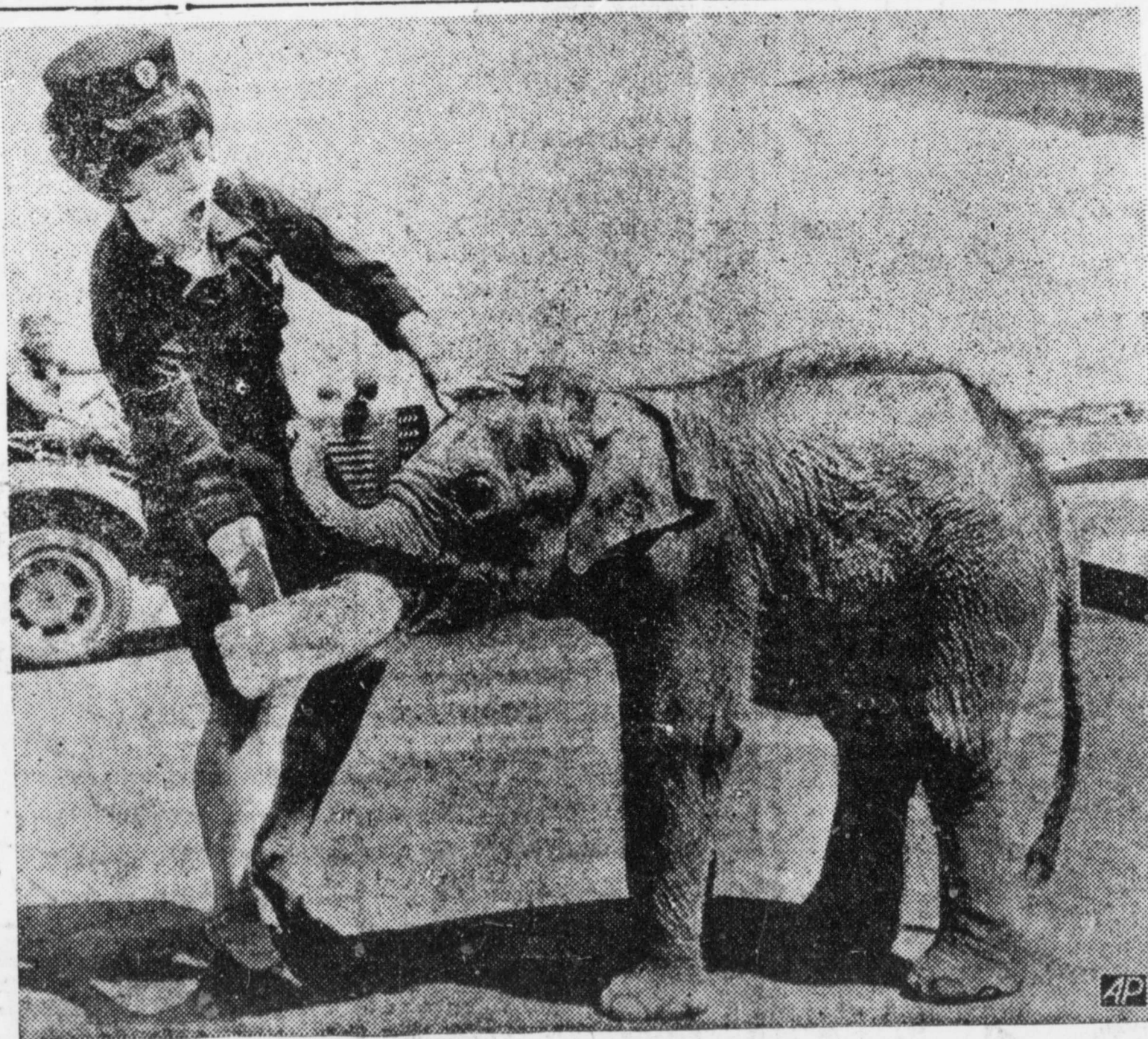

What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

MENTAL HEALTH SOCIETY IS THOUGHT NECESSARY HERE: BROACHED AT LVN MEETING

At a meeting of the local Licensed Vocational Nurses at Coryell

Memorial Hospital the possibility and desirability of organizing a local society to deal with this problem in the Gatesville area was broached.

Roy Brock, Chaplain, Mountainview School, was the speaker to the approximately 20 present, and pointed out the prevalence of mental or nervous problems among our population, and stated an estimated 75 percent of physical ailment in our area of Texas have their background in mental problems. He said any one with mental problems can be helped by professional therapy if they are willing to seek help, provided no brain damage exists.

A Reader's Digest estimate indicated one in 10 of the nation's population is in need of some form of psychiatric help, and applying this percent to Gatesville's adult population, we would have approximately 250 people needing such help.

Bee House Point: A Beautiful Setting For Worship

How often persons look at a hillside or creek bank or shady grove and comment, "There is a perfect natural setting for an outdoor worship service." Many of the most beautiful settings, however, are never used because the necessary landscaping and countless other preparations are never made. This was not the case for Bee House Point where, in spite of heavy intermitten showers of rain, almost a hundred and fifty persons gathered Easter Sunday morning for the first of what is hoped to be an annual Easter Sunrise Service for Coryell and surrounding counties.

Bee House Point with an altitude of 1,387 feet, is a green hill adjoining Bee House Creek and just behind Bee House Methodist Church. Typical of other hills in the area, it has oak trees and

elms and interesting rocks of every size. At the very top of the hill is deeply cemented a fifteen foot cross which Boyce Conner, owner of Bee House Point, artfully welded out of heavy steel beams and painted a glistening white. B

Beneath and a few yards away are a very large boulder and a second large stone leaning against the boulder. Gray and black paint and a small amount of landscaping around these two rocks produced a striking facsimile of the empty tomb and the rolled away door. Besides constructing the cross and tomb setting, Boyce Conner and his family bulldozed, cleared and cleaned two lower levels of land near the foot of the hill. For the upper level he made a wrought-iron pulpit stand, and on the lower level he prepared a parking area and places for benches and chairs.

With such a stage in mind, Mrs. Delos Walker of Pearl planned and directed an Easter program, which she says she did not get up overnight but has "been dreaming of since 1935." The program consisted of a volunteer choir robed in white and singing familiar hymns around the cross. "The Holy City" played as a trumpet and trombone duet by Cort and Bruce Matthews of Evant, a simple Easter drama with the angel played by Mrs. John Freeman of Pearl, Mary the Mother of Jesus played by Bernadine Conner of Bee House, and Mary Magdalene played by Mrs. Lloyd Conner of Bee House. George Matthews, pastor of Evant Parish of which Bee House Methodist Church is a part, and Bland Kirby, pastor of Pearl Baptist Church, had scripture and prayer. Special music was sung by Earl Hampton of Pearl, Mr. and Mrs. Tully Ballard of Pearl and Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Withers of Bee House, during which the hilltop choir marched down the hill to join the congregation in singing "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Anyone who views the huge steel cross at a distance or up close recognizes the careful, skilled craftsmanship which went into it. After the Easter Sunrise service men were speaking admiringly of the expert welding and mounting job, when the builder said, "It is my prayer that people will see beyond the white-

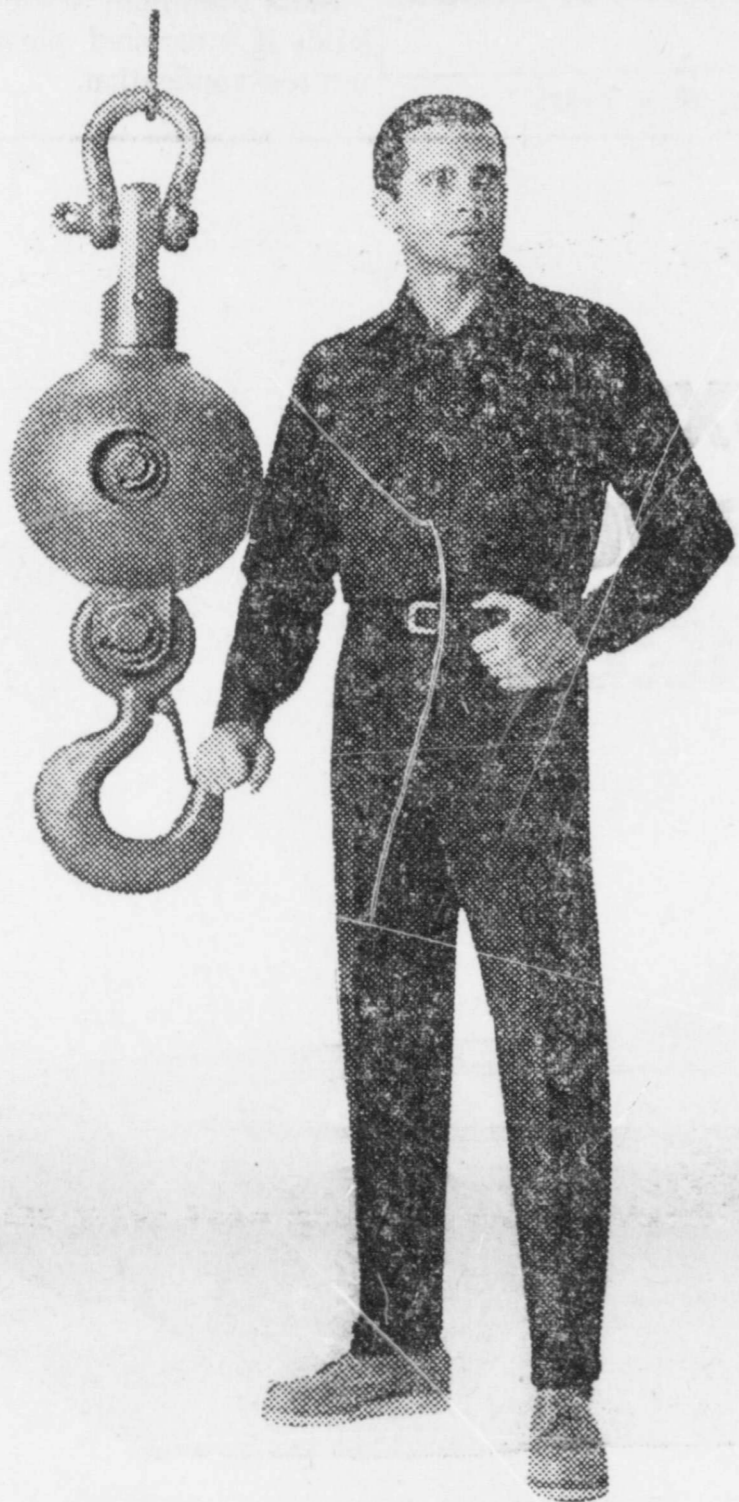
