

Telephone Rates Reduced

Company announces that it's customers will participate in over a hundred million dallars annual savings for telephone users from coast to coast.

The seventh Long Distance rate reduction in five years went into effect November 1.

The new rates apply to Station - To-Station Interstate (calls to points outside of the state) Long Distance calls,

A new after-midnight economy rate schedule has been put into effect and from midnight to 7:00 A.M. subscribers may now call the furthest point in the U.S., excluding Hawaii and Alaska, for 75 cents, not including overtime and Federal Tax. This applies only to Station- To-Station calls and Credit Card, collect or other calls needing operator assistance are not included.

Savings will also be realized by customers because of the low priced rate periods having been extended to include more hours. Station - To - Station calls now have day rates Monday through Friday from 7:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. This day rate formerly was from 4:30 A.M. until 6:00P.M.

New early evening rates are in effect from 5:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. This rate permits calls to the furthest point in the U.S., excluding Hawaii and Alaska, for \$1.25 plus Federal Tax, for the initial three minutes.

The night rates which were

OPEN HOUSE

Gulf States-United Telephone in effect from 8:00 P.M. to 4:30 A.M. Monday through Friday and all day Sunday, during which time a call could be placed to the longest distance in the Continental U.S. for \$1.00, now apply from 7:00 P.M. to 7:00 A.M. each week day plus all day on both Saturday and Sunday. This rate will also applyall day Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's Day, July 4th, and Labor Day.

T.W. Grisham, the Telephone Company's District Manager, states: "while intrastate calls (those within the state) are not affected by the new rates, this change represents the 22nd. major cost reduction in Long Distance rates since Coast-To-Coast service began in 1915. That year a call between New York and San Francisco cost \$20.70. Now the night rate is \$1.00. It shoud be emphasized that the new rates and schedules apply only to Station-To-Station calls to points outside of Texas,"



"Each year in Texas more than two million drivers licenses are renewed without the benefit of an eye examination. Visual capabilities often change, and sometimes rapidly. Advancing age, diseases and eye injuries can adversely affect a person's vision," Dr. Otto Lippmann, Austin, Chairman, Texans for Traffic Safety, said.

"It is not unusual for a 40 or 50-year old driver who had good vision 20 years ago to have some visual problem now that calls for correction or treatment," he said.

"Some drivers with failing eyesight are aware of their problems, but many others are not. These drivers with unknown visual defects may endanger all other users of the streets and highways."

Both the Texas Safety Association and Texans for Traffic Safety strongly advocate vision re-examination at the time of driver license renewal. They think that their vision might be deteriorating, have competent eye examinations.

"They owe it to themselves, as well as others -- for the unseen traffic hazard can kill or cripple," Dr. Lippmann concluded. 718 Main, Ph. UN 5-5013. 1-91-afc



Gatesville is coming off of a two game winning streak, Belton (41-12) and Lockhart (31-7). Measured against these two foes, San Marcos took Belton (22-20) and Lockhart (40-0). San Marcos had more success with Taylor (28-21) where the Hornets lost convincingly (35-6). San Marcos' early season match with Rockdale ended with Rockdale holding all the marbles (48-6). Vroman has been consistant all year long and Bobby Cole has been very impressive in the last two Hornet outings. The Rattlers running attack lead by Bobby Phillips, 165 lb. senior fullback, halfbacks Johnny Bratton (178 pound junior) and Ty Harrison (190 pound senior) has been gaining an average of approximately 200 yards per game. Teaming these with one of the districts best passers, Steve Sessom sho has a better than 50% completion record, it looks like rough going for the Hornet

defense.

The Hornets have played some good defensive ball this year. Rockdale found it hard to score at McKamie Stadium a few weeks ago as did Belton. However, against the areial attack of Taylor the Hornets had trouble containing receivers.

Certificates **On Stadium Being Recalled**

GATESVILLE - Gatesville public schools announced the calling in of the last of \$13,660 in option certificates issued in 1966 to help finance construction of McKamie Stadium.

The stadium, with its cinder track, cost \$110,000. It is already nearly free of debt.

Only 260 of the \$20 option certificates - \$5,200 worth are still outstanding. School officials are asking that holders bring them to the high school office for redemption by Nov. 15. Certificates not cashed by the Nov. 15 deadline will not be called in until October of 1968.

The school has already cashed 423 of the option certificates, or \$8.460 worth.

The 4.100-seat stadium was completed at the start of the 1966 football season and the cinder track was added last winter. It replaced Holmes Stadium as the home of Gatesville football.

FREEDOM COUNCIL SPEAKS OUT

The Republic of America

"Each generation must defend its freedom and its heritage. Every battle which the framers of out constitution thought was finished will have to be fought again by each generation. Freedom, while God-given, does not perpetuate itself. We have given you a Republin, if you can keep it." So said Benjamin Franklin as he left the Convention Hall in Philadelphia on September 17, 1787.

The most fateful period of our history was probably the summer 180 years ago when, from May 25 to September 17, the Constitution that was to determine the destiny of our Nation was drafted in Philadelphia. The wise fathers of our Constitution were unmatched in their ability to understand the relationship of government and people. They believed the best form of government to be a republic based on citizen participation with a representative form of government. With this type of government they believed people would be able to keep a constant surveillance of the political power. In addition, it was thought that our constitution must limit government in purpose, reach, method and duration in order to prevent a totalitarian form of government. For this reason, they created a simple, plain, understandable government which would be kept close to the people by frequent elections.



rights of life, of liberty, and of ownership of property. Today, as with every past

gneeration, we are faced with Franklin's challenge--"You have been given a Republic. Now can you keep it?" Freedom has more often been lost by carelessness and selfishness than by the force of conquering armies. Indifference on the part of citizens causes Republics to erode. Then, the government formally controlled by conscientious people gives way to demands for "wants,""needs," and "rights."

Freedom does not continue by itself. A government big enough to give us everything we want or demand is big enough to take away everything we have, including our freedom. Those who expect to enjoy the blessings of freedom must undergo the sacrifices of supporting it. When freedom is lost, it is seldom regained. Freedom is never free. It only comes at a price and that price may be as high as life itself.


The season opener for the GHS Hornetts was quite a disappointment. Both A and B teams came away from their first basketball rallies with defeat.

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
