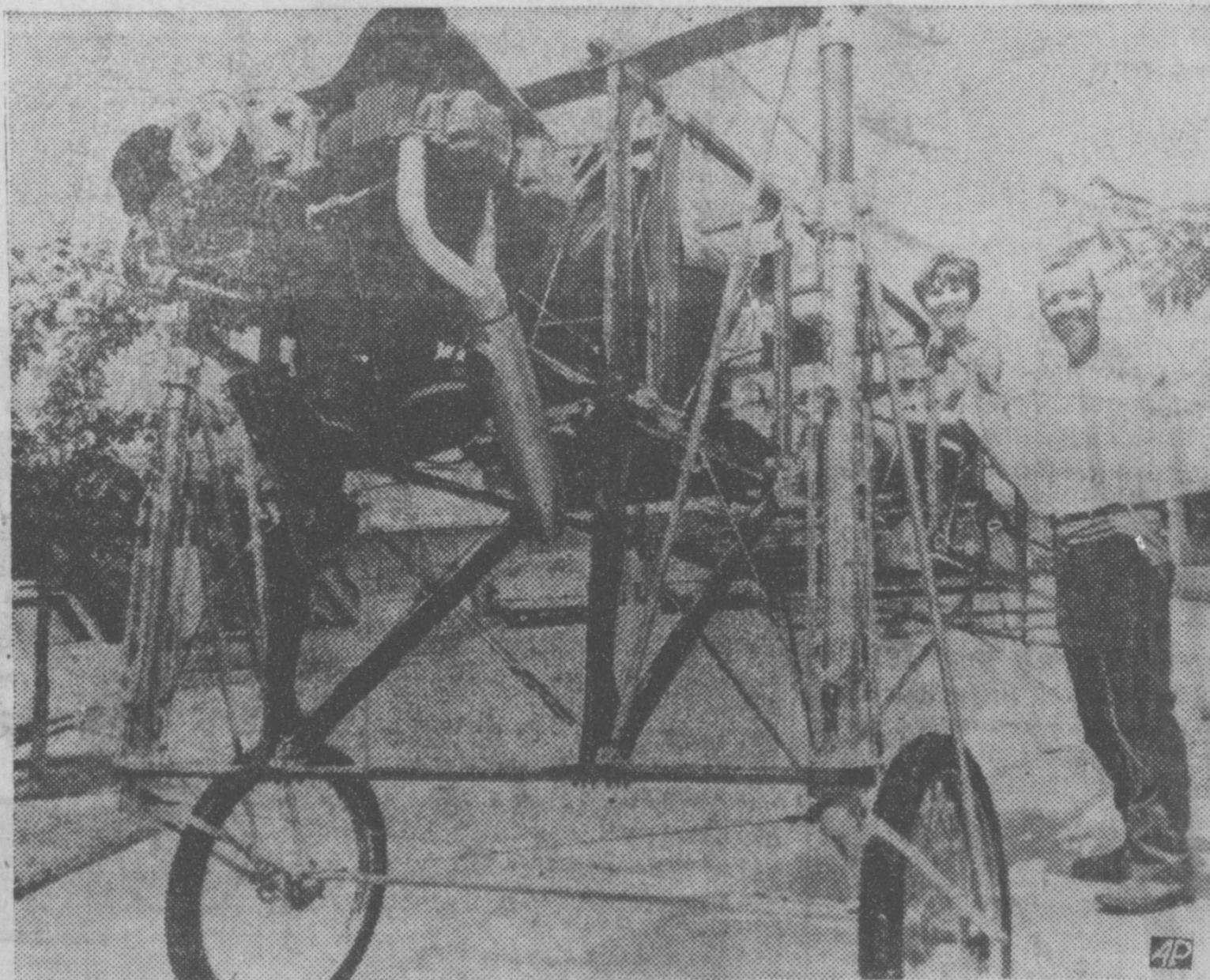

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Chief Government economic adviser, Gardner Ackley, has warned the nation and business, offering two alternatives: blanket control by Government of all wages and prices in the economy, or self-imposed, voluntary controls. "Some firms because of their size and importance have more responsibility than others," warns Ackley, "because they have more power to affect the public interest."



Ackley failed to mention, however, that the economy would be greatly strengthened if Government resolved to spend less, thus deflating ballooning inflation, and stemming the lava-flow of deficit spending, which would curb easy money and existing prices.

Dangers of such Government control are outlined by economist-columist, Lawrence Fertig. "Ackley proposes a rule by men (Government officials), not rule by law, which applies to everyone equally in the economic sphere," Fertig warns also of a "liquidity crisis" which occurs when banks and capital markets must severely restrict ready-cash demands of borrowers.

"Treasury officials estimate they will have to raise \$12 billion in cash the last six months this year. When demands of this magnitude are made by the Treasury in wartime, the Fed will use its powers to prevent financial crisis, making conditions favorable for the financial

community, especially commercial banks, to buy government bonds. The Fed will increase holding of Federal debt, and be the basis of an expanding money supply. Thus, once again the Federal Government and its agencies will resort to monetary inflation. Enough dollars will be made available to provide the Government with the money it needs, and at the same time encourage industry to produce at top rate."

With Washington's insistence upon juggling sky-rocketing war costs with expensive Great Society programs, the Administration will have further woven the nation into a Penelope's web of endless expense and dollar devaluation. Vietnam war costs have burst any previous budget barriers and Treasury Secretary Fowler appears at a loss to know how much more money will be poured into Vietnam, for how long, or at what deficit.

Meanwhile, creditor nations are taking over U.S. gold stock, the legal reserve that backs the value of the dollar, and the country declining in world finance leadership.

Government talks of tax increases can only further deprive the public, already short-changed by inflation, and could trigger recession. In the words of the Wall St. Journal: "The nation could quite easily have recession and large-scale inflation at the same time."

Mounting deficits and ballooning inflation revives the threat of direct Governmental price and wage control as New Economics theories employed by the Administration prove consistently unworkable.

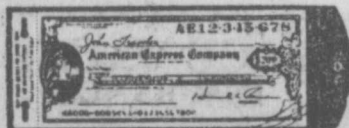

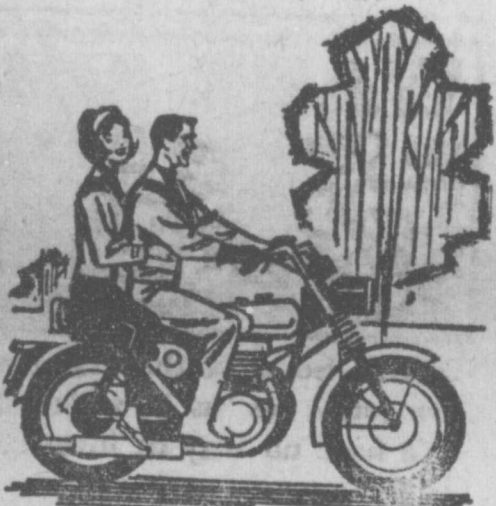

Hello Neighbor

A new neighbor to welcome? That calls for a coffee party with the girls. Now when you reach for the pot, once more for review, the coffee maker's pledge: "a clean pot, fresh cold water from the tap, accurate measurements." For the occasion, use your fanciest cups — maybe lined with spoonfuls of creamy, sweetened meringue. That's Belgian Coffee, remember? And for the "scrumptious" department, go ahead, be gay — try French Quarter Beignets. Mine are tiny square-shaped donuts, a simplified version of the New Orleans original. Don't let the length of the recipe scare you. It's not all that hard. Besides, you do want to impress your new friend.

**FRENCH QUARTER
BEIGNETS**

- 2/3 cup mashed Potato Buds
- 2/3 cup boiling water
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 3 cups Bisquick
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- Salad oil
- Orange Glaze (below)

Stir Potato Buds into water with fork until moistened; whip until fluffy. Set aside to cool completely. In large mixer bowl, beat eggs until fluffy. Beat in sugar and shortening at medium speed. Add mashed potatoes; beat on low speed until smooth. Add Bisquick and nutmeg and beat until mixture is smooth. Cover and refrigerate 2 to 3 hours. Heat salad oil (3 to 4 inches deep) in heavy saucepan or deep fat fryer to

375°. Divide dough in half. Roll one half at a time to 1/4" thick on floured surface. Keep remainder in refrigerator until ready to roll out. Cut dough into 2-inch squares. Drop squares, 3 or 4 at a time, into hot oil. Fry about 1 minute on each side or until golden brown. Lift from oil with slotted spoon; drain on paper towels. While warm, top with Orange Glaze or, if desired, sprinkle with confectioners' sugar. Makes 4 dozen squares. Orange Glaze: Mix 1 cup confectioners' sugar, 1 teaspoon grated orange peel and 2 teaspoons orange juice until smooth.

Note that cubes of bread brown in 375° fat in 60 seconds. Use a deep fat thermometer for best temperature control... Now, let's get the show on the road. Set the date and call the girls for "coffee."

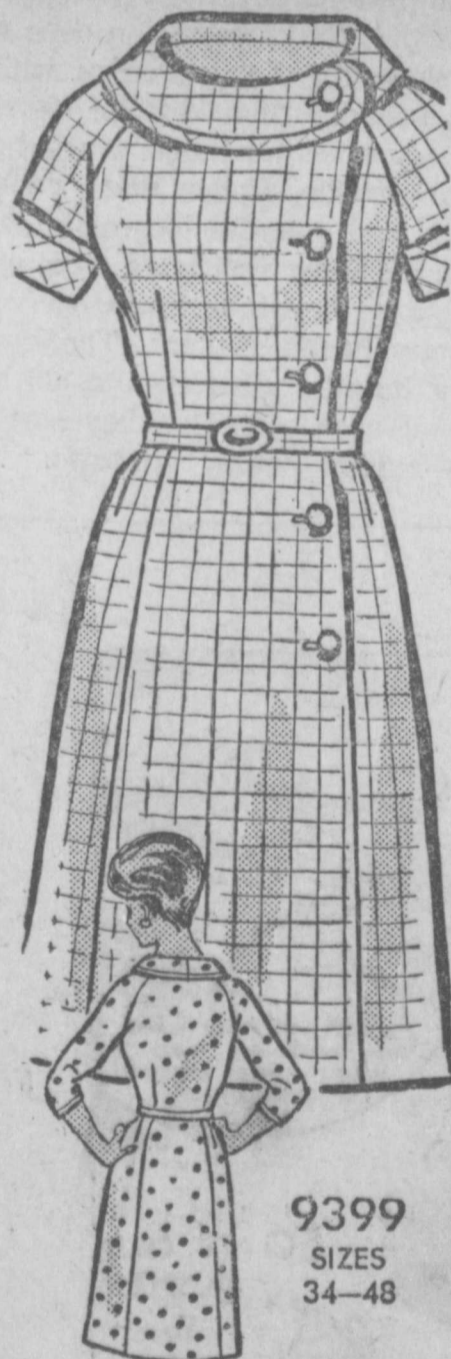

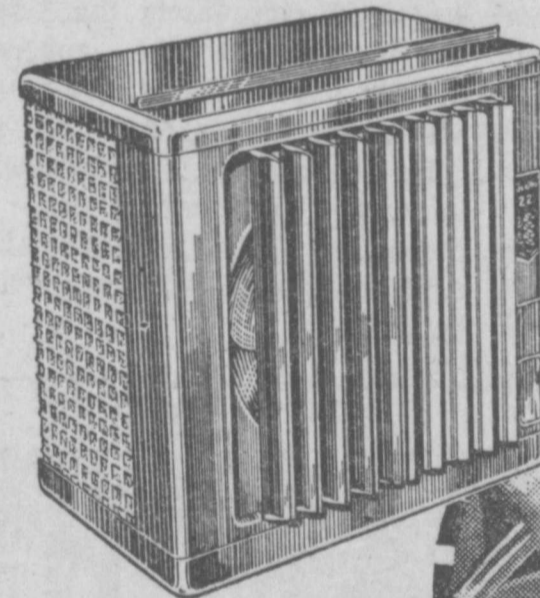

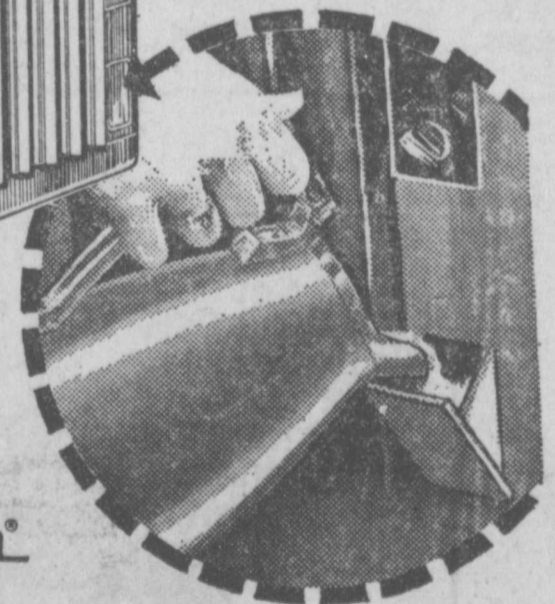

STATE Capital NEWS

By VERN SANFORD

AUSTIN, Tex. — Newspaper readers throughout Texas soon will be seeing long columns of type about important issues as Secretary of State John Hull begins to advertise the six proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 11.

Fourteen additional amendments will be on the 1968 ballot. Eight of the 20 amendments are of interest mainly to special groups (eg: legislators or state employees). Eight others would

provide local governments with new powers or duties. Only four of the group directly affects most Texans.

Amendments to be voted on this year will appear on the ballot in this order:

— No. 1, House Joint Resolution 3, to permit counties to put all tax money in a single general fund rather than dividing income in specified amounts among separate funds for earmarked purposes as is now required.

— No. 2, HJR 37, allowing cities and other governmental units within hospital districts to levy for participation in mental health and mental retardation community centers.

— No. 3, HJR 17, reviving the veterans land program and authorizing a total of \$400,000,000 in bonds to finance continued purchase of farm and ranch land by veterans, including those who

have served in Southeast Asia during present hostilities.

— No. 4, HJR 6, authorizing counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills of county law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.

— No. 5, HJR 12, authorizing a \$75,000,000 state revenue bond issue for the development of state parks and recreational areas. Bonds are expected to be financed by a small admission fee.

— No. 6, HJR 27, permitting state officers and employees to hold non-elective positions under the state or U. S. governments where there is no conflict of interest and where the state might benefit.

That's all for '67.

Top interest in these amendments doubtless will center on the park bond proposal and the veterans land amendment.

Hospital mental health and mental retardation groups will emphasize the importance of Amendment No. 2 to the new community center approach of treating mental patients close to home.

Calling the 1967 election for Veterans Day on a Saturday, undoubtedly, was to assure a large vote turn-out for the land fund amendment. A substantial campaign to urge its passage already is taking form.

Gov. John Connally is the principal backer of the parks bond issue. Last December he unveiled a 10-year plan for acquiring and developing 150,960 acres of recreational lands and historical sites. This would more than triple present state park acreage and open a variety of new facilities for outdoor recreation.

Only opposition to the amendment to date has been based on the \$1 per car park-entry fee, initially proposed by Connally to finance the vast program; and scattered complaints that facilities included in the governor's master plan do not adequately serve some areas of the state.

He is expected to spearhead an intensive fall campaign — supported by parks, recreational and outdoor groups — to put over the bond issue.

The veterans land amendment would add another \$200,000,000 to state bonds previously authorized and through which 35,300 veterans have purchased farm and ranch properties at low interest rates spread over a 40-year pay period.

This amendment would raise the amount which could be borrowed under the program from \$7,500 to \$10,000. The program was initiated in 1949. Additional bonds were approved by voters in 1951 and 1956. Amendments to enlarge the bond authorization were rejected at elections in 1963 and 1965. Opposition came mainly from Dallas and Houston.

Proponents emphasize that, while thousands of veterans have benefitted from the program, it has cost the state no money and actually has turned a profit of \$2,500,000 a year while providing an expanded land market.

Opposition has adopted the argument that it is not the function of the state government to engage in the loan business and that veterans have had plenty of time to participate. Some also contend that "cheap money" invites purchases of land not needed and which will not be put to productive use.

Amendment No. 2 specifies that the legislature, in providing for creation of hospital districts, does not have to require that the districts assume full responsibility for community mental health and retardation centers and services. It would permit cities and counties to levy taxes and issue bonds for such services. Subdivisions within existing districts would be authorized to do so unless statutes creating the districts expressly prohibit.

An attorney general's opinion held that the constitution does not allow political subdivisions within the boundary of a hospital district to levy taxes for medical and hospital service. Under that ruling, cities and counties located in such districts were restricted from participating in establishment of community health centers. Therefore, only hospital districts could establish such centers, a key part of the mental health program.

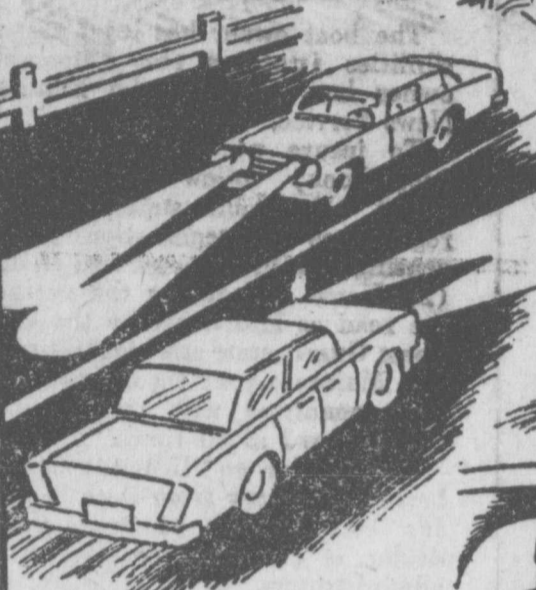

A Question of Budgets

Investors interested in the state of the national economy follow closely at this time the news of the President's proposed budget for the coming fiscal year. The considerable

confusion about the national budget, comes, I believe, because there are actually three different kinds: the administrative budget, the cash budget, and the national income accounts budget.

The administrative budget is the most familiar one which traditionally the President sends to Congress for approval. It itemizes funds to be spent by the government for many federal programs together with an estimate of funds to be received—in the form of taxes—to pay for these expenditures.

The administrative budget however, doesn't include an accounting of the receipts and expenditures for an increasingly large area of government finance, i.e. the several trust funds administered by the government for such programs as Social Security, Unemployment, etc. And today these areas involve nearly 25% of all federal spending!

The cash budget itemizes the exchange of funds between government and the public and includes the trust funds. However, this budget reflects the distortions of financing the national debt in a tight money market.

The national income accounts budget is, I believe, a more accurate and equitable guide; to the national economy. And recently—in a break with tradition—President emphasized this budget in his presentation to Congress.

The national income accounts budget is part of the bookkeeping system by means of which the federal government monitors the progress of the nation's Gross National Product.

This budget itemizes the government's purchases of goods and services... and relates them to total economic output. Moreover, it charts the redistribution of income in our nation. It illustrates—through an accounting of the various trust funds—the transfer of money received from taxpayers to those receiving pensions and welfare assistance.

Because this budget is more inclusive—obviously, its totals are higher than those in the administrative budget. For example, spending in the national income accounts budget totaled \$169.2 billion vs. \$135 billion in the administrative budget.

In emphasizing the national income accounts budget, I feel, President Johnson has led the way toward a greater recognition of—and acceptance of—this more realistic guide to the nation's economic progress.

Most people delight in invited friends—but panic when a guest "drops in" unexpectedly. A call from your husband that he is "bringing a friend" needn't faze you, because if the lamb chops won't go a long way, a little ingenuity will!

A well-perfected slice-and-stretch technique can do wonders. For example, take the lamb (or chicken or beef), dice it up and pile into a casserole adding "fillers" like cooked rice and mushrooms, potatoes and frozen vegetables, or wide noodles and grated cheese. If it still looks like a lean meal, fatten it up with a quickie appetizer (egg salad stuffs a tomato deliciously), a soup, salad, and a rich-y dessert (instant-type pudding served with cookies).

I anticipate emergencies by stocking my larder with salad and vegetables and my freezer is always host to a one-pound Carolina pork sausage that's easily defrosted. So when I whip up quickies it's usually sausages and scrambled eggs.

Whatever you do, never "fragment" a meal; serving your guest the choice cut while you sit there with fried egg on your plate. No one likes to feel they "robbed" your dinner. Always share what you have and if it's a little skimpy, make up for it with rich conversation!

If you have been hesitating to apply for connection to the Sewer line, for this reason, you may rest assured that your property cannot be held as security.

Also you may give your check with the assurance that you may get it back any time before the work begins on construction of the system. When enough members have applied for sewer service, a mass meeting of the community will be held and you will be told how much it will cost you per month. At that time you will decide whether or not you still want to be included in the sewer project, if not you may get your check back.

Dog Feeding Hints

Few dog owners spend as much time as they should planning meals for their dogs. Too often they tend to buy the kind of food their dog likes with little thought of its nutritional value.

But now the American emphasis on health and dieting is moving into the pet world. A number of canned diet pet foods are available today which are claimed to lengthen dog life and increase general well-being.

All this points to the fact that there's more to feeding a dog than just picking out something he likes and giving it to him. Some dog foods may not contain the balanced diet a dog needs. Prolonged indifference to your dog's diet could shorten his life and lead to unnecessary vet bills.

Here are some hints from Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation, a major producer of steel used in the making of cans for dog food and other canned products:

- 1) Check the contents of dog food before you buy. Does it contain the balanced ingredients your dog needs? It should include protein, fat, minerals, vitamins and carbohydrates (vegetable matter).
- 2) Make sure your dog has plenty of water, especially during summer months. Canned dog foods already contain some of the water to fulfill his minimum requirements, but always be sure there is an extra supply of fresh water on hand.
- 3) Always use a clean dish. Leftover food can cause worms if eaten at a later time.
- 4) In cold weather try heating the food a little. One advantage of canned foods is that this can be done easily by placing the opened can in hot water.
- 5) Feed your dog at a regular time each day. Before adult suppertime is best since this will reduce the temptation to beg at the table.
- 6) Make sure you feed him the right amount. A 15-pound dog needs a can a day; a 30-pound dog needs two cans a day.

Let's Go Boating!



OWNERS HAVE LEGAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The boat owner has legal responsibilities just as the automobile owner has, reports the Evinrude News Service.

To insure peace of mind (and pocketbook) follow these suggestions: (1) Know state and local regulations for registration and licensing of a boat, motor and trailer; (2) Know and follow the rules of the road as laid down by the U. S. Coast Guard, state and local officials; (3) Maintain your rig in good operating condition with proper equipment aboard at all times.

Registration and licensing or numbering laws vary from state to state. It's best to talk to your marine dealer, or contact state boating law administrators. In most cases, any boat with an engine in excess of 10 horsepower must be registered and numbers affixed to the boat. Trailer laws also vary, so check this out, too. A trailer for a 14-foot family runabout will generally need a license and must be equipped with stop and directional lights. If you're towing a heavy rig, you may need a trailer with brakes.

Several informative guidebooks will give you the rules of the road, but supplement this with knowledge of local regulations. Ignorance of the law is no excuse.

Maintain your boat, motor and trailer in good condition. If an accident occurs and it's traced to faulty equipment, you are liable.

You may also be held liable if you fail to carry required equipment aboard your boat. An absolute must is a life preserver or buoyant seat cushion for each person aboard. Depending upon the size and type of boat you own, there will be additional equipment. Check with your marine dealer and local water patrol officials.

If a boating mishap does occur, you must report it to the local authorities, if property damage is \$100 or more or personal injury results. To be on the safe side, report all accidents.
