## REP. SALTER'S H. B. 974 IS SENT TO GOV. CONNALLY; WORD HANDLED IN SENATE

H. B. 794 which provides that the county in which the school is located, such as Coryell, pay the first \$250 of the fee to the court-appointed attorneys for a defendant child who was committed to the school from another county. ## BRIG. GEN. JAMES D. SCOTT NAMED COMMANDING OFFICER 49TH ARMORED DIVISION

DALLAS — Brig. Gen. James D. Scott, who rose from the rank of private to become assistant adjutant general of the Texas Army National Guard, will become commander of the "Lone Star" 49th Armored Division June 1.

The announcement was made today by Governor John Connally's office. Scott will take command just three days before the 49th moves to North Fort Hood for two weeks of annual field training. He will succeed Maj. Gen. Luther E. Orrick, present commander of the 49th, who retires this month.

Scott joined the Texas National Guard in 1929 in his home town of Mineral Wells, and was a sergeant at the outbreak of World War II.

Commissioned a first lieutenant, Scott's service during World War II was in the Pacific as a member of the Sixth Army staff. He participated in all the Pacific campaigns from New Guinea to the Philippines, and in the surrender of Japan in August, 1945. During the Berlin crisis he was assistant division commander of the 49th during its callup at Fort Polk, Louisiana.

In addition to serving as commander of the 49th, Scott will continue as assistant adjutant general at Camp Mabry in Austin. Orrick's retirement comes after 28 years of National Guard service and six years of active duty during World War II in Europe and at Fort Polk during the callup. His combat service was as a member of the 36th Infantry Division. He participated in five campaigns and the amphibious landing at Salerno, Italy.

Orrick's military decorations include the Bronze Star Medal, French Croix de Guerre and the Texas Service Medal. He has been commander of the 49th since April, 1965. In civilian life he is audiovisual director of the Wichita Falls Public Schools.

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

"There is no present local or even Federal governmental administration that could not be operated more efficiently, economically, and with less cost to the governed than by private business. Bureaucracy appears to encourage waste and red tape," a midwestern engineer wrote us.

The recent gross miscalculation by the Federal practitioners of the New Economics is a case in point. New Economics is based on the proposition that recession can be eliminated and total employment guaranteed by ingenious manipulation of Federal spending, taxation, and monetary power. Even the present war can be cost-estimated as a predictable expenditure, the brains boast.

But the geniuses really miscalculated this time, as the cost of the Vietnam conflict for this fiscal year is exactly twice as much as was estimated by the government's budget of last January—\$20 billion instead of \$10 billion. At the end of the year, in December, '66, came the official word that fiscal calculations found the defense spending figure to be \$67 billion instead of the \$57 billion figure entered in the budget. As a result, a budget deficit hike of \$10 billion instead of a ceiling of \$2 billion is expected.

The smugness of the New Economists is illustrated by the statement of March 23rd by Treasury Sec. Henry Fowler: "Our current estimates of Viet-

nam expenditures remain, in view of those most qualified to judge, an accurate evaluation of our need as far as we can now foresee . . . I hope no one will base his economic decision on the purely speculative assumption that our Vietnam needs will exceed current expectations."

When Congress estimated war costs of from \$10 billion to \$14 billion, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, Gardner Ackey, made a Pentagon-approved speech contesting that the estimates were "pure figments of someone's imagination."

At a press conference, March 2nd, Sec. of Defense McNamara firmly stated: "I estimate approximately 235,000 U.S. troops are needed in Vietnam." By April 20th, a full 255,000 U.S. troops mysteriously landed there. Recently McNamara's band played a new tune to the figure of an estimated 400,000 troops that may be needed in Vietnam, and the \$10 billion budget discrepancy due to a prolonged engagement in S.E. Asia.

According to the N.Y. Times, with an error of \$10 billion in government spending on their books, the New Economists are very distressed, blaming the Pentagon for misinformation.

As the Chase Manhattan Bank stated in "Business in Brief," until forecasts can be made with greater reliability than at present, attempts to use the tools of the New Economics as if they were micrometers can produce deeply damaging results. The facts are as exposed as the evil contents of Pandora's box that New Economists have yet to prove their accuracy, let alone superiority.

Bake 10 minutes. Cut into small squares. Alternate layers of shortcake, strawberries and whipped cream or ice cream in parfait glasses. Serve immediately. 6 to 8 servings.

For quick additions to the shortcake recipe, stir one of the following into the dough: grated peel of 1 orange or 1 lemon, 1/2 teaspoon cardamom, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg or 1/4 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese.

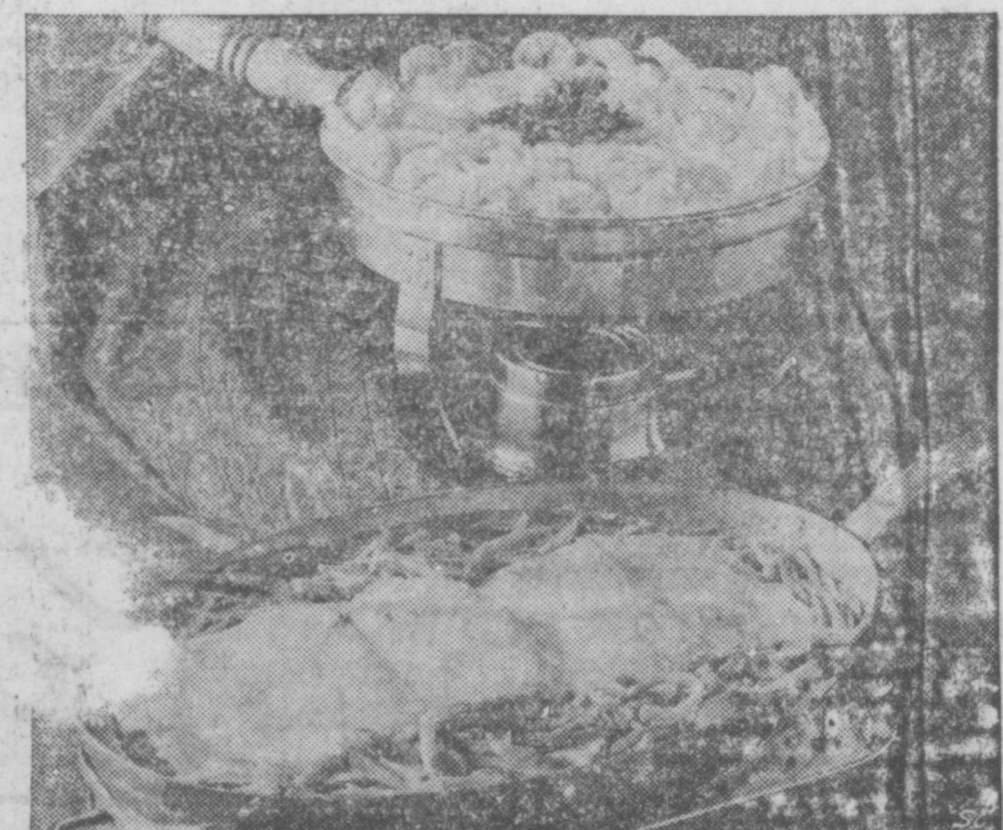

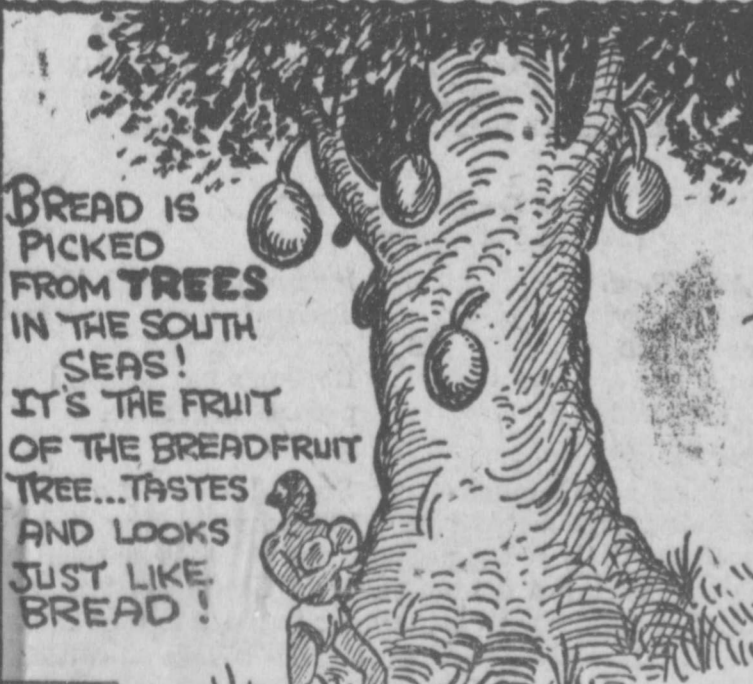

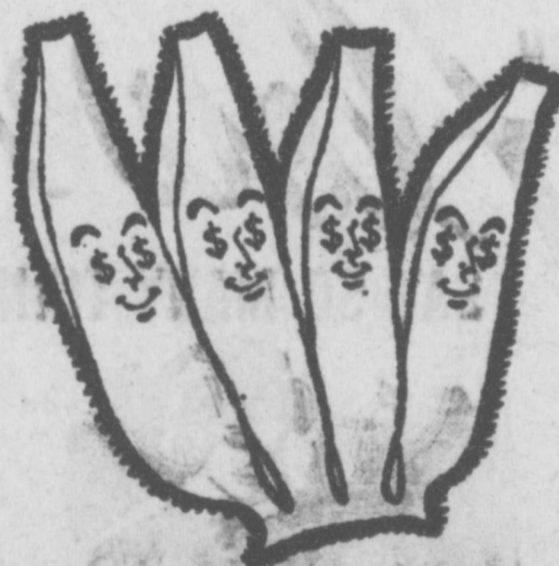

**Ernie Pyle**

Ernie Pyle, noted war correspondent, won a Pulitzer Prize in 1943 for his reporting of World War II. Besides his writing career, he was managing editor of the WASHINGTON NEWS for a time, but preferred the more active life of a reporter.

Pyle accompanied the American invasions of North Africa and Italy in 1943 and of Normandy in 1944, and was killed by Japanese gunfire while reporting the invasion of Okinawa in 1945. In the action with the troops, he obtained the news immediately to report to the American public.
