Induction For Board #23 set at 10.


Texas Local Board No. 23 has received notice of physical examination call for 12 men to report February 13th 1968 and induction call for 10 men to report the same date.

FLAT MAN SERIOUSLY INJURED IN COLLISION



Tuesday January 30, at approximately 6:45 p.m., Ivory Moses of Flat, Texas, was seriously injured in a car-truck collision. The mishap occurred when the car driven by Moses veared across the center strip of Texas Highway 36 and struck the trailer of a cattle truck driven by Robert James Hunt of Gatesville.

Investigating officer, State Highway Patrolman, Wallace Plentl reported that Mr. Hunt

drove the truck into a bar ditch in an effort to miss the auto.

Mr. Moses, 52, was admitted to Coryell Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment. He was then transferred to Darnall Army Hospital at Ft. Hood where he is reported to be in serious condition with severe lacerations of the head and arms, internal injuries and broken bones.

Mr. Hunt received no injuries in the crash.

Record Vote Keeps Cove Dry Again

Copperas Cove recorded 1,032 voters, a record turnout to decide the wet-dry issue, Tuesday.

The official count was completed Wednesday and turned into the County Clerk, Bubba Henson. Voting for the measure were 427 for and 652 voted against the issue.

The issue had come as close as 29 votes in last year's election, but this year, the margin widened to 225 votes.

Officials termed the turnout as the largest ever in Copperas Cove.

County Clerk, Bubba Henson, reported that a long line was present at the 8:00 Tuesday morning opening of the polls. However, the most active period was from 4:00 p.m. until the polls closed, with two voting lines being formed.

School Census in Process

Each year the county schools take a census of children between the ages of 6 and 17 as of September 1.

County School Superintendent W.H. Donaldson, reported that anyone having a child in this age group who has not been contacted by the school census should report to the County School Superintendent in the Courthouse.

Highway Repairs To Begin in County

A contract to seal coat 147 miles of highways in the Waco District has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission during its January meeting, according to District Highway Engineer Brooks Evans.

Jeff Richards and Son of Belton, who submitted the low bid of \$288,193, was awarded the contract.

The project includes US 84 from east city limits of Gatesville to FM 1929 (6.7 miles); FM 932 from US 84 to Purlmela to Hamilton County Line (8 miles).


Cemetery Trust Established

The City of Gatesville and the National Bank have written the trust agreement for the Gatesville Cemetery Memorial Trust.

Since December, the actual trust agreement has been in the works and was finalized this week. The fund began accepting contributions in December and has accumulated \$1,123.85.

The fund has a goal of 1/2 million dollars. This amount seems large, however, the City is looking well into the future in their project. Only the interest and funds over 1/2 mil-

WORKMEN BEGIN DRILLING NEW WATER WELL

The City of Gatesville has begun the actual drilling of the new well east of Gatesville. Workmen of the Lane Texas Company arrived Monday morning to begin setting up the equipment.

Only two days were needed to erect the drill rig before the drilling operation began. Wednesday the rig was in place and drilling was under way on two shifts.

The original hole is to be 4" in diameter with scientific information to be logged at intervals during the drilling operation. Cost of the original "test hole" is approximately \$7,000.

The purpose of the "test hole" is to estimate the capacity of the well and then ream the "test hole" to the required diameter.

The City of Gatesville well study the Lane Texas Companies proposal (guarantee) and decide if the well is adequate.

Hope is that the well will produce in the 700 gallon per minute range.

City manager, Eiland Lovejoy estimated that the new well if it meets expectations would serve Gatesville when population reaches 8,000 and 10,000. Present consumption in Gatesville during the summer runs as high as 1,000,000 gallons per day with present storage facilities set at 1,850,000 gallons.

The Lane Texas Company will use geological samples from the "test hole" to make their estimate as to the wells capacity. Studying the formation and "water producing formations" a guaranteed well will

be offered to the City of Gatesville.

The well will balance the Gatesville water system. The new well will empty into the 1,000,000 concrete reservoir east of town. Mr. Lovejoy pointed out that the reservoir is located at the same height as the elevated tower on 23rd street. This reservoir is the equivalent of four towers the size of the 23rd street tower.

Drilling will take an estimated 6 weeks under normal conditions. Expected completion date should be in March well before water consumption demands reach a maximum.

Turner Returned To County Jail

Charles James Turner, 20, was returned to Coryell County jail Tuesday night by Sheriff Windy Cummings.

Turner had been in the local jail during October, after being captured by Lubbock authorities for a Gatesville forgery charge.

Last October 29th, Turner was able to make good his escape during a Saturday cleaning session at the jail.

The man hunt that followed used all available help, highway patrol, city, county and GSSB personnel searching the area south of Gatesville, with no success.

This week Bryan law enforcement officers discovered that a Charles Turner was wanted by Gatesville authorities. Turner had been in the Bryan jail for a time, during his flight from Coryell County jail and was out on bond. Bryan authorities picked Turner up Tuesday and notified Sheriff Cummings of his whereabouts.



And sauerkraut is not all German as many think. Known as 'sour cabbage' to the Chinese, it achieved a historic role during the building of the Great Wall—it was served to starving workers to stave off malnutrition.

So this wiener and bean casserole has an interesting history—yet it is a modern combination, easy to fix. WIENER BEAN BAKE, A LA KRAUT is bound to be your family's New World favorite.

WIENER BEAN BAKE, A LA KRAUT

- 1 pkg. (1 lb.) Oscar Mayer Wieners
- 2 cans (1 lb. ea.) pork & beans with tomato sauce
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
- 1 can (1 lb.) sauerkraut, drained
- 1/2 teaspoon dill weed

Preheat oven to 350°. Cut half of wieners into bite-size pieces. Combine with beans and chili sauce in 1-1/2 quart casserole. Cover with sauerkraut and sprinkle with dill weed. Bake 30 minutes. Top with remaining whole wieners and bake 15 minutes longer. Makes 5 servings.


But that was not the only narrow escape; Bryan had to climb a tree, and fall out about sundown. We resolved to go to bed and hope we would not fall off it!

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
