### EVERY VOTER WILL HAVE TO REGISTER

Under Texas' new voter registration law, everybody of voting age in Coryell County will have to register to be eligible to vote in 1968 elections, County Tax Collector Jack Whigham noted this week.

In the past, Coryell voters over 65 years of age were exempt from registering since none of them lived in cities of 10,000 or more population. The new law, recently upheld by the state supreme court, requires everyone of voting age to register regardless of the population of the town in which the voter resides.

The voter registration will begin Oct. 1 and continue through Jan. 31.

### AFTER-HOURS SWIM LEADS TO CHARGES

Two Gatesville teenagers were arrested by local police Monday as suspects in a Sunday morning burglary at the municipal swimming pool in Raby Park.

Police Chief Gene Goins said the pair is accused of breaking into the pool's concession stand about 12:30 a. m. Sunday, swiping two bathing suits, a towel and a diving mask, then going into the pool for a post-midnight swim.

Burglary charges were filed against one of the suspects, who is 18 years old. He is free under \$1,500 bond. The other youth, only 16, was placed on probation to his parents by County Judge Norman Storm.

Goins said the stolen articles were all recovered.

Miss Manning was one of 63 lovelies assembled from all over the lone star state for the pageant in Fort Worth, an official preliminary to the Miss America Pageant.

The first night of the contest consisted of swim suit competition. Miss Manning wore a white suit with a smart braid running along the seams.

For the talent portion of the contest, Miss Manning sang "Cowntown."

### SCOOTER DRIVERS MUST BE LICENSED

Drivers of motor scooters must have driver's licenses, City Police Chief Gene Goins warned Thursday as he announced that city officers are going to start filing charges against parents who allow their children to drive motor scooters without licenses.

"We have found several of the motor scooter drivers without licenses the last few days," Goins reported. "It looks like the only way to stop this law violation is to file charges against the parents."

### Uncle Sam's Selective Service

Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Swartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado St. Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—What must I do to qualify for II-S classification as an undergraduate college student?

A—You must file a written request with your draft board after June 30, 1967. At the end of each school year you must furnish the that you are continuing to pursue board with convincing evidence satisfactorily a full-time course of instruction.

Q—How is the phrase "satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction" defined?

A—An undergraduate student taking a four-year course must earn 25 per cent of the credits toward his bachelor's degree at the end of his first academic year, 50 per cent of his second, and 75 per cent at the end of his third. If five years of study are prescribed by the school for a bachelor's degree in some field, a student must earn 20 per cent of the total credits toward the degree each year.

Q—What is meant by a "student's academic year"?

A—In determining a student's eligibility for classification in Class II-S (college student), his 12 month period following the beginning of his course of study.

### GARY MARWITZ, EVANT, TO OPEN ROTUNDA RETIREMENT AND REST HOME HERE

Construction work is due to start next week on a new 62-bed rest home in Gatesville.

To be called the Rotunda Retirement and Convalescent Facility, it will be located on a 405x280 ft. tract at the corner of Osage Road and North Lovers Lane. A groundbreaking is to be held at the site Monday.

Gary Marwitz of Evant will be the facility's administrator. Others connected with the new enterprise are Mr. and Mrs. Delvin E. Marwitz of Evant and A. K. Arnold of Goldthwaite. Mr. Arnold operates a rest home in Goldthwaite.

Contractor for the building project will be Kenneth Brown of Gatesville. The distinctively designed rest home, a circular-shaped brick structure, with a split roof featuring panels of tinted glass and topped with a skylight—is scheduled for completion around mid-November.

There will be over 15,000 square feet of floor space in the building. The facility will include private and semi-private rooms with baths, a nursing call system, nurses' stations, examining room, therapy room, medicine room, business office, dining room and kitchen facilities, a recreational area and a beauty salon.

It will have hand railings, non-skid floors, wide halls and other safety features. The rest home will have a refrigerated air conditioning system and a central heating system.

Gary Marwitz will be moving to Gatesville soon. He attended the University of Texas for two years studying business and sociology.

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Government expert William H. Schofield declares: "We're in a national land lottery."

The U.S. Defense Department alone holds title to \$38.4 million worth of land here and overseas. Of this, 27.6 million acres are in the U.S. and 4.3 million in California. 85 per cent of all Arizona lands Federally owned, as is 80 per cent of Idaho, and 96 per cent of Alaska.



An enormous tax burden would be lifted from present landowners as well as the public if Washington would cash in on the land boom and sell some of this property.

Land value has risen an average of 5 to 10 per cent a year, and recreation grounds are at even a higher premium. Prices for national farm land soared 6 per cent in 1966, and in the Midwest, rural acreage shot up 32 per cent in 2 years.

Some California real estate skyrocketed 60 per cent in the decade, and the entire far West presents a unique problem, which the Federal Government owns from 30 to 99 per cent. In California, the tax base must be shouldered by private owners of 55 per cent of the state, the remaining 45 per cent being

tax-exempt Government property. The average California home-owner is paying nearly \$600 annually in local taxes, while the population expansion of the state is still of Gold Rush proportions—L.A. alone grows by 451 people a day. Added financial troubles are liberal welfare benefits whereby an estimated 4 million out of a population of approximately 18 million are supported by some type of welfare.

Wanton destruction of natural resources and wasteful commercialization of recreational areas is properly viewed with alarm, but why not change laws to allow state and local governments to assess and tax Federal lands presently adding to state deficit?

With Congressional enactment of the Commission on the Organization of the Executive Branch of Government, many of the nation's prominent real estate brains gathered under former President Herbert Hoover's chairmanship to tackle the problem of excess Government land ownership. Future wealth potential of the land explained Government's powerful grip.

Why should taxpayers stagger under such an unsupportable burden while the Government owns extensive state real estate? The Administration should divest itself of this excess land-ownership now.

## WAGE INCREASES APPROVED FOR HOOD EMPLOYEES

FORT HOOD—The Army-Air Force Wage Board in Washington D. C. Thursday announced wage increases for employees at Fort Hood.

The increases, which will become effective Aug. 13, affect approximately 1,200 regular, 80 leader and 100 supervisory workers at Fort Hood. The increase for regular wage board workers average .1193 cents per hour or 4.45 per cent. The increase for wage board leaders averages .1308 cents per hour or 4.76 per cent. Wage board supervisory increases average .1808 cents per hour or 5.10 per cent.

Night shift differential for the second shift was changed from 6

to 8 cents and the third shift differential remains unchanged at 10 cents.

Regular laundry workers' wage schedule remains unchanged. Laundry supervisory rates at Grade 6 and above received slight increases.

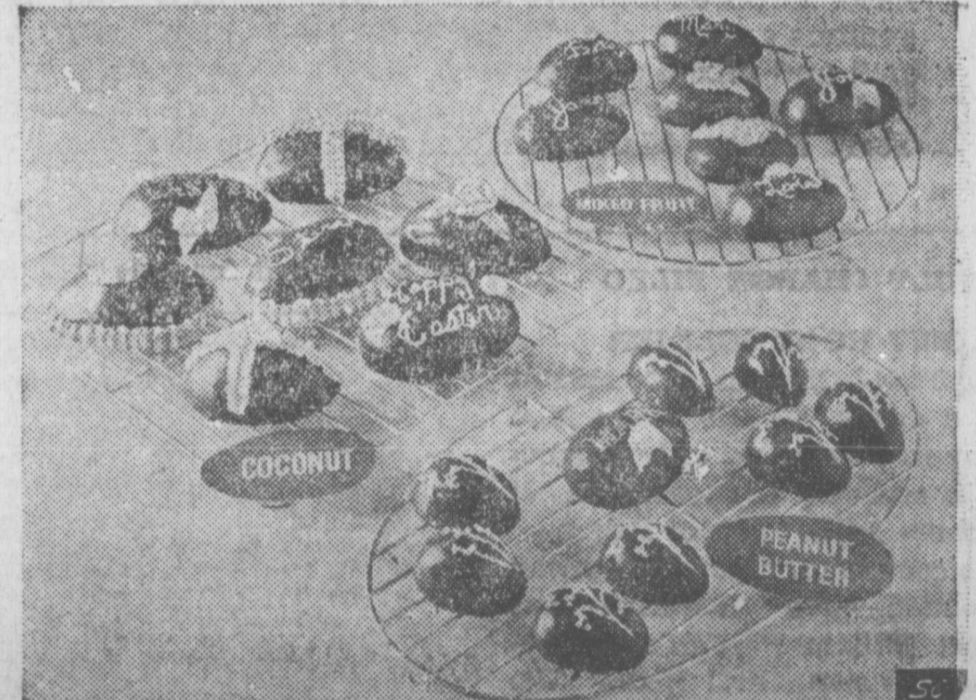

Easter eggs old hat? Not when they're a no-cook fondant made the Borden Kitchen way with sweetened condensed milk. Magic Easter Egg Fondant: (Makes 2 lbs.—enough for 2-dozen medium-size eggs)

In a medium-size mixing bowl cream together 1/2-cup butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, and 1 teaspoon salt. Blend in 2/3-cup sweetened condensed milk until smooth. (For best results use only Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk.) Gradually add 6-cups (about 1-1/2-lbs.) sifted Confectioners' sugar. If chocolate begins to cool and thicken, place over low heat and gently reheat. Let coating dry. Decorate with butter cream frosting.

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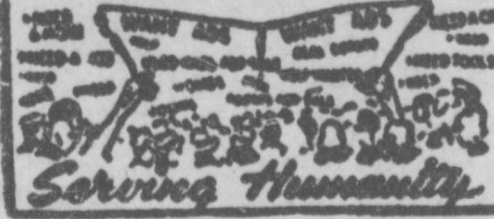

Shrimp Graced With Gruyere



Party day, busy day, any day—thank heaven for the no-fuss dinner. The Borden Kitchen had just such a hurried homemaker in mind when they created shrimp-egg ramekins smoothly sauced with Gruyere cheese. Complement with a crisp green salad, refrigerated biscuits temptingly browned, and—dinner's ready.

Deviled Cheese and Shrimp Ramekins (Makes 4 Servings)

- 1/4 cup Danish flavor margarine or butter
- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 cups homogenized milk
- 1-1/2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 2 tablespoons Wyler's dehydrated parsley flakes
- Dash salt & pepper
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 8-4 drops Tabasco sauce
- 1 package (six 1-oz. portions) Borden's pasteurized process Gruyere cheese
- 1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup finely chopped pecans
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
- 4 hard-cooked eggs
- 1 cup (one 5-oz. can) shrimp, drained

In a medium-size saucepan, melt butter or margarine; saute onion until transparent. Stir in flour; cook until mixture bubbles. Remove from heat; gradually blend in milk. Place over medium heat. Cook; stir constantly until sauce is thickened. Stir in mustard, parsley flakes, salt, pepper, Worcestershire sauce and Tabasco. Remove from heat. Shred four portions of cheese. Stir into sauce. Return to heat; stir until cheese melts. Shred the remaining cheese and combine with crumbs, pecans and butter. Reserve for topping. Butter 4 individual ramekins. Divide cheese sauce in half; spoon into 4 ramekins. Cut eggs lengthwise into quarters. Arrange over cheese sauce. Add shrimp. Top each ramekin with remaining cheese sauce. Sprinkle each with cheese-crumb mixture. Bake in a moderate (375° F.) oven 10 minutes or until crumbs brown and sauce is bubbly.

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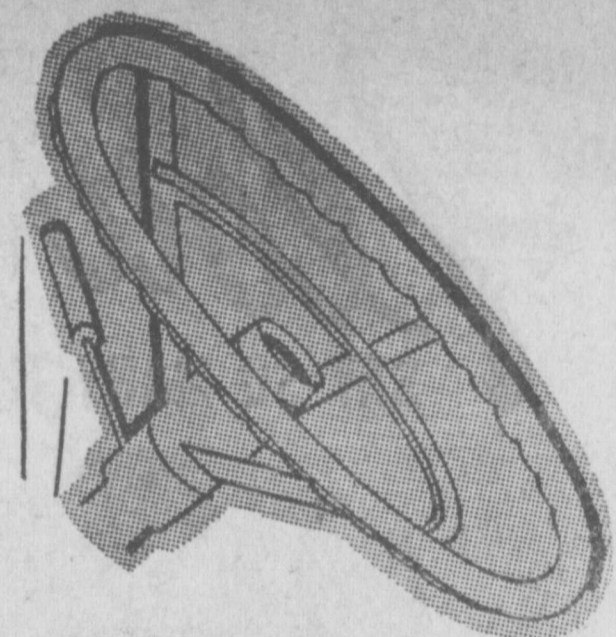

## Let's Go Boating!



### PHOTO TIPS FOR BOATING FAMILIES

Judging from the number of cameras you see aboard boats, you would think they were required by the U. S. Coast Guard.

Obviously this isn't true, but it points out the tremendous popularity of boating photography. Few sports offer the same exciting, picture-taking opportunities.

On-the-water photography does present a few special problems for the amateur shutter bug. To improve your snapshots, follow this advice from the Evinrude News Service. Use a light meter and special lens filters and pay careful attention to setting the correct shutter speed.

Water reflects and intensifies sunlight. This is why so many snapshots are over-exposed and lack sharpness and detail. Don't try to guess the correct setting. Even the pros admit that a light meter is essential. Take your reading at the point of interest you plan to shoot. If this isn't possible, find a subject in similar light conditions. Meters aren't foolproof, but over the course of a season, you will get better, sharper photos.

Inexpensive lens filters are helpful in marine photography. Most are available at camera stores for under \$4.00. As the name implies, they filter out some of the harsh glare of reflected sunlight. The yellow (K-2) adds contrast and sharpness; a red (A) filter adds dramatic over-tones; and an ultra-violet (UV) filter lessens the bluish tint in a picture. These filters are especially helpful to people who own the new automatic cameras.

The correct shutter speed is also important in marine photography. Remember, you're shooting action in almost every case. The minimum speed should be 1/250th of a second. If your camera isn't that fast, you should follow (pan) the subject boat or water skier. As you follow along, snap the photo. This will "freeze" the subject and blur the background.

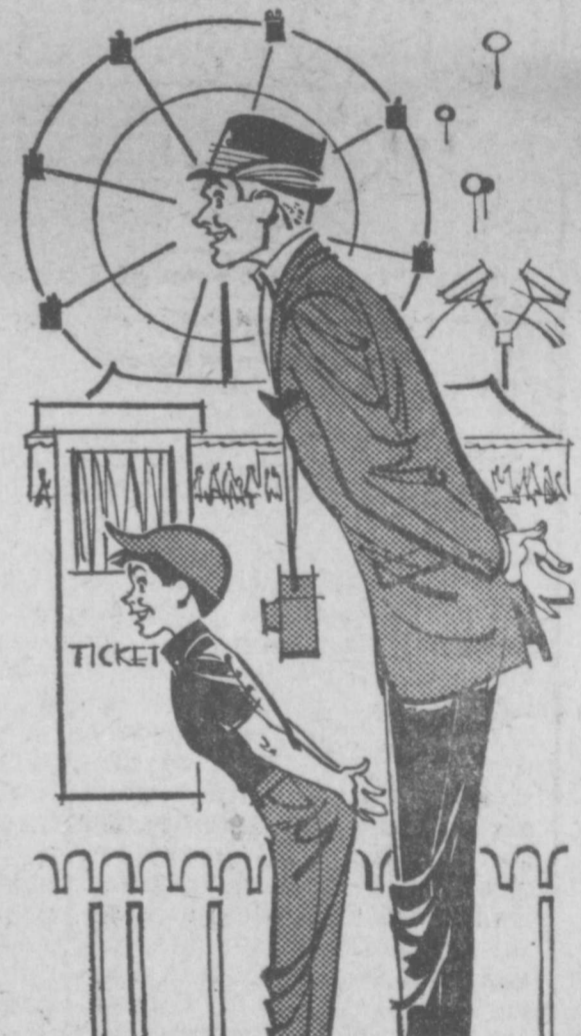
