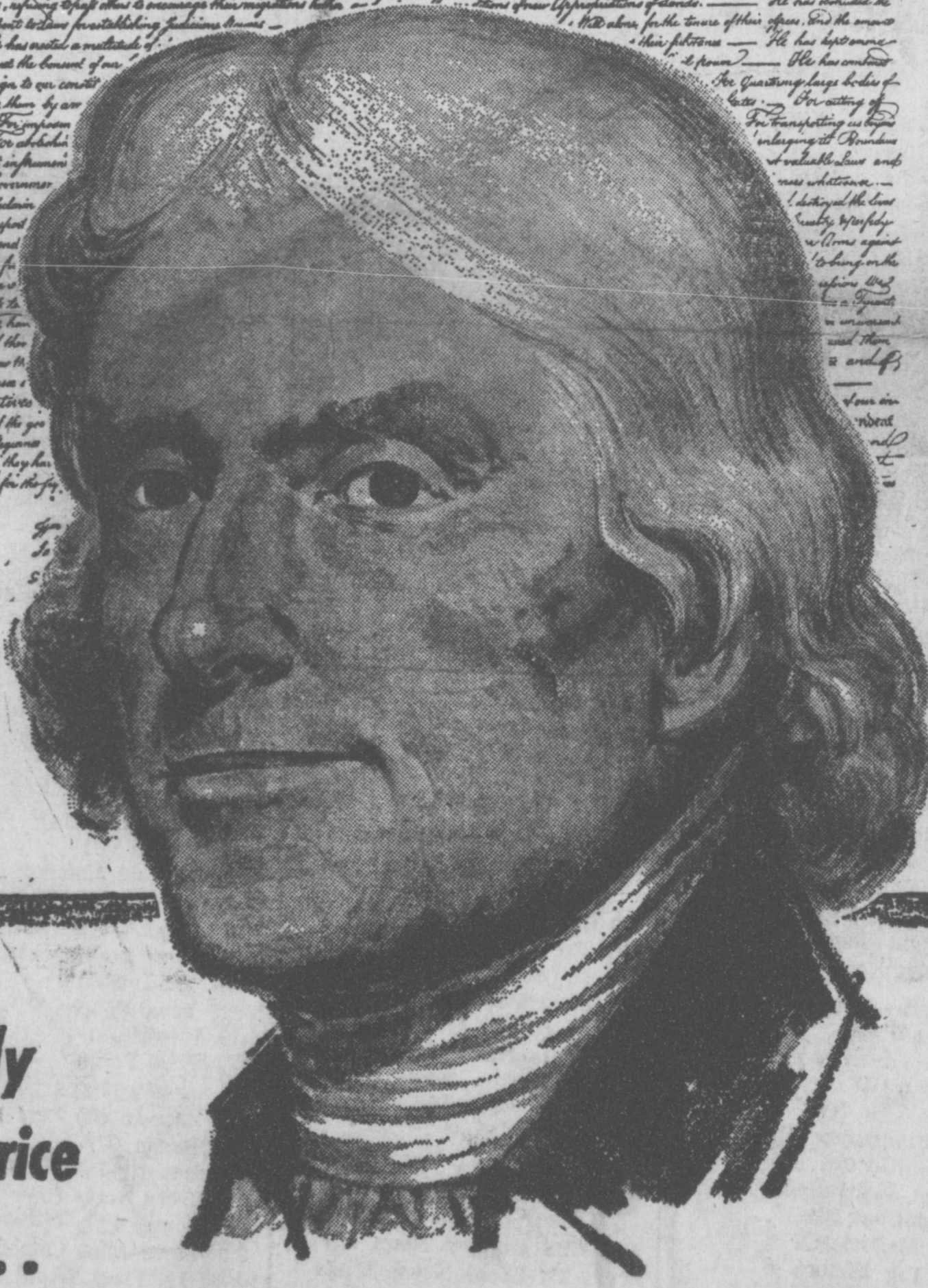
*The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America,*

*When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a solemn appeal is made to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of their intentions. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem best, for the security of their Lives and Liberties. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all reformations of such Governments, should be the result of slow and sure steps, and not of sudden or violent changes; and by the accumulation of slight and unimportant grievances, and insensible encroachments upon the private Rights of the People, a more complete and total destruction of their Liberties, and the establishment of a Tyranny, may be effected, which a bold and determined Resistance on the part of the People, may be the only remedy for. — That the History of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct and plain purpose, to establish an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.*

## STAY AWAKE ITCHING?

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## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Urgent legislation to protect small businessmen from such criminal acts as robbery, burglary, looting from riots, and other destruction has been introduced by Congressman Frank Annunzio, D., Illinois.

The legislation directs the Small Business Administration to conduct a study to determine the best method that independent enterprisers can employ to safeguard themselves from crime.

A sum not to exceed \$300,000 would be allocated for this study, which would be completed no later than a year from enactment of the legislation. Part of the expense would be authorized for outside consultants, and for whatever private services required. The SBA would be empowered to seek assistance from any Government agency in conjunction with the study, especially dependent upon Federal law enforcement agencies.

Holdups and other familiar crimes committed against the small operator, retailers especially vulnerable, are commonplace and not newsworthy, but to the merchant himself the event can have tragic significance and is invariably financial if not physical punishment.

Giants and chains are able to afford elaborate detection such as closed circuit TV, security

guards. The small storekeeper is limited in such expense. If the independent has a gun behind his counter, the weapon can as easily be turned upon him; if he has watchdogs, they can be decoyed as well as scaring customers.

The vast network of chain stores has forced the small merchant to remain open later at night to compete. Insurance against robbery is expensive, and if too great a risk, may be denied.

But it cannot be denied that criminal insurance to protect the small businessman is a must. The Government presently insures homes, banks, savings and loan institutions, and crops. The independent merchant has been a specific target in recent years with the growth of riots and city conflict, not to mention the increase in narcotics criminal activity, and just plain amateur pilfering.

Unfortunately, even when the small operator catches the thief with the goods, it is no guarantee that justice will be carried out. Court action is expensive, often means leaving the store unmanaged, and may even result in a counter-suit against the merchant. "It is not unusual to read of a merchant who has been robbed or had his store burglarized periodically over a period of years. We must find out why such stores are prime targets and develop methods for decreasing their susceptibility to crime... the funds for this study are a small but important investment in the future of small businessmen in the nation."

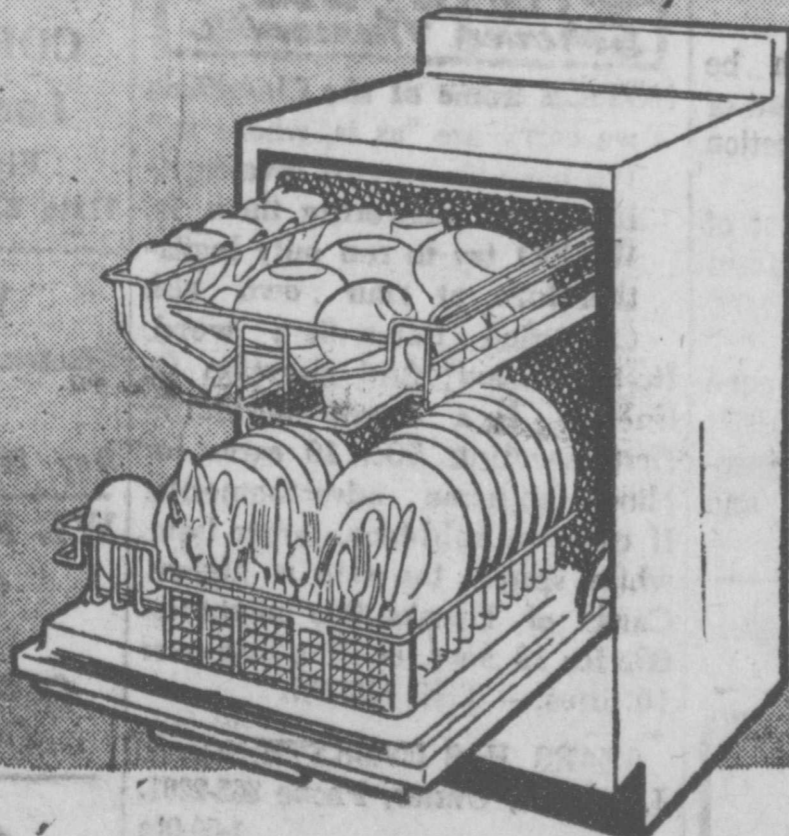
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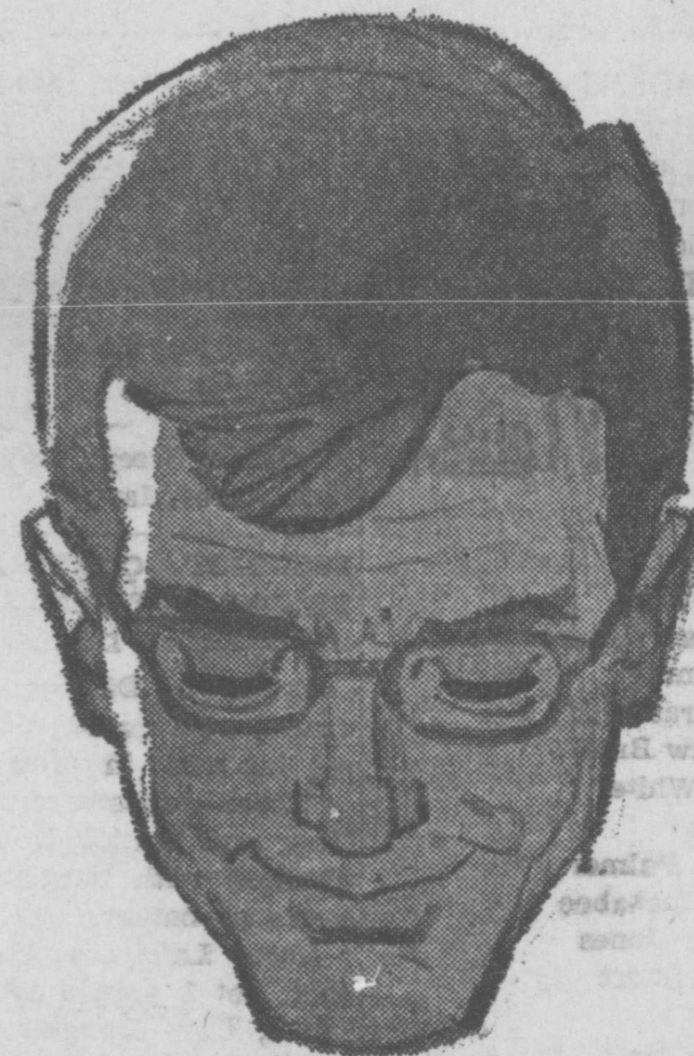

**CORYELL COUNTY'S TAX VALUATION WILL INCREASE**

Coryell County's tax valuation probably will be up about \$1,000,000 this year and will total close to \$21.5 million for 1967, County Judge Norman Storm said Friday. The Commissioners Court is finishing its equalization work on residential and business property tax renditions. Hearings on tax valuation of utilities in the county will be July 19. Most of the increase can be traced to the court's adjustment of low renditions. New construction is down from previous years. Storm aid about 35 percent of the county's revenue comes from ad valorem taxes, about \$190,000 a year. Other major sources of revenue are vehicle registration, \$160,000; civil fees of office, \$50,000; gasoline tax refunds, \$40,000; and fines and court costs, \$20,000.

Mack Maxwell of Gatesville was one of 30 students from Howard Payne College, Brownwood on the American Shrines Traveling Seminar that have walked on the ground where members of the first Baptist Church in America walked. They visited the First Baptist

Church of Providence, R., which was established by Roger Williams in 1638, and the present building built in 1775 is on a rolling plot of ground overlooking the state capitol. The original church was destroyed by fire.

Col. Russell O. Fudge, director of the Douglas MacArthur Academy of Freedom, of which the seminar is a part, told the students that Roger Williams was some-

what of a non-conformist, who accepted pastorate of a church in Massachusetts only with the provision that he church would break with the Church of England.

He was asked to leave and return to England, but fled the Massachusetts colony and went to Rhode Island where he established another colony—the first in America where religious freedom was guaranteed.

Persecution of Baptists at this time caused some entire congregations to move, and the Baptist Church at Kittery, Me., moved to Charleston, S. C. in 1682 and became the mother church for the Southern Baptist movement. Missionaries from that church moved into other areas of the South and on into the Midwest.

The churches of America have been the great bastions of principle and ethics in our way of life. The theatre has contributed to our culture, and the great financial institutions have helped make us a great nation, too.

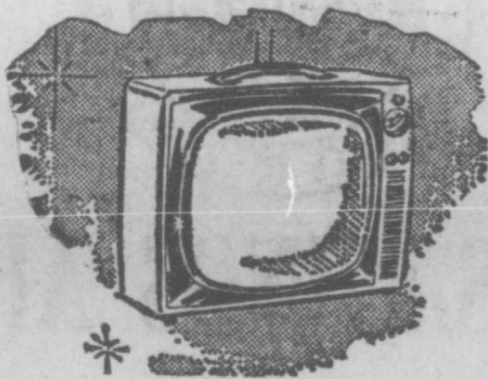

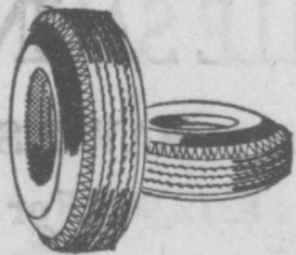
