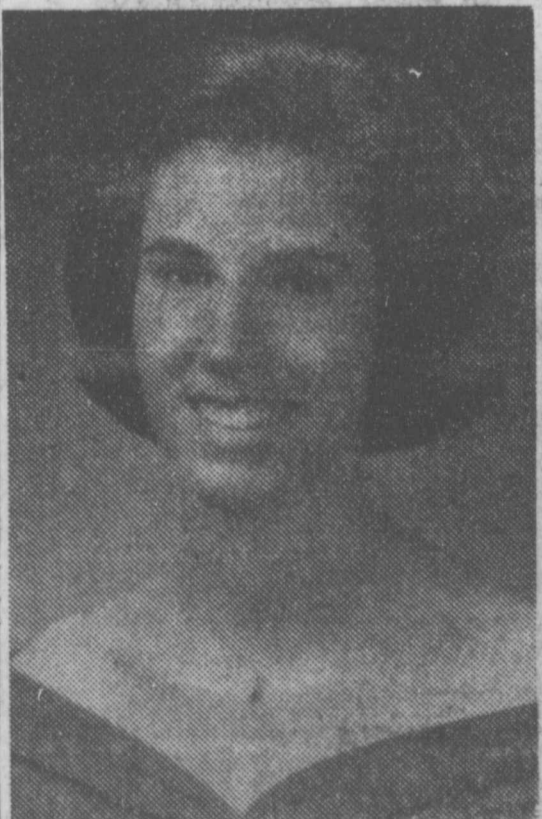

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Last year when California farmers suffered losses due to the edicts that cut off their normal supply of Mexican labor, it was thought that things could not get much Wirtz.

But now they are finding things can get Wirtz and Wirtz. For some strange unknown reason, although at the last count, there was still an active cabinet post of Secretary of Agriculture in Washington, Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz appears to be taking over broad arbitrary powers on how the American farmers will operate.

Although national law now says that farm labor shall be paid at the rate of \$1 per hour, and this was presumably the intent of the Congress, what Congress and what Wirtz decides are two different things.

In a quite unusual edict, he has set up higher minimum farm wage regulations in various states. For example, in Vermont it is now decreed that \$1.50 per hour must be guaranteed for apple pickers.

In Florida, the rate for farm labor must be \$1.35 per hour, and in California it has been

boosted to a whopping \$1.60 per hour.

But for some very strange reason, in Texas, a state where they ordinarily do things on a big scale, the minimum wage scale for farm labor, as set by Wirtz, is a lil' ol' measly \$1.15 per hour.

This is a strange paradox, first from the standpoint of the exercise of dictatorial powers, and secondly from the economics involved.

As even mere schoolboys know, after crops are harvested, they must be shipped to market. And equally as obvious, the further products have to be shipped, the more they cost.

Now shipping California products from San Francisco to the New York market, is a haul of something over 3200 miles. Shipping from Dallas to New York is something around 1800 miles, from Jacksonville, Florida around 1100 miles, and from Vermont into New York it is not over 500 miles.

Inasmuch as Mr. Wirtz has taken some strong public stands against discrimination, which are largely ignored by the unions, it would perhaps be fallacious to assume that he is in favor of discriminating against California. Therefore, it is perhaps logical to conclude that his knowledge of economics and geography may be a little on the foggy side.

A Word from Austin

APPROPRIATION BILL — The Texas Senate passed their one-year appropriation bill last Monday and sent it to the House for debate. The money bill which the Senate Finance Subcommittee had to condense from their original two-year appropriation bill, provides for a \$2.4 billion budget and a \$55.5 million teachers pay raise. I was pleased with the Senate's approval of our proposed budget bill. It was discussed and debated for five hours with a few amendments added by the full Senate.

AMMENDMENTS adding approximately \$1.7 million in spending were tacked onto the budget. These amendments included \$700,000 for public welfare, \$200,000 for schools of social work at Arling-

ton and Houston, \$75,000 for the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, \$200,000 for construction of buildings at Sul Ross College, and \$75,000 for more juvenile parole officers.

The appropriation bill requires approximately \$496,514,953 from the General Fund. The House is expected to take up its one-year appropriation next Tuesday. I hope that the Senate and the House will be able to iron out the differences in the two bills and come to a compromise without much difficulty. The legislative session ends in two weeks and, by then, the appropriation bill must be agreed upon.

THE SENATE passed House Bill 974 which I sponsored last

week. This measure pertains to the payment of court appointed counsel for delinquent children charged with a crime in certain counties. Marvelous Muffins

For light, tender muffins with gently rounded tops, stir batter just enough to moisten ingredients. Overmixing causes peaks on top, tunnels inside. To put a little fun in the muffin pan, try these variations. Follow basic recipe except —

Chive Muffins: Fold 1/4 cup chopped chives into batter. If desired, brush tops of muffins with milk and sprinkle with chopped chives immediately after baking. Great with meats or fish. **Orange Muffins:** Substitute 1/2 cup orange juice for 1/2 cup of the milk. Sprinkle top of batter in each muffin cup with sugar before baking. Nice for coffeetime. **Cheese Muffins:** Add 1/2 to 1 cup shredded sharp cheese to the Bisquick. Perfect for spring's fruit plate. **Bacon Muffins:** Fold 1/4 cup crisply fried diced bacon into batter. Good company for breakfast eggs.

What to do with leftovers? Split, butter and toast muffins under the broiler. Serve with jam or jelly. You'll still say "marvelous."

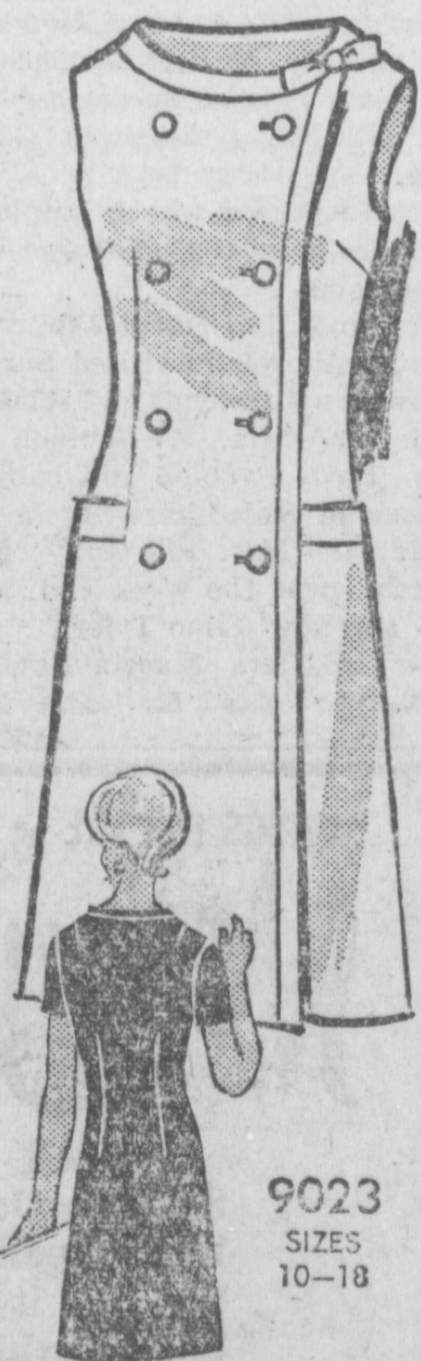

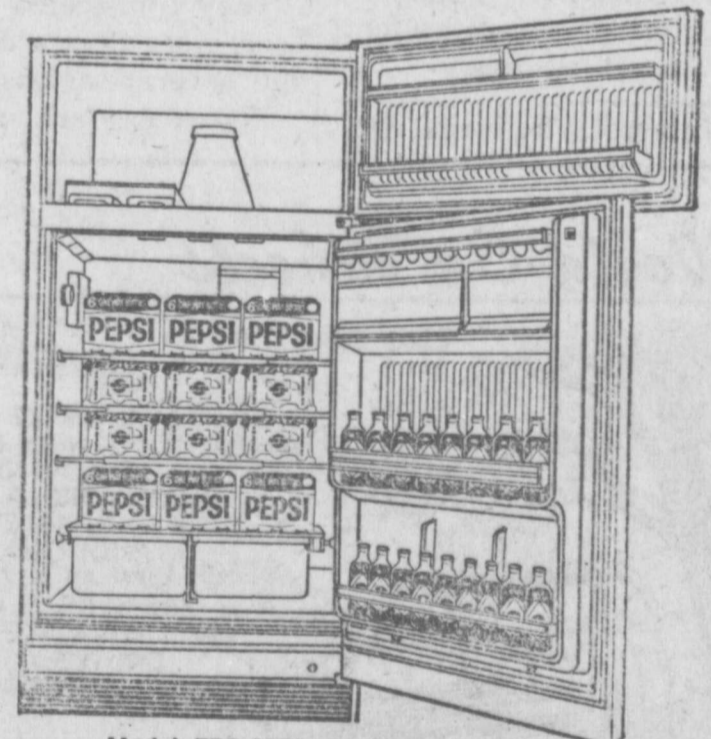

AUSTIN—Rep. W. R. Poage of Waco will get some "big city" connections under a bill passed by the Senate Tuesday.

The bill, by S. Sen. Ralph Hill of Rockwall, would give Poage's 11th District a section in southwest Tarrant County.

The addition of 42,340 people in Tarrant County, now represented by Rep. Olin Teague of Bryan brings the Poage district up to a total population of 432,294, above the ideal of 416,508 based on the 1960 census.

Otherwise, the Poage district is unchanged. It retains the present counties of Bell, Milam, Robertson, Falls, Limestone, McLennan, Coryell, Somervell, Parker and Hood.

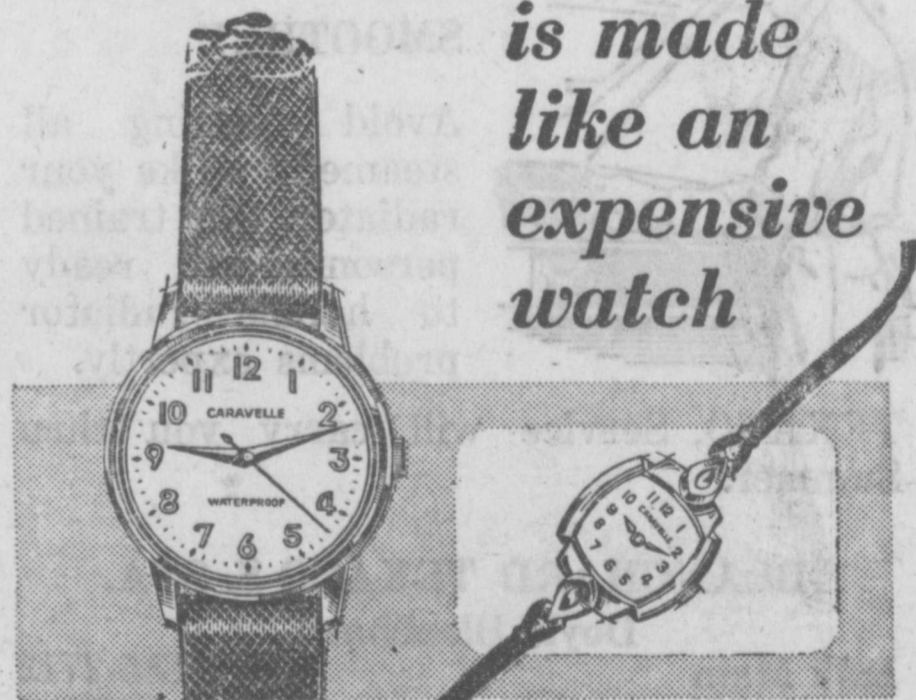

PM Hal Anderson reminds rural patrons of Gatesville PO to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey Cards, and next week mail carriers will leave these cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA (that's U. S. Department of Agriculture) bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey", Mr. Anderson explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings.

Carriers assisting are Bill Nesbit, Rt. 1, Marcus Gregory, Rt. 2, C. B. Jones, Rt. 3 and J. R. Saunders, Rt. 4. Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crop, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets. Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry pro-

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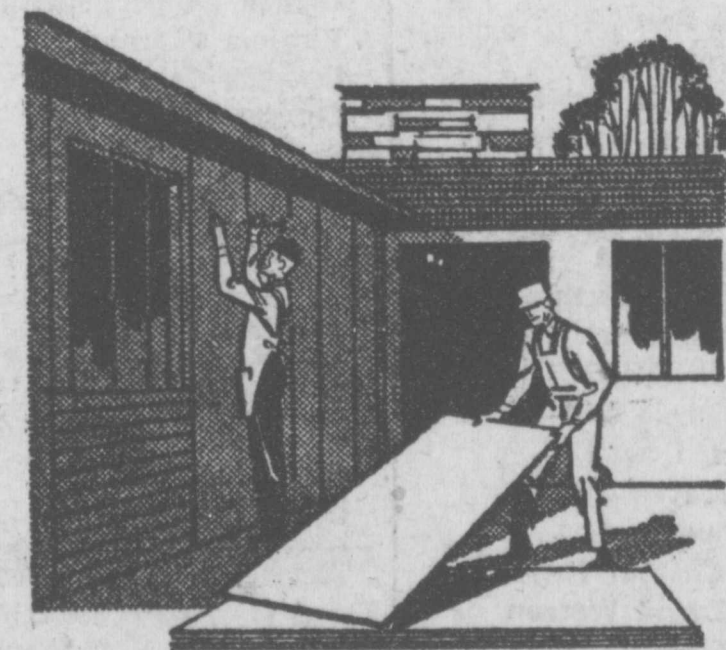
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
