WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Independent proprietors across the nation are echoing an urgent cry for adequate help to run their businesses.

"Competent, qualified help is scarce," complains a Western wholesaler-retailer.

"I just can't find skilled employees to operate my dry cleaning business," laments a Southern proprietor, "and several small businesses, including the restaurant across the street have had to shut down for the same reason."

Unemployment problems in the U.S. are fast being overtaken by a drastic shortage of employees for existing jobs. The situation cannot be righted until two major difficulties are solved: a redistribution of workers where they are needed in the economy, and an up-to-date comprehensive job clearing house for both employees and employers.

The National Commission on Technology, Automation, and Economic Progress informed Congress earlier this year: "There is simply no place in any local labor market, let alone on a regional or national basis, where individual job-seekers or employees can discover the full range of possible jobs or employes available."

The U.S. Dept. of Labor, accelerating employment data, recently completed a survey of 16 American labor markets. Results showed a great number of jobs could be filled by many of the unemployed. A Senate-

House sub-committee, encouraged by this report, has suggested that the study be broadened to include 80 U.S. markets.

There has been advocated legislation such as the Manpower Development Training Act to educate unemployables. Some have praised the War on Poverty and work-study college programs. Particularly effective in Harlem is the Vocational Education Act in which public school drop-outs are paid while attending trade schools. Modern, growth trades are taught in these schools, rather than occupations padlocked by unions, already overcrowded fields, and jobs soon to be automated.

The Technology Division's proposal for a national "job and Manpower Bank" to be run as a combination public-private enterprise is gaining support. This "bank" would be operated between state and private employment agencies, and include labor unions and other job clearing houses. Private industry, government, and state opportunities would be listed along with the job-seekers and their vocational and educational backgrounds.

The national "bank" would index information harvested from regional computer centers and circulate it. Economic planners and educators would have access to the information for their rival purposes.

A rapid solution must be found to match the estimated 3 million jobless with the abundance of jobs available. Meanwhile, independent business reports it is willing and able to employ those with even a minimum of experience, according to nationwide surveys by the National Federation of Independent Business.

APPROPRIATIONS BILL

Last week the Senate Finance presented it to the rest of the Subcommittee completed its work on the appropriations bill and committee members. The five member subcommittee, on which I served, recommended a biennial appropriations bill totaling \$4.7 billions from all funds to finance the operations of State government for the 1968-69 biennium. There are some groups who feel that this appropriation is 'inadequate', but I do not agree—it is an increase over last session's bill which was 3.6 billion dollars. This represents about 30 percent increase over the present biennium.

THE SUBCOMMITTEE considered the issue of state employee's salaries as one of its top priority decisions and recommended a compensation plan that would provide increases of 18 to 30 percent for classified employees. About 200 hours of work and study were devoted to determining

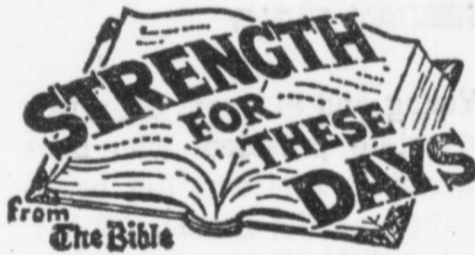
the various funds of the appropriations and I think that we presented a very good bill. The full Finance Committee approved the bill and cleared it for action on the Senate floor.

MILK BILL — The Senate Public Health Committee approved the bill known as "The Texas Dairy Industry Stabilization Act" and sent it to the Senate floor for action. If passed, this Act will create the Texas Dairy Commission which will control the price of milk products and frozen dairy products. The 'stabilization plan' would be an insurance for the dairy farmer, the processor, and the retailer in the store. I did not vote for this bill in the committee because it is now a price fixing measure from start to finish and it will result in the consumer paying higher prices for milk.

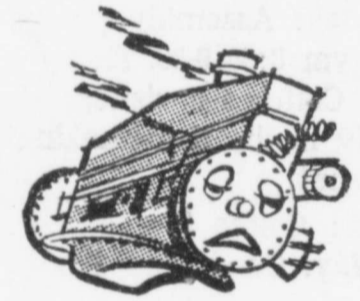

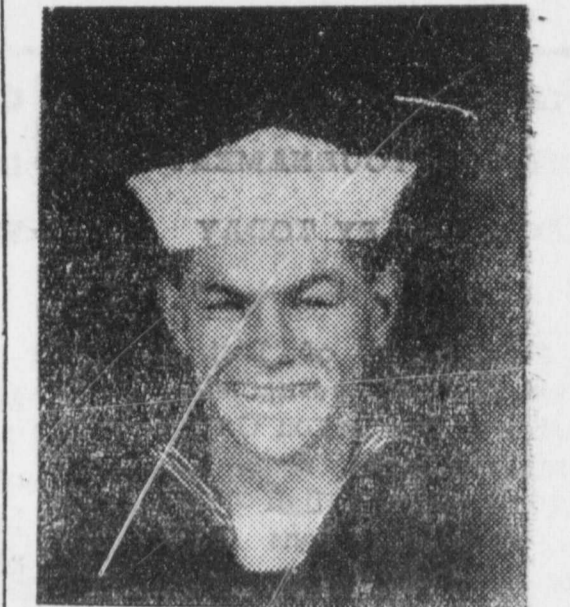

What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

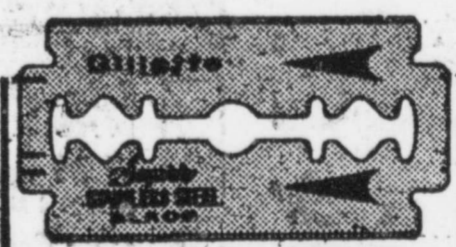
BOWLING TOURNAMENT STARTS APR. 15, GATESVILLE ASSN'S FIRST ANNUAL
