MEMORIAL DAY TRAFFIC TOLL SETS RECORD WITH 608 DEAD

CHICAGO (AP) - Traffic accidents killed 608 persons in the nation during the long Memorial Day holiday weekend, a record for the holiday. The four-day toll compared with 560 traffic deaths during a nonholiday period of identical length two weeks ago.

Despite its record-shattering proportion, the holiday toll this year remains well below the 650 to 750 deaths which the National Safety Council estimated in advance might occur in the 102-hour period. The previous high for a Memorial Day week end was 542, set during a three-day period last 95, Anita Williams 93.9, Bobby year.

A survey by the Associated Press during the four-day nonholiday period of May 12-16 showed 560 persons killed in raffic mishaps. The survey was made Brown 92.2, Vickie Hollingsworth Day holiday toll.

The high traffic toll for any holiday period is 784, set during burn 90.7, Delores Ortega 90.5. the four-day Thanksgiving period last year. The lowest four-day Memorial Day toll is 159 in 1946. 193.8, Celia Powell 93.75.

In addition to traffic fatalities during this year's Memorial Day by drowning and 36 in boating accidents.

A subcommittee of the House on Post Office and Civil Service requested the National Federation of Independent Business to conduct a survey to ascertain the amount of paperwork independent businessmen are subjected to by Federal and local government. Results indicated it was costing proprietors approximately \$1,750,000 per year. The average time required for filling out forms for Federal reports was found to be 33 minutes per month per employee, and 24 minutes per month per employee for state forms.

Failure of Congress to pass the "plowback" allowance has created layoffs in auto plants, appliance factories, and in other wholly consumer industries.







AN ERROR THAT GAVE US THE MODERN MICROSCOPE

Sometimes the mistakes made in scientific research lead to more amazing results than the successes. The fact that we now have microscopes that magnify objects 200,000 times is the chance result of a scientific error, which showed the way to use an electron beam in microscopy.

The first microscope was invented by a Dutchman named Leeuwenhoek. His instruments startled the scientific world of his day. For the first time, men could examine in some detail the structure of a snowflake, a flea's leg, or a grain of oats.

During 150 years, many improvements were made in the microscope. About 80 years ago, instruments with a power of about 1000 were constructed. Then it was discovered that the limits of power had been reached, unless some new medium with a wave length shorter than than of ordinary light could

The next step was the adaptation of the microscope to the use of ultra-violet light. By this means, instruments with a magnification of 2500 diameters were developed. But again the limits had been reached, still almost negligible compared to present standards.

In 1924, a French scientist, Louis DeBroglie, discovered that a stream of electrons, such as constitute an electric current, emits a wave whose length is less than 1/100,000th that of light. If that wave could be used in microscopy, the possibilities were amazing. But there was one great difficulty: no one knew how to direct a beam of electron waves.

At this point in the history of science, there happened one of those small things that sometimes lead to important and unforseen results. A German physicist, Dr. Busch, was performing an unrelated experiment in electronics. A persistent error occurred repeat-edly. Attempting to calculate that error, he discovered by chance that electrons passing through a certain type of magnetic field behaved ex-actly like light passing thru a lens.

This unforeseen discovery was applied to microscopy, and we now have the electron microscope; an instrument so powerful that a grasshopper would appear to be 3 miles long. For the service of men, these modern instruments are aiding the progress of biology, medicine, physics, and many other fields of knowledge.
