



## TREMENDOUS TRIFLES

THE LADDER'S "FINGERPRINTS" THAT CONVICTED A KIDNAPER

No two persons have identical fingerprints and many criminals have been convicted because they left their fingerprints at the scene of their crime.

Arthur Koehler helped solve the Lindbergh case, the nation's most famous kidnaping crime, by proving that inanimate objects may have distinctive fingerprints, too. He definitely identified the "fingerprints" of the ladder used in the Lindbergh kidnaping and Bruno Hauptmann was convicted of the crime.

The fingerprints were the marks made by a planer. Koehler found that every eighth knife cut was irregular, caused by a rough spot on the cutter blade which scored the surface.

Koehler figured out the characteristics of the planer that had dressed the boards, the number of its knives, and its speed; then proceeded to locate the mill which had planed the boards, the dealer, and the man who bought the boards to build the ladder.

The cutter had six knives in each edge cutter and eight in each face cutter—shown by a magnification of the surface to bring out cutter marks. It was a fast-speed machine in which the edge cutter revolved faster than the face cutters.

Each of 25 mills reporting that they had such machines, submitted samples of wood machined on their planer. Each sample was analyzed. A mill at McCormick, South Carolina, submitted a sample which was positively identified as the same as the Lindbergh ladder.

Lumber milled by this firm was sold to the National Lumber and Millwork Company in New York City.

But the firm kept no record of their small sales and was unable to identify the possible purchasers of the wood!

Meanwhile, Hauptmann changed one of the ransom bills and when arrested, said he worked for the National Lumber and Millwork Company. There was an entry that he had bought \$9.00 worth of lumber in December, 1931.

## TREMENDOUS TRIFLES

THE WOMAN'S JEALOUSY THAT ALMOST CAUSED A WAR

The Chevalier D'Eon was a trusted and effective espionage agent to whom Louis XV of France confided his secret diplomatic plans. When Madame Pompadour's jealousy was directed against his great influence, he resorted by almost causing a war between England and France! Here is an account of the intrigue that resulted from an aging favorite's pettishness.

This key man of the Bourbon monarch possessed the unusual name of Charles Genevieve Louis Auguste Andre Timothee D'Eon de Beaumont. Among other things, he was "the most gifted female impersonator who ever lived," a capacity that contributed greatly to his success as an agent of the king. As a youth, he developed a keen and resourceful mind and an agile body. While still a youth, he wrote an intelligent study of French finances that brought him to the attention of Louis XV.

Since French finances were steadily going from bad to worse, the king employed D'Eon in the hope that his clever ideas would help to turn the tide of approaching monarchical bankruptcy. But the young man's keenness of judgement, his capability of mind and body, as well as favorable person, led the king to decide to employ him for his most secret and delicate negotiations with foreign powers. His very first assignment, to carry secret messages to the Czarina Elizabeth of Russia, was performed with brilliant success.

Louis next sent D'Eon to England, where his espionage was so successful as to cause a rift in high circles of English government. The young secret agent was by now in the complete confidence of the French king, who wrote him in secret of his plans to attack England later.

Madame Pompadour now became jealous of D'Eon's power over the French monarch. She contrived to have his diplomatic authority revoked and attempts made on his life. Summoned to return to France, D'Eon, fearing for his life and reputation, refused. Instead, he published some of Louis' letters threatening war on England. The English were aroused, and war might have come about had not Louis XV died shortly thereafter. Madame Pompadour lost her influence, and D'Eon was restored.

**TREMENDOUS TRIFLES**

THE CARELESS ORDER THAT NEARLY COST EARL SANDE'S LIFE

Of all racing jockeys, none was more famous and successful than Earl Sande. Yet Sande was almost killed riding his first race when an Army officer carelessly ordered a cannon pulled across the track! It was in Arizona, in 1916. Those were the days when Pancho Villa, the swashbuckling bandit, was spreading terror in northern Mexico and threatening the American border towns. The American Army was keeping a sizable force in the southwest, to be on the safe side.

When the Arizona State Fair of that year came along, a military display was part of the program. Also, there were horse races. And that is where this story starts.

Earl Sande was a youngster who had been following the horses as a stable hand, hoping for the chance to ride his first mount. Just before the races started, Sande received a telegram. He was to have his first chance, riding a horse called *Little Boots*.

When the Army had concluded its military exhibition, the races were ready to get under way. There were six horses in that race. As they thundered around the track, Sande felt the exhilaration of at last reaching his goal, his first race! He rode *Little Boots* with skill and as they rounded the final turn, his mount took the lead.

This was the first race and all of the military equipment had not yet been removed from the field. Among other things, a cannon remained to be pulled off. At this point, an officer, carelessly miscalculating the speed of the approaching horses, ordered it dragged across the track. Soldiers moved to carry out the order, but as they had got halfway across, the horses were almost upon them.

It was too late to go forward or backward. The soldiers left the cannon standing and fled. It was too late for the forward-driving Sande to veer *Little Boots*. His mount plunged into the cannon and was killed. All but the last horse piled up and were killed. The last horse won the race. Sande spent weeks in a hospital before he recovered.

It all happened because of a careless order!

## Spring Fling Time

The season's right. The picnickers are waiting. So let's dust off the hamper and polish up a few ideas about picnic foods. This year why not try franks topped with sauerkraut? Or wrapped with strips of cheese and bacon? To glorify hamburgers, spoon on hot baked beans — or the sloppy Joe mixture — out of cans. Or smother burgers with Bermuda slices or bitey cheese, for tastes that approve. Next pass individual bags of potato chips, apples and cold drinks. For dessert, a big box of chocolate chip cookies. Homemade, of course, from my recipe below. Simple menu? That's the idea. Now it's a picnic for everyone. Including you.

**Frank-a-Bobs:** Cut each frank into 5 pieces. Alternate on skewers with pineapple chunks; brush with salad oil. Broil over hot coals, turning until browned. Serve on toasted frankfurter buns with mustard or barbecue sauce.

Prefer hamburger? Try these **Double Deckers:** Combine 2 pounds ground beef, 2 eggs, 2 teaspoons salt, dash of pepper and ½ cup bread crumbs. Shape into 20 thin hamburger patties. On half the patties, spread one or more fillings (below); top with remaining thin patties and seal edges. Place on grill 4 to 6 inches from hot coals. Cook 15 minutes or until done, turning once. 10 hamburgers.

**Fillings to Mix and Match:** Dill pickle slices, pickle relish, prepared mustard, catsup, horseradish, chopped onions, onion

slices, Cheddar cheese slices, pasteurized cheese spread . . . Now, for the cookies here's everybody's favorite.

### CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

½ cup soft butter  
1 cup brown sugar (packed)  
1 egg  
2 cups Bisquick  
½ cup chopped nuts  
1 package (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Heat oven to 375°. Mix butter, brown sugar and egg. Stir in Bisquick, nuts and chocolate pieces. Drop dough by rounded teaspoonfuls about 2 inches apart onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake about 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Makes about 4 dozen 1½-inch cookies. Don't forget the bottle opener! And, the salt and pepper! Have fun.


