THE FLU BUG EMPTIES CLASS-ROOMS IN SCHOOLS

This week the flu bug officially hit Gatesville with powerful force. Coupled with the bad weather of the last two weeks and the highly contageous flu bug the attendence and faculty dropped sharply.

Gatesville High School Principal , Sidney Pruitt reported that 313 students were absent from Gatesville Schools Wednesday and by Wednesday afternoon the total had risen to 320 absentees, greater than 17% of the average daily attendence.

Mr. Pruitt said that one faculty member from the High School was absent. Two faculty members from Elementary School were not in attendence said

CITY COUNCIL MET JAN. 9, 1968

The City Council had its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night at 7:30. The Parks Committee, headed by Gene Chitwood, discussed the financing . The Counof the new pool cil has been seeking Federal Funds for several months, It was reported that the funds were set aside for such projects.

To be eligible for the funds a complete design and plan must be submitted to the Government Agency for approval and each third month a priority list is established. It is thought by many that Gatesville could get a high priority rating in the March rating.

It will not be that easy to obtainthe financial help because of economic measures which have presently frozen the funds for this type project. Funds could be come available at anytime so the committee will proceed to complete the designing and planning qualifications and seek the high priority rating. Funds, well we will just have to wait for the thaw.

The new library for the city is still in the planning stages with many alternatives available to the Council.

The library was originally planned to cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000. With the federal aid program it is possible for Gatesville to build an \$86,000 building with almost the same local funds.

At a half and half basis the local share comes to \$43,000. The cost of the Chamelee building is valued at \$16,000 which can be counted toward the local share. This leaves the local share at \$27,000 which is only \$2,000 above the original plan.

The Council has discussed the problem of old cars being left on the city streets. Normal prodecure is to wait until citizens complain before taking action. However, the Council has decided to instruct local law en-See CITY COUNCIL page 2.

January Induction **Quota Set at 8**

Registrants of Texas Local Board No. 23, Hamilton and Coryell Counties, who were ordered to report on January 9th, 1968, had their physical examinations and induction orders postponed until January 26th. 1968 due to the bad weather over the state. The January call was for 15 men to report for physical examination and 8 men to report for induction. These registrants will receive a new reporting time and date by letter in the near future.

Jan. 30 Election Day In Cove

The Commissioners court reconvened Tuesday January 9, 1968 to hear Mr. Bob Royal's petition for a local option election on the sale of alcholic beverages off premiss in Copperas Cove.

The necessary signatures were checked by the court. The Court set the election date as, Tuesday January 30. The date was selected to remove confussion as to who can vote in the election. Only those who voted in the last gubernatorial election can qualify as voters. This years registration will not qualify voters.

It was established that the polls would be open at normal hours (8:00 a.m. to 7:00 o.m.) on January 30. The polling station was set as the Fire Station in Copperas Cove.

Approximately 1000 voters are expected to participate in the election.

TOURISM CAN BE AN IMPORTANT SOURCE OF INCOME

The regular meeting of the Gatesville Lions club was held at the First Methodist Church of Gatesville Wednesday noon.

The noon luncheon program chairman was Mr. Sam Powell Jr. Lion Powell introduced Phil Davis, chief of community relations for the Texas Tourist Development Agency, who spoke in the area of Tourist Development.

An interesting point brought out in Mr. David' talk was the fact that tourist trade averaging 24 persons for a 24 hour period every day of the year was equivalent to an industrial payroll of \$100,000.

Mr. Davis pointed out that the "Tourist" dollar amounted to approximately \$30 billion in 1966 and asked the local Lions how much of that money came to Gatesville?


Estimates are that 19 million tourist came to Texas in 1966 and brought in \$1 billion. How much came to Gatesville?

The Tourist Development Agency of Texas is looking for this 1966 figure to double in 1968. Many conventions, the Hemisfair, and the 1968 Summer Olimpics in Mexico City Mexico, will increase tourism in and through Texas.

The exonomic value of the tourist dollar is tremendous. Mr. Davis pointed out that the "tourist dollar" is a "new dollar" and can turnover 7 or

Jan. Last Day for Allotments

January 15, 1968 is the last day to make an application for a new-growers cotton allotment. To be eligible for a new-growers allotment the farm must not now have a cotton allotment and the owner or operator must not be working another farm that has a cotton cllotment on it for 1968.

All wool, mohair and unshorn lambs sales receipts from January 1, 1967 through December 31, 1967 should be turned in to the ASCS office not later than January 31, 1968 in order to be eligible for incentive payment. Payments will probably be made about April 1, 1968 for those timely reported.

Coryell County ASCS office has had 172 persons to visit the office since the 2nd of January. A majority of the visits were to turn in sales receipts on wool, mohair or unshorn lambs, or to request cost-sharing on ACP practices. Most of the ACP applications muda this winter and spring. Some of the applications were for cross fencing pastures, drilling wells, digging earthen dams, dozing cedar or brush. Applications are still being taken, however, no applications can be approved until funds are made available.







Miscible Oil Used to Improve Fruit Guality

Don W. Callahan County Agent

Now is the time to control Scale in peach, plum and apricott trees. Control of this disease will increase fruit production for the coming spring and increase the vigor of these orchards said, Don Callahan, Coryell County Agriculture

For the Commercial growers use 4 gallons of 97% Miscible Oil to 100 gallons of water. For home growers with four or five trees use 1 pint of the 97% Miscible Oil in 5 gallons of water.

Now is also a good time to prune peach trees before spraying for scale, severe pruning needs to be done on trees that have never pruned. Fruit yields will be reduced but the quality of fruit increased.

Also clearing up the orchard removing all dead trees and setting out trees can be done at this time of the year.

Mid 50's HOLD NATIONS WEALTH

Life begins in the mid-50's not at 40, if you judge happiness in terms of money. That conclusion may be drawn from the January FINANCE FACTS, a monthly newsletter on consumer behavior, published by the National Consumer Finance Association.

The newsletter reported that the average age of the top wealth holders in the United States is the mid-50's. For married men and women, and single men it is the early 50's, for single women the late 50's, and for widowed men and women the late 60's.

Top wealth holders are defined by the Internal Revenue Service as those with gross assets of \$60,000 or more. According to the IRS survey made in 1962 there were 4.1 million people in this category.

About 2.5 million were men with average asset holdings of \$173,000, while the 1.6 million women were wealthier with an average of \$196,000 in assets. A total of 84 per cent of the men were married as compared to only 48 per cent of the women.

The men are more inclined than women to own real estate, notes, mortgages, insurance and annuities, FINANCE FACTS reported. But proportionately more women own bonds and corporate stock.

Insurance was the greatest difference in ownership--87 per cent of the men had some insurance but only 46 per cent of the women. For men, debts too0 up some 14 per cent of assets compared to 7 per cent for the women, the newsletter






COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT By Grace Chandler

The Hornet B's tied the game at the end of regulation play.


The overtime period was won from the free throw line with the Rockdale B's making four foul shots while the locals picked up only one.
