## Council To Hold Information Session On Annexation Proposal School Board Will Seek \$500,000 Bond Election

The City Council has set up a meeting with the State School Road Water Corporation to clear up some questions concerning the proposed annexation of the area into the city.

The council and Mayor Miller are hoping to annex the area by petition with the necessary signatures from residents of the area. The meeting will be held in the Gatesville Community Center at Waco and 14th street on January 29 at 7:00 p.m.

The council has been considering the proposed annexation since last fall.

The council slate of six official holidays for 1970. The holidays to be observed include Memorial Day, Saturday May 30; Independence Day Saturday July 4; Labor Day, Monday September 7; Thanksgiving Day Thursday November 26; Christmas Day, Friday December 25; and New Years Day Friday January 1, 1971.

In other action the Council excepted a proposal for liability insurance from the Jackson Insurance Company. City Manager, Skipper Wallace, pointed out that cost of the policy will be determined by payroll figures at the end of the year.

The Council appointed Mike Mahoney, City Planner of Ft. Worth, to hold a similar position for Gatesville. Mahoney will be in charge of the 701 Planning Program which is due to be completed in February of 1971.

In recent months the 701 program has slowed down due to differences in interpretation of the 701 contract.

The Council gave the "go-ahead" on purchasing a new

Where Were You

Friday Afternoon?

Where were you Friday afternoon? The City of Gatesville is making a study of radar-enforced traffic control and Friday City Manager, Skipper Wallace conducted a study of traffic on three busy locations in Gatesville.

Wallace recorded traffic speeds for 15 minute intervals near the Main and Park St. intersections; on Main east of the Leon River Bridge and on Lutterloh at Waco Street. All three locations are 30 mile per hour zones.

In the heavily traveled Main street area near the Park St. intersection Wallace recorded 55 cars of which 26 were traveling at least 5 miles over the speed limit. A break down of the speeders shows 14 cars driving 35 to 45 mph; 10 cars driving 40 to 45 mph; and 2 cars driving 45 to 60 mph.

At Leon River Bridge (where all the construction work is going on) Wallace clocked 59 cars with 50 of the cars traveling at least five miles over the speed limit. The speeders at this location were broken down as follows: 13 cars traveling 35 to 40 mph; 26 cars traveling 40 to 45 mph; and 17 cars traveling 45 to 60 mph.

On North Lutterloh the story was similar for the fifteen minute period. Of 55 cars tested 46 were traveling at least five miles per hour over the speed limit.

The tests were made from 2:30 p.m. until 3:25 p.m., and did not include lunch hour or school traffic.

The city has been considering the use of radar for more than a year with no action being taken.

The Gatesville School Board has given its approval to Superintendent L.C. McKamie's request to circulate a petition calling for a School Bond Election.

McKamie based his request on the need for a new elementary school and a planned additional vocational facility at the high school. He noted the State Education requirements would include pre-school training for children age 5 years 5 months. The new pre-school program will add 150 more children to the schools already over crowded facilities.

The school board placed a high priority on the Elementary building because it will relieve over crowded conditions throughout the school system. McKamie noted that with a new elementary capable of handling three grades it would shift the high school to a top three grade facility; the junior high would have 7, 8 and 9th grades; the present elementary would contain 4th, 5th and 6th and pre-school; and the proposed new elementary would contain grades 1 through 3.

The Elementary building is estimated to cost \$400,000 and will be a metal building designed for the modern "team teaching" method.

McKamie noted that about every ten years the Gatesville Schools have needed expansion programs. He pointed out that the Elementary building was built in 1949, the present high school was built in 1960 and now a second elementary school is needed in 1970. He estimated that the new building would free class rooms in all school facilities and relieve over crowding for ten years.

"We have had to fit the kids to the building," said McKamie instead of building the facilities to meet the needs.

The cost of the new elementary are to be 100% local funds due to changes in federal aid programs. However, McKamie pointed out to the board that federal funds could be available for construction of the new vocational building. McKamie has been attempting to get federal money for the Vocational Building for two years. Presently federal sources indicate that facilities to reduce drop out rates and up grade vocational training are receiving high priority. A key factor to the availability of funds is a school districts quick access to its share of building cost.

For this reason, McKamie asked the board to include in the bond issue enough money to finance both projects. He noted that "just because we vote a \$500,000 bond issue does not mean we have to use them."

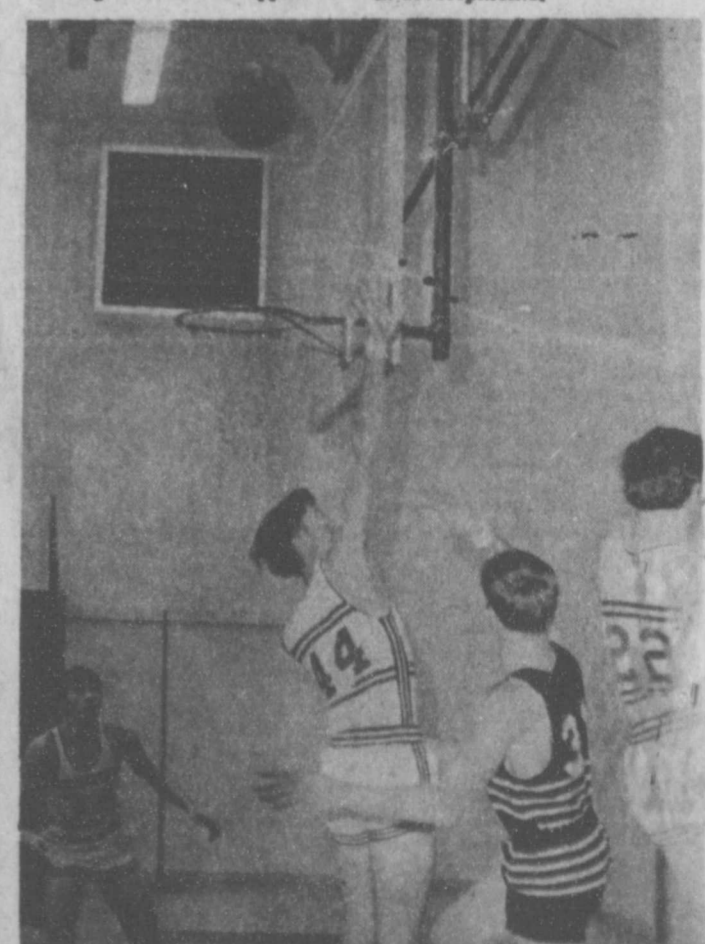
The Gatesville Independent School District is in a good financial condition and would be allowed to issue up to \$80,000 in bonds, according to McKamie.

McKamie has often noted that voting a bond issue will not necessarily require an increase in the bond tax rate. He does not foresee the need for a tax increase in this area. The other tax rate (maintenance tax) would be subject to increase due to increased cost of operation. Presently the GISD has the lowest maintenance tax rate of any district of its size in Central Texas. Some area schools double the GISD operating tax rate.

The board gave unanimous approval to the calling of the Bond Election. Attorney for the district, Floyd Zelger will draw up a petition and submit the petition to board at its next regular meeting on Feb. 10. The election date will be set at that time.

Another board action the Trustee Elections was set for April 4, 1970.

Also the board voted to keep the stadium lights at old Holmes stadium for possible use in lighting the practice field at the high school.

## Family Code To Be Tested In District Court

A petition was filed Friday January 9 with 52nd District Clerk, Floyd Murray asking the court to require that County Clerk, Bubba Henson, issue a marriage license to a Copperas Cove couple.

The couple was refused a license by Henson recently under the Family Code as set up under the 61st Legislature HB 53. Judge Truman Robert set a hearing on the matter for Friday January 16.

It will be the first court test of the Legislatures Family Code in Central Texas. Recently the Central Texas district of the County Clerks Association of Texas met in Gatesville to review the family code. County Clerk, Henson reported that the Code sites a penalty of \$200-500 for failure to comply with the particular clause questioned in the petition. Henson will be defended by county attorney Albert Dickie.

## Housing Act Will Spur Construction Of Rural Homes

More new housing additions will be stimulated in rural communities by the Housing Act of 1969 which was signed into law yesterday by President Nixon, Sec. of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin said today.

The Sec. announced that the Farmers Home Administration is preparing to carry out new provisions for cooperation with rural builders, realtors and homestead development organizations. Farmers Home makes loans for both farm and non-farm rural homes to families that cannot obtain credit from other sources.

The new legislation authorizes the Farmers Home Administration to issue "Conditional Commitments" to builders and realtors certifying that houses they plan to offer for sale will be financed for families eligible for Farmers Home rural housing loans.

The conditional commitments will encourage builders to invest in construction of more new rural homes before buyers have been secured. This is expected to be a significant step toward the goal of adequate housing for all families in rural America, where 30 percent of the population lives with half of all the substandard housing in the country—a ratio of bad housing twice as great as in urban areas of the United States.

Administrators James, V.

Smith of the Farmers Home Administration said no new funding will be required to put the conditional commitment plan into effect. He said procedures are being developed for builders and realtors to submit their housing plans to Farmers Home Administration county offices for advance determination that houses will measure up to requirements for Farmers Home loans. The rural FHA has approximately 1,700 offices in rural counties throughout the United States and Puerto Rico.

Another provision of the new housing act authorizes the Farmers Home Administration to make short-term loans to non-profit organizations to buy land and develop rural homesteads for sale to lower income home buyers. The act thus broadens a previous authority to finance homestead development for the benefit of "self-help" groups of low-income families who build homes at reduced cost by donating labor to each other. Funding must be provided for the expanded homestead development program.

Mr. Smith said the Farmers Home Administration, which financed about 50,000 new homes for rural families last fiscal year, is working toward an increased goal of 80,000 during the current year ending June 30. The agency expects its rural housing credit to exceed \$850 million in fiscal 1970.

# Narcotics Problem Getting Multiple-Front Attack

Austin, Texas--Texas' increasing narcotics problem is getting a multiple-front attack at the state level.

State Board of Education endorsed two test projects to find the best ways of teaching young Texans about crime, drugs, and driving. Later will be offered in grades five through 12 under a new state law. A two-year study of driver education methods was assigned to the Texas A&M Transportation Institute.

Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin joined in a pledge to declare an "all-out war on drug abuse."

Smith called a meeting of state agency heads and set a February 1 deadline for reports on their plans to fight the use of narcotics and to decide what else can be done.

Agencies represented included State Health Department, Public Welfare Department, College Coordinating Board, Texas Education Agency, University of Texas, Department of Public Safety and Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Governor Smith called the drug use "one of the most serious

problems that confront the people of this state today."

Barnes urged local grand juries to conduct their own investigations and to bring such cases to a prompt trial.

A 24-month project will develop teaching materials for a public school course on crime and narcotics.

Initial training of 2000 teachers will begin in February. Model programs will be tested in public schools, 1971-72. Universities, schools, regional education centers and community groups will help with course development work.

Voters Signing Up-- About 1,347,040 Texans had registered to vote in the 12 most populous counties by Jan. 1, State Democratic Executive Committee reports.

SDEC says the medium-metropolitan counties have shown only a slight increase in registrations during the last 30 days. This group of 23 counties enrolled 282,851 or 35.9 per cent of a potential 676,680. Same counties a month ago had signed up 230,764.

Some SDEC statistics bore out, some contradicted the warning of U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough that registration is greatest in Republican and conservative counties.

Greatest percentage of registration in any big county, said SDEC, is Jefferson, a liberal Democratic stronghold where 75.9 per cent of a possible 90,609 already have enrolled. Sign-up in liberal Bexar County is 62.8 per cent of quota but conservative Dallas registers 70 per cent and Harris 69.3 per cent.

Midland County in medium bracket has 73.7 per cent registration, Brazoria 90.2 per cent. Midland is key conservative area.

SDEC, through its "Operation: Everybody" is offering awards to counties which meet registration quotas. Welfare Rolls Grow-- Assistance payments totalling \$364,673,953 went to Texans on public welfare rolls during fiscal 1969, Department of Public Welfare reports.

About 25 per cent of this, or \$90.4 million, medical aid payments \$147.9 million, aid to blind \$36.3 million and aid to permanently and totally disabled \$13.4 million.

More than 161.7 pounds of commodities valued at \$45.8 million went to 1.4 million participants, and \$7 million worth of food stamps were issued.

Average Texas old age assistance payment is \$59.25 a month, 15th from lowest in nation. Average monthly aid to needy families with dependent children comes to \$76.20, compared with top (New Jersey) of \$266.50. Texas AFDC payment is fifth lowest among states.

Economy Strong--Year end reports by state agencies boast of strong economy and record breaking industrial development during 1969.

Texas Employment Commission says the labor force continues to grow rapidly. Employment went up four per cent from 1968, and the unemployment rate (averaging 2.6 per cent) was lower than for any period recorded by TEC.

Industrial development reached a new high. But what happened in 1969 was just a "drop in bucket" to what can be expected in the future, reported Texas Industrial Commission Executive Director James Harwell.

TIC reports an estimated 350 new plants located in Texas last year, compared with 291 in 1968. About 465 plants reported expansions of facilities. Most of the activity was in the chemical, metal and transportation industries.

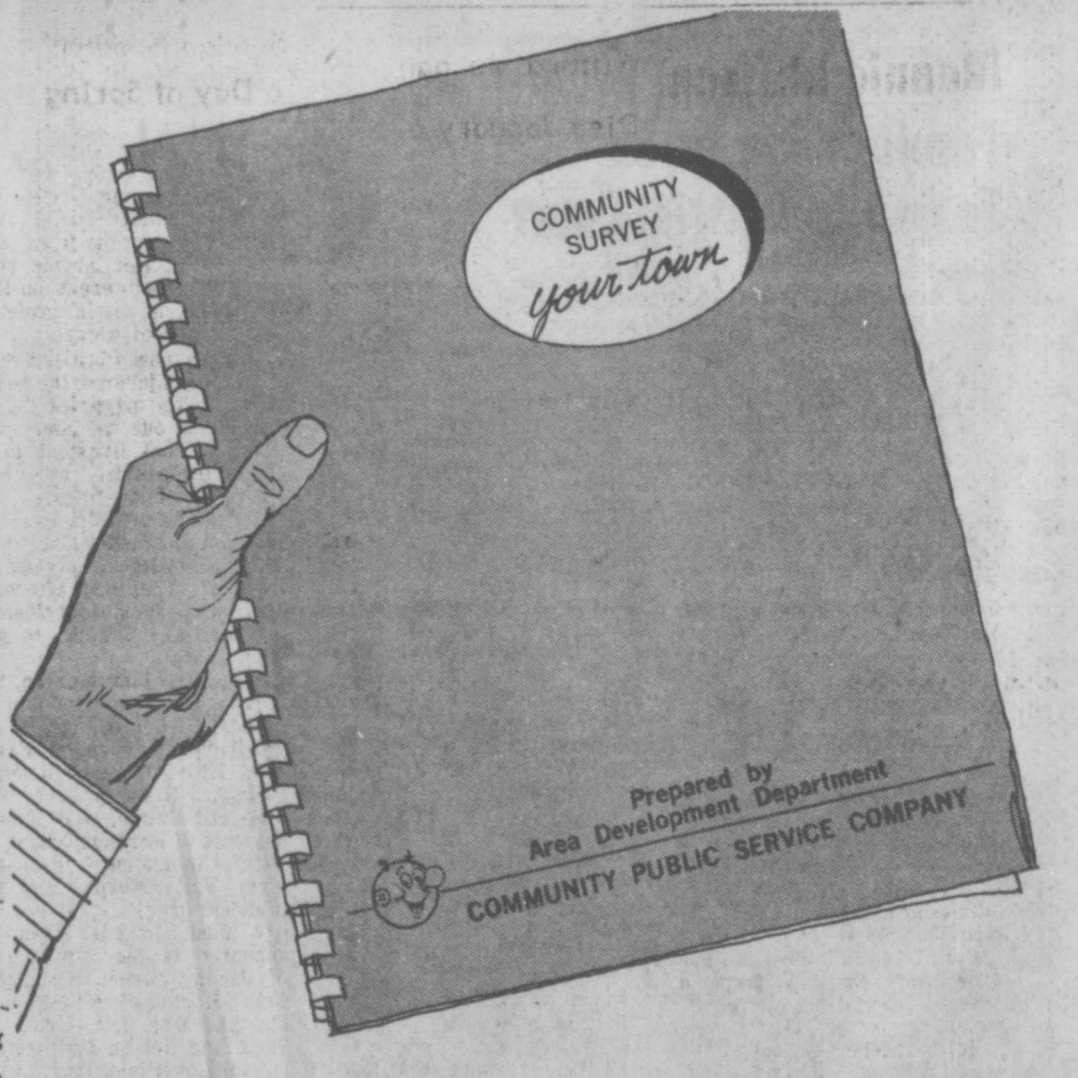

Over two hundred guests were greeted from 2 to 5 p.m., with 52 being out-of-town guests. The home was decorated throughout with gold and white

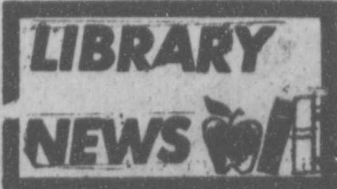

## SCULPTURE, ECONOMICS OF ART DISCUSSED AT WOMEN'S FORUM

The Woman's Forum met Monday at the studio of the Gatesville Art Club. Since the subject of the program dealt with Art, members brought paintings and sculptured objects of their own or friends.

Mrs. George Painter spoke on the subject of "Sculpture, A Complex Art." She told how art developed around the religious life of cultures and their superstitions. The original meaning of the word "sculpture" meant to cut. Sculpture tells us about ancient cultures and what they believed. As far back as the Paleolithic Age amulets carved of bone and ivory were used in connection with burial ceremonies. During the Middle Ages the people became concerned with life af-

ter death, so sculpture followed this idea. In India and China sculpture was used to aid meditation and contemplation of the acts of their gods.

Works of sculpture have been found dating back to 500 B.C. in Africa. Pre-Columbian olmec type sculpture has been found carved by the Inca Indians on the southern coast of the Gulf of Mexico. Tribal Indian cultures have been traced through masks and totem poles found in the Pacific northwest in Canada and the United States.

Sculpturing is done with wood, stone, marble, clay, wax, and other pliable materials. One of the qualities to appreciate in sculpture is its volume, mass

or three-dimensional effect which can be viewed from any side.

Mrs. Painter gave the interesting history of how the gigantic monument was carved on Stone Mountain near Atlanta, Georgia, of Jefferson Davis, Robert E. Lee, and Andrew Jackson. This work was begun in 1915 and is to be dedicated sometime in 1970. Another interesting work being done is in the Black Hills of South Dakota where a man, his wife, and ten children are carving a Sioux Indian Chief on his horse. This work is called "Crazy Horse" and was begun ten years ago. In order to finance the sculpture, a fee is charged to watch the people at work.

Mrs. C.H. Wallace spoke on the subject of "Art As An Investment." She told of the economics involved in art collecting. Some people put money into paintings and works of art instead of bank accounts since the value of paper money fluctuates while art works usually increase in value. She gave as an example Norton Simon, a Californian industrialist, who bid on a famous Renoir painting over the telephone for \$1,550,000.

The acquiring of art works, however, is no longer just for the royalty and rich. Long ago artists were often not appreciated until after they were gone. Now many are discovered while still able to give of their talent. Mrs. Wallace brought out the fact in concluding that most people, however, want art for the pleasure it brings, rather than as a financial investment.

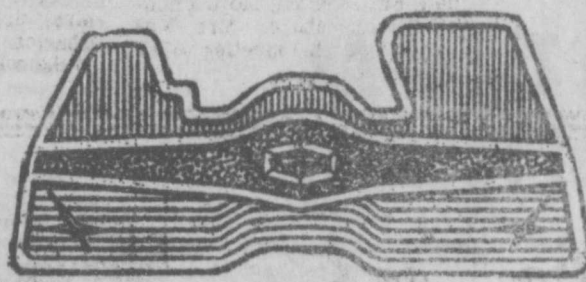

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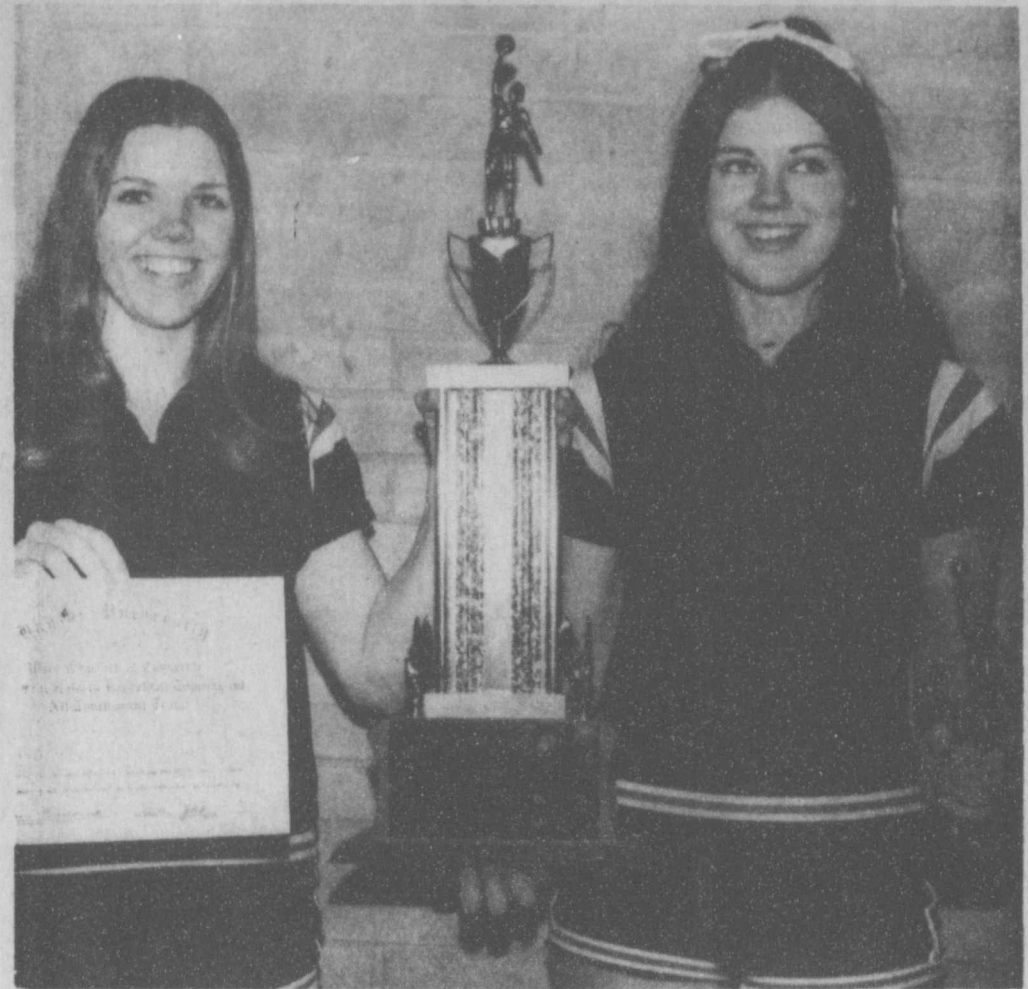

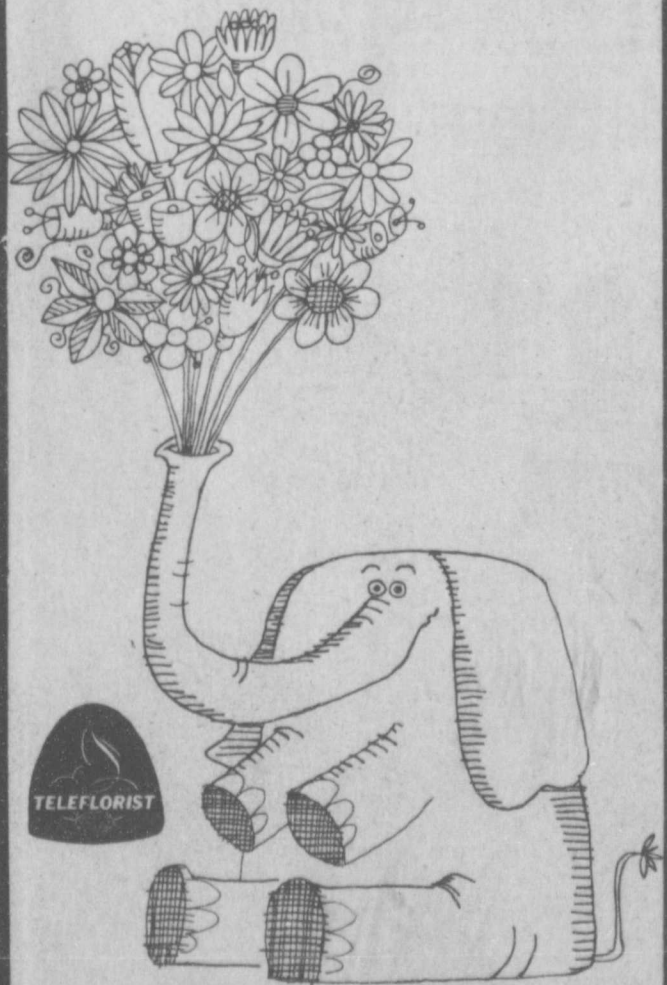

### HEALTH AND SCIENCE SHORTS

A two-day conference held at the New York Academy of Sciences dealt with a common problem that is often taken lightly, but is a frequent source of human distress: gastrointestinal gas. It has been found that 70 per cent of this problem is caused by swallowed air. People swallow air when they eat too fast or are emotionally upset. Only 30 per cent can be attributed to bacterial fermentation and food ingredients.

Dr. Jerome E. Weiss of New York City, a specialist addressing the Academy meeting, said that the distressing symptoms of distention and bloating are effectively relieved by Phazyme, a drug that contains digestive enzymes and simethicone, a specially activated defoaming agent that disperses masses of air bubbles.

Prudent exposure to the ultraviolet rays of summer sunlight has been found to help relieve psoriasis, a common skin problem. Also helpful is a daily tub bath in warm water to which a soothing bath oil has been added. And, to soften skin and speed healing, a modern version of a remedy that was known to the ancient Greeks is recommended by doctors. Called Alphasyl, it combines a refined coal-tar extract with allantoin in a nonstaining cosmetic cream and lotion.

"Puppy dog dermatitis" may be the doctor's diagnosis when a child has an otherwise unexplainable outbreak of itchy rash. An Indianapolis dermatologist, Dr. Arthur L. Norins, explains that problems arise when mites—often found on fondled puppies, take up residence on humans and reproduce. The physician, reporting in the *American Journal of Diseases of Children*, cites other recently published studies, including one by two army doctors. They prescribed for dog and for humans, an all-over, head-to-toe application of gamma benzene hexachloride lotion (Kwell).
