.

For \$300 to \$1,500 and up, you can have larger shelters, in basements or outside, providing cots, better facilities, larger stores of food and water.

A 10,000-to-One Advantage

Prices rise as you install electric generators, chimneys and air pumps and air filters, and additional comforts and room. A very definite offset, however is that sometimes the larger shelters can double as a playroom, den, storage room, or other useable space in the basement, or underground.

The better, the sturdier and better supplied the shelter is, the more protection there is against fallout, and even blast effects.

My own simple shelter, in which I could use sleeping bags, increases fallout protection 100 fold. But a \$5,000 shelter could give 10,000-fold protection.

Underground shelters, using concrete or metal, cost more than basement types. The Office of Civil Defense Mobilization and private contractors and architects offer many suitable designs.

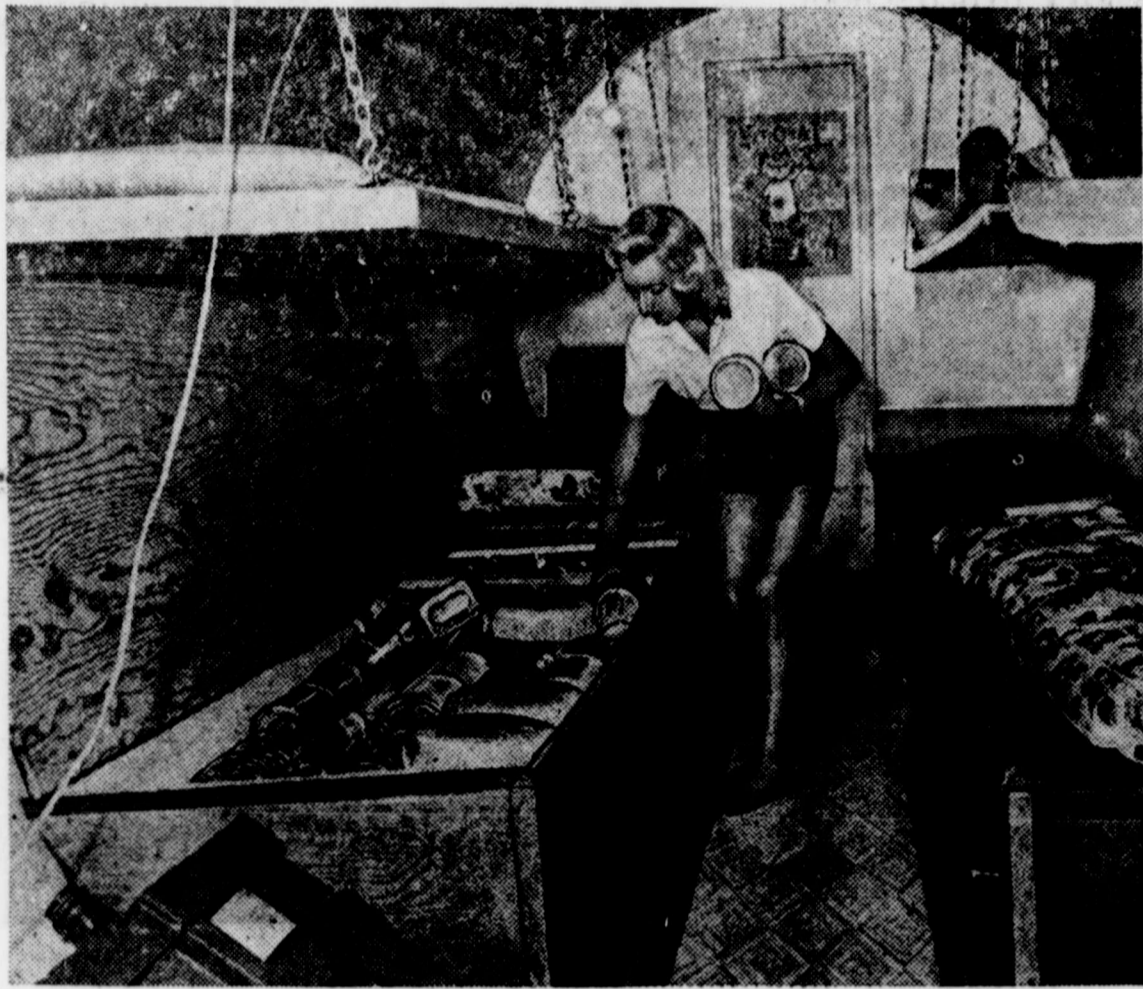
In some areas, as along the Gulf Coast, the ground is too marshy or the water table too high to permit digging underground shelters. There the only solution is above ground out-door shelters, small or large depending on budget, but following the rule the materials used must be dense enough to keep out the fallout radiation.

Apartment dwellers face varying problems.

Apartment Lag

Some apartment buildings have basements or areas which can and should be prepared and stocked with supplies to last two weeks for all tenants.

In many areas, though, three to four story apartment buildings have no basements, and thus no ready made place to hide. One solution is community shelters, preferably underground, large enough for 100 persons for 14

Is it time to Renew, Lew?

Trying to run away in your car, from the rain of approaching or continuing fallout could be foolish, unless in particular areas you had official advice to do so. The pattern of fallout can be unpredictable. Fallout coming to rest on your car could bathe you with dangerous or even lethal radiation. The thin metal top of an automobile would not stop the rays.

After a few days, or the two weeks, you may well need your car to move somewhere else, or to resume normal activities in your own city or neighborhood. So keep it gassed up. In an impending attack, roll up the windows and preferably, keep it in a closed garage. If the car has been out in the open, hose off the fallout from it before driving it.

And you might well keep some emergency supplies in it, including a shovel to dig fox holes if renewed attack caught you out in open areas with a new cloud of fallout approaching. (Tuesday: How to tell when to leave your shelter.)
