have worked their way half way through the list into the middle or upper 100's- they will probably have all the men they need for their 1970 quotas.

Men with birth dates drawn early in the list can be almost sure of receiving a draft notice next year; men with middle range numbers may have to wait all year to see if they are drafted; men whose birth dates are drawn late in the list, next to numbers in the 200's or 300's probably will not be drafted.

Every man in the country who reaches the age of 19 but not 26 by Dec. 31, 1969 will have a place-in-line number determined by Monday nights drawing.
But only men classified 1-A

"available for service"-will be subject to draft call in 1970.
Men granted deferment or exemption by their local draft boards will not be called while their deferments or exemptions continue.

But the place-in-line number they draw in Monday nights lottery will stay with them; and if they lose their deferments or exemptions and become 1-A, they will fall back into line with other draftable men in exactly the same place they would have occupied if they had not been deferred or exempt.

In other words, if a man now deferred stands third on Monday nights list, he would become third on the list to be drafted in any future year should he become 1-A.

Each year, while the lottery system continues, a new drawing will be held, assigning place-in-line numbers to a brand new group of men-those who reach the age of 19 during that year.

That group will be the draft's prime target for the following year, while the men who have already faced the draft, in 1-A classification, for one year without actually receiving their draft notice will move into a safer category.

They could legally still be drafted-but only if the draft uses up all of the new group of 19-year-olds first. And the White House says that is unlikely.

The draft pool for 1970-those affected by Monday night's drawing-is estimated at some 650,000 men classified 1-A or 1-A-O (men available for non-combatant duty).

The Pentagon expects about 290,000 of them to enlist voluntarily in the armed forces, leaving 560,000 to take their chances with the draft. Of that number, about 260,000 or 46 percent will be drafted, by present estimates.

For 1971, the new draft pool will be somewhat smaller, including only those who turn 19 during 1970. No estimate has yet been made public of the 1971 draft calls.

If two more men registered with any local draft board share the same birthday, they will be subject to call in an order determined by a second lottery drawing held Monday night in which letters of the alphabet were scrambled.

Here is the "tie-breaking" order of call, in which the initial of each man's last name and first name if necessary will be matched with the scrambled alphabet.

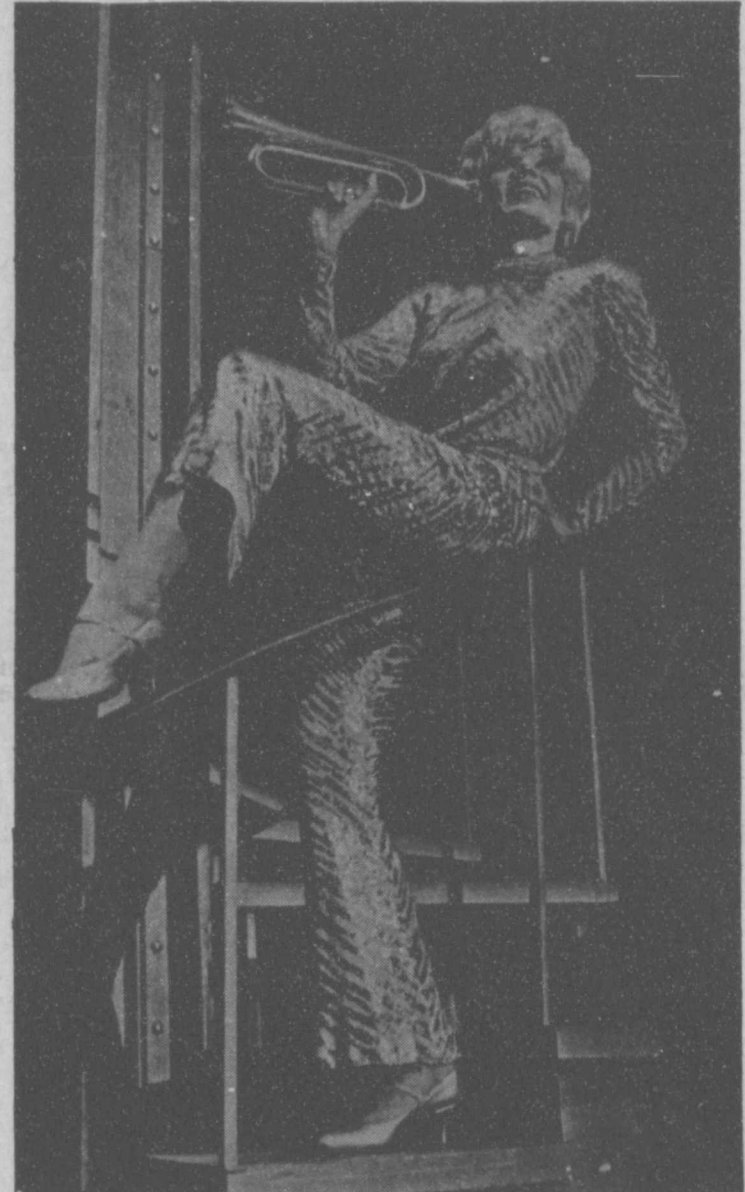

"Mame" To Be Staged Dec. 9th On Baylor Campus

"Mame" is the name, and the national touring company production of this hit Broadway musical will be in Waco Tuesday (Dec. 9) on the Baylor University campus.
"Mame" will be staged here one performance only at 8:15 p.m. in Waco Hall.

Starring in the title role of this production is Sheila Smith, a musical-comedy actress who has performed the role of the famed, vivacious Mame more than 250 times on Broadway.

One of the American stages longest-run musical hits, "Mame" is still going strong on the New York stage, more than three years after its Broadway opening, May 31, 1966.

Meanwhile its touring company version is making the rounds of cities throughout the country.

"Mame" is a musical adaptation of the Patrick Dennis novel, "Auntie Mame," and subsequent play by Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee. Lawrence and Lee also collaborated on the book for the musical; Jerry Herman wrote the music and lyrics.

Among its best known musical selections are "Mame!" the rousing title tune; "Open a New Window"; and the ballad "If He Walked into My Life."

Mame's story remains more or less the same in this latest version--the story of a gay madcap of the roaring 1920's who gets orphaned, 10-year old nephew thrust into her guardianship in the midst of one of her huge cocktail parties and carries on from there through the stringencies of the 1929 financial crash that wipes her out, marriage to a fabulous scion of the old South, and affluent widowhood.

An enduring enemy of dullness, Mame is jolted to find, when her adored nephew grows up, that he has fallen in love with a stupid girl. Mame manages to extricate Patrick from an alliance by throwing him into contact with a far more suitable girl named Pegeen, who reminds him they had been childhood classmates in the radically progressive school Mame had chosen for Patrick.
So presumably, after they are married, they live happily ever afterward, but that's not the end of "Mame". The end comes some years later when Mame bubbly starts all over again to educate the 10 year old who is Patrick's and Pegeen's son.
"Mame" was nominated for a number of Antoinette Perry (Tony) Awards, Broadway's equivalent to Hollywood's Oscar. Nominations came in such categories as best musical play, best musical actress, best director of a musical play, best supporting musical actor and actress, best composer and lyricist and best choreographer.
Tickets to the Baylor engagement of "Mame" are \$6.50, and 4 for lower floor and \$5.4 and 3 for balcony.

The program is under the supervision of the Vocational Industrial Division of the Texas Education Agency and meets all State requirements for the course. Instructor for the course is John Washburn who lists the following objectives:

To develop skill in the use of the tools of the trade; skill in the analysis of trouble; skill in maintenance repair and overhaul of the automobile and automotive equipment.

To develop a sufficiently broad understanding of automotive mechanics work to permit entrance into the trade at an advanced apprenticeship level. To develop a willingness to follow instructions; a desire to cooperate with fellow workers; a wholesome attitude toward the customer; and an attitude recognized throughout the trade as outstanding.
