Dignitaries Inspect New Library Facility



Texas State Library representatives, city officials, library board members, and Friends of the Library gave final approval of the new modern Gatesville Public Library building Wednesday afternoon. The officials tour occurred just three days prior to Na-

tional Library Week, April 12-18.

The new facility, star of an ugly duckling story, was formerly a vacant garage and storage building for city equipment. The Barrett Construction Company of Waco held the library building contracts with a \$76,843 bid. New furnishings and equip-

ment valued at \$9,306 will arrive May 1. The new facility may be operational by mid-May.

The formal opening of the library will be staged by the Friends of the Library during Gatesville's Centennial Week in August.

Highway 36 Public Hearing Set For Thursday April 16

A public hearing on the proposed route for the Highway 36 by-pass will be held Thursday April 16 at 11:00 a.m. in the County Courthouse.

The hearing is open to all interested citizens. A Highway Department announcement recently noted "Written statements and other exhibits may be submitted to the resident engineer's office, but must be received no later than ten days after the public hearing."

County Judge, Norman Storm noted last week that there was no opposition to the proposed highway change viewed.

The Highway Department asked Commissioners Court in mid 1969 to give the go ahead to

secure right of way for the proposed 4.6 mile east loop. The Department is proposing a construction project of a modern two-lane facility at present. Right of way for future expansion into a four-lane divided facility is planned.

Right of way expenses are to be shared by the county and state on a 50-50 basis. Funds were not set up under the 1970 budget to handle the right of way cost.

Maps showing the proposed route are on display at the County Judge's office and at the Senior Residents Engineers Paul Hensler's office on Highway 36.

The proposed loop will route

traffic just east of the present city limits at the intersection of Highway 84 and the proposed route. It swings north and bisects the State School for Boys between Sycamore and Terrace schools.

The proposed route intersects with Highway 36 on the north approximately 1000 feet northwest of the present intersection of Highway 36 and FM 215. On the south the proposed route intersects Highway 36 at the curve just southeast of the city limits.

The route presently does not interfere with any building or homes.

Missing Receipts Sought

Hornets Take Fourth At 13AAA Track Meet

"We had a good effort by all our boys" said Coach James Christopher following the district 13AAA Tract Meet in Tay-

lor. The Hornets finished fourth place with 76 1/2 points behind Taylor 103, Del Valle 95, and Belton 86 points.

The Hornets picked up regional births with Steve Palmer Larry Moore, and Gary Kafer. The three boys took either first or second in their event to qualify for regional competition. Palmer won second in the pole vault with a 12 foot vault, Larry Moore picked up second with a 10.1 second run in the 100 yard dash, and Gary Kafer notched another record in the high jump with 6' 5 1/2" for first in the high jump.

The Hornets team effort was displayed in almost all events as individual began setting personal records in each event. Behind Palmer in the pole vault the Hornets picked up big points with Steve Brazier with 11'6", good for fourth place. A surprise performer was fresh man Leslie Stewart, who vaulted 11 feet and picked up a tie for fifth in the event. Stewart can become an outstanding vaulter for the Hornets.

Chris Bone picked up third place in the discus with a 138 foot 7 inch toss. Bone was a hopeful to pick up second against Belton's two top weight men, Bartek and Brown.

The Hornet 440 yard relay team knocked .5 of a second off their best time, but still managed only third place behind the speedy Del Valle and Lockhart runners. Coach Christopher seemed surprised that such a fine performance was topped. Don Rogers, Moore Billy Hord, and Ray Ortega make up the fine sprint relay squad for the Hornets.

In the high hurdles Gary Kafer picked up third place with 15.1 seconds and Mike Williams picked up fourth with a 15.4 second time. This event was another near qualification spot for the Hornets.

In the 100 yard dash Ray Ortega picked up fifth place with .3 of a second behind Moore with a 10.4

Moore was unable to recover in time to run the 40 yard dash and picked up fourth with a 51.9 second run.

Williams was a double point getter in the hurdle events when he picked up sixth place in the 330 intermediate hurdle with a time of 43.4 seconds.

Sophomore miler, William Ayers knocked nine seconds off his best time running a 4:46 mile. The young miler picked up third place for the Hornets and will be the man to reckon with for the next two years at the mile.

Regional Qualifiers

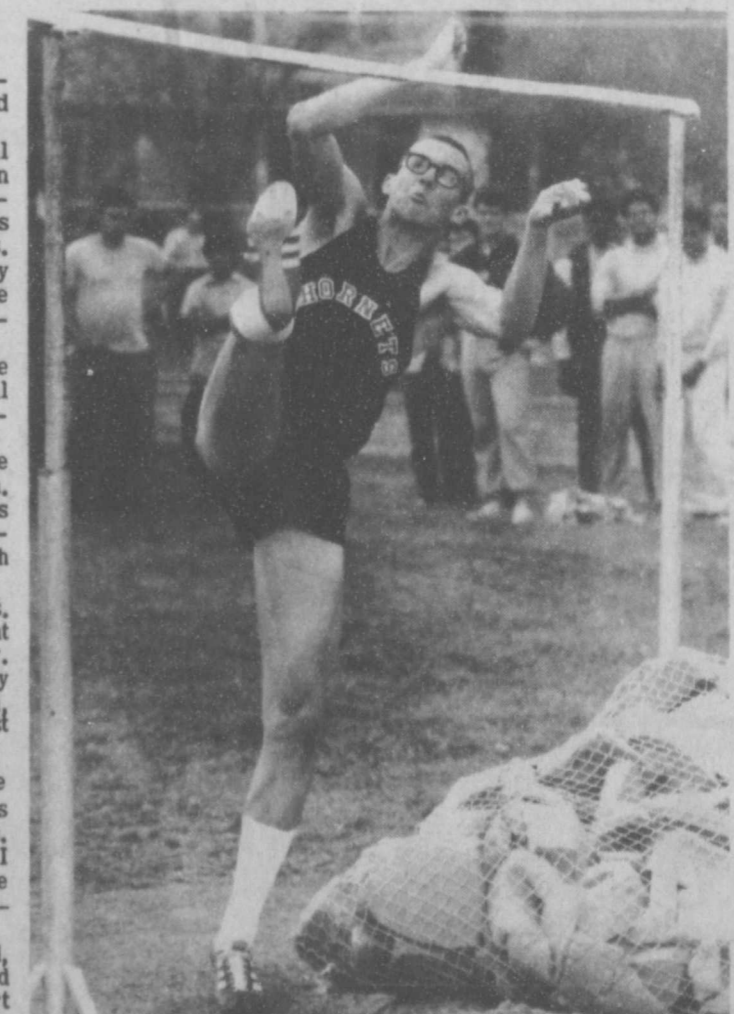
Three Hornet tracksters have qualified for regional competition by way of first or second place finished in the District 13 AAA meet in Taylor Friday.

Steve Palmer, Larry Moore, and Gary Kafer qualified in the pole vault, 100 yard dash and high jump, respectively. Palmer's vault of 12 feet was good for second place behind Taylor's fine vaulter who set a new meet record at 13 feet. Larry Moore, top springer for the Hornets, took second in the 100 yard dash with a 10.1 second time. Moore was the Hornet hope in the 440 yard

dash, however, the 100 dash and the 440 dash are back to back events in district and Moore was unable to recover and run better than third in the 440.

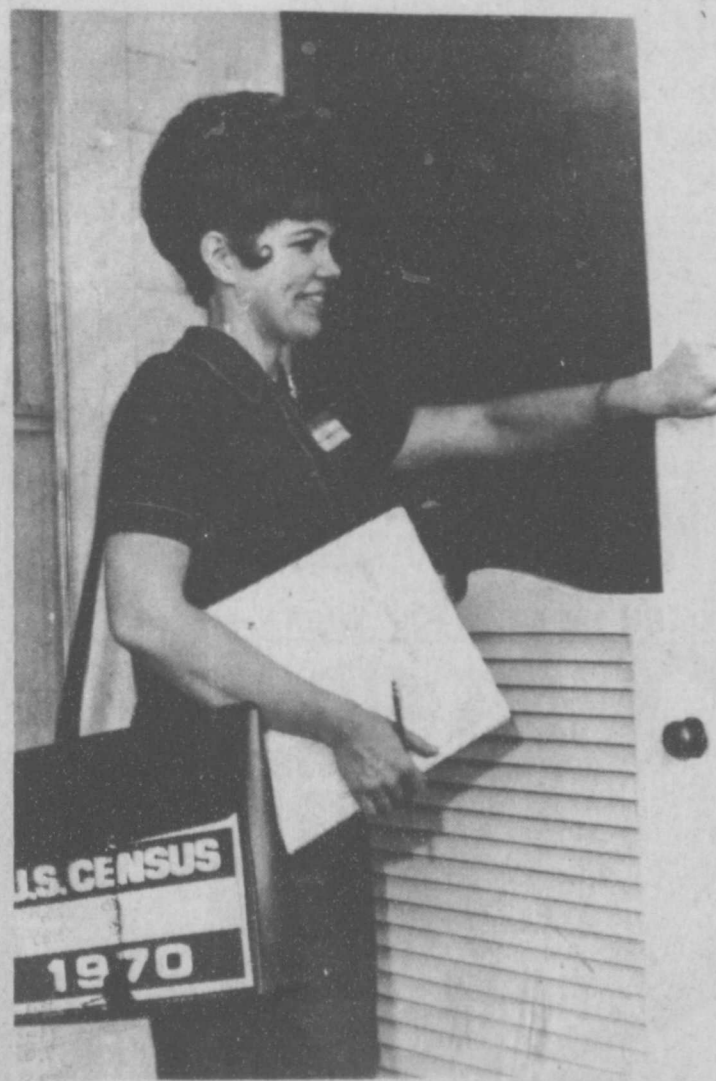
Gary Kafer cleared 6 foot 5 1/2 inches on his first try at the height and no one could stay with him as he set a new district record for the event.

Arnolds Witness Chartering Of Unique Lion's Club

Veteran Lion Bob Arnold of Gatesville was among the hundreds of Texas national and international Lion's Club notable attending the charter meeting of the world's first Lion's Club for the deaf and dumb in Austin Tuesday night. The new club, composed entirely of deaf members will be called Emphata Lion's Club, Lion's International Presi-

dent Dick Bryan of Cleveland, Ohio, was guest speaker at the Villa Capri Inn chartering of this unique club.

Lionism has climbed to the one million members listed on the international fellowship's roll, said Arnold. Over 24,000 clubs are now organized around the globe.

Mrs. Arnold accompanied her husband to the charter meeting.

Householders in the Gatesville area are having little difficulty in recognizing enumerators for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing, said Mrs. Homer L. Davis, Jr. Coryell county census crew leader. Enumerators, or census takers began making their rounds April 1 and are expected to finish their visits during the month of April.

"About one third of the census work in the county is finished," Mrs. Davis said, "and we hope to complete our count in about two weeks at best." The enumerator force in the county is made up of 17 workers two of whom are men. Each census taker wears a red, white and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. The tag also bears the worker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep all census information strictly confidential.

Some residents have resented the census questionnaire and have been reluctant to complete their blanks, the census chief added.

"We need the complete cooperation of all county residents to complete our information survey. We are simply doing our job in the most efficient way possible and remind Coryell County residents that all information is kept confidential.

The local force contacts approximately 30 households per day. "If we haven't arrived at your home yet—don't discard the blanks. We will be there," Mrs. Davis concluded.

At most homes, the enumerator will simply ask for the questionnaire, check it for completeness and continue on her round. Each fifth residence will be asked additional questions.

County Candidates To Speak At Rally

"Things are going to get worse, unless we plan and fight a war against drug abuse in Texas," Gov. Preston Smith told the Conference on Public Health and Drugs.

Noting that in the past 10 years "arrests of teenagers for drug abuse increased 800 per cent," Smith urged the conference to come up with new means of controlling and preventing drug problems, as well as reviewing what is being done.

"We need to examine penalties," he said.

"The drug offender who is caught is often very young. He may have been pressured into experimentation with drugs.

"Yet, within the legal machinery, his punishment can be as severe as that of a dope pusher, or seller.

"Is this fair? Or is it out of proportion with the crime?" Smith asked.

Earlier, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, accompanied by newsmen, law officers and government officials-toured drug treatment and mental health facilities over the state. On the trip, Barnes

proposed a State drug center near a medical school for treatment, rehabilitation and research.

Later, Barnes joined Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin at the meeting of the Crime and Narcotics Advisory Committee with the Texas Education Agency to hear what plans the agency has developed for teaching a course on the dangers of drugs and crime, as required by the last Legislature.

Speaking to the meeting, Martin expressed concern over the increasing use of heroin, which he said is becoming a major problem.

Involving young people in the program will be necessary if it is successful, the Atty. Gen. said, because "no program of narcotics control can ever be effective unless the young people themselves want it to be effective."

REGISTRATION - A record total of 4,150,645 Texans are qualified to vote during the primary and general elections this year. Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. reported that count as the

State Chief Election officer. Statewide total is almost 80,000 more than in the 1968 presidential year.

Metropolitan area county registrations rose dramatically from 1969. Harris County (Houston) alone accounted for 650,612 of the votes, Dallas 466,925 and Bexar (San Antonio) 260,225.

Dies said he is confident new procedures for registration and various drives by groups produced the record sign-up, which he had predicted, even though 1970 is a non-presidential year.

have had the entire Wheatley property-with wild game, river frontage, waterfalls, fish and stands of trees- absolutely free eight years ago. Deal fell through when the legislature failed to provide the requested \$250,000 for development.

Meanwhile, the Governor has requested federal study of possible release of the Matagorda Island military installation in Calhoun County for recreational purposes.

ROAD DEVELOPMENT ASKED- South Texas highway boosters called on the Highway Commission for \$150.8 million worth of highway developments ranging over 1,275 miles during the next decade.

Projects are in District 15 which includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Guadalupe, Kendall, Kerr, LaSalle, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties.

Delegation urged state expenditures of \$146.5 million for construction and \$4.2 million for right-of-way in "Plan for '70's." About \$87.9 million of the total would go to farm to market roads.

Long range plan does not include interstate projects, those programmed for later construction or strictly urban facilities.

COURTS SPEAK- Supreme Court set an April 29 hearing on the question whether a businessman can collect damages for libel if a credit rating agency puts out an incorrect report that he has filed for bankruptcy. A Midland businessman brought suit against Dun & Bradstreet which corrected its error.

High Court heard arguments on the question of whether the residence of the district superintendent of the Methodist Church conference is tax exempt. Also booked for hearing is the tax-exempt status of officially-declared historic sites.

Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the life sentence for robbery by assault given a Lubbock man, despite expert testimony he was mentally retarded.

Uncorroborated testimony of one who may have been an accomplice cannot be used alone to sustain a conviction for possession of marijuana, Court of Criminal Appeals held.

Lawsuits have been filed in federal court in El Paso to force district courts, courts of civil appeals and justice of the peace courts redistricting in line with the one-man one-vote ruling of the U.S. Supreme Court.

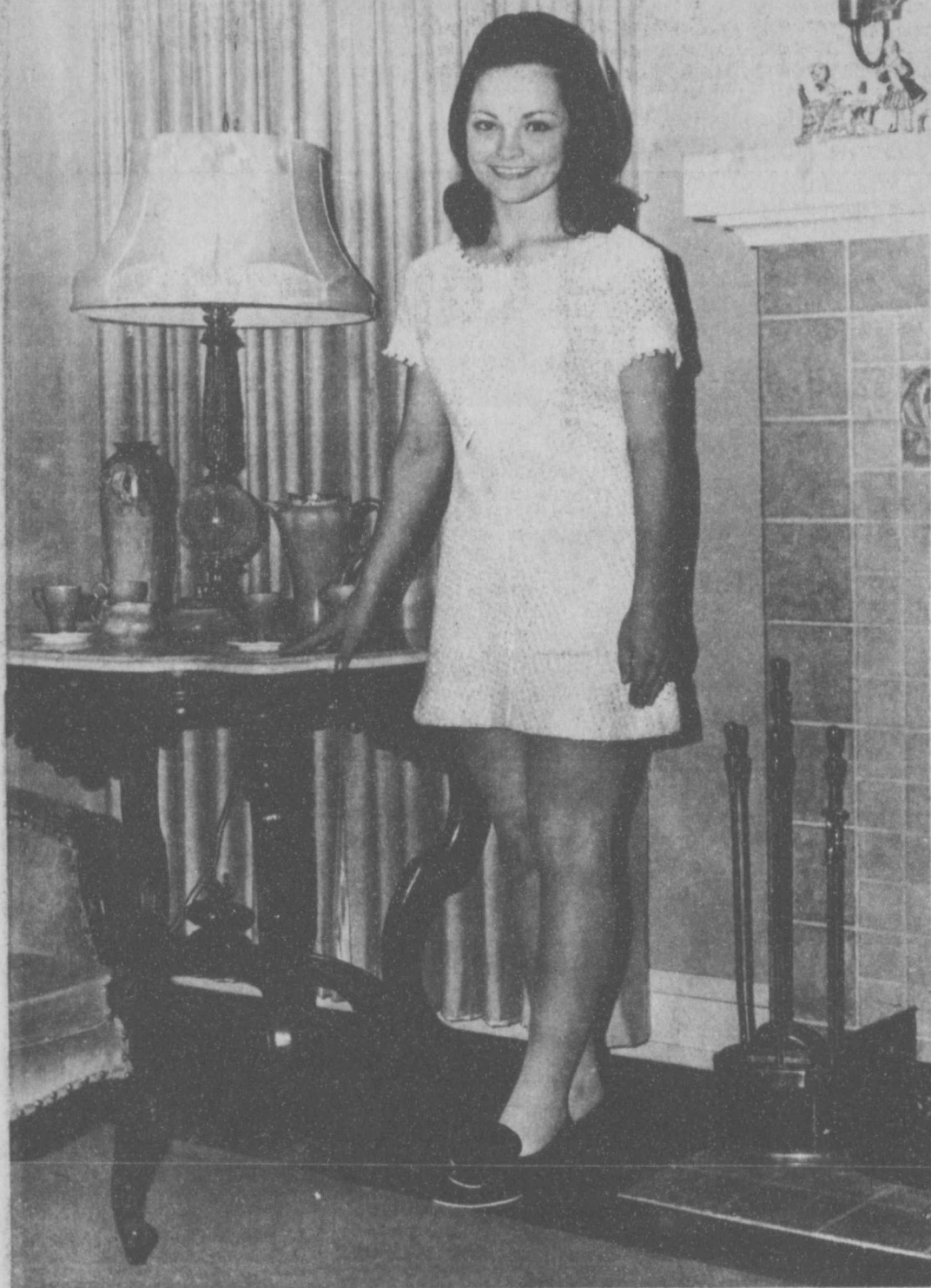

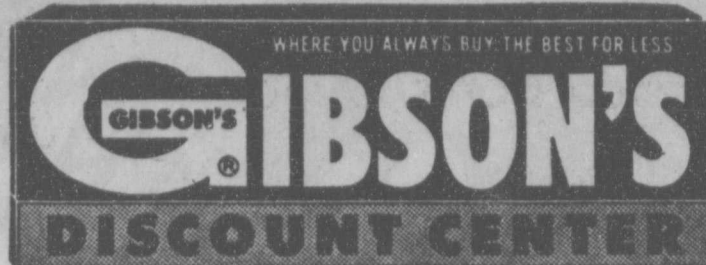

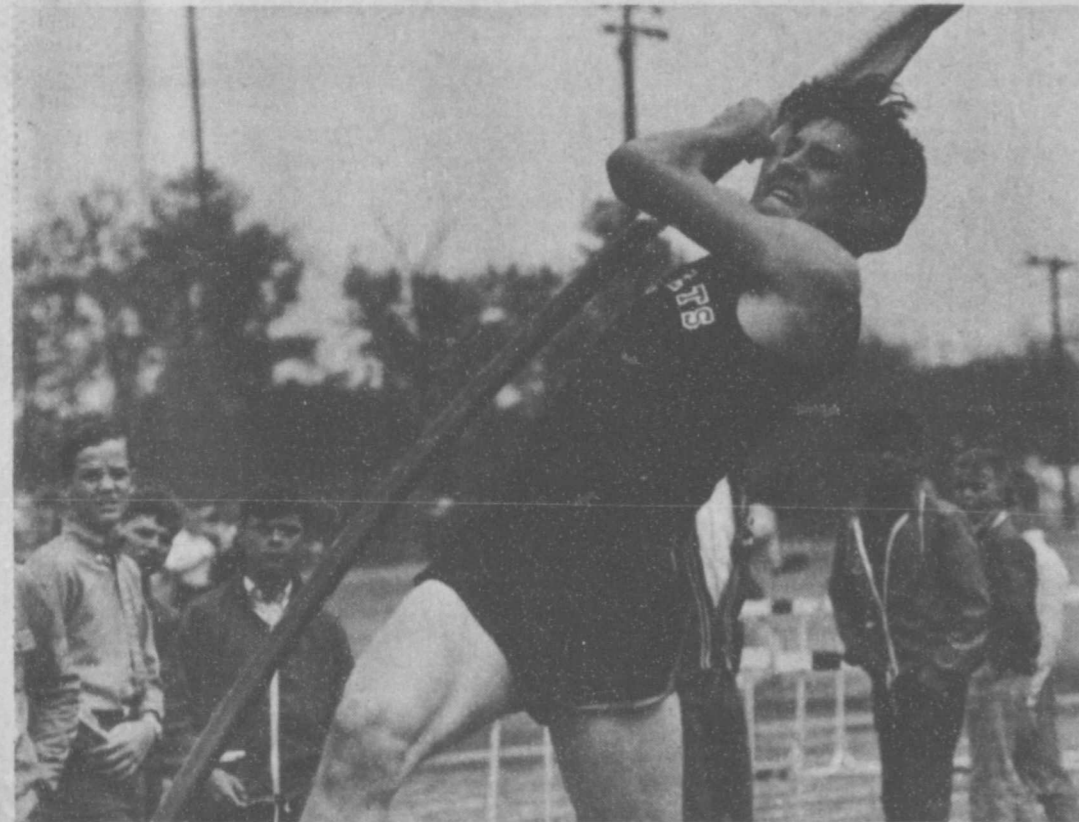
