



## Election Interest Increases In County

Political anxiousness and excitement has begun to increase over the county as the Saturday May 2 Democratic Primary is less than a week away.

Local political races plus state and national contest of interest to Coryell County has stirred up voter interest.

Evidence of the political interest can be seen in absentee voting where 48 personal appearance votes had been cast by the close of business Friday at the County Clerks office.

Clerk, Rebel Henson, indicated that 45 ballots had been mailed out to persons requesting ballots. Henson estimates that 80% of the mailed out ballots will be returned to his office in time to be counted in the election.

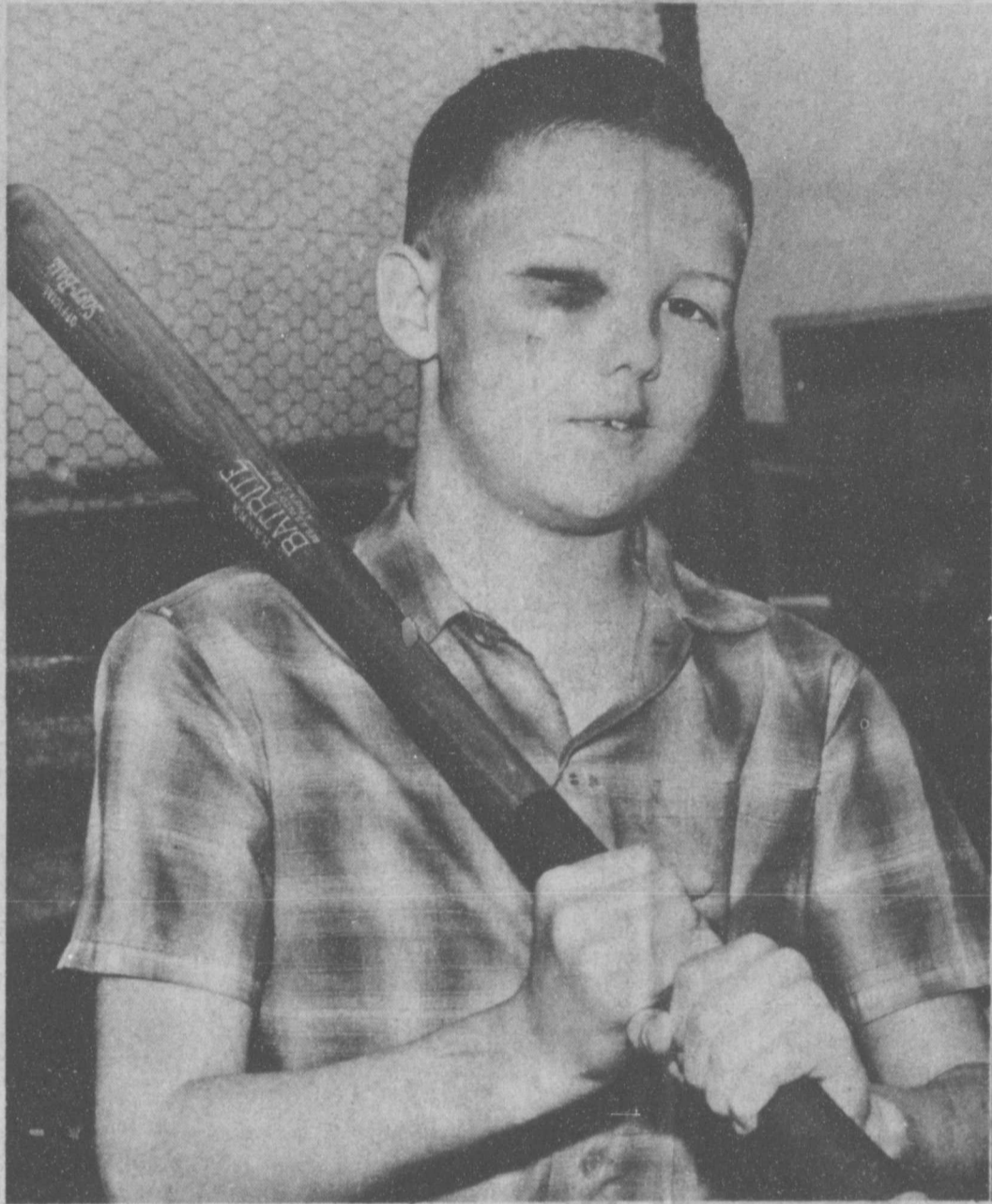
Henson reminded voters that Tuesday was the last day for personal appearance voting and the last day he could accept request for mail out ballots. Mail ballots can be accepted from persons with a medical excuse and persons post marking their request from outside of Coryell County. Ballots mailed out must be in the County Clerks office by absentee county time at 1:00 p.m. Saturday. Henson noted that in reality ballots must be in the 8:00 a.m. Saturday mail or sooner to be counted.

The local political scene includes three county wide races. The County judge office has developed into a two man race between incumbent Norman Storm and Doug Smith. Incumbent W.H. (Bill) Donaldson has Morris Bell as an opponent in the County School Superintendent race. The other county wide race is for County Treasurer with incumbent Mrs.

Leona Fowler and Mrs. Vesta Leonard the candidates for the office.

Precinct races have developed for Commissioners in two beats. A two man race will be decided in Precinct 4 with incumbent Cleo Carrol and George Jageler seeking the post. A five way race has developed for Commissioner Precinct 2. Cloyce Duncan is the present Commissioner and is seeking his first elected term as Commissioner. Candidates for the post include Duncan, Lee Roy Hairston, Luke Austin, Earl Bond, and Lonnie Dossie.

Absentee voting is heavy in the most populous voting precincts, however, Precincts 2 and 4 have shown definite signs of increased voting activity; Precinct 1 has 1 absentee vote, Precinct 2 has 31 absentee votes, Precinct 3 has 12 votes; and Precinct 4 has 28 votes.

## Census Office Asks "Were You Counted In Census '70?"

Were you counted in Census '70?

With the 1970 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Manager Robert C. Ford announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

If you think you or your family might have been missed, you are urged to notify the census district office by means of a "Were You Counted?" form. Area newspapers are printing these forms in their current editions as a public service. Prompt mailing of the "Were You Counted?" forms

will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures giving the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties will be issued as soon as the District Manager is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued from Washington later this year after returns have been tabulated by the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the District Manager. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must

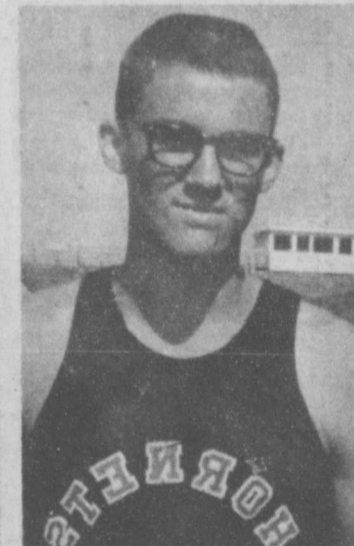
stand as official until the next Federal census.

"Representation in the U.S. Congress and the State Legislature is determined by the population count as ascertained in the census. Federal funds are allotted to States and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means under representation in the Federal and State law-making bodies and under allotment in government funds. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," he said.

## Kafer Makes State With 6'2" Jump

Gary Kafer jumped into the State Meet in Austin this week with a winning jump of 6'2" at the Regional Meet in Corpus Christi.

It was Kafer's lowest jump of the season but still good enough to capture first place in the high jump. Coach James Christopher noted that 6'2" was Kafer's first less than satisfactory performance. Christopher then hesitated and added "How can we call his performance less than satisfactory

Field competition was completed Friday night and Gatesville's other field man, Steve Palmer, fell short of qualifying for State as he cleared 11'6" in the pole vault. Palmer is a junior competitor and should return next season and improve his skills at the pole vault.

Christopher noted Saturday morning that Larry Moore was ready for the 100 yard dash which was scheduled for Saturday night. Christopher noted the track was fast and in good shape. Moore will need to repeat his 9.8 second performance of last Saturday to pick up a State Meet berth.

Sammy maintains his high class standing and works as a Distributive Education Student stationed at Powell Chevrolet in the parts department.

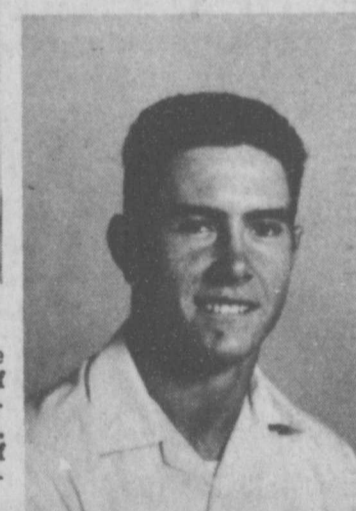

The Baylor Opera Workshop will combine with the Baylor Oratorio Chorus and the Baylor Symphony Orchestra to present the opera in Waco Hall on the Baylor campus. Performances will be at 8:15 p.m.

The Baylor production of the Swiss-American composer's only opera already has attracted national attention since the opera has never been in this part of the world. The opera has been performed only once before in the United States several years ago on the West Coast.

The opera is closely related to the text of the Shakespearean tragedy, with only minor cuts by the composer in order that the opera not be too long. The libretto was adapted by Edmond Fleg from the Shakespearean text and re-translated by the composer.

Daniel Sternberg, dean of the Baylor School of Music, is the musical director of the opera. He and his wife, Felicitas Gobi-neau Sternberg, who is the opera's artistic designer and director, have been responsible for all Baylor opera productions for the past two decades.

In so doing, it is my hope that we can begin to build a process which will result in truly responsive government at all levels.

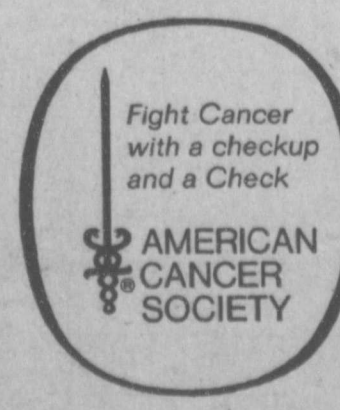
Because of our faith in voluntary cooperation among elected officials and interested citizens at the local level, a significant increase in State funding to regional councils of governments was approved by the 61st Legislature at my request. I commend you for your pro-

### RALPH YARBOROUGH'S WASHINGTON REPORT

In the years after World War II we trusted the Soviets not to participate in aggressive acts and we drastically reduced our Armed Forces. The results during succeeding years were powerful pressures on Greece and Turkey intensified subversive activities in Italy and France, the Berlin Blockade, and encouragement for North Korea to commit outright unprovoked aggression on South Korea. These results were all encouraged if not actually directed by the Kremlin and these actions forced us to re-arm.

The Soviets have had ample opportunities to prove by their actions that they are not attempting to achieve a Communist-dominated world. They could encourage North Vietnam to settle the war in Southeast Asia through negotiations. They could have a significant effect in encouraging North Vietnam to observe the Geneva Accords on humane treatment for Prisoners of War. There are innumerable other actions the Soviet Union could take in other parts of the world which would firmly indicate that they are honestly seeking peace. They have executed none of the possibilities. They have said that they want peace, but their every act has indicated that they would be willing to risk peace to achieve world supremacy if they could be assured of success.

This does not mean that we should not explore every possibility in our own search for a stable peace. Arms limitation talks is one possibility that should be fully explored. It does mean that any arms limitation agreement with the Soviets must be coupled with a means to guarantee that the Soviets will live up to the agreement.

The Soviets have a marked propensity for signing agreements when it is to their own advantage and then breaking those agreements as soon as such action will further their own interests. We can only expect them to do the same again, if we let them. It has been argued that our development and deployment of a defensive Anti-Ballistic Missile system will lead to another round of arms escalation.

Last year, the Congress approved the first step in providing the Safeguard ABM system. While debate on that issue ensued, our efforts to get the Soviets to agree to come to a negotiating table and discuss arms limitation were fruitless. But shortly after the Congress approved Safeguard, the Soviets

agreed to discuss arms limitation. This year, the Congress will decide whether to take another step in development and deployment of the safeguard system.

I believe it is crucial that the Congress grant that authority even while arms limitation talks are proceeding. We cannot expect our negotiators to find success in dealing with the Soviets while simultaneously denying them the opportunity of negotiating from the strongest possible position. The Soviets have never appreciated weakness. They cannot be expected to agree to arms limitation out of a sense of pure good will. We can only expect success in limiting the development, deployment and use of nuclear arms if the Soviets find that it is in their own best interest to agree to do so.

Any action taken by Congress to proceed with deployment of Safeguard could be easily halted in the event of an arms limitation agreement covering that aspect of our defense.

But if we deny our negotiators the opportunity to deal from strength, success in effective arms limitation may escape us. We could find ourselves further down the road toward ever more awesome nuclear weaponry, and the goal of a stable world peace would then be further from attainment.

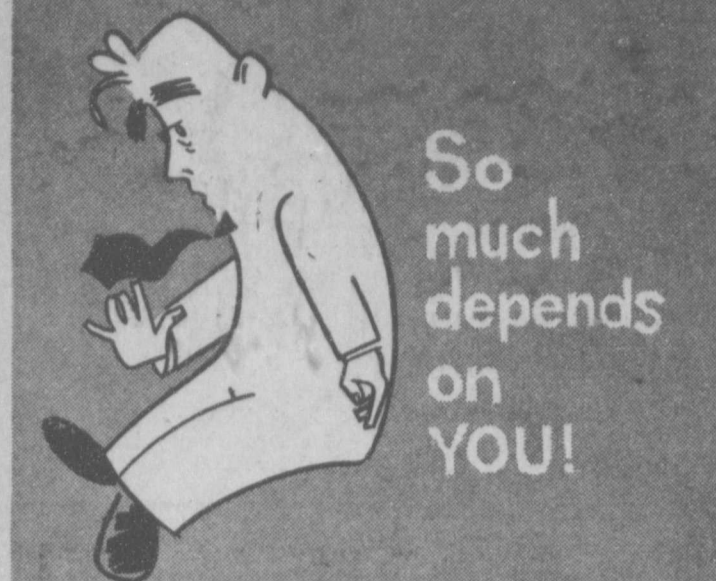

"Behold, the Lord stood upon a wall made by a plumbline, with a plumbline in his hand. And the Lord said to me: 'Amos, what seest thou?' And I said: 'A plumb line.'" Then said the Lord: "Behold, I will set a plumbline in the midst of my people, Israel. I will not again pass by them anymore." Amos 7:7&8.

A plumbline can be a verticle line, going upward, or it can be used as a sounding line, going downward, measuring depths, but it is always perfectly upright, and straight.

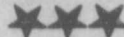

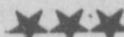

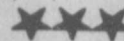

TIME FOR FIRES, FLARE-UPS AND FOOD FUN...Now that the icy wintery weather has tamed a bit into a mild, warm spring season. With the budding of trees, blooming of flowers and all, the American cook abandons his modern, completely equipped kitchen to rough it at the old backyard barbecue pit.

Why, in Heaven's name, with all these conveniences, do good cooks turn to great-grandpa's way of cooking a "delicacy" out of charcoal and hamburger? And delicacy it is! At any Gatesville or county home when smoke rises over the ole pit, mom, the kids and probably a few extras scamper to the backyard to watch "chef-boy-oh-dad" prepare the juicy hamburgers.

Admirers look on as dad, puts the round red objects on the grill—too soon—and cooks the outside black and hard and the inside stays the same. But put this not-so-delicate delicacy on a bun with mayonaisse or mustard, pickle, onion, tomato and lettuce and the family will burst forth with congratulations for dad on his great cooking.

I saw some tips for fine charcoal cooking artistry and can't help but pass them on to you.

1. Use good charcoal, either natural or briquettes. Briquettes burn longer but charcoal in its natural state generates more heat.

2. To start fire, pile charcoal in pyramid and pour igniter fluid on top to saturate briquettes. Light fire and allow to spread over pyramid. You will find you will have to move coals around as one side will burn faster than the other.

3. Let the coals burn until they are entirely covered with white ash. If you put the meat on the grill while some black is still showing on the briquettes you may get a funny taste in the meat.

4. After the coals burn down to the white ash stage, move them into a single layer on the fire pan, leaving about half an inch of space between the coals. This allows for good circulation of air and lots of oxygen and that is what makes the coals hotter.

5. Raise the fire as close to the grill as possible. Lay the meat, steak or hamburger on the grill and sear it on one side. Turn and sear on other. Then lower grill and allow steak to cook to desired doneness.

6. Never use a fork in turning any meat. This releases the juice. You sear the meat to seal in the juices so if you stick a fork in the meat, you are defeating the purposes of the fast searing.



Lemon Meringue — Man's Pie

If you are new to making Lemon Meringue Pie then a point to remember is that if you want a strong lemon flavor add more lemon rind rather than lemon juice.

### Lemon Meringue Pie

1 cup sugar  
1/4 cup corn starch  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups water  
3 eggs, separated

### Lemon Meringue Pie

2 tablespoons margarine  
1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind  
1/2 cup lemon juice  
1 baked 9-inch pastry shell  
Mix 1/2 cup of the sugar, corn starch and salt in double boiler top. Gradually stir in water. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until thick enough to mound slightly when dropped from spoon. Cover; cook 10 minutes longer, stirring occasionally. Do not remove from boiling water. Combine egg yolks and 1/2 cup of the sugar. Blend a little hot mixture into egg yolk mixture, then stir all into remaining mixture over boiling water. Gently stir in margarine, lemon rind and juice. Cool to room temperature without stirring. Turn filling into prepared pastry shell. Spread a 3 egg white meringue around edge of filling first, touching crust all around; then fill in center. Bake in 425 F. (hot) oven for about 5 minutes or until the meringue is lightly browned. Cool at room temperature away from drafts.

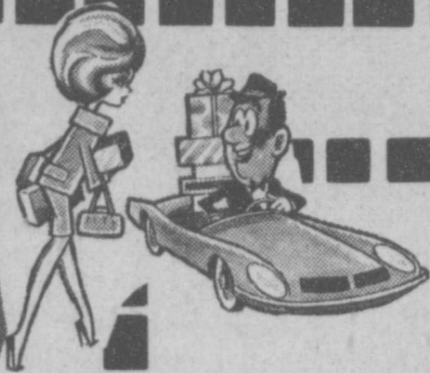

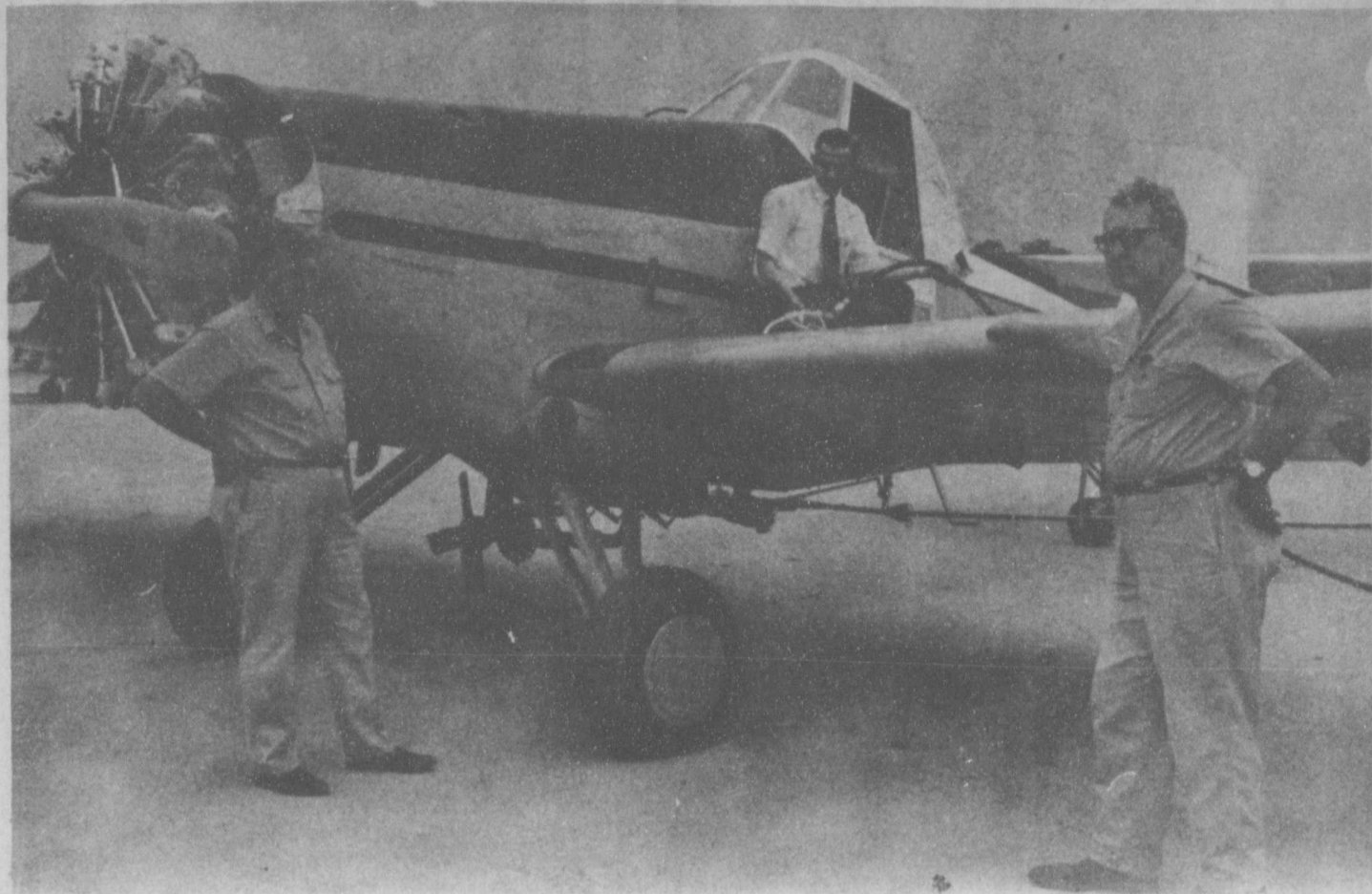

# Washington Views and News

Bob Poage

On June sixth 1969 my news letter stated "What I am trying to develop is an atmosphere of cooperation with the Department of Agriculture and the Committee. I believe this is the only way we can hope to pass any legislation."

On September twenty-sixth, referring to the same matter, I stated that "Neither one (the Committee nor the Administration) can hope to get just what we want."

Later in the fall I spoke at Texas A&M and stated that neither the Republicans nor the Democrats could alone pass a farm bill. I think that with the passing of time it has become even more clear that there is no way of passing a farm bill except with a great deal of give and take on both sides. Over the months we have been able to get Secretary Hardin, on behalf of the Administration to accept much of our viewpoint. To do so we have to accept some of his. Many of the Farm Organizations now indicate that they would rather have no bill. I wish we could get more but all indications are that this is the best we are going to get. In any event it will mean that we will continue to put roughly three billion dollars a year into farm income.

I think we are in a position of the Texas farmer who has gone through a hard, dry, summer; winter is approaching; he has no grass in the pasture, no feed in the barn, and might little water in his tank. He has a herd of cows that he thinks ought to sell for 25¢. Just before the tank goes dry, a buyer comes along and offers him 20¢. Is he going to take it; or is he going to bet it will rain that night?

Those of us who want a farm bill have reached the point where there is no feed in the barn and very little water in the tank. We have the choice of at least getting a great deal of support for a bill (and we may not even be able to pass that), but it would assure our farmers of about three billion dollars a year for three years; or of making a political issue which would make us look like heroes, but which in all probability would leave our farmers in even worse shape than they are now in. Which way do you think I should go?

Yesterday the House voted by 243 to 155 to embark on the so-called guaranteed annual wage. This means a wage paid by the Government, whether the recipient works or not. I think what we need is a guaranteed job for everybody who is capable of working and direct assistance for all those who are not able to work. I know that you will be told that this bill, which had the support of both the Republican and Democrat leadership would require people to work. I challenge you to read the bill and find the provisions that will require this. You will be told that the Committee (Ways and Means) indicated that the bill would cost four and one half billion dollars a year. I submit that within three years the program will be costing three times this much. Every program of this kind has. I voted against it.

There is a state law to stop sales or possession of bombs or dynamite, but the list of exemptions to the law is so broad that almost anyone can fit as a legal dynamite buyer. Attorney General's office is working on a law to curtail the sale of explosives. Proposal will be submitted to the next session of the Legislature.

A bill is in Congress, supported by the Nixon Administration, that also would pose a federal ban on possession.

Our nation renewed discussions with the Soviet Union this week in an effort to find a common ground for the limitation of strategic arms.

I support these talks and I join with all Americans in the hope that they will provide a workable avenue toward a more stable peace in our world.

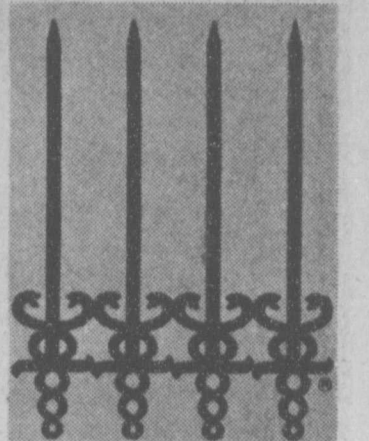
I noted with considerable interest that the Soviet Communist Party Chairman, Leonid Brezhnev, said this week that his country would welcome what he called "a reasonable agreement"; and that he coupled that statement with a promise to match the military might of any other nation in the world.

This is in keeping with the Soviet attitude of the last several decades.

I am not opposed to arms limitation talks, but we must approach such negotiations with the Soviets with our eyes open. We must remember that the Communists have not given us any sound reason to believe that they can now be trusted. And we have certainly learned in the past that they could not be trusted.

In October of 1962, the Soviet Union assured President Kennedy that no Soviet offensive missiles had been installed in Cuba. At the time of this assurance, the President had on his desk conclusive evidence that such missiles had indeed been installed.

## Highlights and Sidelights

Vern Sanford

Experts on moods of the voters think that fewer than half of the 4,100,000 Texans who registered to vote will take part in the primaries, Saturday.

Precinct conventions, also slated for both parties Saturday haven't produced a ripple of controversy.

Since there is no contest for the governor ship in the Democratic primary for the first time since primaries were begun, less attention is being given to statewide races. The Texas Election Bureau is estimating that 1,800,000 Democrats will vote.

Main attention has been going to two contested races, Lloyd Bentsen Jr. of Houston is trying to oust Sen. Ralph Yarborough. State Rep. Bob Armstrong of Austin and Fred Williams of Houston are trying to defeat Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

The Yarborough-Bentsen race has proceeded at a fairly cool level.

Little attention has been paid to the effort of David Brown of Sherman to defeat Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, or to the campaign by Connie Lawson of Taylor against Railroad Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey.

Lawyers are taking an active part in the two high court races, Hawthorne Phillips of Austin, Judge Matt Davis of Texarkana and Judge James G. Denton of Lubbock are seeking an open seat on the Texas Supreme Court

called on the board for aid, including a "tuition equalization program" to place them in a better competitive position with state-supported schools.

Tuition recommendation calls for \$500 a semester fee for out of state students. Junior college local boards would set their own tuitions but not at more than 75% of senior college fees for in-district students or 90% for our of district enrollees.

GRANTS APPROVED- Gov. Preston Smith approved a \$124,996 federal grant to the Kieberg County Community Action Committee in Kingsville.

Grant involved \$4,169 in unexpended funds, making a total of \$129,165 for a 12-month program beginning May 1. Bulk of the funds will go to Neighborhood Service Centers.

Smith earlier approved a \$10,090 state regional planning assistance grant to the Golden Crescent Council of Governments. Council serves Lavaca, Jackson, DeWitt, Goliad, Victoria and Calhoun Counties. It is based in Victoria and includes eight cities and seven special purpose governments.

Texas Criminal Justice Council, meanwhile announced it has \$4.6 million available in action grant money to strengthen law enforcement. Money will be used by the state and allocated to units of general local government to fight crime and improve police work.

EXPLOSIVES- Texas is one of 32 states where anyone can freely buy dynamite from anyone willing to sell it to him.

CONSERVATION GROUP meets- New Texas Conservation Foundation was charged by Governor Smith to work toward providing the state with a top system of parks, scenic points, refuges, scientific and recreational areas.
