## BILL FORD LOSES ARM IN ACCIDENT

Bill Ford, 51, of King lost his right arm in a farm accident at the Gatesville State School for Boys shortly after 4 p. m. Thursday, June 28. He is being treated at Coryell Memorial Hospital, where he is reported as "doing just fine".

Doctors amputated the injured arm halfway between the elbow and shoulder.

Ford, who joined the agricultural force at the State Schools last January, was working at a silage cutter when his arm became entangled in the cutting blades of the machinery. He was freed from the machine by fellow employees and rushed to the hospital.

## CITY COUNCIL TO HAVE OPEN BUDGET MEETING JULY 25 VALUATION UP

City Secretary Eiland Dovejoy announced that at the meeting of the City Council they voted to have a special meeting July 25 to discuss the 1967-68 budget and the public was invited.

The Tax Board has completed their work and the total valuation of the city is set at \$7,458,671, up \$187,000 from last year.

The Council is taking under consideration Blue Cross Hospitalization for city employees which would be about \$3.75 per employee. Water consumption is up, according to the secretary and one day this week it was 1,900,000 gallons and the average has been 1 1/2 to 2 million gallons per day during the hot weather.

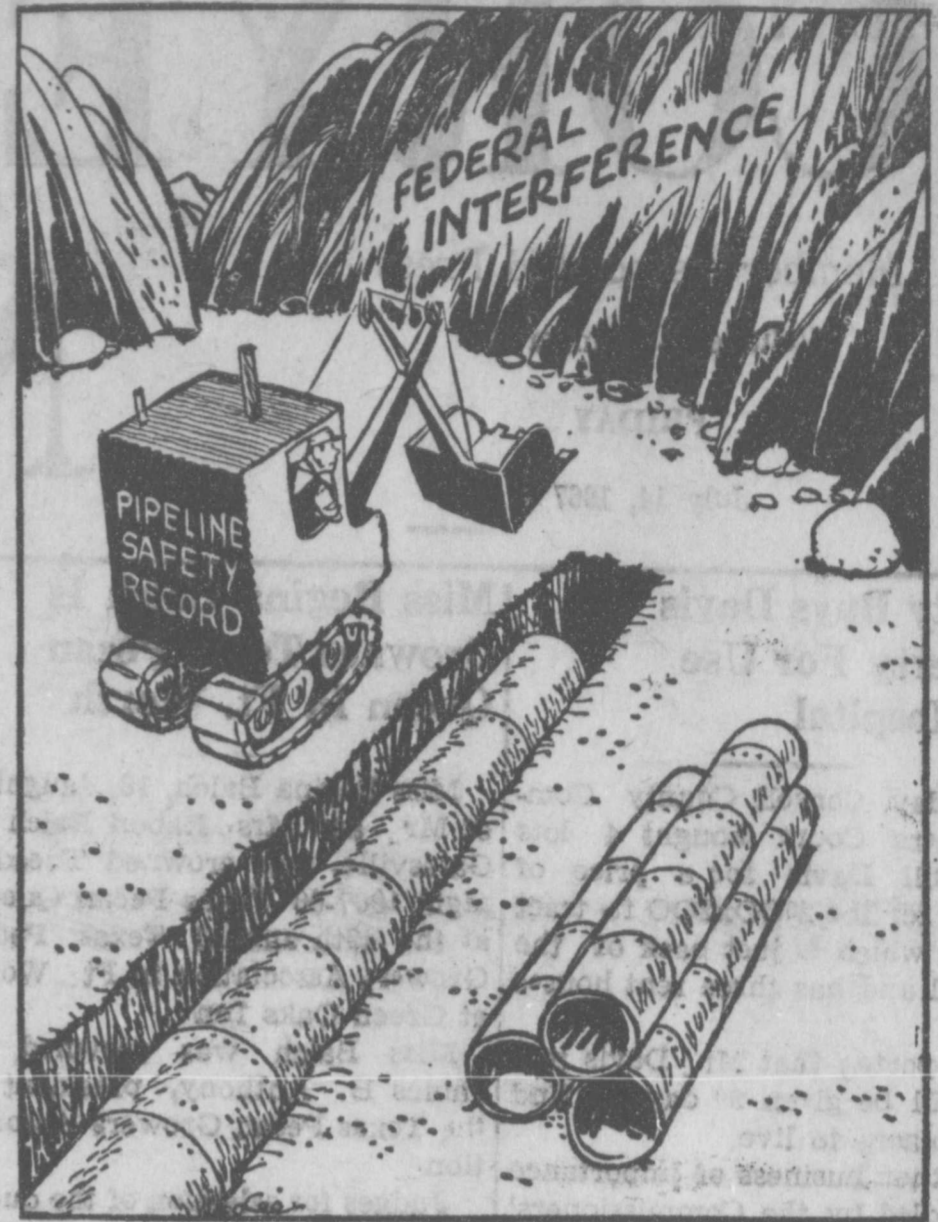

1. They make sure that a sturdy screen door is in place before succumbing to the urge to leave their front or back doors ajar. (Your local locksmith has sound advice on proper door locks.)

2. They equip their windows with locks which allow them to be opened just so far and no farther.

3. They never let strangers enter the house. All callers must identify themselves satisfactorily, and if there is a question, women in the know quickly verify them via a call to Police Headquarters. (Keep the telephone number by the phone.)

4. They lock their regular doors whenever they leave the house.

As an all-season security measure, install a tamper proof chain on front and back doors. Door chains are now available with locks. If all family members carry keys, the person who's home alone at night can lock up knowing he won't have to spring from bed at all hours to admit the stay-outs.

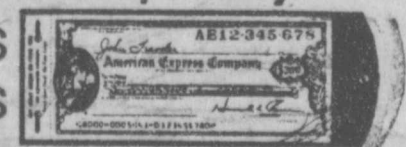

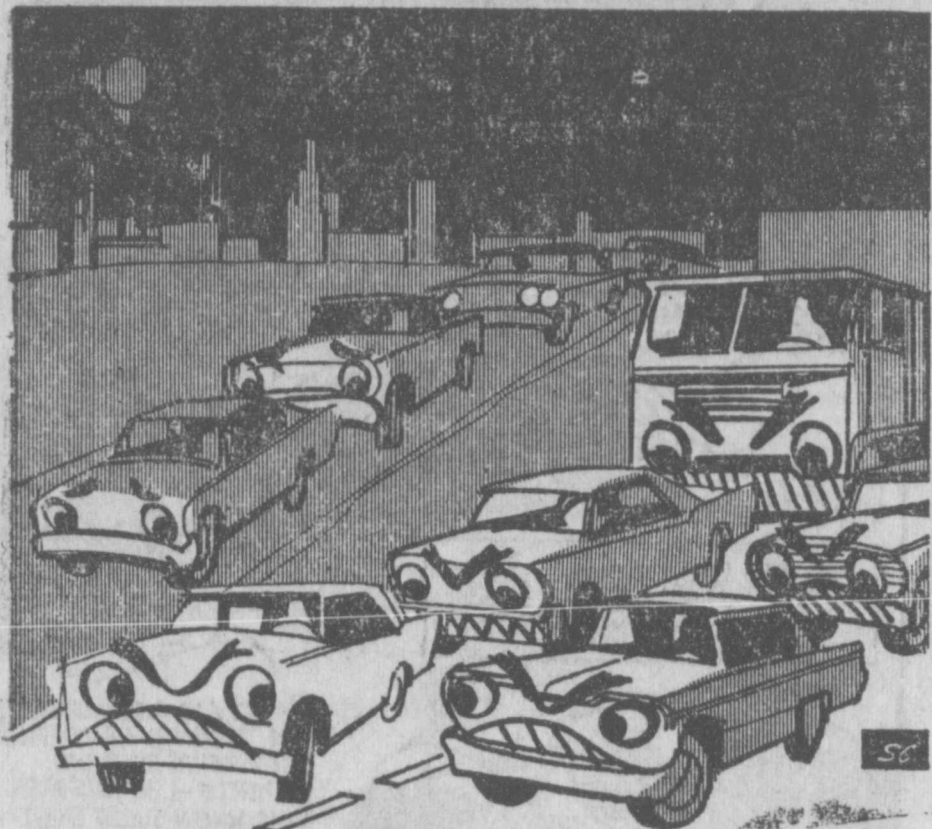

CLEVELAND, O.—A skyrocketing automotive population and inadequate safety facilities on our nation's highways will push our already gloomy annual traffic toll to epidemic proportions within a few years unless preventive measures are taken now, experts warn.

The National Safety Council predicts possibly 70,000 traffic deaths in 1975 unless the present trend can be halted.

"One area where this trend can be reversed is in nighttime fatalities," according to J. Parker Heck, educational director of the Street and Highway Safety Lighting Bureau here.

"Over 50% of all traffic fatalities occur at night, when traffic volume is only one-third as heavy," the Bureau spokesman said. "The nighttime traffic fatality rate is two and one half times that in daytime.

"Evidence indicates that

some 9,000 of the yearly traffic deaths are the direct result of darkness and could be eliminated or drastically reduced by the installation of adequate street and highway lighting at critical locations," he said.

The Bureau reported conclusive evidence showing a positive correlation between street lighting and traffic accidents and fatalities. In nearly every case, figures showed a marked reduction in nighttime traffic accidents where adequate street lighting was installed.

"With the steadily growing number of automobiles on the roads, the traffic situation is getting progressively worse," Heck pointed out. "Driver education and safety features on cars will help, but the roadways themselves must also be made as safe as possible. This is the area where lighting can make a definite contribution."

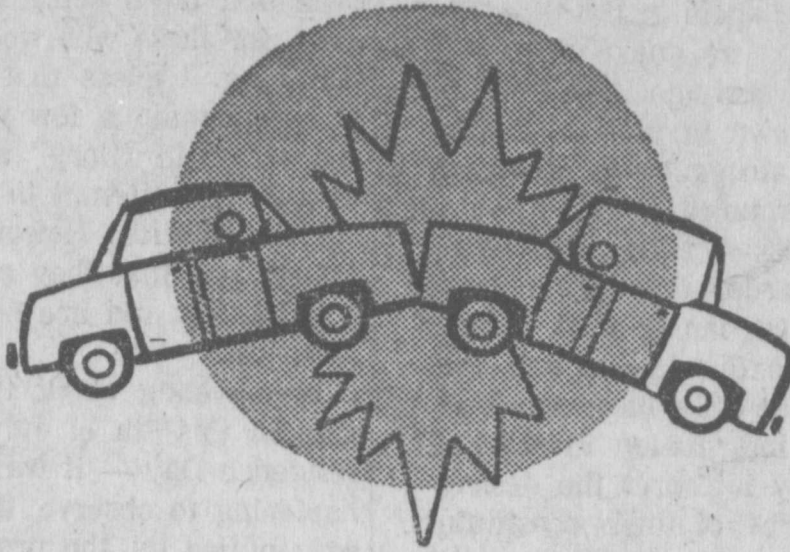

### Pancake Party

by Betty Crocker

All you need is griddle and guests — and with little to-do, you can turn your home into a Pancake House. If guests include men or children, or both, let them flip their own flapjacks for more fun. Griddle at one end of the table, with pitcher of batter . . . coffee and juice at the other . . . toppings in between.

Offer a variety of toppings, at least three. That's what makes pancakes a party. Lots of bacon, too. Or a meat and sauce combination with tiny sausage balls swimming in hot maple syrup. More coffee perking in the kitchen, and that's it. Now for some basics and flourishes.

#### BASIC RECIPE FOR PANCAKES

- 2 cups Bisquick
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 cups milk

Beat ingredients together with rotary beater until smooth. Grease griddle, if necessary. Turn pancakes when bubbles appear and before they break. Makes about eighteen 4-inch pancakes.

For thinner pancakes, add more milk. For thicker pancakes, add more Bisquick . . . To keep them hot, place between folds of towel in warm oven. Or place pancakes separately on rack in very low oven with door open. Don't stack . . . Then to doll them up, try these luscious toppings.

**Special Cherry Pancakes:** Set out a bowl of dairy sour cream. Four contents of 1 can (1 pound

5 ounces) cherry pie filling into another bowl. Guests spread each pancake of a small stack with sour cream and top with a spoonful of cherry filling.

**Or, Fruit-patch Delight:** Set out a bowl of sweetened fresh raspberries (or thawed frozen raspberries) and a pitcher of Orange Sauce (below). Just pour sauce over a small stack of pancakes and spoon on raspberries. **Orange Sauce:** Combine 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 2 tablespoons sugar and 1/2 cup orange juice; heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Makes about 1/2 cup.

Serve honey butter, too. Whip 1/2 cup soft butter with 1/2 cup honey until fluffy . . . To spice up the coffee, add a dash of cinnamon before brewing . . . And your pancake party is casual but unusual.

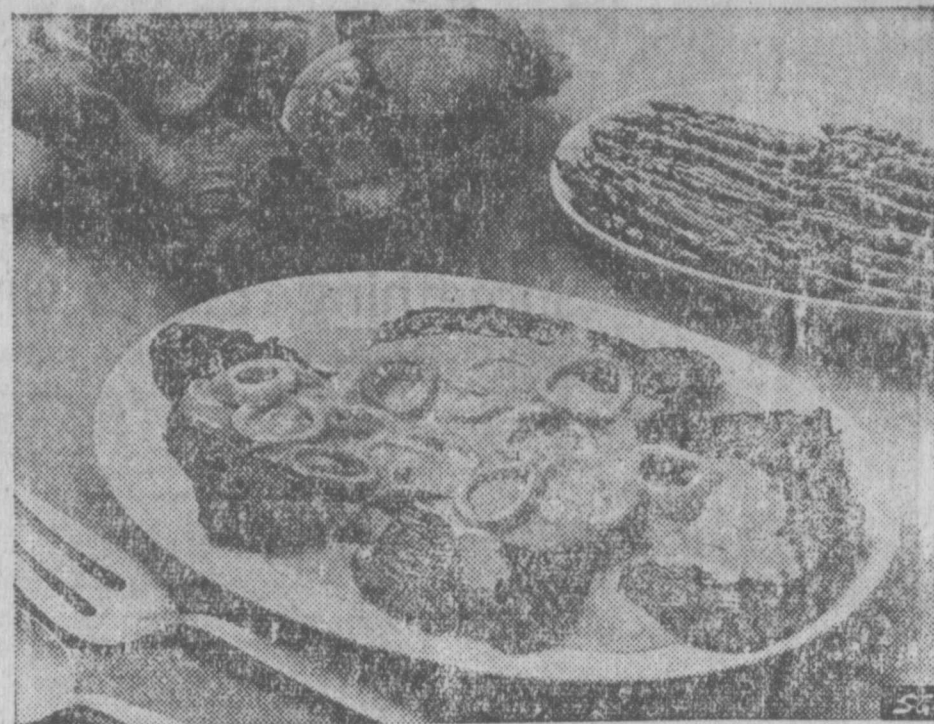

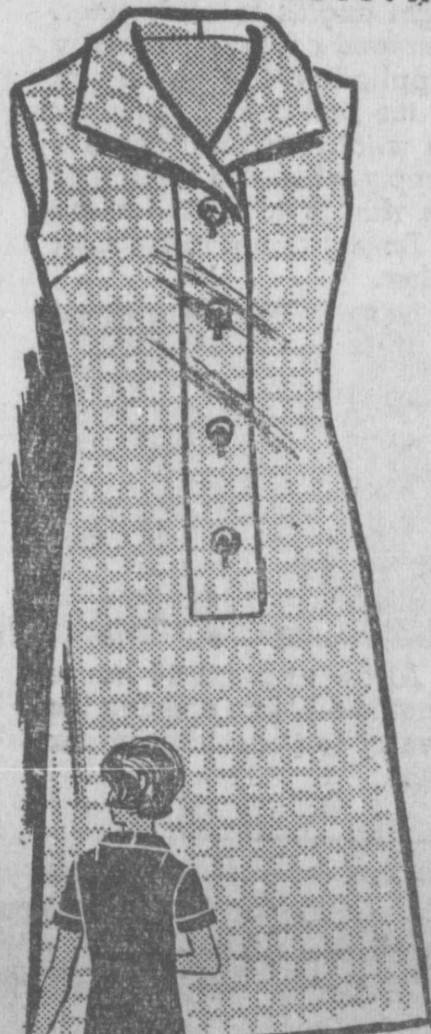

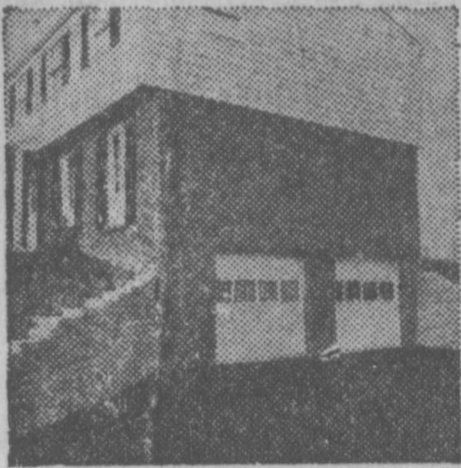

## Blacktop Driveways Need Attention— Coal Tar Sealant is 'Do It Yourself' Answer



Indifference, misunderstanding and delay can cost the homeowner precious dollars if the driveway for the family car is blacktop-paved. Surface cracking, chuckholes and shoulder crumbling are danger signals of trouble ahead, leading to costly repairs or replacement, if left unattended.

Usually a mixture of asphalt and aggregate rolled into place, this type of pavement is immediately subjected to deterioration caused by sun, rain, snow, wind, frost—plus the destructive drip of oil, grease and gas from automobiles. Like wood and steel, which are protected by paint from the elements, blacktop surfaces also must have a protective coating.

Such a sealant must be water resistant, impervious to petroleum solvents, flexible, easy to apply, and long lasting, according to Koppers Company, Inc. of Pittsburgh, producers of waterproofing and protective coating materials. Of all the materials tested only coal tar has been found to possess all of these characteristics. Asphalt cutbacks, frequently offered as a low-cost "dressing" will not resist the elements or oil and gas dripage.

For the "do-it-yourself" handyman, a five gallon pail of coal tar emulsion should be sufficient to double-coat a surface of approximately 250 square feet. This Pavement



Sealer meets U.S. Air Force and federal specifications for coating of bituminous (asphalt) pavements. It is used on such major projects as jet runways, service station aprons, shopping center plazas, and car dealership display lots. The Koppers material may be obtained in this five-gallon pail from local paving contractors. The material may be applied easily by following this simple procedure:

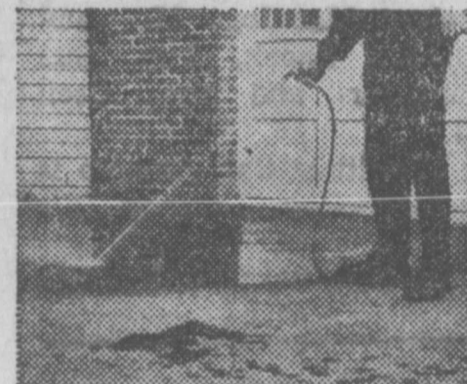
1. Patch or replace oxidized or broken areas completely with a patching compound, obtainable at asphalt supply outlets and many hardware stores. Allow the patch to set a minimum of 21 days to one month, if possible.

2. Remove all surface contaminants, such as grease and oil spots, by scrubbing with a household detergent or grease remover. Flush with clear

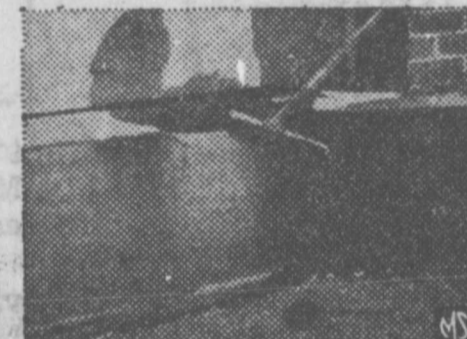


water. In event the oil or grease has penetrated deeply into the pavement, this area should be chipped out and replaced with a dense mixture of the patching material. The repaired area should be cured about three weeks prior to applying the sealant.

3. Completely remove all dirt, loose aggregate, leaves and other foreign material by sweeping, blowing with air, or by brisk water pressure. Dampen surface thoroughly, but do not allow puddles to form in low spots.



4. Apply two coats of sealant at right angles to each other. The second coat can normally be applied within two hours after the first coat, depending upon weather conditions. Do not apply when it is raining or when rain is forecast for the day. Do not apply in freezing weather.



5. Allow at least 24 hours drying time before opening the driveway to pedestrian or car traffic.

Daily Care Yields Bright Glass:

Sparkling, brilliant glassware takes careful daily home care. This includes pre-washing preparation proper washing, and adequate storage.

To prevent difficulties in washing glassware, here are a few "ounce of prevention" hints. Removes stains, such as lipstick with a paper towel before washing. Glasses that held milk, tea or coffee should be rinsed soon after use, as these beverages often leave rings difficult to remove by normal washing. For easier cleaning, scrape and rinse away all loose food. Soak glass cookware with burned-on food. Use cold water for soaking utensils with egg or starch mixtures.

The two cardinal rules for proper washing are—handle gently, and wash immediately after use.

Wash with mild soap or detergent and HOT water. Glass has more sparkle after drying if detergent is used. A few drops of blueing or ammonia in the wash water

Some glass is easily broken by sudden temperature change, so it is important that glasses which have held iced drinks not be suddenly doused in hot water. There is less chance of glass breakage if only a few pieces are washed at one time. Stemware should be handled extra carefully—hold by the base of the bowl, not by the stem.

An extremely hot water rinse is necessary for sparkling glassware. For a high polish, dry with a lint-free absorbent towel.

Proper storage is the final ingredient for sparkling glassware. Shelves should be cushioned with paper or a tea towel, and glasses should stand with rims up. For maximum protection, crowding and stacking should be avoided.

Most homemakers already know the rules, but how many really use them?

## CENTRAL TEXAS COLLEGE RECEIVES FAA FLIGHT SCHOOL APPROVAL

The Federal Aviation Agency has approved Central Texas College's Career Pilot School and issued them the Air Agency Certificate Number SW-SAT-50 with the following ratings: Primary Flying School-Airplanes, Basic and Advanced Ground School, Commercial Flying School-Airplanes, Instrument Flying School, and Flight Instructor School.

### ROUTINE SERVICE PREVENTS PROBLEMS

Routine maintenance will prevent mid-season performance problems, reports Bill Spaeth, manager of engineering at Evinrude Motors.

Spaeth outlined six things you should put on your maintenance checklist: (1) boat bottom; (2) spark plugs; (3) fuel system; (4) propeller; (5) lubrication; and (6) electrical system.

Salt water boatmen should pay special attention to marine growths on the hull. They can cut performance by as much as 50 percent. If your boat is in fresh water, don't have a false sense of security. Grime and marine growths can also be a problem. Scrub the hull periodically, or wash it down after each boating trip.

Erratic performance, hard starting and mis-firing can usually be traced to fouled spark plugs. They should be removed, cleaned and re-gapped. Your owner's manual will give you the correct setting for the plug gap. If fouled plugs are a recurring problem, make sure you are not using an oil-rich fuel mixture.

If the plugs are all right, check the fuel system—tank, lines and carburetor. It should be free of gummy deposits. To clean it, use a solution of acetone or lacquer thinner. All fittings should be tight.

A bent or nicked propeller or one with a broken blade will have an immediate, harmful effect on performance. This should be checked by your marine dealer. In many cases, looking at the prop will not tell if continual running has altered the pitch of the blades.

Your owner's manual is a handy guide to engine lubrication. Follow the directions to the letter and use the recommended lubricant.

All electrical wiring, fittings and controls should be inspected. Loose fittings should be tightened; frayed wires should be replaced. A battery, used to power electrical equipment or for an electric start outboard, should be fully charged. Clean the battery terminals to insure a positive contact and flow of current.

## Boating Tips...



### PORPOISING

This rhythmic up-and-down motion of the bow usually occurs at or near top speed. Porpoising can be eliminated quite simply in most cases, according to the Mercury outboard boating authorities.

First, try moving weights forward, a bit at a time, to see if this helps. Moving the gas tank or anchor, or changing seating positions, may do the job. Next, try experimenting with different motor tilt positions. Sometimes porpoising is caused by deformation of the hull bottom. That portion of the hull on which the boat planes should be a straight line when viewed from the side.

Internal stiffeners can sometimes be installed to straighten out bulges, hooks or warps.
