

# **Highway 36 Public Hearing** Set For Thursday April 16

A public hearing on the pro-posed route for the Highway 36 by-pass will be held Thursday April 16 at 11:00 a.m. in the County Courthouse.

The hearing is open to all interested citizens. A Highway Department announcement recently noted "Written statements and other exhibits may be submitted to the resident engineer's office, but must be received no later than ten days after the public hearing." County Judge, Norman Storm
