Oran D. Bates, Principal, Gatesville Elementary School, has been named Chairman of Coryell County Task Force for a statewide planning project for a comprehensive vocational rehabilitation program for Texas, designed to close the ever-widening gap between the number of disabled persons who need services and the number who receive services.

WASHINGTON AND

"SMALL BUSINESS"

There is an ever-increasing outcry for the government to protect the nation and its major cities against the impact of paralyzing strikes. Last winter, New York City was brought to a virtual standstill by the subway strike against the metropolitan transportation system by the employees.

Recently, 33,400 members of the International Association of Machinists struck the five major airlines: National, Eastern, North-west, TWA, and United.

More than 150,000 travelers and 4,500 flights a day were grounded by the walkout 231 U.S. cities and 23 foreign countries had their air service severely limited. 75 cities had no air service whatever.

The airlines affected were forced to furlough 20,000 non-striking workers without pay, while the revenue loss to the companies amounted to \$100 million. The cost of the strike to business has been millions of dollars a day, while the Federal Government lost badly needed tax revenue.

Air mail deliveries have been slowed, and the U.S. Air Command had to institute an emergency airlift for soldiers. Production of vital Defense Department contracts also lagged.

As long as the country remains at the mercy of labor leaders, there will be periodic crises resulting in the sus-

pension of essential services.

Senators Wayne Morse of Oregon, Jacob Javits of New York, and Frank Lausche of Ohio are among those seeking proposals for the revision and strengthening of labor laws to deal with national emergencies.

Senator Morse introduced a bill to compel the striking union to return to work for a period of six months while the parties continue to negotiate.

The legislation sponsored by Sen. Javits gives the President "one last-resort weapon" that can be utilized if all else fails. If fact-finding negotiations with recommendations plus a cooling-off period should fail, the President would then be empowered to go to court to request a special receiver to operate the struck property.

If free collective bargaining is at an impasse, the only remaining alternative is compulsory arbitration. In 1963, faced with the threat of a railroad strike, Congress passed President Kennedy's bill requiring binding arbitration on the elimination of unnecessary firemen, which averted a strike. Today, the airlines are the chief carrier, doing more than half of all inter-city travel.

However, there is a traditional reluctance of both labor and management to compulsory arbitration. Politicians, always wary, are especially frightened of anti-labor legislation during an election year.

Crippling strikes caused by power-welding unions threaten the health and welfare of the nation whose outraged citizenry demands permanent relief.

MEMORIAL SERVICES FOR RICHARD HILL, JR.

Dell Valley Memorial Services for Henry Richard Hill Jr. were held at the First Baptist Church in Dell City, Friday, April 7, 10 a. m. Some 500 family and friends attended this service.

Richard Hill, seventeen year old son of Mr and Mrs Henry Hill, died Tuesday night, April 4, in a pick-up accident. The accident occurred at approximately 7:30. Richard, who had resided in Dell City since 1954, where his family moved from Gatesville.

He was well liked by his school mates. He was co-manager of the basketball team, and manag-

er of the football team. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Dell City and very active in the Church Youth program.

The accident occurred while Hill's pickup was traveling north on Farm Highway 1576, 4.2 miles north of Highway 62. The truck turned over one and one-half times after Richard swerved to the right trying to avoid collision with a calf crossing the road immediately in front of him. The attempt was unsuccessful and the impact caused the driver's door to come open allowing Richard to be thrown from the truck and killed instantly. Two other passengers were not hurt.

RADIO PROGRAMS "BACKLOG"

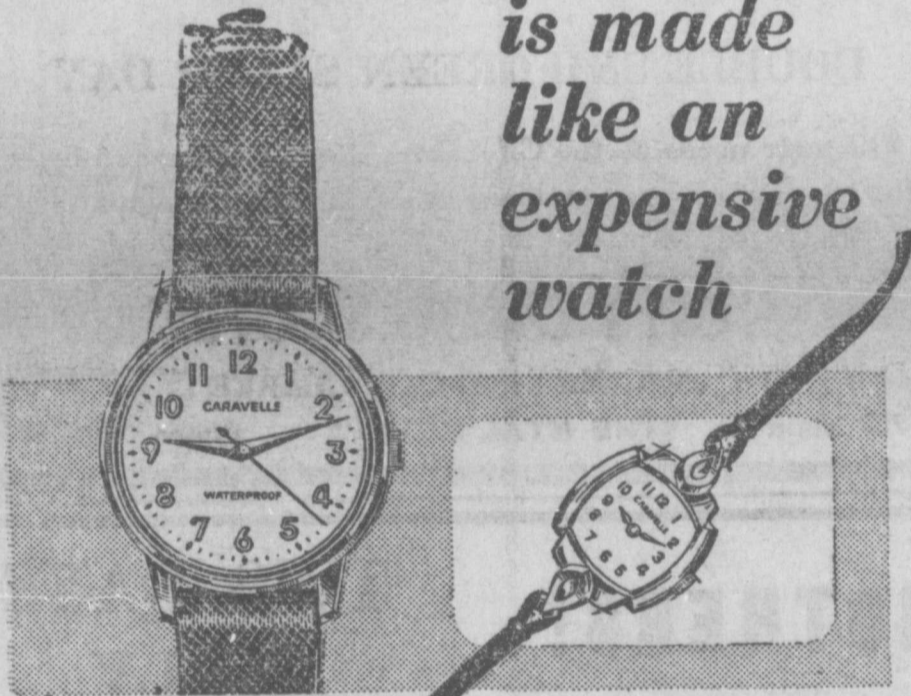

(HO741) USS TOLOVANA (AO-64) (FHTNC April 25—Radarman Seaman Charles A. Strickland, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Strickland of Rt. 3, Gatesville, took part in the under way Naval training exercise "Blue Coral" off the southern California coast, as a crewmember of the oiler USS Tolovana.

Blue Coral, the second major fleet exercise conducted this year by the U. S. First Fleet, refined the techniques of surface to surface and surface to air warfare, as well as detection and destruction of subsurface craft. Some 21 air units and 25 ships participated in the week-long exercise.

Pilots flew their carrier-based planes on bombing runs over a range on San Clemente Island. "Drone" aircraft were used as targets for the pilots in air-to-air rocket firing.

Participating ships trained extensively under simulated battle conditions using "hit and run" tactics to engage and evade the "enemy". Once again, drone aircraft were targets for ship-to-air missile exercises.

and fighting force rolled into one compact unit.

Kitty Hawk also serves as the flagship for Commander Task Force 77, the attack aircraft striking force for the Seventh Fleet.
