## 'CABALLO BLANCO' ARMY EXERCISE OPENED MONDAY

FT. HOOD — An exercise involving 6,000 troops and 2,000 vehicles and which has been in the planning stage since early July opened Monday morning at Ft. Hood.

"Caballo Blanco" (Spanish for White Horse) will be III Corps and Ft. Hood's first command post exercise since May, 1965. It will be a five-day map exercise ending Oct. 20.

The area will be bounded by the neighboring cities of Georgetown, Llano, Goldthwaite and McGregor.

The main function is to test mobility and communication systems of the units involved under simulated combat circumstances, and over realistic distances.

Since the major portion of the operation will be conducted off the military reservation, it was necessary to obtain permission to use land occupied by troops.

The project will include units from III Corps, 1st and 2nd Armored Divisions, 13th Support Brigade, and 12th U. S. Air Force from Waco.

There will be three claims officers who will visit all sites. They personally will contact each individual who has permitted use of his land as soon as possible after troops have moved and will ask the landowner if he is satisfied with the manner in which the

# "SMALL BUSINESS"

Although there is often evidence that some aspects of labor union's leadership political ideologies are detrimental to the nation, there are also ideological differences growing within the unions.

A good example is the hassle in the United Auto Workers Union. As is well known, production lines are largely manned by unskilled workers who are trained to perform one simple task as the chassis go by.



To keep the plant rolling, there is a certain percentage of the employees who are skilled craftsmen such as machinists, electricians, and others who have either through schooling, or long apprenticeship, become highly skilled people. Without them, any auto plant would shut down.

But the problem developing in the auto union is the fact that there are more unskilled workers than skilled workers, thus there are more unskilled voters in the union than skilled.

Naturally, the leaders of the union realizing the butter on their bread comes from control of the unskilled mass, negotiate proportionately better contracts for the unskilled than they do for the skilled.

This has made the skilled workers most unhappy and they are trying to pull out of the UAW to form their own union.

But despite the size of the national debt, and national social policies indicating to the contrary there are some in Washington who can also understand arithmetic, and they too realize that there are more unskilled than skilled workers.

Hence, the National Labor Relations Board has refused to let the skilled workers hold an election to see if the majority do want to pull out of UAW.

In affect, the pendulum of history is starting to swing, and is only impeded by the action of government bureaucrats. The old American Federation of Labor was composed of craft unions, which made it the target of the old IWW, and then the Russian backed union movement in the early '30's which then led to a domestic organization called the CIO. This was the genesis of the so-called vertical union in this country whereby one union would represent all the workers in a given industry.

Eventually the AFL and CIO merged, but the marriage has shown signs of progressively becoming strained. It is perhaps a situation that results when a competent, hard working man marries and then learns that he is also being called upon to support hordes of his wife's less able relatives.

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## A Month O' Sandwiches



Norman R. Camit, manager of the Peter Pan Peanut Butter Company, stacks up a month's supply of sandwiches — 40 of 'em.

**CHICAGO** — In the past five minutes, more than 833,000 sandwiches were consumed here in the United States.

If you totted up the beef, ham, peanut butter, sausage, hot dog and hamburger sandwiches, to name just a few of the combinations eaten in the last 24 hours, you would come up with better than 200 million sandwiches.

It has been a long time since the Earl of Sandwich first nestled a piece of meat between two slices of bread. The Earl was English, but over the years his discovery has become a staple on the American menu. Norman Camit, manager of the Peter Pan Peanut Butter Company here, reports that the spotlight on the sandwich glows even brighter with the increasing number of quick, convenient meals being served.

The way the statistics break down, each and every one of us eats 1 1/2 sandwiches per day. We're apparently a general group, because the remaining two-thirds of the sandwich gets eaten also.

An estimated 20 million

workers carry their lunch, and all but a very few include sandwiches, whether they be last night's pot roast or the dainty water cress variety, Camit said.

Approximately 30 per cent of the sandwiches are the meat variety. The most popular sandwich up to the age of nine is peanut butter and jelly, and 39 per cent of the population between the ages of 19 and 17 prefers peanut butter and jelly to all other sandwiches, he reported.

Over a year's time, we manage to chomp up 94 billion sandwiches. If placed end to end they'd reach from Hamburg or Frankfurt, Germany to the Sandwich Islands and back 740 times. No matter how you slice it, that takes a lot of crust, Camit concluded.



### Picture Perfect

One hundred and twenty-five years ago an American portrait painter got fed up with mixing his paints fresh every day and storing what was left in cumbersome animal bladders. He was probably not the first artist to rebel against this waste of precious time. But he was the first to do anything about it. In 1841 John Rand invented the metal tube.

Until then, painting was strictly for professionals—it was too much trouble for hobbyists. But thanks to the invention of the metal tube, Sunday painting is now the favorite pastime of thousands of Americans.

Nowadays it's so easy to take up painting as a hobby. About \$10 pays for all the supplies you need to start, including easel! However, if you've never painted before, here are some tips the instruction manuals don't give you.

First of all, the Metal Tube Packaging Council suggests you start out with canvas boards—which range from 25¢ and up—instead of the bulkier, more expensive canvas stretched to a frame. Second, while you're still learning, you'll find a pad of specially treated paper palettes more convenient than a wooden one. And third, buy a kit of assorted oil colors rather than selecting your own individual tubes; and be sure to get two extra tubes of white—one fast-drying base white, and the other a regular oil mixture. You'll be amazed at how quickly white gets used up!

Oil paints are not the only supplies that come in metal tubes to make a hobby less bother. Now even finger paints come in collapsible metal tubes, to put that pastime, too, in the class of "easy does it."

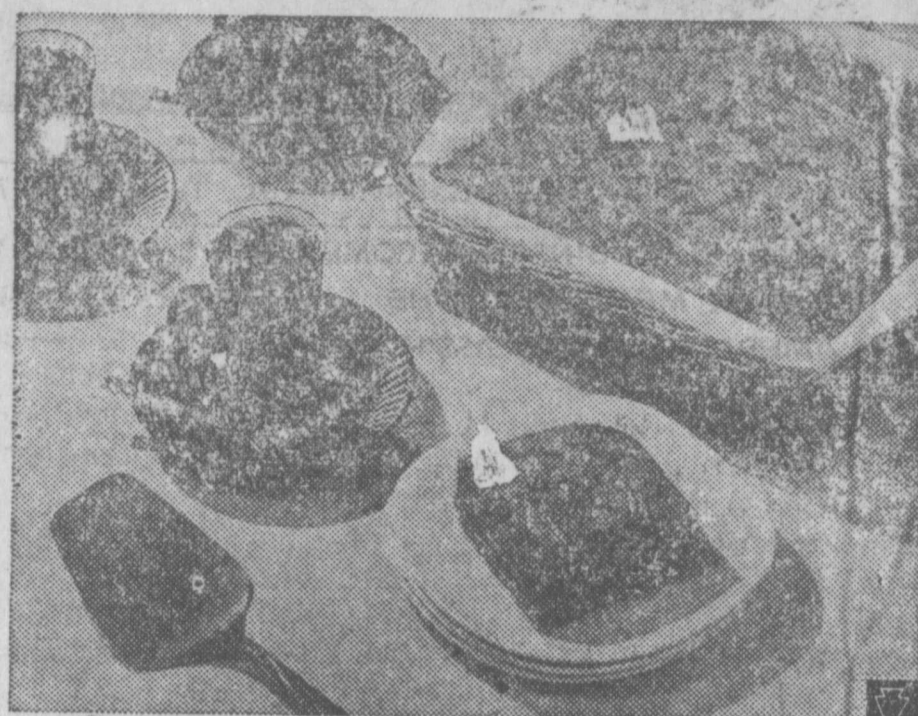

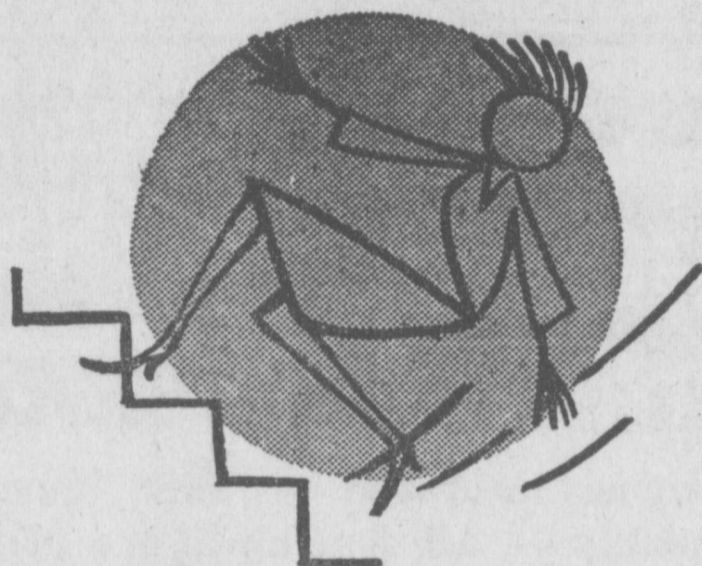

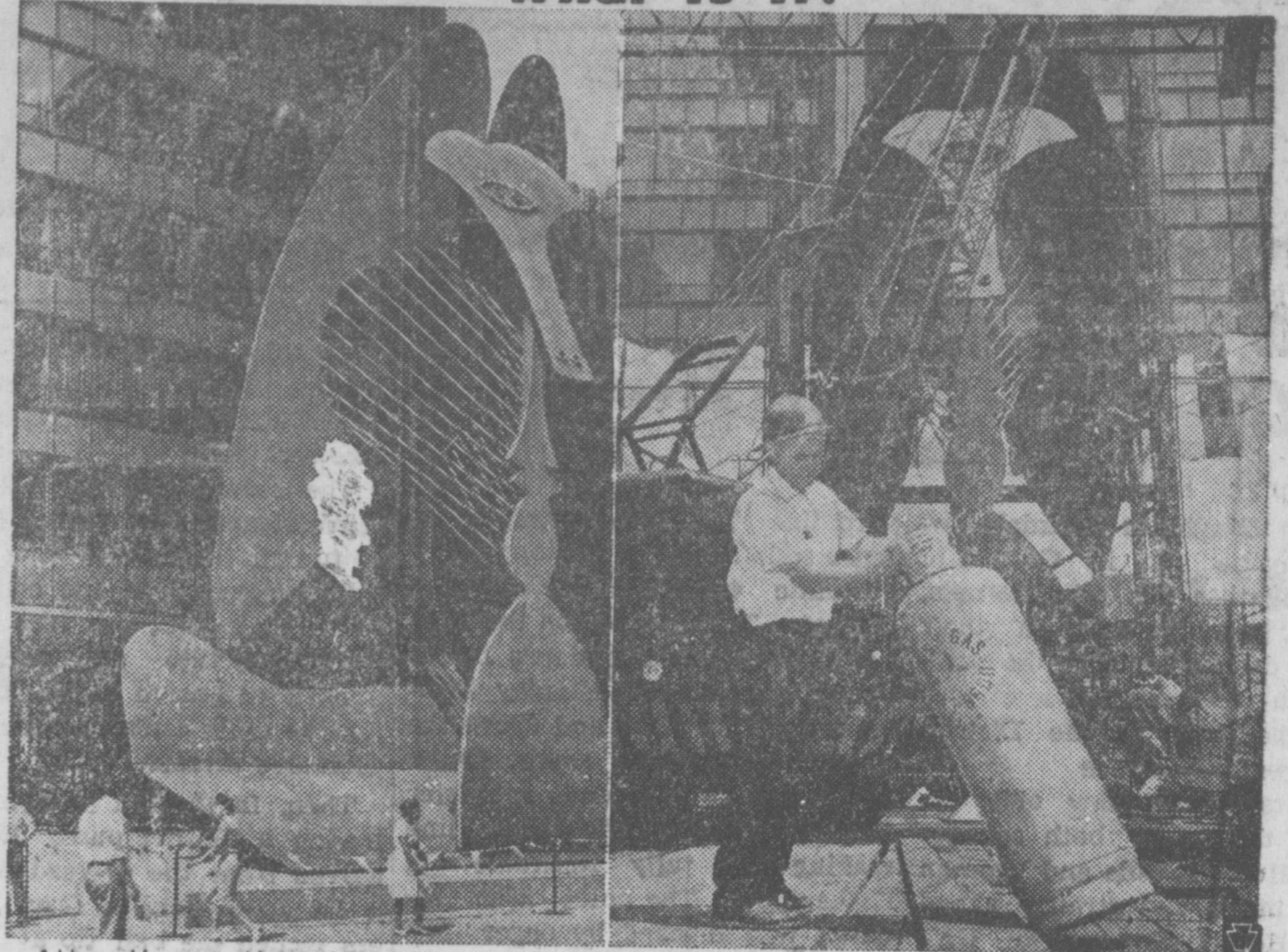

Construction of low-rent housing units may begin in Gatesville within eight months. This was predicted Friday by Paul Dean, executive director of the Housing Authority.

Cost of sites acquired this week hiked the funds expended for this purpose to \$14,597. Purchased were tracts from Booker T. Mack for \$2,025; from Mrs. Etta Lester for \$,700; from Anderson Ortega Jr. for \$2,050; and from Mrs. Lillie Scott for \$2,300.

The Housing Authority had previously purchased a 1 1/2 acre tract from Horace Gallaway for \$947,000 government loan to build the 60 low-rent housing unit. Deans said most of them will be brick duplexes and 48 of the units will be for elderly people.

Dean and the five Housing Authority commissioners, Erle Powell, Robert Scott, Francis Ward, Jack Straw and E. J. Smith Jr., are scheduled to join representatives of the Houston architectural firm of Fitch and Holredge Oct. 23 for a meeting in Ft. Worth with planners from the regional branch of the Housing Assistance Office.

The Houston architects have been employed to draw plans for the units. Preliminary drawings will be presented at the Oct. 23 meeting. After this conference the architects will start drawing up detailed plans and specifications for the units.

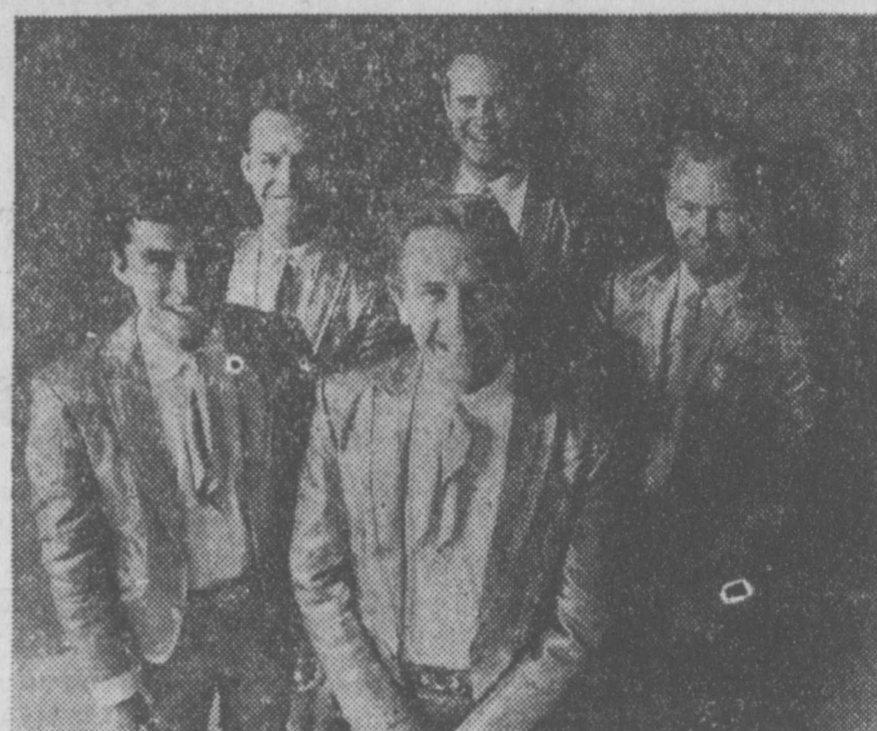
With four minutes left in the half, Gatesville moved the ball

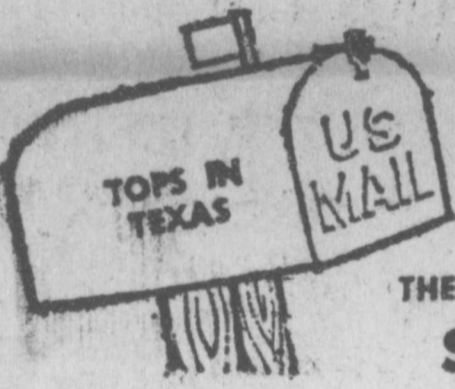

#### THE STORY BEHIND NEW OUTBOARD IGNITION

What's so hot about electronic ignition systems? Plenty, say the manufacturers who offer this as standard equipment on larger horsepower outboards.

Because two-cycle engines require a fuel mixture of gasoline and oil, fouled spark plugs have sometimes been a problem. Electronic ignition goes a long way toward eliminating this. It increases plug life five to ten times over conventional systems and virtually eliminates pre-ignition caused by spark plugs.
