### BOB POAGE TO RECEIVE BU DEGREE

Rep. W. R. (Bob) Poage of Waco, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, will be granted an honorary Doctor of Laws degree by Baylor University at its summer commencement Aug. 25.

The honor to Congressman Poage representative from this Central Texas district since 1936, was announced Tuesday by Abner V. McCall, Baylor president. Poage was unanimously recommended by the faculty and approved by the 48-member Baylor University board of trustees.

Poage received his B. A. degree from Baylor in 1921 and his law degree in 1924.

He was a member of the Texas House of Representatives for four years and of the state Senate for six years. He held numerous top committee assignments in the Texas legislature and in congress following his election in 1936. He has been a member of the committee on agriculture for 26 years.

"Congressman Poage has been an active and effective former student and friend of Baylor University for many years," President McCall said. "His selection as recipient of an honorary degree was a worthy one."

Baylor's summer commencement will be held at Waco Hall at 10 a. m. Friday, Aug. 25.

### YOUTH DROWNS ON OUTING IN CORYELL COUNTY

A 12 year old Dallas boy drowned Monday on a ranch in Coryell County near Mosheim, Justice of the Peace Stony Hammack said Tuesday.

Terry Wayne Austin, one of 55 boys on an outing sponsored by a government antipoverty agency, drowned after jumping into 12 feet of water in a swimming pool on a ranch, Hammack said. He said the boy could not swim.

When the boy did not reappear, other boys dived into the pool until the body was recovered. The body was taken to Clifton where Hammack ruled death by accidental drowning.






**TEA HONORS BRIDE TO BE OF WILLIAM A. NESBITT AT W. E. POSTON HOME**

**Age Of The Supersonic**



The sun won't have to set on the traveler of tomorrow. Flying the U.S. supersonic transports of the 1970s, you will be able to leave London after sunset and catch up with the sun as you fly across the Atlantic and watch it set all over again in New York.

According to Trans World Airlines, first to order the U.S. "SST", you could fly all the way around the world in broad daylight. This, of course, is because the SST, going west, flies faster than the rotation speed of the earth.

Speed of the SST will be 1850 mph, and at cruising altitude—65,000 feet—you will be able to get a full panoramic view of the earth, sky and sea. There will be little sensation of supersonic speed because the landings and take-offs will be performed at speeds comparable to today's jets. Because SST speed will be reached at such a high altitude the speed relative to

the ground will appear much the same as experienced in today's planes.

But, of course, the speed in the SSTs will be noticed where it really counts. TWA estimates that a traveler flying from New York to Paris will be in the air less than three hours, from New York to the West Coast in two hours, around the world in less than 24.

TWA flight planners have been "flying" the SSTs with computers, and TWA pilots have been flying SSTs for several years in flight simulators. The airline, with 16 SSTs on order, will probably be the first to introduce the U.S. SST to the world.

For second opinion on diagnosis and emergency treatment, first-aid team at bedside sends patient's heart tracings to hospital experts in cardiology, through 'phone.

It takes partnership to win for health. Here an emergency team at bedside and a team of heart specialists in a European hospital are the partners.

In this case, the bedside team seeks a second opinion on both diagnosis and emergency treatment for its patient, suspect of serious thrombosis. An on-the-spot consultation is made possible through a 2-lb. apparatus connected to both a portable electrocardiograph and a telephone.

The device, the small, boxy object on the table, transmits the cardiogram to receiver units in the hospital. This permits a double-checking of the emergency

diagnosis, rapidly made through necessity, by a team of cardiologists, seen at right poring over duplicate heart tracing.

To make the point that it takes all kinds of medical skills to save lives, the World Health Organization has selected "Partners in Health," as the 1967 World Health Theme.

### Poison-Prevention Week

Accidental poisoning is the most common of all threats to childhood health and safety, and women in the know take drastic



steps to safeguard their households. Here are some helpful hints:

1. Keep all medicines and cosmetic products completely out of high-climbing toddlers' reach.
2. Keep laundry, dry cleaning, and household cleaning products inaccessible to children, no matter how inconvenient this makes it for you.
3. Throw out all old medicines and boldly label all look-alike drugs.
4. Keep cigarettes and old butts out of reach. (The nicotine can be deadly.)
5. Keep all garden sprays, pesticides, and other like materials locked in a toolhouse or garage closet.

In spite of all these precautions, accidents sometimes happen. Someone leaves aspirin on the dining-room table, or Mom runs to answer the phone—leaving the laundry bleach untended for just an instant, and presto! the damage is done. Women in the know post a special emergency poison control center telephone number near every phone. They will give you antidote information about any product your child may have swallowed and advice to help you until you get him to a doctor.

Some further tips: Keep a supply of syrup of ipecac (a standard emetic) and powdered activated charcoal (a neutralizing substance which is not an emetic, but a basic antidote.) Carefully read the invaluable advice on this in baby and child care books.







Where can you get a lower unit gear for a 1911 Waterman Porie? Who can fix a 1928 Elto Pal? You'll find the answers to these and many other questions in the pages of "The Antique Outboarder."

This quarterly publication is the official voice of the Antique Outboard Motor Club, a national organization of antique motor buffs started in 1965. It's devoted to people all over the world who are interested in these fascinating engines, their restoration and their preservation.

According to David R. Reinhartsen, president, the club "is beyond any doubt, non-profit." But this doesn't bother Reinhartsen. Antique outboarding is a love, not a business, for the young Texas engineer. He has more than 50 motors in his collection and until recently used a 1928 Elto (Evinrude Light Twin Outboard) on his family runabout.

Reinhartsen is by no means the biggest collector in the United States. Frank Johnston of Gainesville, Florida, has 150 engines, and Richard Hawie of Easton, Connecticut, has over 100 in his cellar. There's even an Antique Outboard Museum run by a club member in New Hampshire.

Membership is now over the 200 mark, said Reinhartsen, with nearly 50 members under the age of 20. Members come from all walks of life — doctors, dentists, marine dealers, engineers and what-have-you.

You don't have to own an antique outboard to join, but most members do. The cut-off date is 1942. According to Reinhartsen, the modern age of outboarding began during World War II with radical improvements in engineering and manufacturing.

Members are justly proud of rebuilding antique engines. According to Reinhartsen, "I love to come across somebody who is having trouble with a new motor and offer him a tow. You should see the looks I get when they see the motor I'm using."


