## 198TH INFANTRY BRIGADE MOVED TO FIELD

FORT HOOD—The 198th Infantry Brigade moved to the field last week, lock, stock and barrel, for its first full scale field training exercise.

Under the command of Colonel James R. Waldie, the 198th set up a Brigade Command Post near the Belton Reservoir and issued orders to its Infantry Battalions and supporting units.

The emphasis was on airmobility and the 55th Aviation Battalion pitched in with UH-1 Hueys, while CH-47 Chinooks were provided by the 243rd Medium Helicopter Company, Fort Sill, Okla. The three day exercise started Tuesday with a controlled movement to field positions. Two infantry battalions—the 1st Bn., 46th Infantry, and the 1st Bn., 52nd Infantry—made heliborne occupations of initial positions.

The purpose of the exercise is to provide an annual Army Training Test to the aviation elements as well as to provide training to the 198th Infantry Brigade in airmobile operations," said Colonel Waldie.

## LONE STAR GAS CO HAS GAS TURN-ON CEREMONIES FOR EVANT

Ceremonies celebrating the beginning of natural gas service provided by Lone Star Gas Company to the city of Evant were held at 2 p. m., August 16, at the utility's city gate measuring station.

S E Campbell, district manager of Lone Star's Gatesville District, supervised as gas was turned into the town's distribution system for use by an estimated 162 customers.

Among the other Lone Star dignitaries on hand were Douglas Williams, distribution engineer, Dallas; J. E. Gross, regional superintendent of distribution of the South Texas Region in Waco; R. W. Jolly, regional supervisor of promotional projects of the South Texas Region; Jack Boggan, engineer, Temple; Harry Raesener, foreman, Gatesville District; Wylie Shehorn, promotional representative, Temple; and Bill Kirkland, air conditioning salesman, Waco.

Evant city leaders attending were James Inabnet, Floyd Barkley, Jack Elam, Elmer Conley and James E. Hudgins. O. B. Faubion, one of the main promoters for obtaining natural gas for Evant was unable to attend.

In joining Lone Star's natural gas distribution network, Evant became a part of the company's Gatesville District. The district supplies the fuel energy needed for some 2,200 customers in twelve towns and communities, including Gatesville, Evant, Fort Gates, Valley Mills, Hamilton, Pottsville, Oglesby. ### WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

AFL-CIO is chief draftsman of Bill HR 100, possessing the contagious-sounding name, Common Situs Peaceful Picketing Bill, sponsored by Rep. Frank Thompson, New Jersey. If enacted, the bill's effects will be contagious if not peaceful.

When the National Federation of Independent Business polled nationwide small proprietors on Common Situs in 1966, the vote was 59 per cent against, 39 per cent in favor, with 2 per cent undecided.

Opponents of HR 100 call it the Secondary Boycott Bill and are out to block push for enactment in the 90th Congress.

In brief HR 100 would permit any single picket to appear at any construction site and force a cessation of all work in progress, without fear of Secondary Boycott charges.

Under present law, organized construction trade groups are allowed to walk off the job, but are not allowed to pressure other subcontractors.

But under HR 100, a single disgruntled plumber might decide that work at a certain level is hazardous, walk off the job, picket, and eventually force a general shut-down of the entire construction operation. Thus, the anti-secondary boycott pro-

visions of Taft-Hartley would be nullified.

Construction unions presently have power to authorize closed shops, excluding workers unless hired from a specified hall, as well as receiving highest labor wages, and controlling selection of materials. Labor has prevented use of plastic pipes, nonmetallic cables, spray painting devices, prefabrication, other labor and money saving introductions.


Opponents say Secondary Boycott also serves as a net to ensnare non-union employees into the union field, since non-union workers would also be laid off when work stopped.

Unions argue HR 100 is not Secondary Boycott since subcontractors are not really independent, but "joint venturers."

But the Supreme Court ruled in the 1951 Denver Building Trades case that employers at a building site are not any more joint venturers than parts distributors are joint venturers to auto manufacturers.

Construction unions negotiate separately with subcontractor employers, not with the general contractors, and the number of subs on a given job may number in the hundreds.

When labor unions possess autocratic power to dictate to owners, contractors and public how a structure is to be erected, who must be hired, and for what amount of labor, the cart then leads the horse in a distorted economy.

**DRIVERS LICENSE CHANGES  
DUE AUGUST 28  
RATE UP TOO**

AUSTIN, Texas—Major changes in state drivers' license law go into effect on August 28.

At the same time, inspection of additional auto equipment will be required, and minimum fee for vehicle inspections will be raised to \$1.75. Inspections for the 1968 sticker will continue until April 15, the usual deadline.

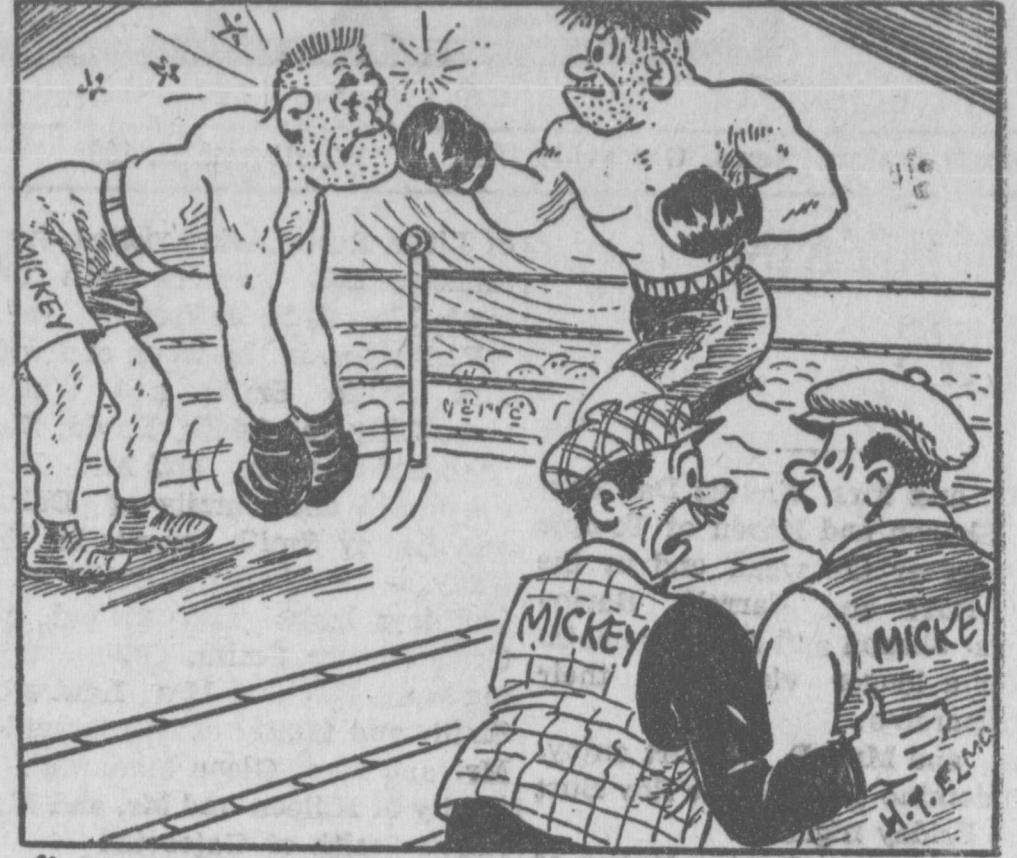
Under the new law, front seat belts will be required on all cars which have belt anchorages as part of the original equipment. Steering mechanism, wheels and rims also will be added to inspection items.

Other changes effective next week include:

Licensing law raises minimum age to 16 for those who have completed a driver's education course and to 18 for those who have not had approved training.

Minimum age for operating a motor scooter has been raised to 15, and a special examination will be required after January 1 to operate a motorcycle.

Dear Friends:

Early this week the House passed a measure which has tremendous public appeal — if you don't think it through. Most

members felt they "simply could not vote against it." This was the bill to have the Federal Government spend some 40 or 50 million dollars a year, as a starter to pay the expenses of local police forces. Of course, the advocates

of this bill said they were simply wanting to help the local people maintain order, and we all want to maintain order. Of course, the advocates vehemently denied that they want the Federal Government to control local police forces but surely there is no one in our country who doesn't realize that if the Federal Government is going to assume the financial obligation for local police protection, that we are going to cease to have local police organizations. They will all be controlled by the Federal Government.

It seems to me to be much better to let the Federal Government provide military protection and let the localities continue to provide police protection. I don't want an F.B.I. agent or a marine sergeant issuing traffic tickets on Austin Avenue. I have enough confidence in the ability of the people of the 11th District to understand this attempt to "buy away" our local control of local affairs that I voted "No".

I also voted "No" on another measure which likewise carried overwhelmingly. That was the bill to provide for a full census every five years. Aside from the fact that it will cost nearly a quarter of a billion dollars to take this census, or \$50 million a year for each of the five years, I don't believe that our people want to submit themselves and their affairs to the detailed review required by the census any more often than we do at present.

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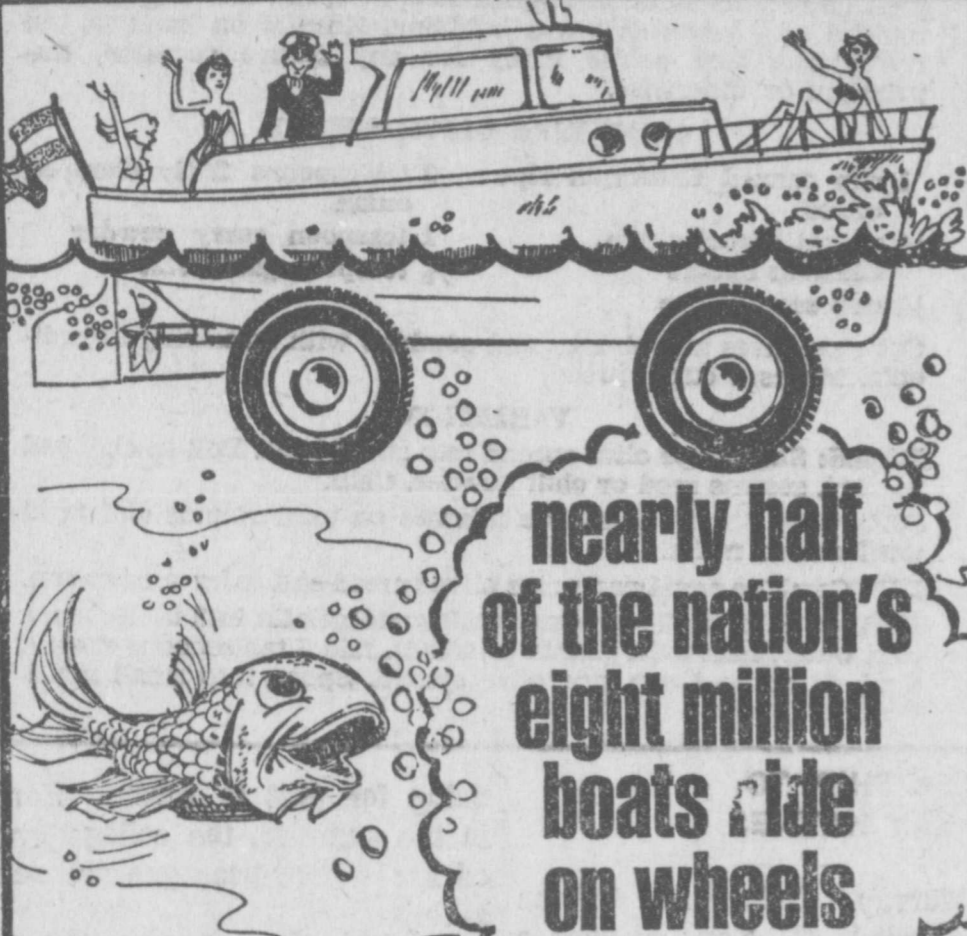

- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

Cook shrimp in boiling, salted water to cover about 2 to 5 minutes or until tender. Shell and devein. Prepare artichoke hearts according to package directions; drain. In medium size saucepan, over medium heat, melt margarine and stir in flour. Remove from heat. Gradually stir in milk and wine. Return to low heat and cook; stir constantly, until mixture thickens and just comes to a boil. Stir in cheese, salt and pepper; cook until cheese melts. Remove from heat. In a buttered 9-inch round or square baking dish, arrange artichoke hearts around the outside edge of dish. Place shrimp in center; pour cheese sauce over all. Sprinkle with paprika or fresh dill. Bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven for 25 minutes or until cheese sauce is hot and bubbly. If desired, garnish with additional fresh dill. Serve immediately.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioner Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other Section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."
