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Coryell County Youth Attend Seminar

Monday, Oct. 23, marked the first meeting of the Coryell County "Youth Wants to Know" program. A total of 182 students attended the meeting held at Gatesville High School. Of the 182 students attending, 147 were from Gatesville, 20 from Evant, 13 from Jonesboro, and 2 made the trip from Copperas Cove.
 A welcome by the Superintendent of Gatesville Independent Schools, Mr. L. C. McKamie, was followed by the introduction of Mr. Kenneth L. Denmark. Mr. Denmark brought an inspirational talk in which he related the four necessities of proper self-development: education, personality, health and religion. Following the talk, the students dismissed and went to their designated groups.
 One group heard Mr. Charles McLemore and Mr. Joel Franks, both from Texas A&M University, discuss the requirements for college. Mr. McLemore, in his speech, discussed each of the main divisions of high school students. Topics of discussion included

students who don't know where they are going to college, and those who know but are not sure if they can pass. He also stressed the importance of junior colleges and technical schools. Mr. Franks discussed the basic requirements for entrance into colleges. Entrance examinations and the importance of good grades were also topics of discussion.
 The second group of students heard Mr. John H. Dodson from the University of Texas speak on "The Cost of College Scholarships, Fellowships and Loans". Mr. Dodson told who could apply and how to apply for scholarships. He also discussed the different federal and state programs set up for borrowing money. Financial aid for the poor and for the children of disabled veterans also was covered by Mr. Dodson.
 After forty minutes the groups switched in order to hear the other speaker. The next meeting of the Coryell County "Youth Wants to Know" program will be held Nov. 20, again in the GHS auditorium.

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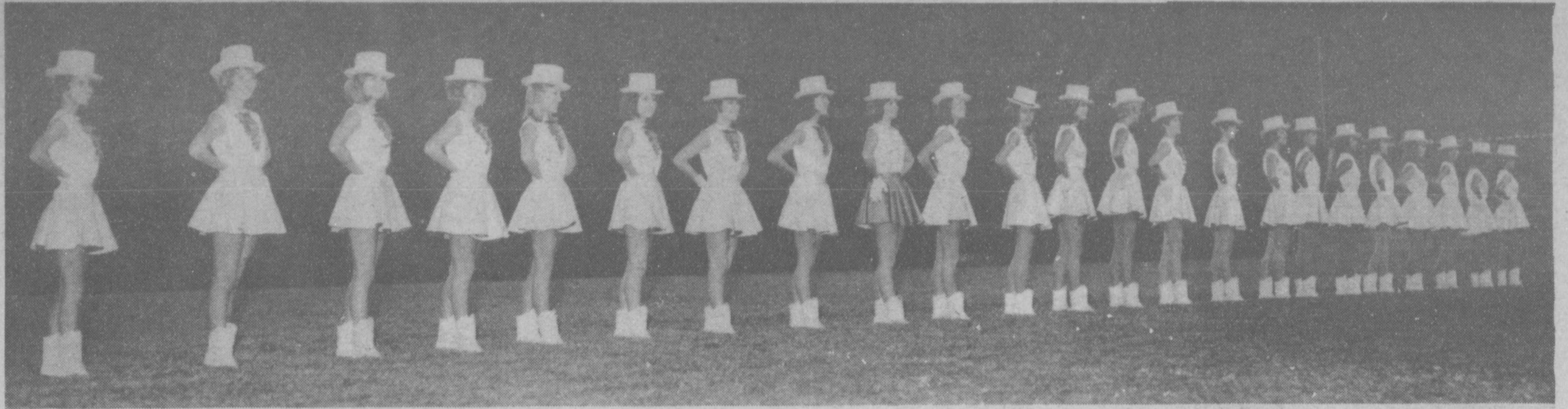

Festival Slated At First Baptist Church

The annual Fall Fellowship Festival of First Baptist Church will feature Dr. Abner V. McCall, president of Baylor University as speaker. This churchwide fellowship will be held Wednesday evening November 8 at the First Baptist Church in Graves Fellowship Hall beginning at 7 P.M.

The theme for the occasion will be "Give Light to the World - Tithe", and the 1968 Stewardship program will be emphasized.

Dr. McCall is a graduate of Baylor University and the University of Michigan and has served as Instructor and Assistant Professor of Law at Baylor University, Special Agent for Federal Bureau of Investigation, Professor of Law, Baylor University, Dean of Law School, Associate Justice of Supreme Court of Texas, Executive Vice-President of Baylor University and has been president of Baylor University since 1961.

Dr. McCall is a past president of the Texas Civil Judicial Council, past president of Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas, Inc. He is past president of Baptist General Convention of Texas and is now a deacon and teacher of Men's Bible Study Class, First Baptist Church of Waco. Dr. McCall was president of Waco School Board, Chairman of Waco City Plan Commission, Director of Waco Chamber of Commerce and Secretary, Scottish Rite Foundation of Texas, 33'.

Dr. McCall is listed in Who's Who in America, in Southwest, in Education. He holds two honorary degrees, LL.D. from Texas Christian University in 1960 and LL.D. from Stetson University in 1966. He is married to the former Frances Laura Bortle and they have 4 children.

Soldier Killed In Viet Crash

COPPERAS COVE--Warrant Officer Forrest DeVere Rains Jr., 21, of 504 Louise St., Copperas Cove, was killed in a helicopter crash in Vietnam about 8:20 p.m. Sunday, the Army announced Wednesday.

WO DeVere, a helicopter pilot in the 57th Medical Detachment, 44th Medical Brigade stationed in Vietnam, was killed when his helicopter crashed while returning from a medical evacuation mission in a combat zone.

He was born Oct. 23, 1946, at New Boston, Texas. He was married Oct. 29, 1966, to Miss Sheila Kay Lacey of Copperas Cove.

Surviving are his wife; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Rains of Columbia, S.C.; a sister, Miss Margaret Rains of Columbia, S. C.; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Rains of Fort Smith, Ark., and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Green of England.

Funeral arrangements will be announced by Palmer Funeral Home of Copperas Cove.

FREEDOM VS. WAR

During the past 30 centuries, only one year out of every 15 has been free from war; even then in the brief intervals of peace, the preparations for war have sapped energy which might otherwise have been directed toward constructive pursuits. One could hardly imagine what kind of world this would be if the energies of its two billion people were removed from war efforts, freed from bureaucratic regimentation, and applied to invention, production, and exchange of useful goods and services.

Down through the ages, human beings have always tried to stop wars by utterly crushing the enemy. There has been no progress for the simple reason that the underlying cause of war is not the enemy. Combat on the battle field is merely a symptom. War is caused by a false notion of human energy, based on the ancient superstition that men and women should be reduced to the status of the beehive. When the majority of people on this earth come to realize that they

are free, self-controlling, and responsible for their own acts and for their relationships with others, there will be no war.

Until that time, Americans must continue to lead the struggle against the forces of paganism--in time of peace as well as in time of war. We have always given a good account of ourselves on the battlefield, and we have played an important role as the arsenal of democracy--or rather, as the arsenal of freedom. The victims of paganism always look to America for help in fighting off their aggressors. America always plays the major role in helping its friends, as well as its enemies, to get back on their feet.

In view of the pitiful situations confronting some unfortunate war-ravaged countries today, perhaps we might become more appreciative of our own products, more steadfast in holding to the faith of our fathers, and more alert in resisting the alluring promises of false Utopias, which for over 6,000 years have kept the vast majority of people underfed, poorly clothed, embroiled in wars, and surrounded by famine, pestilence, and human degradation. WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

The Chinese give various names to the years, such as the year of the tiger, the year of the dragon, and they even have the year of the rat.

And perhaps the year 1967 will go down in history as the Year of the Rat, marking one in which the Congress of the United States voted some \$40,000,000 to exterminate rats.

There is no question but what rat infestation in some of the older sections of the nation's older cities is a serious problem. The big question would seem to hinge on whose responsibility it is to get rid of them.

It does seem peculiar that the majesty and power of the government of these United States of America should be mobilized to trap rats. It would seem that this is a problem that local city government should address itself toward solving.

The sponsors of this bill claim there are 80,000,000 rats involved. This led Congressman H. R. Gross, Iowa, to ask just how this count was made. Apparently in his mind, if there are people who can accurately count rats, why did they not at the same time knock them off.

But cities do not have a monopoly on rats. There are also

country rats, yet nothing is said about spending federal funds to destroy the country rats.

Could this be deemed a form of discrimination?

After all, a swarm of rats can clean out a bunch of baby chicks or turkeys in short order, to say nothing of grain in cribs and elevators.

However, country folk, whether bothered by rats in the chicken house, or the dwelling house, usually take steps to get rid of the pests quietly, and without help from a government bureau.

It will be interesting to see how the Federal government approaches this problem. After all, it is spending far more money in Vietnam against far fewer Viet Cong than there are reputedly rats in the nation's cities, yet so far it has not been able to even rid Saigon of the Viet Cong.

Of course, there is always the possibility that after much cogitation and concentrated thinking on the subject, the bureaucrats might decide the rat problem can be solved by the federal government giving cities \$40 million worth of tom cats.

But of course this plan might run afoul of local city laws on noise abatement. Then, a new program could be set in motion to breed a new kind of screech-less tom cat. The long range possibilities are quite endless.

A fat heifer calf, weighing at least 600 pounds, from Frank Courtney's feed lot will be given away Sunday afternoon.

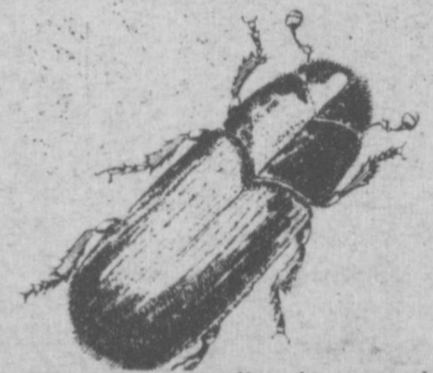
The Jonesboro Lions Club's regular meeting Monday night, Nov. 6, at 7 o'clock will be open to the public so that as many as possible may hear a

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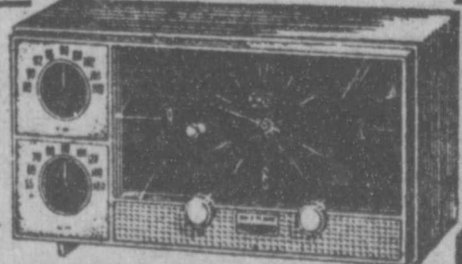

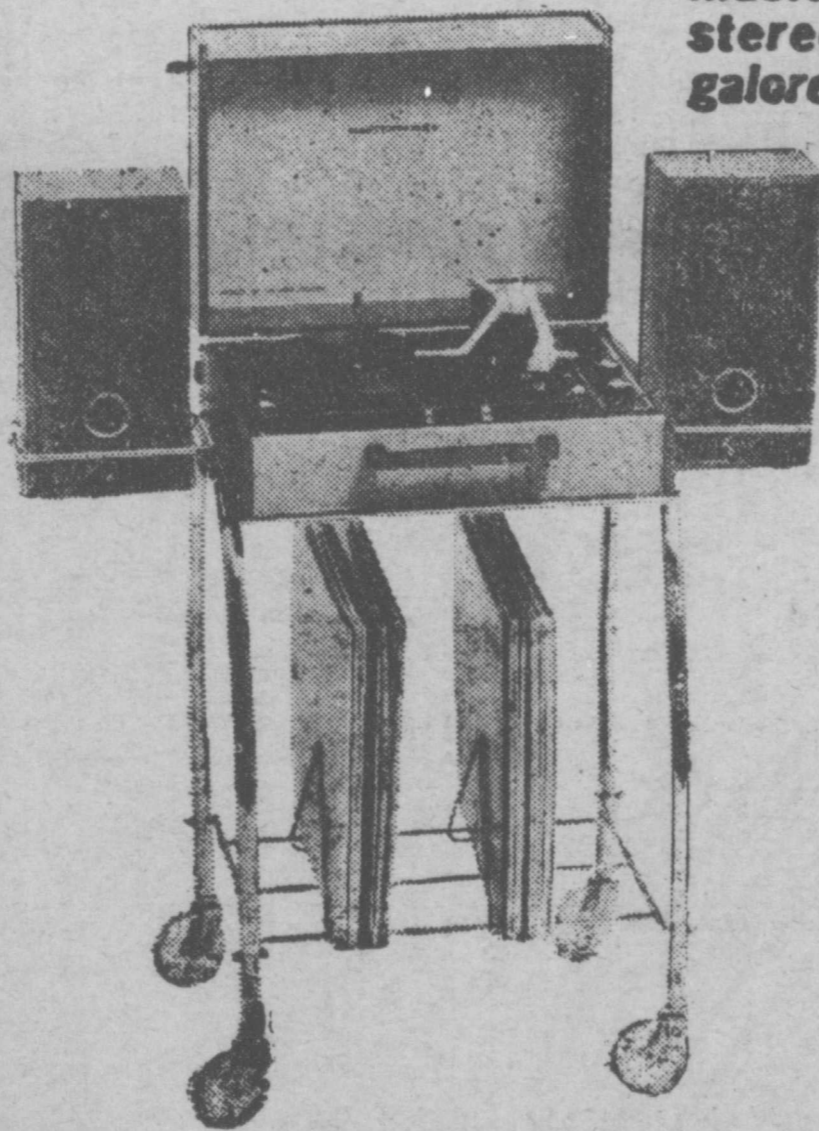

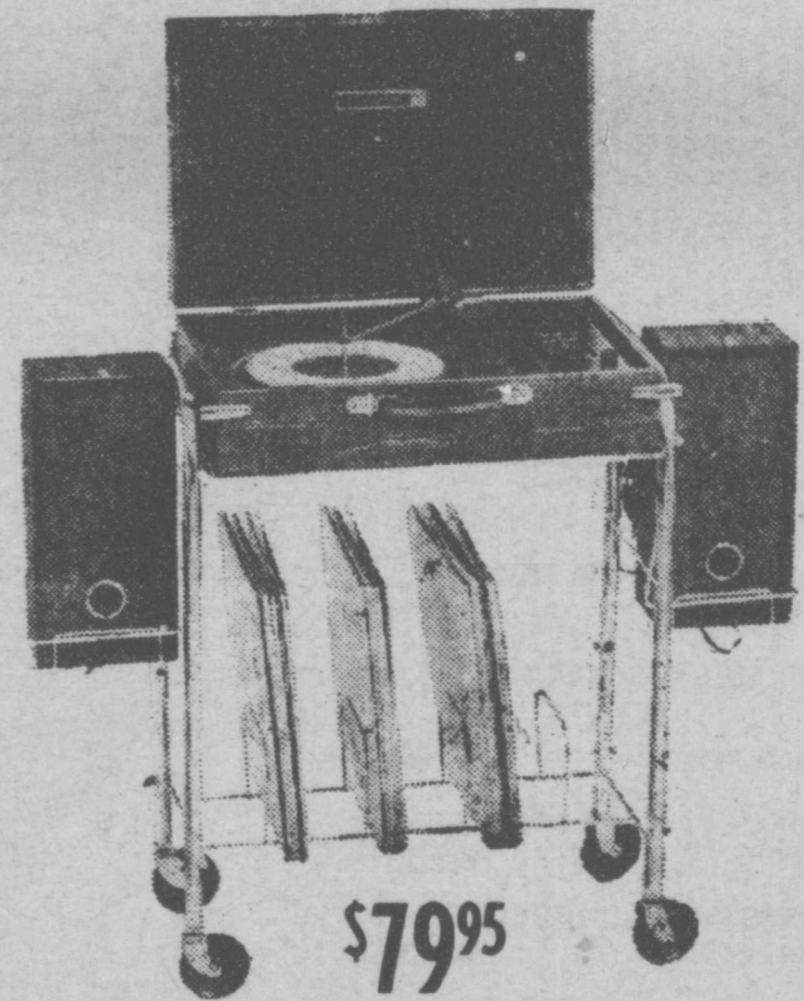

Hornets Sting Tigers

Friday, October 28, was Homecoming in Gatesville and the Hornets performed to perfection for the G.H.S. exes and a packed stadium.

From the starting kick-off the Hornets moved the ball with power and punch. Star Hornet Randy Vroman returned the punt 17 yards to the Hornet 27 yard line. Using only 9 plays on 2 minutes and 43 seconds the HORNET ELEVEN LIT UP THE SCOREBOARD.

The first touchdown drive included two key offensive plays by Vroman. In the first, Vroman grabbed a pass on 3rd down for 5 yards placing the Hornets at midfield. The second Vroman play was another 3rd down and short yardage situation at the Tiger 43 yard line. Mark Reeve, Charles Ivy, and Stanley Kopec then opened a hole for Vroman who moved through the defensive secondary to the 2 yard line. The touchdown came two plays later from the Hornet 1. The point after attempt was good.

Belton bounced back after the Hornet kick off to score in eight plays. The big play of the Tiger drive came when Larry Taylor stepped outside the Hornet defense and romped to the Gatesville 11 yard line where the Cole brothers made a desperation tackle at that point. Five plays later the Tigers were on the scoreboard after Tommy Lee scored from the 1. The point after was no good leaving the score Hornets 7 Tigers 6.

After the kick off the Hornets bogged down and were unable to move the ball. From that point the Tigers started their second drive in the first quarter. With a fair catch at their 15 yard line it took the Tigers four plays to move the ball to their 32 yard line. Then Quarterback Jay Taggart worked the "bootleg" to perfection for a 17 yard gain. After a couple of outside plays by a speedster Aguppin Rodriques the ball was moved to the Hornet 28. Pulling the "bootleg" Jay Taggart romped to the 10. Taggart then took the ball all the way for another Tiger T.D. The point after was no good. The score: Tigers 12 Hornets 7.

The Hornets moved to the Tiger 5 late in the second quarter only to fumble the ball with Belton recovering. The defense held the Tigers and forced them to punt in four downs. The Hornets took over on their own 44 yard line. On first down with 53 seconds left in the first half of play, Randy Vroman connected with receiver Kenny Gaston who carried the ball to the Hornet 4 yard line. Vroman ran off the left side from the four to score for Gatesville. The point after attempt was blocked by a fine Tiger defensive play. The score at the end of the first half was Hornets 13 Tigers 12.

During the third quarter the Hornets dominated play. The Tigers managed possession for only eight plays in the quarter. Gatesville's long time consuming plays started at the Hornet

23 yard line. With good "crisp" blocking, hard running, and mixing plays, the Hornet 11 moved to "paydirt". Vroman carried the ball over from the 4 yard line for a third Hornet T.D. Bob Gillette's point after was wide but the Hornets led by 7. The score: Hornets 19 Tigers 12.

Belton's efforts to get back into the football games were short lived. On first down, at their 34 yard line Tommy Lee managed only one yard against the powerful Hornet line. On a crucial third and 3 situation, Quarterback Jay Taggart called on speedster Rodriques but Hornet defenders Stanley Kopec and Randy Achoenewolf were not to be denied. The fourth down punt went out of bounds on the Hornet 38-yard line.

Mike Gaston decided to keep the Hornets on the ground and with a first down situation ran for a six yard gain. Then Speedster Bobby Cole set his sights on the goal line and with good blocking up front, he dashed into the end zone from 56 yards out making the score after the extra point attempt was good Hornets 26 - Tigers 12.

With momentum moving in Gatesville's favor the Hornet defense proved too much for the Tiger offensive squad. On first down, Jimmy Ferguson, Mark Reeve, and Raymond Cole combined to halt the Tiger's Larry Taylor with short yardage. On second down, Rodriques picked up six more yards but fell short of a first down. Then Hornet defenders James Ingram, Robert Brown, and Gary Carothers stopped Larry Taylor short of the first down. The Tigers tried a fourth down run but ran into Stanley Kopec and Doyce Wright setting Gatesville on the Belton 46 yard line.

Both teams exchanged the ball on pass interception in the next three minutes. First, Mike Davis picke off a Hornet pass at the Belton 23 yard line. Two plays later Raymond Cole grabbed off a Taggart pass and returned it to the Belton 10. Bobby Cole cracked into end zone on the next play. Mike Sastar added two points and it was Hornets 33 -- Belton 12.

Belton's next possession lasted only one play when Chris Bone intercepted a pass and ran it back to the Tiger 7. Bone's efforts to score ended when a hard tackle caused a fumble and Belton recovered.

Belton tried again to move the ball for the first down but was forced into a punting situation. Mark Reeve blocked the attempted kick and Gatesville had the ball on the Belton 2 yard line.

Gary Carothers used one driving play to cover the two yards and the final score was Hornets 41 and Belton 12.

Cole and Vroman combined carried the ball for 284 yards. Individually, Cole carried 23 times for 136 yards and 2 TD while Vroman carried 24 times for 148 yards and 3 TD. Both boys had long runs during the night. Cole 56 yards and Vroman 46 yards.

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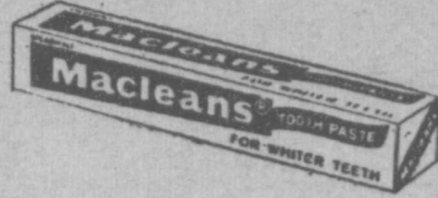
