## WORK UNDERWAY ON NEW COVE CATHOLIC CHURCH

**COPPERAS COVE** — Construction of a new Catholic church has begun in Copperas Cove, with completion set for Jan. 14, 1968. Holy family Sunday.

The church, designed by O'Connell and Probstarchitects of Austin, will cover approximately 11,000 square feet and will be located across from the old church on Highway 190.

The church, costing around \$250,000, will be air-conditioned and carpeted throughout. A small sanctuary to the right of the auditorium will be used on weekdays and for baptisms. An intercom system will be installed.

A four-bedroom rectory, equipped with a kitchen and large garage for the parish cars, will adjoin the church.

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Although Defense Secretary McNamara announced that truth and nothing but truth would be forthcoming in Government news releases, doubt lingers . . .

The Wall St Journal complains: "McNamara's refusal to admit error even when error is understandable, and his shading truth to defend his position have greatly contributed to the Administration's credibility gap and weakened public confidence."

"The Government is having such a problem with its 'credibility' that it is turning on its attackers. Labor Secretary Wirtz accuses newspapers and other newsgatherers of being less than honest in reporting matters of public policy. We doubt that any newspaper or any other observer is exaggerating the seriousness of inflation or the extent of Governmental guilt for it."

"It is rather, Government spokesmen who minimize the inflation and deny blame. The technique is particularly inappropriate in view of the fact that the Government, not the private economy, is the basic cause of inflation. Officials seek to defend the inherently indefensible: incredible budget outpourings for such failures as most of the war on poverty, urban renewal and agricultural regimentation."

One way to improve that credibility "image" would be to stop lecturing the American people for supposedly deceiving themselves about the quality of their masters' performance."

Syndicated columnist Henry Taylor recently revealed that "an unidentifiable 6858 federal employees are kept busy arranging Big Brother's fruit on the cart, with the best side forward, the wormy things to the rear. McNamara has the largest publicity network of all—about 12 per cent of the 26,000 people who work in the Pentagon perform publicity services. McNamara budgets their glorious activities at \$23.3 million a year."

In total, Big Brother spends more than \$425 million a year of our money for public relations, news, etc., informing and persuading us around the clock—more than twice the outlay of all three TV and radio networks, the great worldwide United Press International, Associated Press, and our 10 largest newspapers combined. Reversal of campaign promises regarding U.S. involvement in Vietnam, turned the gap into a canyon, as have evasions and double-talk regarding commitments, costs, escalations, casualties, and peace offers.

At a cost to U.S. taxpayers of \$425 million annually, the people deserve honest, complete disclosure. "Credibility gaps" are really no more than deceptions and cloaked lies.

**Agricultural Briefs**

**BUILD WIND RESISTANCE IN-TO FARM BUILDINGS** — Be prepared for hurricane or tornadic winds, advises W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, by securely anchoring farm buildings. Good anchorage is essential in preventing damage from high winds, he adds.

**GREENHOUSE VEGETABLE GROWERS TO MEET AT TEXAS A&M** — June 26-27 are the dates for the Texas Greenhouse Vegetable Growers annual short course. Dr. John E. Larsen, Extension horticulturist at A&M, says the conference provides a meeting place for the growers to exchange ideas and pick up the latest developments from research as well as unifying their efforts in the expanding industry. The production of greenhouse tomatoes will get major attention, he added.

**DAMAGE FROM MAIZE DWARF VIRUS** — MDMV is expected to cause an estimated loss of \$2 million to Texas corn and grain sorghum crops this year. Crops affected by the virus include field, sweet and broomcorn and grain sorghum. R. W. Tolar, cereal virologist at Texas A&M University, found the disease in Texas last year for the first time. It has been reported from many areas in the eastern half of the state.

**NEW WHEAT VARIETY ANNOUNCED** — Fifteen years of breeding work have gone into the development of a new wheat variety for Texas. It has been named

"Sturdy" for its ability to stand up in storms and with heavy loads of grain. Seed will be available after the 1967 harvest from certified seed growers in Texas. It was developed cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

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**CENTEG ECONOMIC DISTRICT  
HIRES DIRECTOR AS  
FIRST OF NEW STAFF**

Preston Hayes was hired June 1 at the first executive director of the Central Texas Economic Development District, with an annual salary of \$14,400.

The district also received the federal government's first down payment of \$10,194.27, which is 25 per cent of the government's share of the district's operating funds.

The twelve counties that belong to the district will provide one fourth of the funds for the first year. This amounts to \$13,592.23. Only about \$5,500 of this is in actual cash; the rest will be furnished in in-kind services, such as office space, supplies, etc.

The new executive director will help the district choose an assistant director and a secretary to complete the staff. These three working with the district, will attempt to develop an overall industrial development program for the 12-county area of which Coryell County is a part.

The economic development district was created under the Public Works and Economic Development Act passed by Congress in 1965. Specific goals of the program are to lower unemployment, raise incomes, strengthen economy, improve basic environment, and improve worker skills and job opportunities.

It has been announced that James Connally Technical Institute will provide 1,200 feet of office space and furnishings to the district without charge.

Officers of the district are Howard English, Hill County, chairman; William Black, Bell County, vice chairman; Paul Harvey, Hill County, secretary; and Bassel Wilson, Cameron County, treasurer. Don Haile, Hamilton, is on the executive board of directors. County Judge Norman Storm is Coryell County Representative.

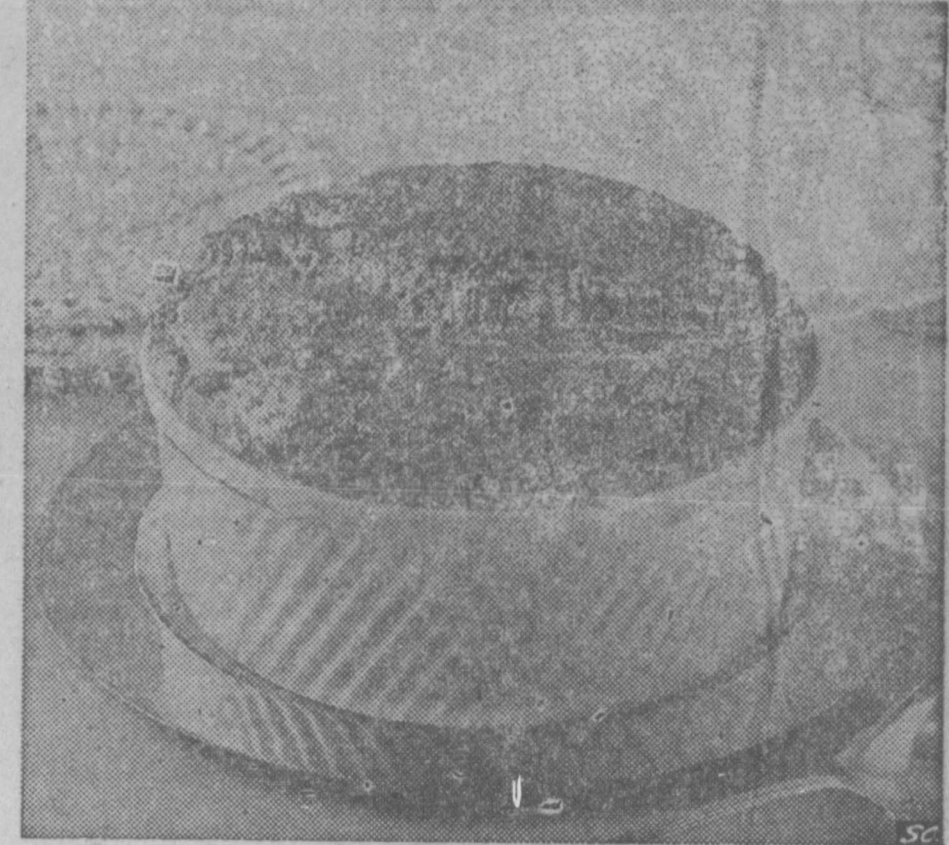

Stir in condensed milk; blend well. Stir in water. Cook over rapidly boiling water; stir constantly, until mixture is very thick. Remove from heat; cool to room temperature. Place in refrigerator or chill over ice water. Place egg yolks in large bowl; beat with electric beater until thick and lemon-colored. Slowly add cooled chocolate mixture to yolks; beat until ingredients are blended. Stir in flour. Place egg whites and salt in a large bowl; beat with electric beater until stiff, but not dry. Fold gently into chocolate mixture. Pour into prepared souffle dish. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven, 65 minutes, or until puffed. Remove from oven; remove collar. Serve immediately.

**Washington Views and News**

Dear Friends:

June 2, 1967

This week the House has been working very largely on appropriations bills. Yesterday we passed the Legislative bill. Earlier in the week we passed the bills for the Department of State, Justice and Commerce. We hope to get the Agriculture Department soon. In fact, we have been told for two weeks that the bill would be out "tomorrow" but the Appropriations Committee is still holding it. We now expect this bill next Tuesday.

Actually, the Appropriations Committee has gradually acquired such control that Congressmen who are not members of that committee have very little opportunity to influence our expenditures. Unlike other committees of the House, the Appropriations

Committee does all of its work in secret. It does not have to get a "Rule" to bring its bills on the Floor as is required of all other committees. For his reason, it does not have to make its bills and reports public until the day they are considered. They then come out with hundreds of items in one bill. It is almost impossible for one who is not a member of that committee to intelligently offer amendments.

This year the Republicans have adopted a policy of offering an amendment (or Motion to Re-commit) to cut 5 per cent from each and every appropriation bill. This sounds real good but actually it is a very unfair way of making reductions. It cuts the good along with the bad.

Probably the worst practice is that of the Appropriations Com-

mission by writing instructions to committee itself "amending" legislative Departments in their "reports". There is no way whereby the Congress can vote on these items, yet they may completely destroy the rules established by a law passed by the entire Congress — no matter how large the majority for the bill. Even though the courts hold that these "reports" are not binding, the Department must allow them or face the loss of future appropriations.

Another practice which circumvents the will of the majority is the refusal of the Appropriations Committee to provide money needed to carry out programs by Congress. Last year Congress voted overwhelmingly to require dealers in dogs and cats to get a Federal license if they were to sell to research laboratories. The Appropriations Committee refused to appropriate money to pay the expense of inspecting the promise of the applicants. The result is to make the law which the Congress passed inoperative.

The same sort of veto is used by the Executive after Congress has passed an appropriation. The Bureau of the Budget often issues orders to the Agency or Department involved not to spend the money which has been provided. For instance, they have repeatedly refused to let FHA make the water supply loans Congress has authorized.

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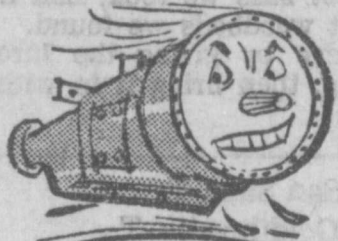

- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

**SPOON FISHING...and other tips**

**PURPLE MAGIC!**

I returned not long ago from a brief but most satisfying trip to the Kissimmee River lakes of Florida's Osceola County. This four-day jaunt was made for just one reason: to test a new lure color. But wait'll you hear the best part — the color was purple! Now I haven't anything against the color purple — particularly not after this test and some earlier experiences — but if you'd have asked me two years ago to go fishing with a purple spoon, I'd have said... well, I don't know what I'd have said. Nothing very complimentary, I'm sure.

But it was in 1965, not too far from Ocala, Florida, that I heard about a lot of bass being taken with a purple plastic worm. Didn't take me long to check out the rumor and brand it a fact. Those purple worms were out-performing other colors, and several different shades of spoons, to boot.

It wasn't long afterward that I heard a similar story about the drawing power of purple. Some fishermen farther north reported that lake trout were lapping up lead-headed jigs done in a purple-blue color. These stories were verified for me by the people who make the Johnson's lures — and boy, were they ever interested!

So, as things turned out, the forged Silver Minnow I'm so fond of finally acquired another finish. Yep — purple!

There's nothing drab about it, however, because the color was added by means of a dye in clear lacquer. This was then baked on the tapered spoon after it got its regular bright silver finish. The result is a lively, see-through color that's just the opposite of our first reaction when we hear the word "purple."

As for the "fish-ability" of the new lure — well, it was good enough to make my Orlando brother-in-law and his know-it-all buddies holler "Uncle."

Four of us started down the Kissimmee, fishing in pairs. My partner and I used the purple spoon exclusively, in all sizes from 1/24 oz. (with fly rods) to 1 1/2 oz. (with bait casting rigs). The brother-in-law and a friend worked with all sorts of lures, including the Silver Minnow with standard silver finish.

At the end of four and a half days, my partner and I had taken and released well over one hundred keeper-sized bass and bream — beating the other team's score by very nearly two to one!

One thing I should add about fishing the purple Minnow is that it works best with a trailer: pork rind, rubber skit, or plastic worm. Select the color that works best in your area. Also, you'll want to keep in mind a couple of tips I've mentioned before. First, get down in the weeds. The biggest bass we took, half a dozen at 6 to 8 lbs., were in the heaviest weedbeds we found.

Second, work a change-of-pace retrieve by giving the lure time to sink to the bottom after casting, then bring it in with alternate slow and fast cranking speeds.
