**LOW-RENT HOUSING LAND FOR FIFTEEN PARCELS GET OKED FRIDAY**

Fifteen parcels of land were approved Friday by a federal agency Gatesville Housing Authority Erle Powell reports, and securing options to purchase is now being completed.

The Housing Authority has approved for a \$947,000 government loan to construct 60 low-rent housing units, most of them, brick duplexes, and 48 of them for elderly people.

Lot locations are reported in the north part of Gatesville and are scattered over an area bounded by Lutterloh Avenue on the west and Mills Street on the north 18th Street on the east and Saunders on the south.

Total land to be obtained for the units are 8.5 acres.

**SERIES OF MORE OR LESS MINOR ACCIDENTS STILL MESS UP CARS, PEOPLE**

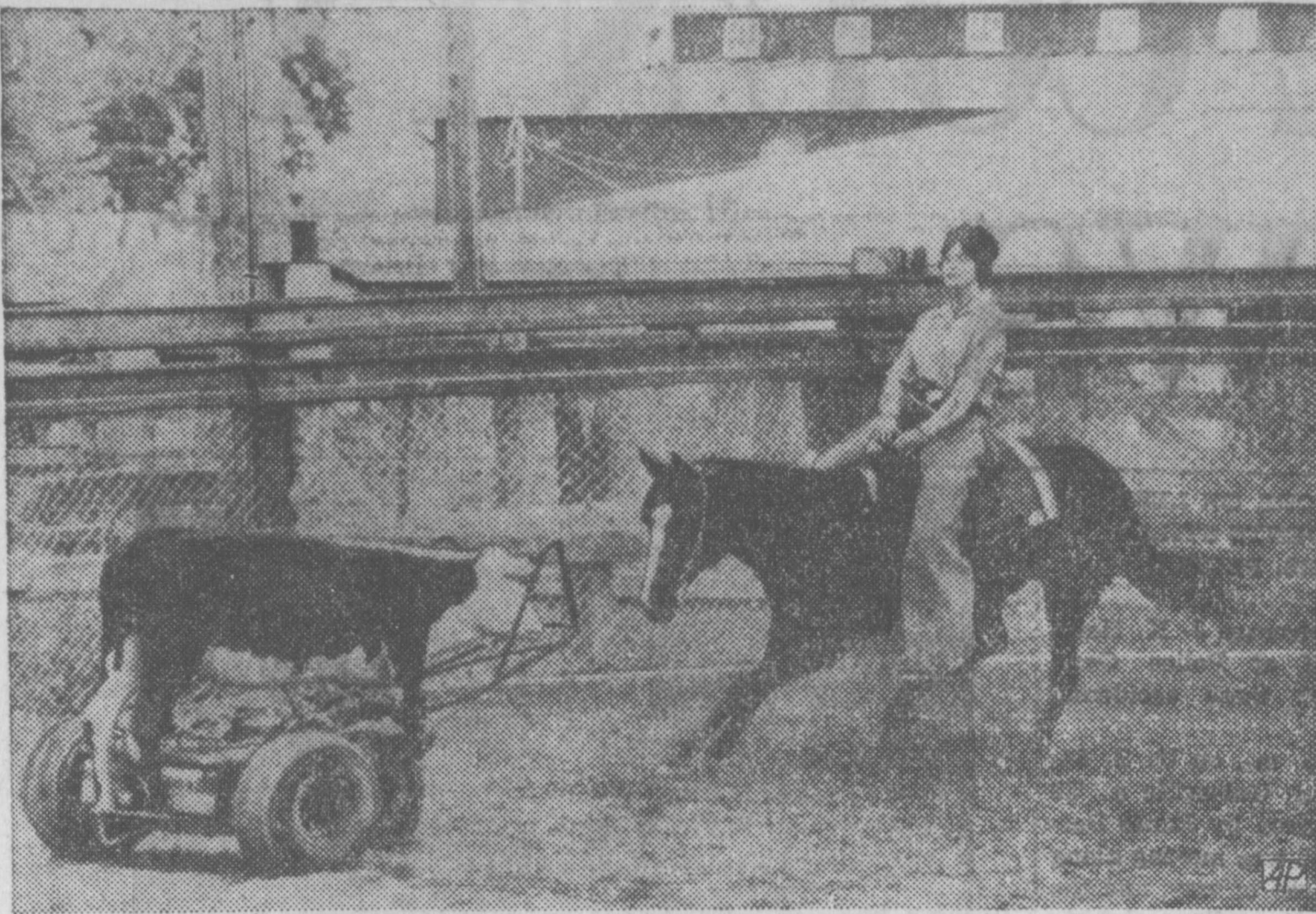

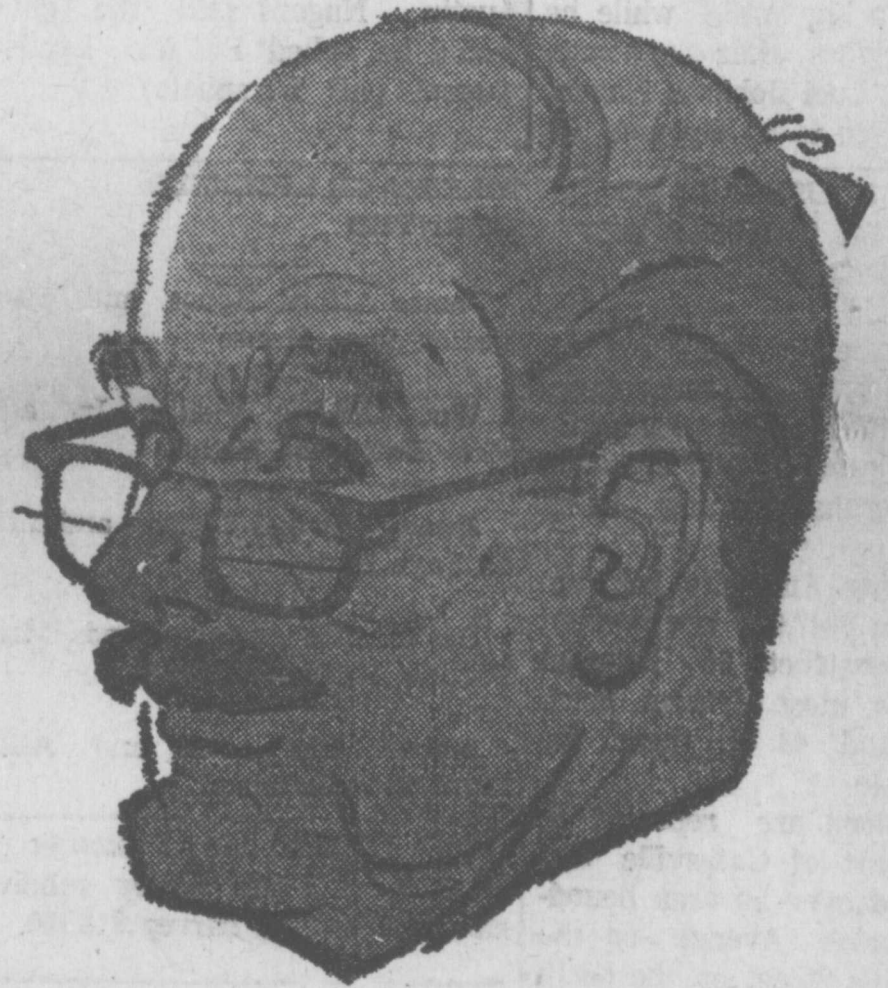

The Coast Guard is part of the Department of Transportation, and is the United States' major agency responsible for maritime

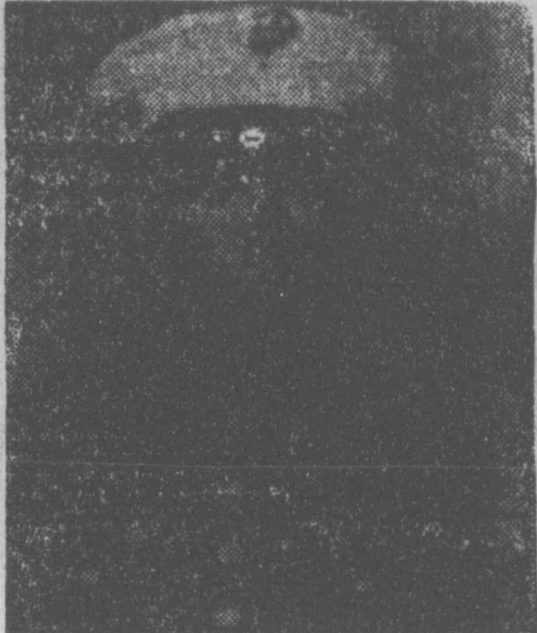

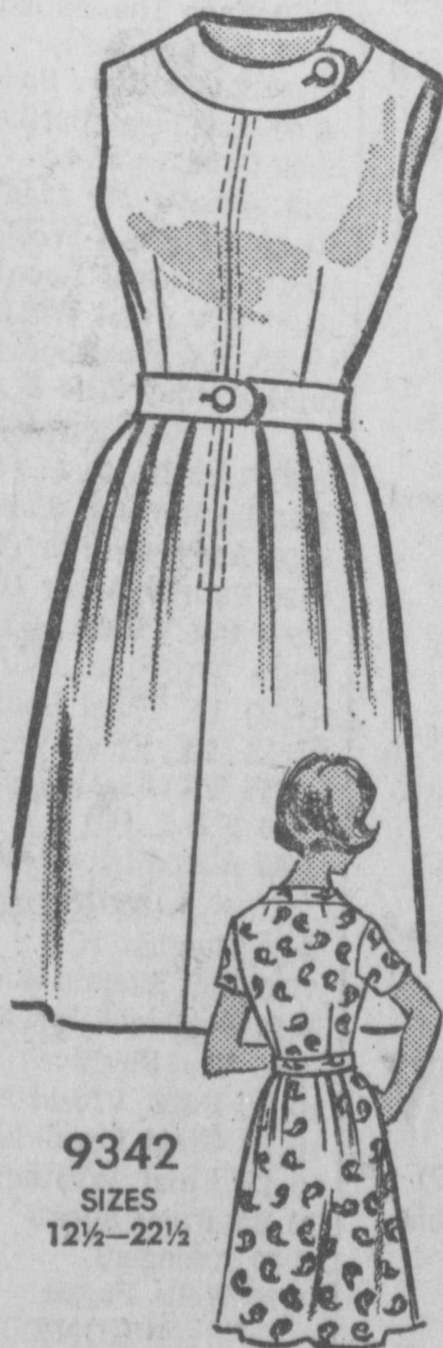

## What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

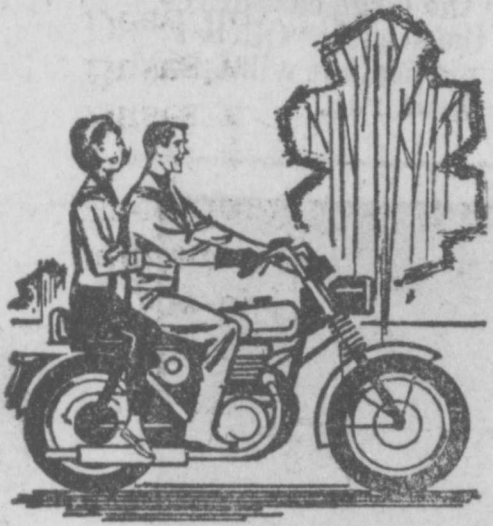

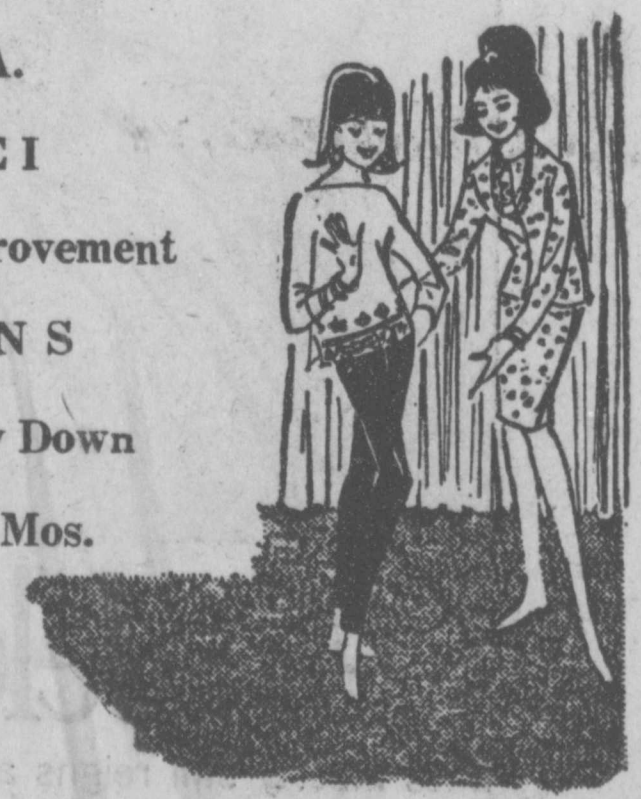
