Pat Hollingsworth, connected with Gatesville's grocery field for nearly three decades and owner and operator of Hollingsworth Foods the last 12 years, announced this week that he is closing his store on the east side of the downtown square and quitting the retail food business.

The Hollingsworth firm will suspend business after Sept. 2. Hollingsworth said the decision to quit "was dictated by a variety of compelling reasons."

A Gatesville civic leader and chairman of the Coryell County Democratic Executive Committee, Hollingsworth revealed that he has accepted employment locally and that he and his family will continue to reside here.

COUNTY VALUATION IS UP MORE THAN MILLION DOLLARS

Coryell County's total tax valuation for 1967 is up \$1,095,284 over last year's figure, County Tax Collector Jack Whigham revealed this week. This year's valuation is \$21,443,725.

Whigham said about 60 per cent of the increase can be traced to the equalization board's adjustment of low renditions this summer. The other 40 per cent came from new construction and "normal growth," he said.

The commissioners court makes up the county's tax equalization board and also sets the tax rate. The commissioners will adopt the 1967 tax rate next month and are expected to stick with the current rate of 95 cents per \$100 valuation.

The county's tax roll lists 504,329 acres of rural property valued at \$7,573,363 and city real estate valued at \$8,294,214. Other major valuations are banks, \$277,339; railroads, \$360,520; and utilities other than railroads, \$1,669,005.

There are 4,711 automobiles and other vehicles on the tax roll at a total valuation of \$1,632,370. Also listed are:

- 145,773 cattle for \$437,190.
- 38,962 sheep for \$116,886.
- 62,462 goats for \$187,206.
- 1,060 hogs for \$4,240.
- 22 horses and mules for \$660.
- 199 tractors for \$91,695.

AIRPORT'S OPENING IS POSTPONED

Formal opening and dedication of the new city-county airport near Gatesville, first scheduled for Sept. 2, has been indefinitely postponed.

Airport officials decided to delay the grand opening celebration when it became apparent that hangars and other improvements would not be ready by the Sept. 2 date.

Selection of a new date for the opening ceremony hinges on the addition of the planned improvements.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, who had been secured as guest speaker for the Sept. 2 event, told Gatesvilleites this week that he would try to fulfill the engagement at a re-scheduled date.

This new transportation facility, featuring a paved and lighted runway, was completed early this summer and has been open to traffic for several weeks.

GOOD IDEA

Rep. Wilbur Mills (D-Ark.), Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, has proposed the formation of a bipartisan Government Program Evaluation Commission, to be composed of twelve members to be selected from private life. The purpose would be to examine new and projected Federal programs and activities, as well as current ones and assign priorities among them.

This proposal merits widespread support, since the country today is in an unpleasant fiscal situation because of its earlier failure to exercise control over the growth of federal spending. This continuous growth of non-defense spending is the heart of the nation's present fiscal problems. After the tax reduction in 1964, it appeared that the rate of federal spending had moderated. But in September 1965, the spending rate rose quickly and now, if certain contingencies occur, the nation is faced with the prospect of a possible fiscal year 1968 budget deficit of nearly \$30 billion, the largest since World War II.

It is time that Congress and the

Administration undertake a program for stringently reducing federal expenditures and controlling their future growth. Taxpayers, who bear the cost of government and to whom the government turns when emergencies arise, should insist that members of Congress favor such a proposal as the Government Program Evaluation Commission.

BRUCE JONES IS NAMED SUPERVISOR OF RURAL SCHOOLS

Bruce Jones, former superintendent of the Turnersville public schools, Wednesday was named Coryell County's new rural supervisor, working out of County Superintendent W. H. Donaldson's office.

Jones succeeds Richard Stapp, the supervisor for the last year. Stapp quit the post to become high school band director at Saint Jo.

Jones resigned at Turnersville early this summer after it was decided to discontinue the high school grades there because of declining enrollment. He then accepted a teaching position in the Evant system, but resigned that to take the county supervisor job.

Jones, a graduate of Gatesville High School and Baylor University was at Turnersville 17 years, 14 of them as superintendent.

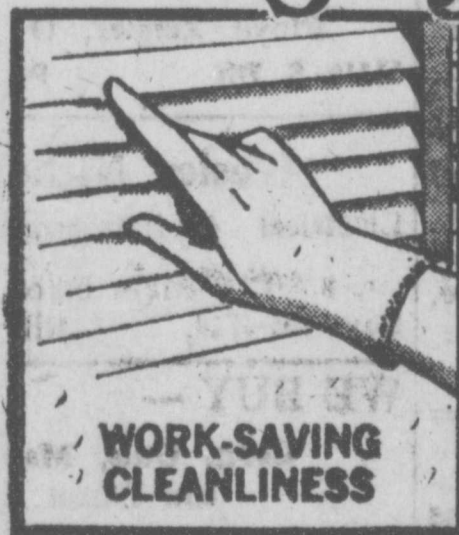

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

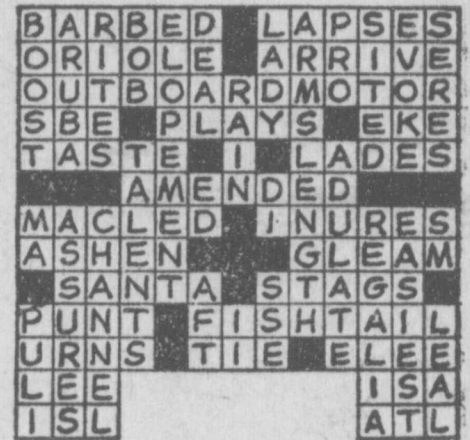

CORRECT STORAGE PROTECTS OUTBOARD

Improper winter storage will do more harm to your outboard motor than three seasons of normal operation, warns Bill Spaeth, manager of engineering at Evinrude Motors.

Moisture is the biggest culprit, says Spaeth. During the course of the winter, it will rust piston rings and cylinder walls; shorten the life of lower unit gears; and corrode the ignition and fuel systems. Any one of these would result in a costly and time-consuming repair job.

Fogging oil offers effective protection of internal engine parts. With the engine running in fresh water, either on the boat or in a test tank, inject this rust preventative directly into the carburetor intake. Give it several good squirts. Allow the engine to run a few seconds, circulating the oil throughout, before shutting it off.

Drain the lower unit. Watch carefully for traces of water. This would indicate a crack or distortion in the gearcase preventing a perfect seal. This damage could occur if you struck an underwater obstruction. If you suspect problems, your marine dealer is the man to see. If everything checks out, refill the lower unit with a lubricant recommended by the outboard manufacturer.

Drain residual water from the outboard by pulling the starter rope several times. The engine should be in an upright position out of the water. The throttle should be fully advanced and the gear shift set at neutral.

The entire fuel system should be drained and flushed with acetone or lacquer thinner to remove gummy deposits. This includes the tank, lines and carburetor.

If the propeller is nicked or bent, a marine dealer can repair or replace it. Keep the old prop as an emergency spare.

Complete the job with a light coat of oil over all exposed metal parts. If you own an electric start outboard, remove the battery. Clean it, make sure it's fully charged and store it in a cool, dry place.
