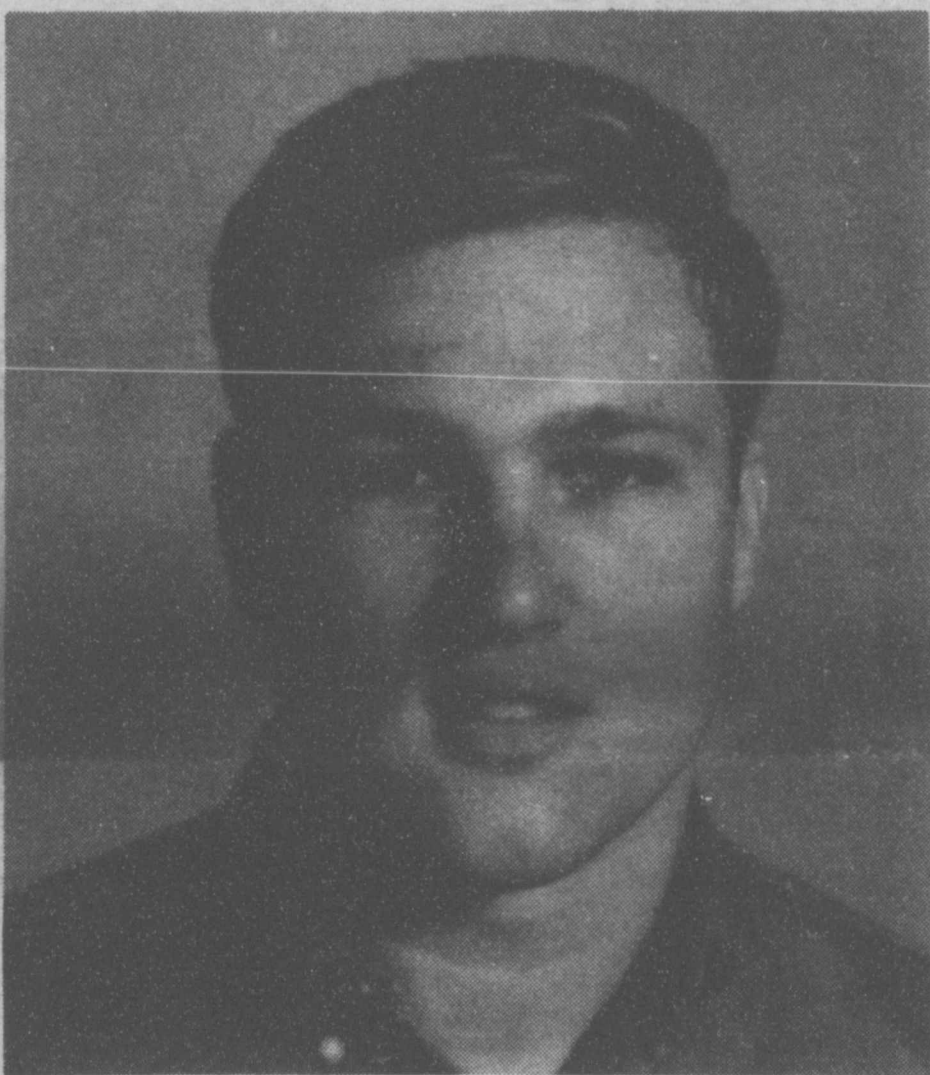

## Hearings Slated For Monday

A special hearing concerning the right of way disputes of FM 116 under construction between Pidcoke and Coryell County is slated for Monday in Gatesville. The proceedings will be primarily the discussion of the condemnation suit filed by the commissioners court.

The court has appointed a three man committee to speak in its behalf concerning the problems. The three special commissioners are: Leroy Harriston, Ewell Swift and George Leonard.

The question of one of the hearings slated is that of the Pidcoke Baptist Church. The special commissioners and Church representatives will decide the amount of damages suffered by the Church in order to improve FM 116. The question revolves around 0.177 acres lost in right of way.

A second part of the Monday proceedings will involve the discussion and review of the right of way damages to the J.E. Wookley estate near Pidcoke. The acreage involved in the second question is 0.521 acres.

## Tim Thomas Fund Began

On November 19, young Tim Thomas sustained extensive pelvic injuries from a shotgun accident. The accident occurred as the 13 year old boy and his companion Steve Brazier were hunting birds in a field north of Eastwood Park Addition where both boys live. A 20 gage shotgun accidentally discharged striking the youth who was only a few steps away.

The youth is reported to be improving slowly but due to the severity of his injuries it will be necessary for him to undergo a great deal of corrective surgery.

## COVE CITY SALES TAX DISCUSSED

City officials in Copperas Cove Tuesday night continued their drive to promote the 1 per cent city sales tax to be voted on Dec. 15.

Mayor George Leonhard addressed more than 25 civic leaders, businessmen and interested citizens at a town hall meeting. At the close of the meeting a show of hands showed a majority favored the sales tax as the answer to many of the city's problems.

Councilman Lonnie B. Walker was guest speaker at the Business and Professional Women's Club meeting earlier in the evening. He said there was 100 per cent support of the proposed sales tax by the women attending the meeting.

Leonhard told those at the town hall meeting the sales tax was the most equitable tax for Copperas Cove because 32 per cent of the people pay no city taxes.

"We have 2,880 families in Copperas Cove and only 1,962 of these are on the tax rolls," Leonhard said.

Lovett Ledger, a Cove businessman, countered that most of the 32 per cent were lower ranking military people and could ill afford more taxes. Leonhard answered Ledger's objection by recalling conversations he had with military people about the tax.

"I have talked to no less than 80 military people and at least 90 per cent of them favor the tax," Leonhard said. "These soldiers are proud and they will let you know real fast they are not a bunch of

noochers.

"Most that I talked with are thankful for the city services they receive and realize that it takes money to provide these necessary conveniences," Leonhard said.

Leonhard also said that many rural families utilize city services such as the city dump and plots in the city cemetery which the city also maintains at no charge.

There was active discussion at the meeting and most appeared to agree it was not a question of "if we are going to raise our taxes - but how."

The city sales tax will bring an estimated \$23,614 annually to the city. It would take a 14 per cent ad valorem tax increase to equal this figure.

Copperas Cove's present ad valorem tax rate is \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation, based on 40 per cent of actual value.

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## County Completes First Report

A Coryell County has completed the first county report in a statewide planning study for vocational rehabilitation services in Texas.

The announcement was made by Dr. Clifford Knape, chief of psychology services at the VA Hospital in Waco and chairman of the Waco region of the planning study, which includes Coryell and 11 other counties.

Chairman of the Coryell County committee is Oran D. Bates, principal of Gatesville Elementary School at Gatesville. The report includes recommendations for improving services to the handicapped population of the county.

Purpose of the statewide study is to develop vocational rehabilitation services so that by 1975 the services will be available to all handicapped Texans instead of the estimated one in five who receive services now, said Bates.

Bates explained the vocational rehabilitation is the process which prepares physically, mentally, or socially handicapped individuals to enter or return to employment and independence.

Field work in the 20 planning regions was begun in March, and final reports are due in February. The regional reports will be incorporated as grassroots recommendations in the final state report due in July 1968.

The Coryell County report concludes that the county is "poorly endowed in services and facilities for dealing with the handicapped," and made several recommendations for improving the situation.

The report notes that there are "very few services offered to handicapped people in Coryell County and that in the main, help for these people comes from outside the county." It

points out that no diagnostic services are available except on a private basis, and that there are no training facilities for the handicapped.

Primary recommendation in the report is a call to establish a regional center to coordinate all services for the disabled. The report maintains that such a center would promote fuller use of existing facilities because the public would know what services are available and where to find them.

"Little purpose is served if we provide the finest facilities in the world, staff them with the best trained people, maintain the best records, employ the best procedures, etc., and yet fail to reach the handicapped and the people who might like to help them," reads the report. "Communication----- that is the word that will make the difference."

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**FARM PRICES ON THE DECLINE**

SENATOR JOHN G. TOWER  
As you know, I'm not in Washington right now, but I took the liberty of recording, before I left on my Vietnam trip, this introduction for today's guest on this program.

I'm very pleased to have been able to get Congressman Bob Price from Pampa to take time out from his busy schedule in the House of Representatives to talk with you today, Bob Price is one of the real experts in our Texas congressional delegation in the field of agriculture and ranching. I've asked him to share with you today some of his views in those fields and to generally bring us up to date on what the House of Representatives is doing these days of importance to Texans.

This is Bob Price. I'm certainly glad to have this chance to talk with you and fill in for Senator Tower. As a former military officer myself, I long ago realized that in John Tower, Texas has provided the Congress and the nation not only a man of great dedication, but one of the real experts of our times in the field of national security affairs. I'm glad Senator Tower has been sent to Vietnam once again by the Senate Armed Services Committee, and I know his report on the current situation there will be important to both Congress and the people of Texas.

Senator Tower and I both are concerned about the plight of our state's farmers and ranchers. We both, in fact, have introduced a number of bills aimed at declining farm prices, mounting meat imports and the continued migration of farm families to our over-crowded cities.

The last report of the Department of Agriculture showed farm prices going down for the third straight month while everything else was going up. The parity ratio, an index of whether farmers gain fair prices for their products in relation to their costs, is down to 73. Even adjusted for government subsidy payments, the index was down to 78. Farmers would be getting fair prices if the index were 100.

While wages and corporation dividends have soared during the past 20 years, the prices farmers are now getting for their cotton, wheat and corn are actually less than in 1947. As a comparison, hourly earnings of industrial workers have increased 123 percent and corporate dividends are up 241 percent since 1947. But during the same period, farm prices are down 9 percent.

I can think of no other segment of our society, except the agricultural service industries, that has suffered an actual net loss of income since 1947. These figures are shocking but true.

And I believe it is safe to say that no other member of our society is taking less for his labor and services than he did in 1947. The American and Texas farmer holds a dubious monopoly.

It is certainly obvious that something has gone wrong with present and past farm programs that have failed to keep farm income up to the level of other income. And this in spite of the billions and billions spent on price support and many other farm programs.

As I said, Senator Tower and I both have introduced a number of bills and resolutions intended to bolster sagging farm prices. One would raise CCC resale price on grains to full parity. Another would increase loan levels on corn and grain sorghum. We both are trying to get action on meat import bills.

A bill with strong bipartisan support would set up a commission to study ways to correct the economic imbalance between rural and urban areas. And Senator Tower and I both would like to see a complete overhaul of a farm program that obviously has failed to accomplish its purpose.

**Scholastic Attendance All-time High**

Unprecedented numbers of Americans are attending school, with a total enrollment exceeding 55 million persons in the last school year, according to the Bureau of the Census.

About 35.6 million were in elementary school or kindergarten, almost 13.4 million were in high school, and about 6.1 million attended college or professional school. It is anticipated that the total enrollment will exceed 60.4 million by the fall of 1975 even though the rate of growth is expected to slacken at each educational level.

In the 11 years from 1955 to 1966, the number of persons 5-34 years of age who were attending school on a full-or part-time basis increased by an average of 3.6 per cent annually. The average yearly enrollment gain was 2.5 per cent in elementary school, 4.8 per cent in high school and 8.9 per cent in college.

By 1975 almost 8.6 million students may be enrolled in college, according to Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. This anticipates an increase of 2.5 million over their number in 1966, and will account for almost half of the expected increase in the total enrolled at all school levels.

**FORMER TEXAS FARM BUREAU PRESIDENT DIES AT 79**

J. Walter Hammond, 79, former president of the Texas Farm Bureau, died at his home in Abilene Saturday following a long illness. Funeral services were held Monday in that city.

Mr. Hammond, known as the "Father of the Texas Farm Bureau," is survived by one daughter, Mrs. W. D. Wofford Abilene, and two grandsons. His wife died November 22, 1964.

Mr. Hammond was elected president of the fledgling Texas Farm Bureau in 1939, when it was still known as the Texas Agricultural Association. The name was changed shortly after he became president when the organization affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation. The Taylor County farmer served as president of the TFB for 18 years, until 1957. Nationally known in agricultural circles, he was a member of the AFBF board of directors for 17 years during that time.

Sidney Dean TFB president paid this tribute to the memory of Mr. Hammond: "Farm Bureau, as well as agriculture, has lost a true and valuable friend. His passing recalls the great leadership which contributed so much in securing this organization's rightful place in the agricultural history of Texas."

During Mr. Hammond's tenure, the TFB grew from less than 5,000 members in a few organized counties to more than 70,000 members in almost 200 counties.

Mr. Hammond was an aggressive farm leader, constantly striving to better the lot of farmers. He played an important role in getting the successful farm-to-market road program under way in the late 1940s.

He became a farm celebrity in 1949 when he persuaded President Harry Truman to authorize loans for wheat stored on the ground, thereby breaking a storage bottle-neck and

saving wheat farmers an estimated \$40 million.

Recipient of many awards and honors, the soft-spoken West Texan was named "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" in 1954 by The Progressive Farmer Magazine. In 1958 he received the first Distinguished Service Award ever given by the TFB. People from all over the nation gathered at TFB's 1958 annual convention when he received that honor.

Although Mr. Hammond was

named president of the organization in 1939, he did not take over administrative reins of the organization until 1944. It was said of that period that he carried the records of the organization around in the trunk of his car. Actually, TFB had one employee in its small upstairs rented office in Waco.

Today, the organization he helped nurture to maturity has a membership of 105,653 farm and ranch families, employs more than 300 in Waco and around the State, and has large and successful affiliated service companies.
