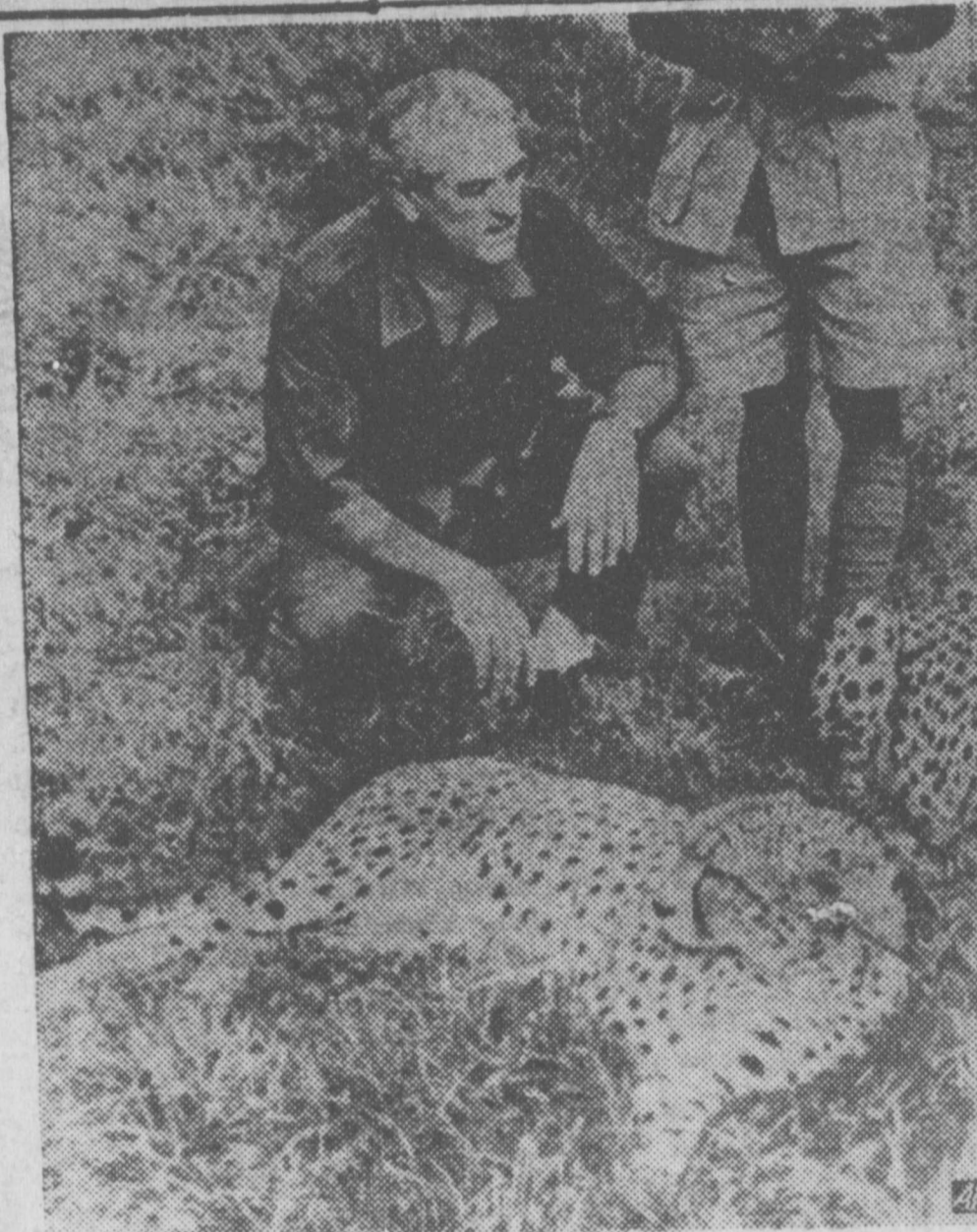
Miss Manning was a very credible representative for ALL Coryell County, and her work toward that end is well appreciated.

SAMUEL L. ADAMS TO BE HONORED IN DALLAS AUG. 9 BY VO. AG. TEACHERS ASS'N

AUSTIN, Tex., (Spl.) Samuel L. Adams, Vocational Agriculture Teacher at Gatesville for the past 17 years will be honored by the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas in Dallas, August 9, according to E. A. Roquemore, Arlington, President of the organization.

Adams is being recognized for his 38 years of service to the Vocational Agriculture program of Texas.

The award will be presented at the annual Awards Breakfast of the association. The breakfast is held during the statewide conference of Vocational Agriculture teachers and the 1967 conference will emphasize the implementation of new approaches to Vocational Agriculture Education. Leaders in agriculture and education throughout the state and nation will participate in the four day meeting.

Education features of the meeting will be under the direction of George H. Hurt, Director of Agriculture Education, Texas Education Agency. He will be assisted by J. A. Marshall, Don Jobes, E. L. Tiner, Bill T. Tomlinson and twelve area supervisors including Ralph Moser of Stephenville.

Adams graduated from Coolidge High School and received his B. S. and M. S. degree from Texas A&M University. In addition to his 17 years of vocational agriculture in Gatesville he also taught in Buda, Jasper Mildred, Wortham, and Temple.

He is active in the Presbyterian Church and was a member of the Kiwanis Club.

Approximately 1400 Vocational Agriculture Teachers and friends are expected to attend the Dallas conference.

LEGAL SPARRING CONTINUES IN CORYELL DISPUTE

More action on the legal front in the jurisdiction controversy between Gatesville and Fort Gates came when Bob Cummings, attorney for Gatesville, filed a quo warranto petition again attacking the validity of Fort Gates ordinances annexing land between the two municipalities.

The petition, filed in 52nd District Court, asks that the annexation by Fort Gates be declared "void and of no effect."

It is styled the State of Texas, on the Relation of Wendell Lowrey, Mayor of Gatesville, vs the City of Fort Gates.

In order to file the petition, Cummings had to obtain the permission of the state's attorney and the district judge. After accepting the petition, District Judge Truman Roberts said it had not yet been determined when any of the suits filed by Gatesville against the city of Fort Gates and the Fort Gates Water Supply Corporation will be tried.

The latest petition contends that a 1965 resolution approved by Gatesville City Council setting the town's population at more than 5,000 was passed "in good faith and upon sound basis." It says that Fort Gates was incorporated in 1965 after the Gatesville population was approved.

It claims the resolution gave Gatesville extra-territorial jurisdiction over all the area within a mile of the city's boundaries.

The petition charges that a Fort Gates ordinance enacted last May to annex the property of 42 residents into its city limits "is fraudulent and in bad faith, in that consent was not gained, as averred, of all the property owners whose land is included."

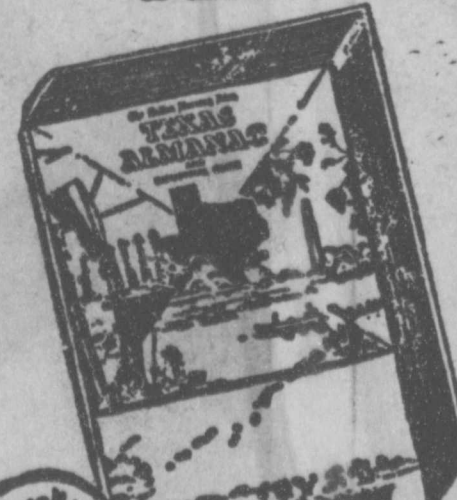

Fish and chips. Or grilled ham slices, out of a can, and corn on the cob. With fruits for salad, cookies for dessert. And since breakfast appetites are hearty under the open sky, how about Blueberry Pancakes some sunny morning? Here's my campers' recipe.

Blueberry Pancakes

2 cups Bisquick

1 egg

1 1/2 cups milk

2 tablespoons sugar

1 cup fresh or drained canned blueberries

Mix Bisquick, egg, milk and sugar with rotary beater until smooth. Fold in blueberries. Bake on hot griddle. Grease griddle if necessary. Turn pancakes when bubbles appear. Makes about eighteen 4-inch pancakes.

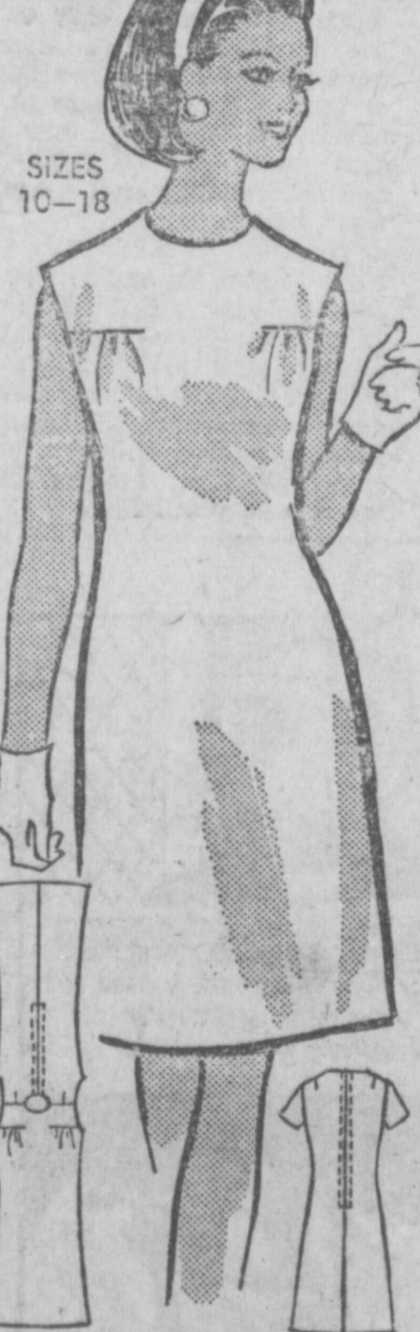

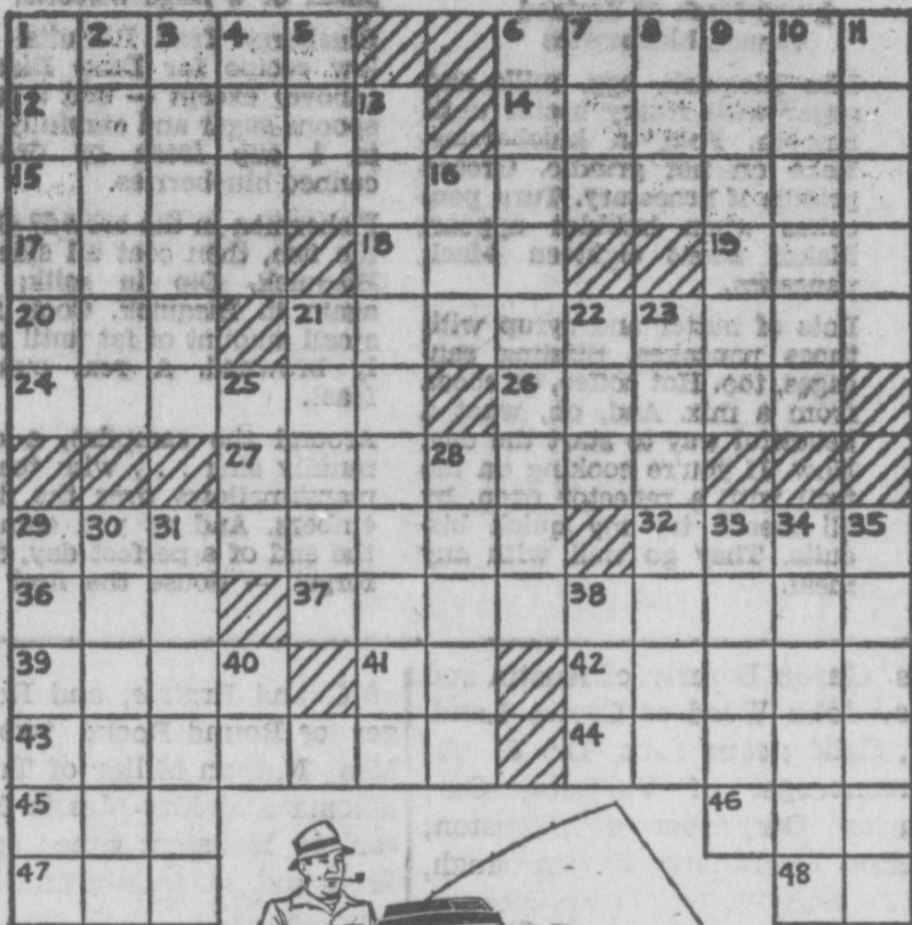

What To Do In a Tornado

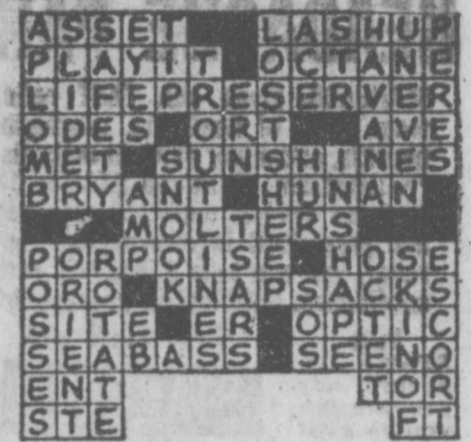
- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

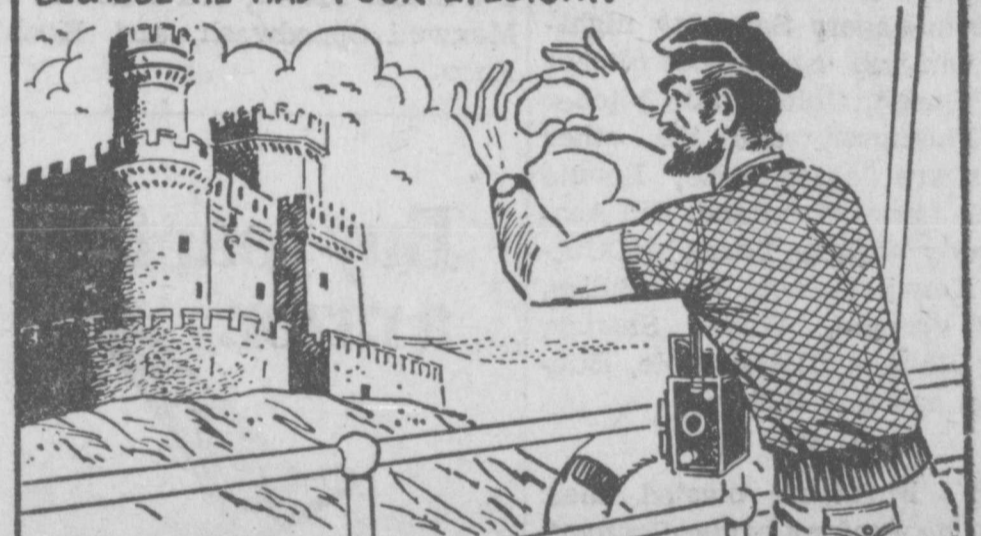
meeting was a possible readjustment of garbage collection fees to charge heavy users of the service more and light users less.

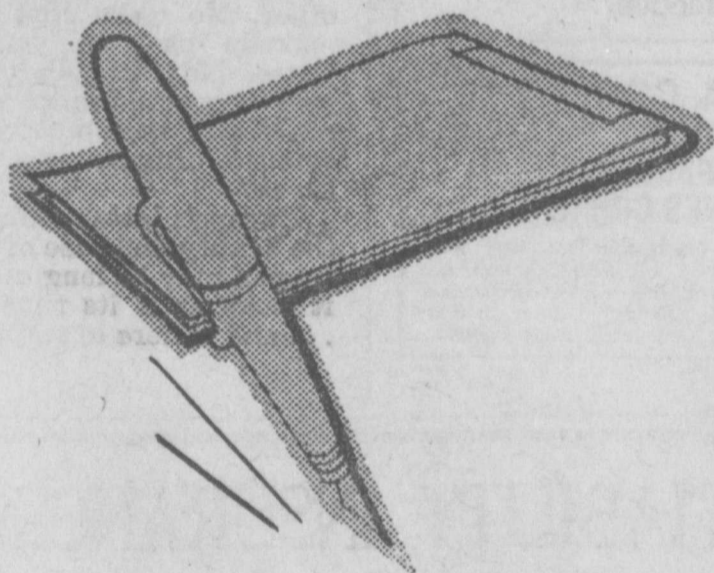

ARCHEOLOGIST EXPLORES JAMAICA'S SUNKEN CITY

A world renown marine archeologist is defying murky waters, dead jellyfish and marauding sharks in an expedition in Jamaican waters.

The object of the search is Port Royal, once the brawling, bawdy, buccaneer capital of this Caribbean island. It was swallowed up in two minutes, with the loss of 2,000 lives, by earthquakes and a tidal wave in 1692.

The water in the Port Royal area is comparatively shallow, most of it less than 25 feet in depth. This permits use of a portable air compressor that floats on the surface, in place of more cumbersome and heavier SCUBA tanks. The unit, called the Aquanaut, and manufactured by Evinrude Motors, consists of twin compressors mounted on a flotation collar. It is powered by a small gasoline engine. Air is fed directly to two divers via 25-foot vinyl air hoses.

A team of six divers, headed by Robert F. Marx, have already reclaimed slate roof shingles, cannon balls, pewter dishes, rare "onion" bottles, pieces of eight and other miscellaneous artifacts.

The diving conditions are the worst he has ever experienced, reports Marx. "The water is extremely murky, with visibility as low as two or three inches. Jellyfish are an ever present hazard. If they come in contact with certain parts of the head or neck, they can be lethal.

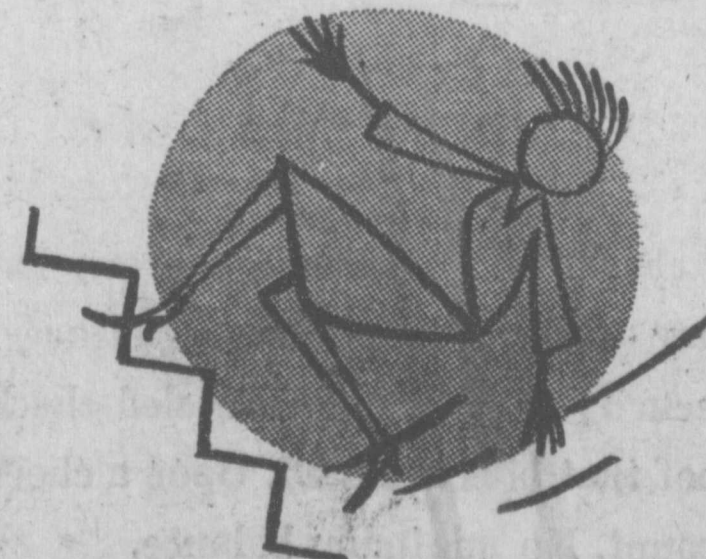
"Diving efforts are further complicated by beds of sea urchins on the ocean floor. Their poisonous needles break off in the skin and cause severe pain for several days.

"The most nerve-wracking experience of all," according to Marx, "is when divers encounter sharks. Due to the poor visibility, they are within bite-size range before we can see them."
