BEWARE OF \$20 BILLS

COUNTERFEIT BILLS PASSED IN AREA

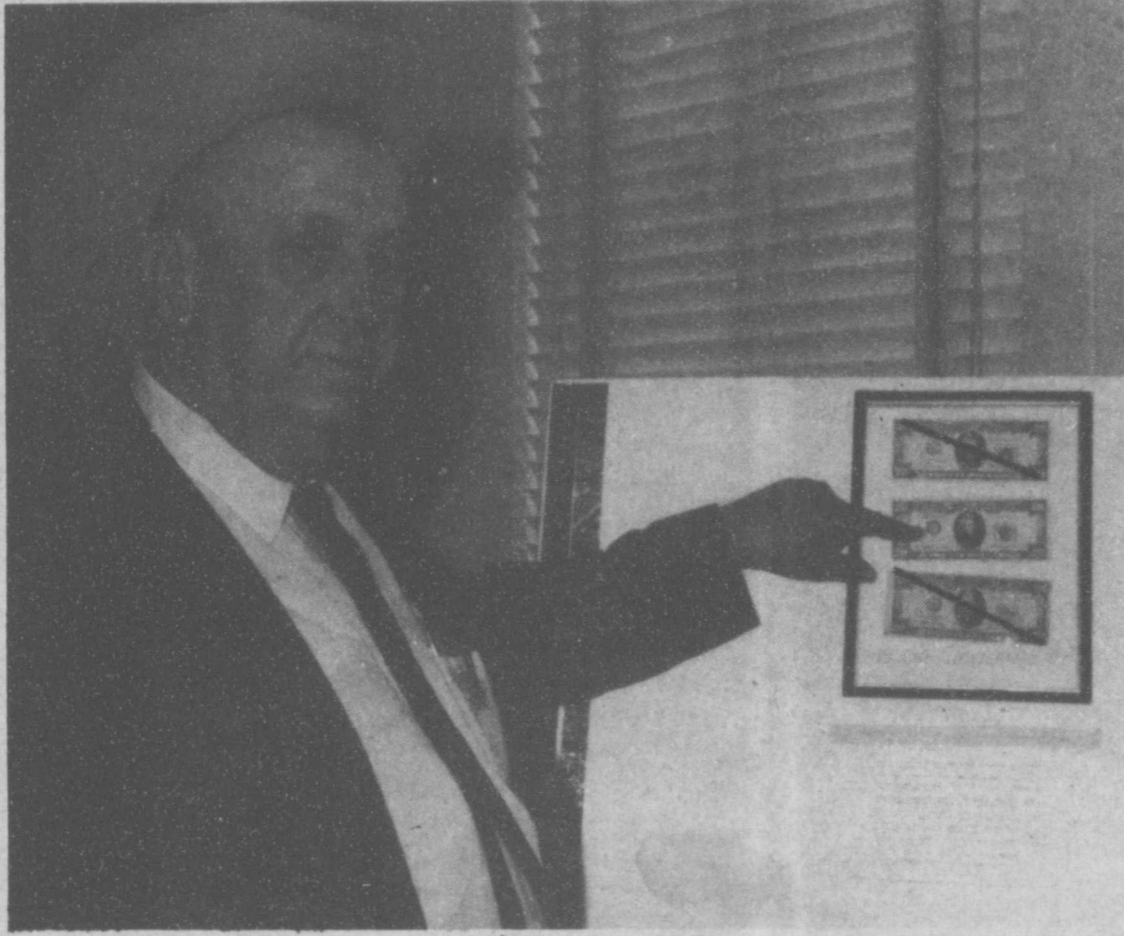
Tuesday afternoon about 1:30 or 2:00 o'clock, a counterfeit \$20 bill was passed at the City Drug Store.

An employee of the drug store became suspicious of the bill. A license number of a pickup driving away from the area was recorded.

Later, a second bill was discovered.

covered at the National Bank when bank officials inspected the \$20 denomination.

Sheriff Cummings pointed out several things to look for in checking for counterfeit bills. First, Cummings pointed out, that the counterfeit bill will not have the "silky" feel of a real bill. Secondly, the paper will probably be flimsy compared to a real bill. A third indication will be the green seal, located to the right of the portrait. This seal will be blotched in on the counterfeit bill and not legible. On the real "thing", the seal will appear distinct and readable. A last check point for this particular group of counterfeit bills is the notation D 21 located in the lower right hand corner in the white area. Of course, all bills with the D21 will not be counterfeit, but a close check will not hurt anything.

City Council Approves Road And Pipeline Construction

The City Council, in its last monthly meeting, Tuesday night heard reports on the highly successful and productive well, east of Gatesville.

All testing on the well is complete and collected data is being analyzed to determine the pump capacity suited to the well. Final recommendations are expected within two or three days by City Manager, Eiland Lovejoy.

Installation of a suitable pump will begin immediately upon determination of pump size. Lovejoy expects the pump can be in operation in one month's time, barring any complications.

In other council action, it was recommended that the city and

county pave the section of road from the old Leon River Bridge to the intersection of the Levita Highway and Highway 84 in Westview Addition.

This section of road is heavily traveled by both mail delivery and school buses each day. A section of the road is almost impassable.

The City and County will handle the project together, sharing the cost of construction.

The Council agreed with the State to help procure land if needed, to widen the Leon River bridge, west of Gatesville. Lovejoy pointed out that the

new construction possibly can be done without the purchase of more land.

The council authorized drawing up of plans for construction of pipe line to extend from the intersection of 23rd Street and Bridge, along Golf Course Road to the entrance of the Country Club.

Construction on this project is scheduled for the immediate future.

Later, the "dead end" line will be connected up with the existing line at the intersection of Logan Lane and Lovers Lane to create the required "loop-line" line.

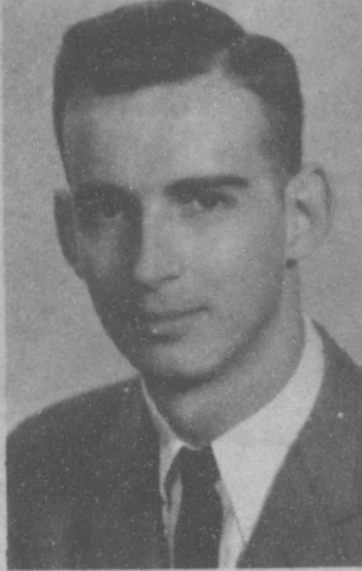

Souffle Made With Tuna
There's always room for another good way to use canned tuna, one of America's favorite foods.

Tuna Souffle
3 tablespoons margarine
2 tablespoons corn starch
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 cup milk
1 (6 1/2 to 7-ounce) can tuna, drained and flaked
4 egg yolks, well beaten
4 egg whites, stiffly beaten
Melt margarine in saucepan. Blend in corn starch, salt and pepper. Remove from heat. Gradually stir in milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in tuna and egg yolks. Fold in egg whites. Pour into greased 2-quart casserole or souffle dish. Set in pan of hot water. Bake in 350 degrees F. (moderate) oven 50 to 55 minutes, until puffed and golden brown. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Photographs in the county office have been photocopied and the copies were mailed during the week of March 4 to all operators in the county who have a cotton, peanut or wheat allotment or a feed grain base. Permanent field acreages and acreages between terraces are shown on these photo copies. These measurements are to help farmers in reporting their acreages, since compliance is to be by certification this year. Please read the letter that was enclosed with photocopy.

Accurate reporting is a must because a loss of payment or severe penalty will result if the farm is not in compliance.

You will not be able to plow up base or allotment crops to get in compliance after you have reported your acreage. The office offers premeasurement service, also an early measurement service if needed by anyone. However the farmer must pay the cost of this service.

Approved Uses to Be Listed

A list of the approved uses will be enclosed with the operator's copies of the cotton and feed grain intentions. However, we would like to call your attention to the following:

To be eligible for diverted acreage small grain cover crops must be pastured off, clipped, incorporated into the soil or destroyed by neutral causes by April 30.

March 15 Last Day Cotton, Feed, Grain, Wheat Programs Signup

March 15 is the last day to sign an intention to participate in any of these programs for 1968. Failure to sign intention will leave the farm ineligible for diversion payments, price support payments, commodity loans and wheat certificates.

Transfer Allotment Deadline April 1

April 1 is the final date to file an application for transfer of 1968 peanut allotment, either by sale, lease or transfer. A farm without a peanut allotment is eligible to purchase from a farm that has an allotment.

May 20 is the last day to release or ask for more peanut acreage in Coryell County.

If you are interested in peanuts in any way, ask about them at the ASCS office.



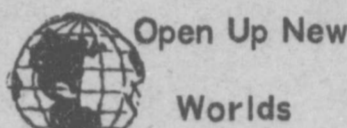

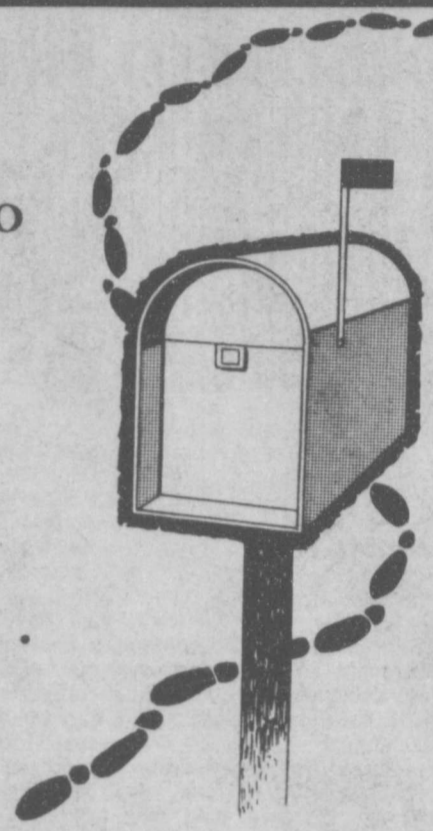

ELECTRONIC WATCHDOG?

Electronic watchdogs are being strategically placed on rivers and streams all over the state by the U.S. Geological Survey and the Texas Water Development Board in an attempt to gain all the information necessary for having a complete assessment of Texas' water resources.

As of July 1, 1967, they had instruments gathering information at 802 locations and by next July, that number will increase to more than 1,000.

Instruments measure such things as continuous streamflow, chemical quality, lake content and river and stream stages.

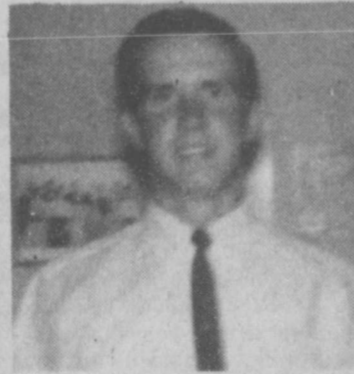

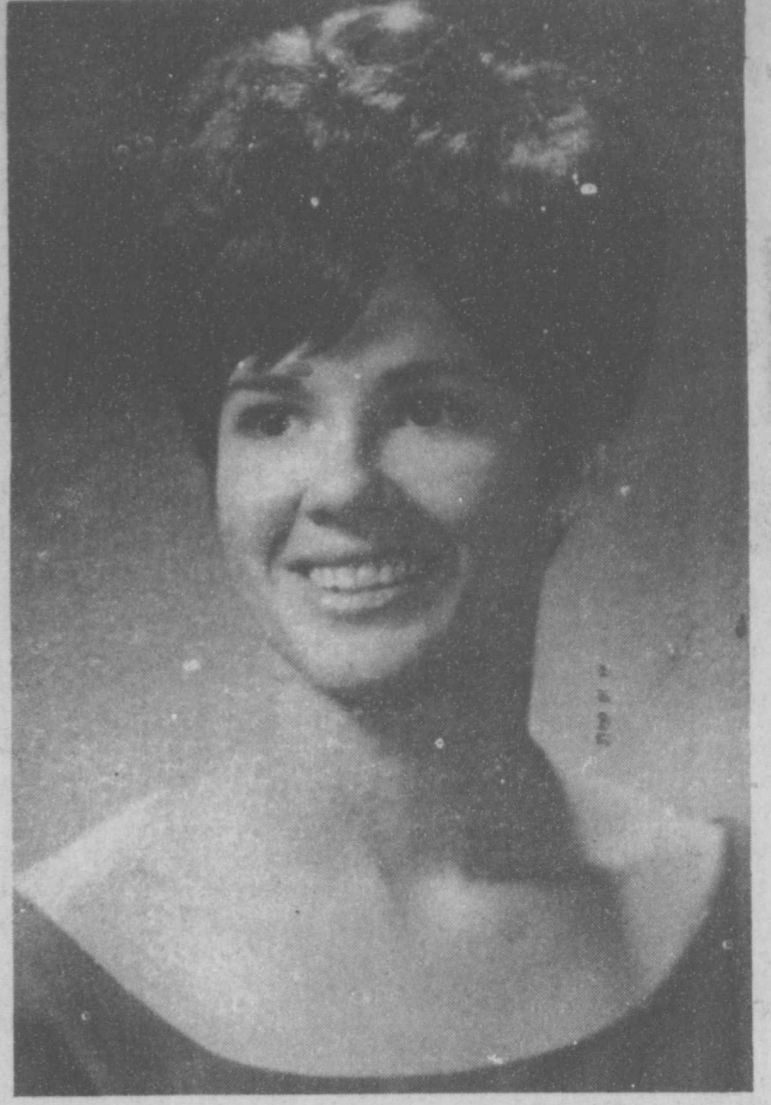

Spring may not be here officially yet, but it is in reality. The children found a lizard, a horned toad and a small snake this last week. This means it's time to watch where we walk in the country, for the rattlers will also be out sunning themselves these bright days. The fruit trees and spring bulbs are blooming, but if you don't have enough to bring in the house for a spring bouquet add some branches of trees or shrubs that are beginning to leaf out. Their delicate shades of rose and yellow - green are as attractive as flowers.

Right about now is the time usually given as the average frost free date for this part of the country. So it's time to plant snap beans, beets, sweet corn, leaf lettuce, radishes and onion sets. Some people plant their summer squash now too but it won't do them any harm to wait a couple more weeks until the soil warms up a bit more. If you like to have the first tomatoes in your neighborhood, you can put out a few plants now, but be prepared to cover them on cold nights. Average frost free date isn't any guarantee that we won't have a hard frost as late as April - remember that thunder in February!

If you planted seeds in the fall, your larkspur, poppy, bachelor button and snapdragons plants should be up good by now and can be transplanted to permanent positions. If you didn't start your own, you can get them now at the local nurseries. The secret of a successful flower bed is to have it full of blooming plants as soon as the earlier plants have stopped blooming. Any of the above plants can be put in your bulb beds to carry on the flowering season after the daffodils and tulips are finished.

While waiting for your spring and summer garden, it is nice to be enjoying the fruits of our winter one. This has been a good year for fall planted vegetables and we've been having crisp lettuce, onions, golden carrots, sweet turnips, broccoli and brussel sprouts.

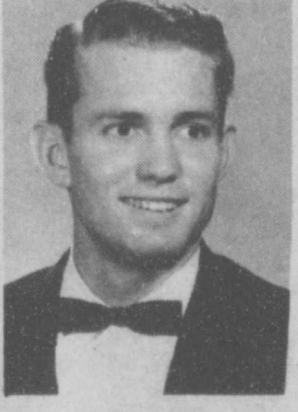

Gatesville Junior High School track team, coached by Kenneth Marshall, will travel to Taylor for a relay meet, Saturday afternoon, March 16. The Hornets will be one of nine Junior High squads competing at the event.

The Hornet squad is comprised of 15 young athletes from the 7th and 8th grade. The boys will compete in 7 running events and 5 field events this weekend.

Coach Marshall has some returning performers in Gary Fruge, 1st in district pole vault last year; Ricky Thompson, 2nd in district broad jump last year; and both Jim Saunders and James Smith, 3rd in district broad jump.

Coach Marshall's 100 yard dashers will be Ronald Brown and Billy Merritt. Brown is the team's fastest man through 60 to 70 yards.

In the 220 yard dash, Billy Hord and Billy Merritt will try to pick up points.

At the 440 yard distance, William Ayres, Gary Davis and James Smith will be in action. Ayres is good at this distance. He has been running in the low sixties in practice. Coach Marshall sees Ayres as a future

distance man and a present asset to his squad.

In the 660 yard dash, William Ayres, Steve Braziel and James Smith will be the Hornet representation. James Smith is entered in 5 events and should score points for the team.

The long 1320 yard dash will feature Barry Nottingham and Tommy Tatum. Hats off to any man that can run that far.

In the 100 yard low hurdles, Ricky Thompson, Gary Davis and Barry Nottingham do the honors.

The 60 yard intermediate hurdles will feature Gary Davis, Steve Braziel and James Smith.

The 440 yard relay will consist of Ronald Brown, Billy Hord, Billy Merritt and Ricky Thompson. Coach Marshall expects his relay squads to stand out this year. Marshall estimates that the 440 boys

can run a 49 or high 48 second relay. The High School squad has been running a 43 second relay.

At the longer distance (one mile), the relay squad will be Ronald Brown, Billy Hord, Ricky Thompson and William Ayres. Ayres will have the last "leg" of the relay and will be relied upon to carry the baton to the string.

Coach Marshall had the boys working on handoffs Wednesday afternoon and this will be the determining factor Saturday at Taylor. Time lost in passing the baton will be hard to recover.

Broad jumper will be Ricky Thompson, Jim Saunders and James Smith. All these boys scored points in last year's district meet. Coach expects all three to jump near the 17 foot mark in competition.

High jumpers will be Jim Saunders and James Smith.

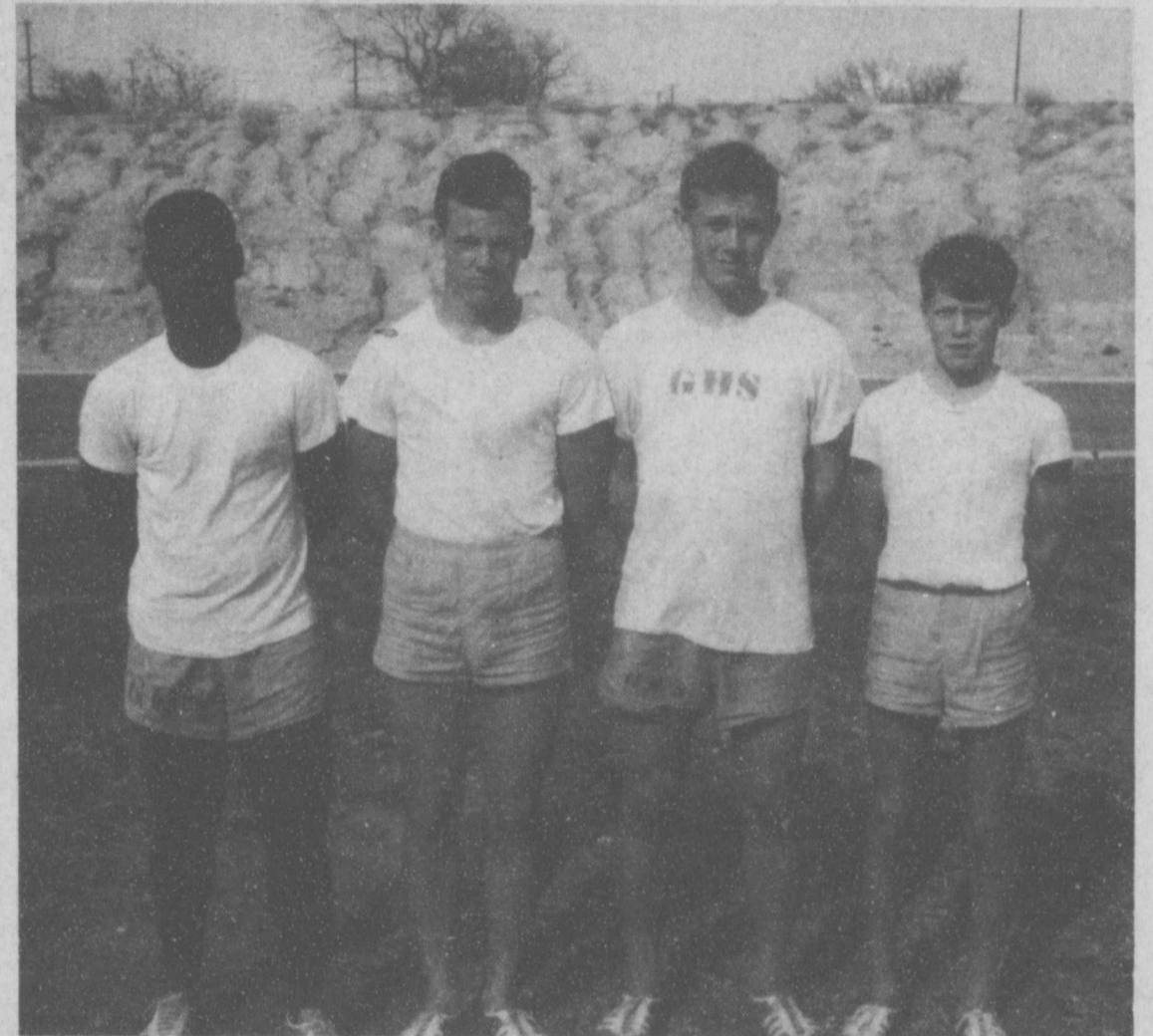
