## Commissioners To Discuss Tort Claim Insurance

Coryell County Commissioners Court is expected to make a decision Monday on the amount of insurance and insurance company to adequately cover the County in case of liability suits.

Judge Norman Storm explains that the Commissioners will have to determine the amount of coverage necessary. Storm estimated that the insurance package would cost the county \$10,000 annually.

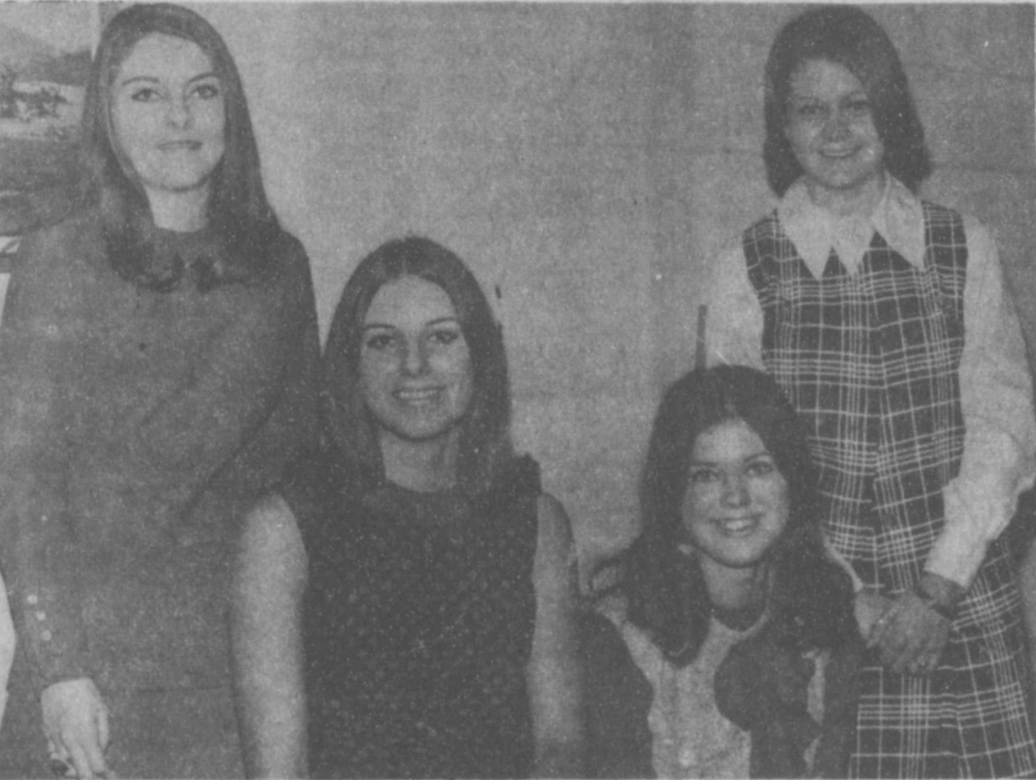
The Tort Claims Act of 1969 passed by the Texas Legislature allows individuals damages in liability cases where the government unit can be shown negligent.

Storm noted the maximum damages of \$300,000 for any accident and 100,000 for each individual could be awarded in damages against a governing unit. The county is not liable for property damages.

## Coryell City Water Well Being Tested

The Coryell City Water Supply Corp. is now in the testing stage of its water well. The well is the first stage of the counties largest Farmers Home Administration project costing \$270,000.

County Supervisor for the FHA, Vance Stephens expects the well testing to be completed this week. Stephens explains that the well must be certified with good quality water and a specified pumping capacity before the water system contract can be signed.

## Footballers To Be Honored At Banquet Jan. 12

Over 100 Hornet footballers who played on the freshman, B team, and Varsity are being honored Monday night, Jan. 12 at the Annual Football Banquet

at the Gatesville High School Cafeteria.

The Hornet football program has rebounded in 1969 to post a 6-4 record for the varsity under the coaching of Head Coach, Jack Moss, Coach Fred Walker, Coach Wilson Elliot and Coach Ronnie Barr.

Guest speaker for the Banquet will be Grant Teaff, head coach at Angelo State University for the past year.

Coach Teaff was offensive end and head of the recruiting program at Texas Technological University from 1966 to 1969. Teaff began coaching Tom S., Lubbock High School as an assistant in 1956. He has also coached track and football at McMurry College.

Under Teaff's direction the Angelo State University football program has made a complete reversal of form in just one season and is on its way to being one of the best in the Southwest.

The Ram football team finished with a 2-9 record in 1968 and then under Teaff's direction in 1969 the mark climbed 6-4 and at one time during the year stood at 6-2.

Teaff accomplished this reversal with 17 returns from 1966, a handful of quality junior college transfers, and many outstanding freshmen. The important ingredient in the reversal was the team's "PRIDE '69" motto.

Teaff played Junior football at San Angelo College, the seasons of 1951 and 1952, where he was All Conference and Co-Captain. Teaff played tackle

and line backer at McMurry College, the seasons of 1953, 1954, and 1955. He was All Texas Conference in 1955. He worked as a radio disc jockey and television announcer during his school days at McMurry. He was Senior Vice President

Student Council Vice President, and Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. Teaff served as Co-Captain of the football team at McMurry College.

Teaff attended Snyder High School in Snyder, Tex. He graduated in 1951. He was All District Football and Basketball Co-Captain in both sports. President of his high school student body, and named the Carl Herod Most Outstanding Football Player.

turned by the jury on Johnnie Moore, John T. Campbell was indicted on charges of Sale of a Dangerous Drug.

## ANCHOR PLASTICS DEVELOPES NEW PRODUCTS FOR THE 70's

The decade of the 70's holds new potential and the chance to expand into new areas for Anchor Plastics Inc.

A.P. officials indicated this week that work has been underway on five different fiberglass projects that could become products for the Gatesville manufacturing plant.

Marketing director for A.P., Richard Belf estimates the manufacturing company can double its dollar volume in each of the two five year periods of the 1970's.

This increased volume is dependent on economic conditions of the 1970's. The economic outlook A.P. officials see in the decade will be discussed later in this article.

The prospective new production at AP includes: a new runabout boat, a houseboat, monocab, agriculture chemical barrels, and

the most definite new product is the runabout boat which AP plans to introduce at the Chicago Boat Show in the fall of 1970. A working model of the hull has completed and construction of the production mold will begin soon.

"We will expand horizontally," notes Belf, explaining that vertical expansion in to other phases of business, such as, raw materials production, or

retail sales would not be feasible.

Horizontal expansion includes the runabout and houseboat products, explained Belf. "We will stay within our present distribution system with our new products," he said.

The new products list actually includes an old product in the fiberglass barrels but A.P. is now trying to develop its distribution system hoping to increase production to approximately 1000 units.

The production line expansion does include two products that are the present distribution system, but these products do not require an extensive sales system.

AP President, Price Neeley, indicates that work on the monocab prototypes is continuing at AP on a development contract.

Neeley is hopeful that AP can land the construction contract for the monocab.

Monocab Systems are thought by many persons to be the answer to airport transportation problems of the 1970's. The super sonic jet and the jumbo jets save much time for travelers but often the savings is overshadowed by delays in terminals.

Neeley pointed out that the planned new Dallas-Ft. Worth

airport is designed with each major airline having its own terminal building complex. The problem arises when people are to be shuttled between terminals and to different gates in the same terminal.

For example, Neeley points out that terminals are to be designed in a semi-circle with jets loading on the outside of the circle. The distance across a terminal could be as much as one-half mile.

At the Dallas-Ft. Worth facility, now scheduled for completion in 1975, the cost of the system is approximately \$20,000,000. Neeley says the system of monocabs is capable of handling 150 persons in five minutes. It works much like a "horizontal elevator" shuttling passengers by pushbutton command.

The monocabs are designed for six passengers so that waiting times are cut to a minimum.

The company developing the monocab system has indicated that some other transportation problems could also be solved by the system.

Industrial Development Soared in '69

AUSTIN, TEXAS--Industrial development continued at a record breaking pace throughout 1969, with plant locations and expansions 20 per cent above the all-time high previous year.

"Texas closed out the sixties very impressively, with economic development spiraling through continued growth in industry in almost every possible sector," James Harwell, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission said in a year-ending report.

Harwell said most of the record growth came in the first six months of the year, with 198 new plants located in the state and 264 existing industries undertaking substantial expansions.

Looking to the possibilities of mild recession in the economy, Belf estimated the Marine industry would not really be effected except in a psychological trend toward reduced spending.

In a major recession, Belf acknowledged that joblessness would extend into the boat consumer market.

The Division Commander and his staff also observes and directs the operations of ships under his control and exercises similar administrative supervision for air groups through the commanding officer of the appropriate ship and is responsible for the readiness and training of these groups.

Carrier Division Three was created in 1950 and has seen action in Korea and later participated in the evacuation of Chinese Nationalist troops and civilians from Tachen Island in 1955.

With the advent of the Viet Nam conflict Carrier Division Three commenced operating air strikes against enemy forces and strategic targets from Yankee Station in the Gulf of Tonkin.

Petty Officer Galaway was aboard the aircraft carrier USS Hornet prior to beginning his tour of duty with Commander Carrier Division Three.

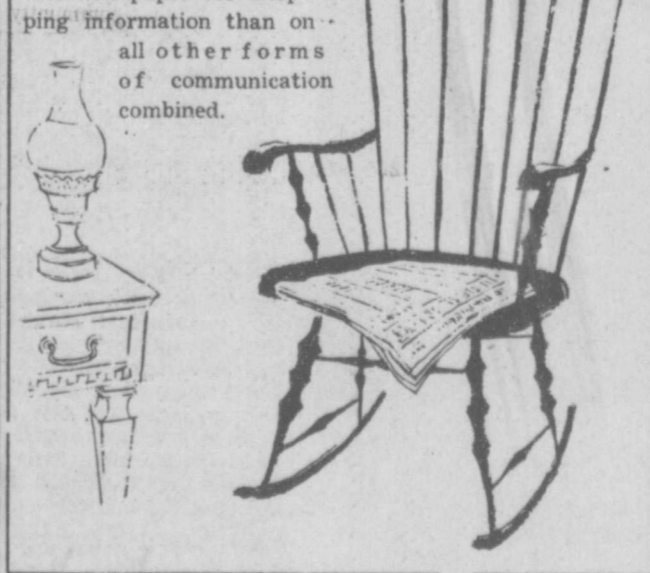

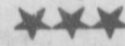

Also on the itinerary were Lookout Mountain, Rock City, and the famed Chickamauga Battlefield in Georgia.

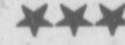

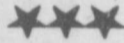

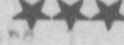
