In the under six month class Dolan Dutches owned by Ruby Thompson took first prize. In second for the under six months was Junior a fine dog owned by Ruby Mench.

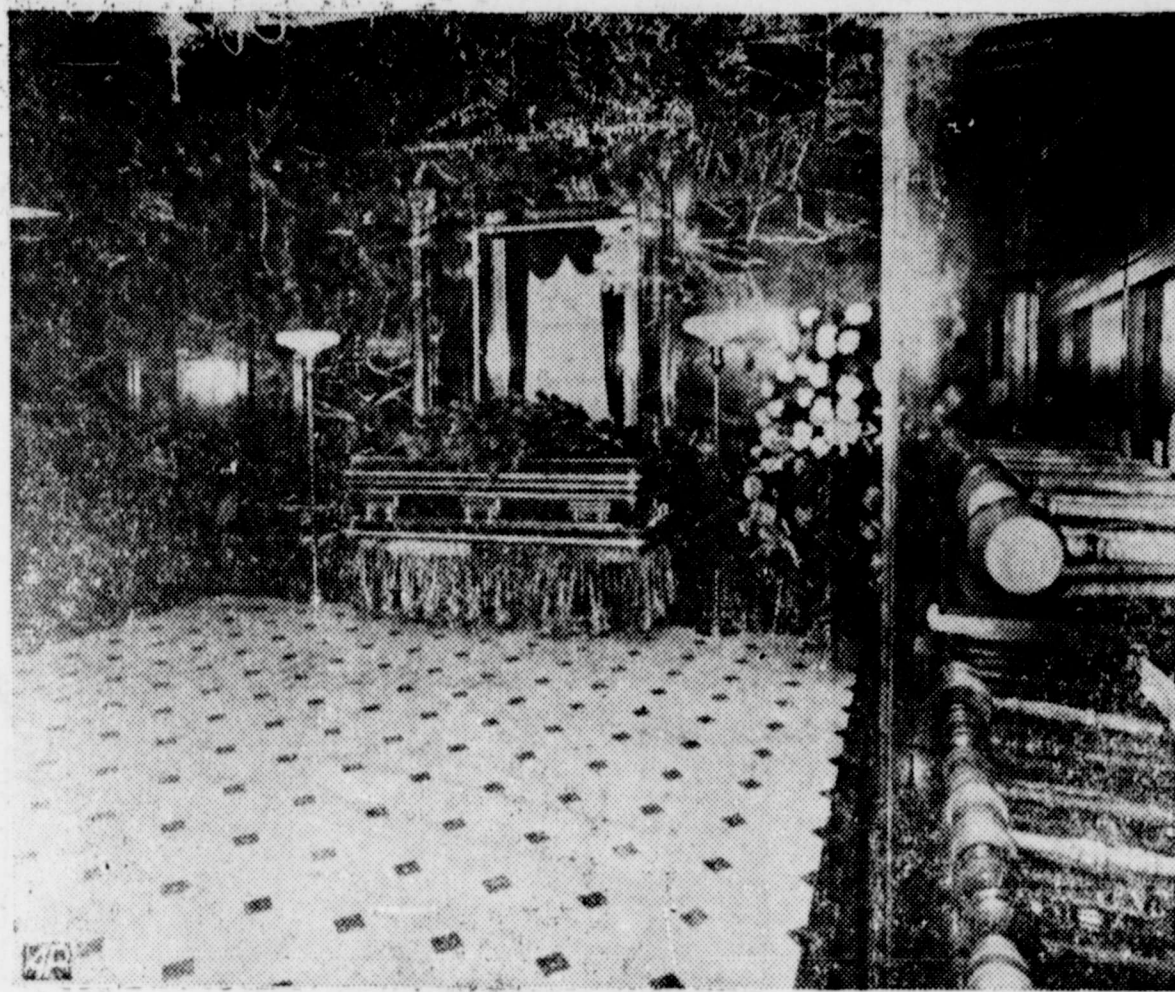
In the Coon Dog Derby a female dog named Bess took home the honors. Bess was owned by Mr Walske

DEER HUNTING: HERE'S  
THE DOPE, DOPE**

FORT HOOD, Tex., Nov. 18—Deer hunting at Fort Hood is permitted only under carefully controlled conditions, post officials said this week in reminding hunters of this area that "climbing the fence" is dangerous and illegal. This year, even more than in past seasons, unauthorized hunters are a danger to themselves and to training troops. Stepped up training is keeping thousands of Fort Hood's soldiers with their heavy equipment and guns in the field for days and weeks at a time. No one—soldier or civilian—may legally hunt deer on the Fort Hood reservation except as a member of an organized party under the supervision of a qualified guide.

All weapons used must be registered with the Fort Hood Provost Marshal. This registration can be completed by hunters from off post at the Rod and Gun clubhouse.

Detailed information and reservations may be obtained by contacting the Rod and Gun Club. The clubhouse is on Pilot Knob, just north of the motor pool area of the cantonment. The phone is Overland 5-4734.

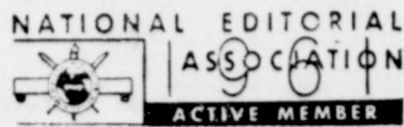

**52 BUILDINGS SOLD AT WINK FOR \$15,000**

WINK (Spl)—Nineteen commercial buildings and 33 homes were auctioned off by the Urban Renewal Agency Tuesday to clear the way for redevelopment of the area.

Approximately 125 persons attended the sale. The 52 buildings were sold for a total of \$15,000. The new owners must move them from their present sites within 60 days.

All but four of the homes sold Tuesday were what the agency calls "substandard." One of these substandard dwellings was purchased by Dick Strawn of Wink for \$1. The Urban Renewal Agency paid \$1,600 for this house and lot.

Top price at the sale was paid by Foreset Walker of Barstow. He paid \$2,250 for one of the four "standard" dwellings. The agency bought this house and lot for \$7,350.

from our Congressman **BOB POAGE**

November 13

Dear Friends:

Next week we will observe Farm-City Week. The purpose of this observance is to get a better mutual understanding between those who produce the nation's food and fiber and those who buy it. Certainly, it is clear to all that only as a result of efficient production by our farmers have the people of our cities been able to eat so well so cheaply. It should be equally clear that unless city people pay a fair price for the food which the farmer produces that more and more farmers must quit farming and go into direct competition with the people of the cities.

In the final analysis it is to the advantage of both farm and city people for farm products to bring a fair price on the farm. It is no use to tell a Coryell County Dairyman that milk is selling in the stores of Gatesville for 20 cents a quart while the producer is only getting a little over 11 cents. The farmer has been getting a constantly smaller portion of what the city family pays for food for several years. Last year it was about 38 per cent. Twelve years before it was about 53 per cent. Oftimes this explains how it happens that although the consumer is paying more and more each year, the farmer-producer is actually getting less and less.

Recently, a columnist stated that ten years ago the wholesale price of milk paid to New York farmers was 12.1 cents per quart but that today, in spite of an increase in the cost of everything the farmer has to buy, the New York Dairyman is now getting only 11.09 cents per quart. During the same period the retail price of milk (paid by the housewife) has gone up in New York from 20.9 cents per quart to

33.05 cents in 1961. This means that the man who feeds and milks the cows and who must invest many thousands of dollars in land, livestock and equipment gets only one half as much of the housewife's dollar as those who process and distribute this same milk.

Substantially the same thing is true in regard to lots of other farm products. When wheat sold for \$2.40 per bushel, bread sold for 13 cents per pound. Now with wheat selling at about \$1.80 per bushel, bread sells for about 24 cents per pound. I hope that our people—both in town and in the country—will ponder these facts. It is just shortsightedness for city people to think that bankrupt prices for farm products will help them in the long run. On the contrary, such prices for farm products can only mean that competition in agriculture will be eliminated, and food prices will then probably rise to heights beyond anything we have ever known.

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GATESVILLE, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 12th day of December, 1961, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, be authorized to issue TWO HUNDRED FORTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$245,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of financing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PERCENTUM (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and to pay for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

The 4 rallies in the state will attract around 7,000 persons.

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Gatesville, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election to-wit:

Mrs. Harmon Sellers Clerk

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.-T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$245,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"  
"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$245,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

EACH voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the proposition.

SECTION 6: THAT a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

SECTION 7: THAT notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS". Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Gatesville, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

# How Long to Stay Under Cover

By Prof. Willard F. Libby  
How can you know when it's safe to leave your shelter, on quick sorties to find food or help others, or to depart permanently, yet safely?

Or how can you know you're not foolishly hiding in a hole when there's no danger?

Your fundamental guides must be a transistor radio, a radiation meter and an understanding of the danger.

Civil Defense has set up an emergency radio broadcasting system, transmitting on 640 and 1240 kilocycles, called CONELRAD to supply national and local information and advice to guide your actions.

Experts will gather information near and far beyond the scene, and report fallout patterns. Part of the advice about the hazard you personally face, and how long you should stay inside, depends upon the size of the bomb and also where—on ground or air—it was detonated. We all need to know some of the fundamentals as to why altitude of the explosion is important.

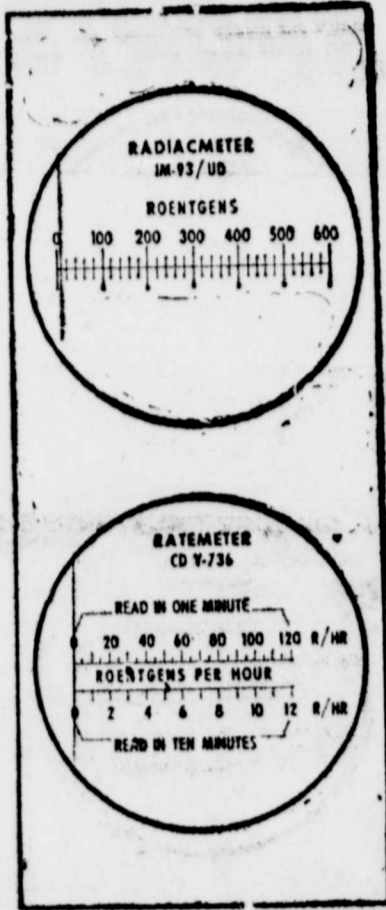
### Surface Blast Most Dangerous

First, a bomb exploded high in the air, as in a nuclear test, produces radioactive ashes just from the device itself. This fallout becomes widely distributed over a long period of time. It is too fine to fall quickly. It's the kind of fallout at issue in discussions of nuclear testing. So far, it has amounted to a few per cent of the normal, unavoidable radiation we receive daily all our lives from cosmic rays, the earth, and naturally radioactive elements in our bodies.

In war, a bomb could be exploded over a city with the main intent of blasting down buildings and setting fires. This happened in Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Those bombs did not produce local fallout.

Nor was the ground beneath made dangerously radioactive and uninhabitable.

But a bomb exploded on the ground or close to it, can suck up thousands and millions of tons of dirt and make it all radioactive to produce the widespread shower of intensive fallout which we are concerned here about. This is dirt that "shines" lethally, but it cannot be distinguished from ordinary dirt by sight, smell taste or touch.



RADIATION DETECTOR: This kit consists of two tubes, and a square charging box which is used to adjust the gauges in the tubes. The gauge in one tube shows how the other tube immediate vicinity. The gauge in much radiation is present in the shows how much radiation has accumulated over a period of time through fallout.

An enemy could choose to explode bombs on contact with the ground particularly to knock out underground missile bases, cities or industrial complexes. Such bombs would dig huge craters. The most intensive fallout would come down in an area of several hundred square miles, downwind after waiting long distances beyond the bombing site.

Exploded in air, but near the ground, the bomb could suck up dirt to spread radioactivity in stretches of hundreds of miles, with diminishing intensity as it fell hours later.

### May Move Upwind

Don't assume you are safe from fallout because you are upwind from a blast, so far as surface winds go. Fallout is sucked 20 to 25 miles high, and varying and strong winds at these altitudes will produce unpredictable fallout patterns. Maybe you have nothing to worry about, but stay inside until compilations can establish the pattern of actual fallout.

A transistor radio is the only way of getting these reports.

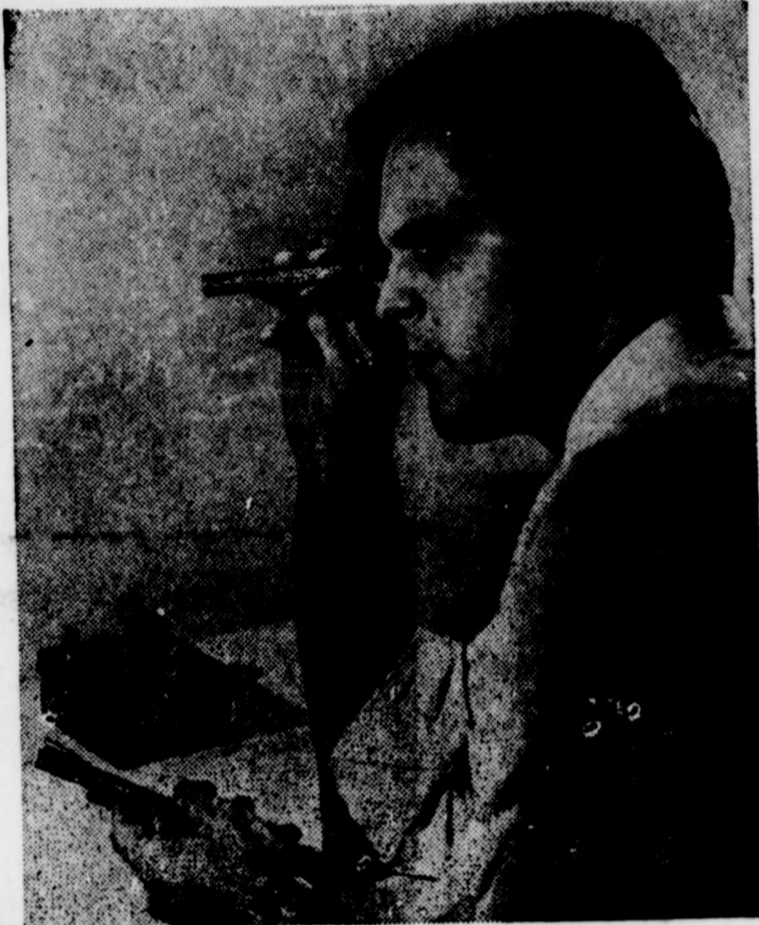

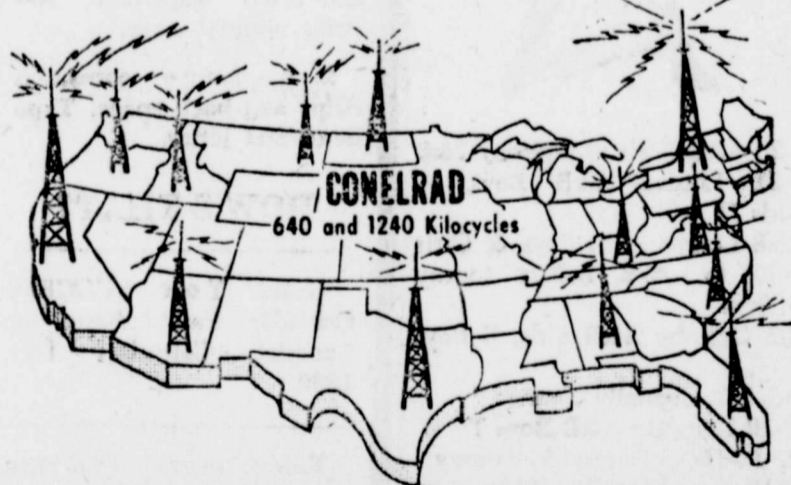

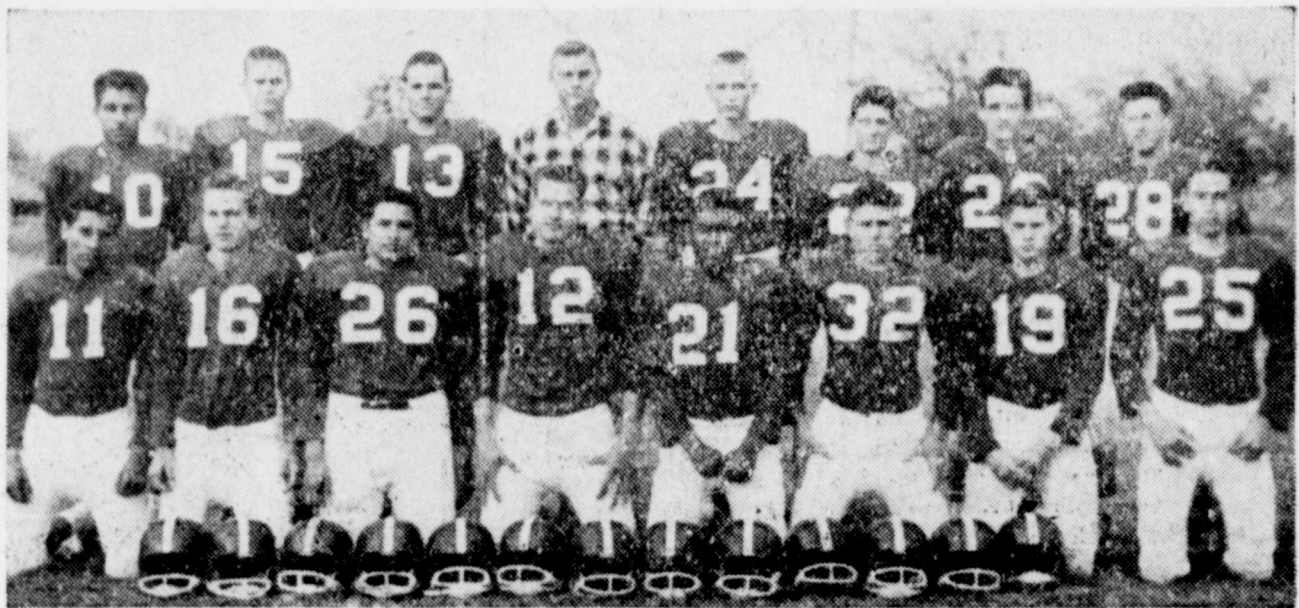
