member, Choir Musical, and Who's Who '70. He has been a scholarship student in 1967-68; Latin Club

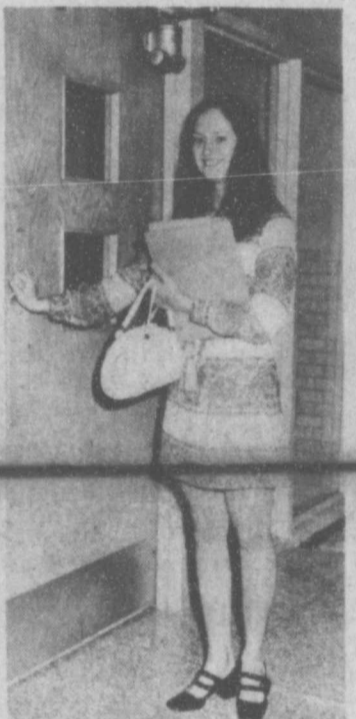

Voting is expected to be brisk in Saturday's Primary Election in Coryell County. The May 2 Democratic Primary will attract most of the attention this year with several county and a close senatorial race slated. Absentee voting has been very heavy in the last two days, Monday and Tuesday. Voting by personal appearance reached 131 by the end of voting with 21 ballots received in the mail, County Clerk, Rebel Henson, noted that 34 ballots had been mailed out that had not returned. He expects as many as 25 more mailed ballots to be returned before absentee counting begins on Saturday.

Henson estimated that 175 absentee ballots would be counted this year. He said "This is the most absentee votes we have ever recorded in a primary election." Henson checked the records Wednesday and noted that the last general election with three major parties seeking the presidency was the only other election to attract more absentee votes. In that November 1968 election 366 absentee ballots were counted. There are 7,709 eligible voters in Coryell County in 1970 with a large concentration of voters in Precincts 2 and 4. Candidates are making last minute campaigns this week in an effort to swing the all important voters into their camp.

Voting in Gatesville will be in three places this year with voting boxes at the County Court house Precinct 2, Gatesville High School Precinct 3, and City Hall Precinct 4. Election Judges at the Gatesville polling stations are Bobby Jones, Jamie Erwin, and Mrs. W.E. Poston.

County Clerk, Henson, noted that some physically disabled persons have asked how to vote during the election. Persons unable to climb steps or leave an automobile can vote in their car in the precinct.

Voter interest does not center around only single political race as five major county races are on the ballot. The County Judge race features incumbent Norman Storm and Doug Smith a Gatesville businessman. Storm is seeking his fourth term in office.

Two other county wide races have developed and will attract many voters, W.H. (Bill) Donaldson, incumbent, and Morris Bell are on the ballot for county school superintendent. Bell has advocated the elimination of the superintendents office. The County Treasurer office also has two candidates with Mrs. Leona Fowler, incumbent, and Mrs. Vesta Leonard both seeking the post.

Two Commissioners races have developed in Precincts 2 and 4. Present office holders in the positions are Cloyce Duncan, Prec. 2 and Cleo Carroll, Prec. 4. Duncan is seeking his first elected term and four of the candidates are seeking the same position. Earl Bond, Lee Roy Hairston, Luke Austin, and Lonnie Dossie join Duncan on the ballot for Commissioner Precinct 2.

Carroll is opposed by George Jagler Jr. for Commissioner Precinct 4.

C.P.S. Installs Street Lights

The Community Public Service will revise the street lighting in the five block area of 26th street to 31st street in the near future. The Company received approval of a lighting plan for the area to improve safety in presently unlighted intersections.

The light company will install 400 watt mercury vapor lights at all five intersections with Highway 84. Two lights are planned for the middle of blocks along 30th and 31st streets. Another light is to be installed at the corner of Jackson Drive and 30th street.

City Manager, Skipper Wallace said "The light company proposal will remedy poor lighting conditions on those streets." A recent one car accident at the corner of 30th and Highway 84 pointed up the need for better lighting in the area.

Lion's Name Rabbe Outstanding Farmer-Rancher

Rabbe was honored as "Outstanding Farmer-Rancher" for the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District at the Wednesday Lions Club Meeting.

Rabbe was given the award by Lions Club President, Paul Bromser. The Lions Clubs all over Texas have been making the award for many years. The award was first started 25 years ago by the Fort Worth Lions Club and since has spread to almost all Lions Clubs.

The Board of Directors of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District made the selection of Rabbe recently.

Rabbe was born and reared in the Coryell City community in the north-eastern part of Coryell county, and attended school at Coryell City. In 1932 he married Miss Elsie Mueller of the Coryell City community. The Rabbe's have two children; Mrs. Pat (Loretta) Henson, and a son, Dennis Mrs. Henson is a graduate of San Marcos State University and is a teacher in Anson, Texas Public Schools. Her husband is District Conservationist in the Soil and Water Conservation District in Jones County. Dennis is a Senior at Texas A&M University and will graduate at the end of the spring semester. The Rabbe's have 3 grandchildren.

Wallace is 58 years old and started farming in 1932, perhaps at the time of the lowest prices for farm products the country has ever seen. He told the writer one story that gives some indication of prices in 1932. He stated that he made an excellent oat crop. When he had finished threshing he was offered only nine cents per bushel for the No. 2 high quality oats. It was his opinion the price was too low, so he stored the oats in his barn. Due to a hard freeze, killing all the oats in 1933 he was able to sell all the seed oats he had for seed at 75¢ per bushel. His first farming operation was on 300 acres. Over the years he has purchased adjoining farms and now owns 740 acres. In the meantime he has erected a spacious modern home with all the modern conveniences that could be found in any city home.

Mr. Rabbe's crop operation consists mainly of milo and small grain on 520 acres. On range and pasture land he grows cattle with a cow and calf operation. He never sells any grain as such. When crops are harvested he determines the amount of grain he has in storage. He also figures out the number of steers he can feed up on the grain he has. If he finds he has feed for fewer cattle, then he sells down to

FARMERS TO RECEIVE ACREAGE SURVEY QUESTIONNAIRE

During the last half of May some 40,000 Texas farmers will receive at their mailboxes a most important questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. County Agent, Don Callahan says it will be the annual acreage survey and that many farmers in Coryell County will be included in the 40,000. The information derived from the replies will be the basis for the official estimates of crop acreage for the State of Texas and for each county. Gary D. Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Reporting Service, emphasizes the importance of getting back just as many of the 40,000 questionnaires as possible so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas Agriculture, Palmer adds.

The Texas Legislature, explains the county agent, has provided a program of estimates for each county. Because Texas covers such a wide area, State totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry; hence the need for county information. The program is a cooperative effort of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture. The county agent urges all farmers in the county who receive the questionnaire to fill it out accurately and completely and return it as soon as possible to the Reporting Service.

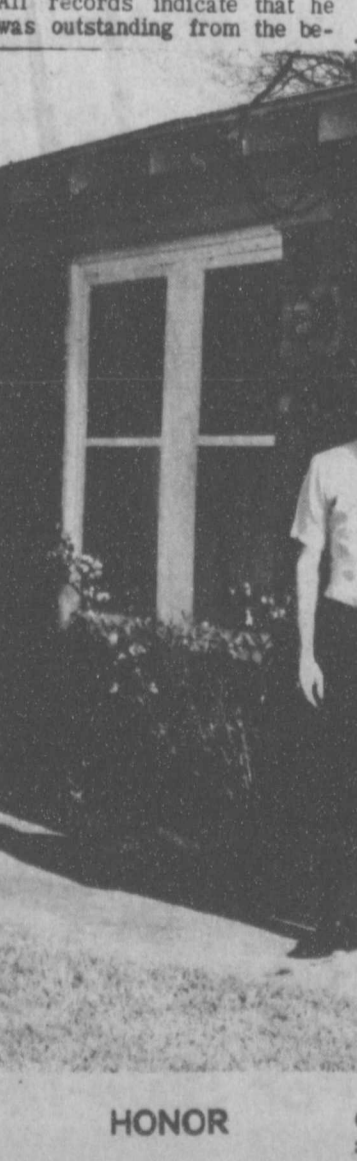

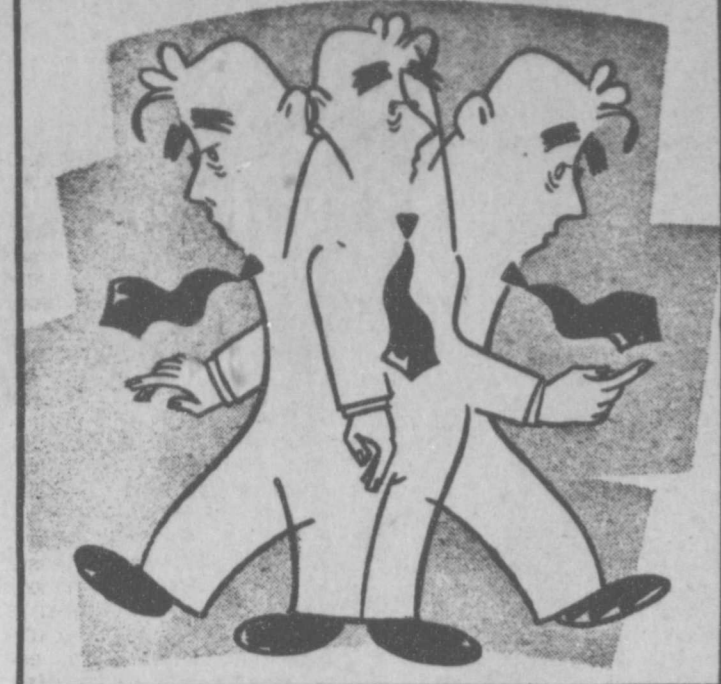

Prock pointed out that attitudes and even atmosphere at home or away from home have a lot to do with whether things go smoothly or not. Studies show that tensions, worry and lack of courtesy are often factors in causing accidents.

"We all have to rush at times, but the hurry habit can cause accidents," Prock said. "When the rush-bug gets into your kitchen for example, he can cause burns, cuts and falls. Joe Williams, principal of the Gatesville Sycamore Unit (high school), pointed out that the boys, being from all over Texas, found much that was familiar to them among the thousands of historical items on exhibit.

The students found more than just local interest, however. They paid close attention to the guides' lectures and asked many questions.

Jay Caballero, Institute Guide called the visitors, "very responsive."

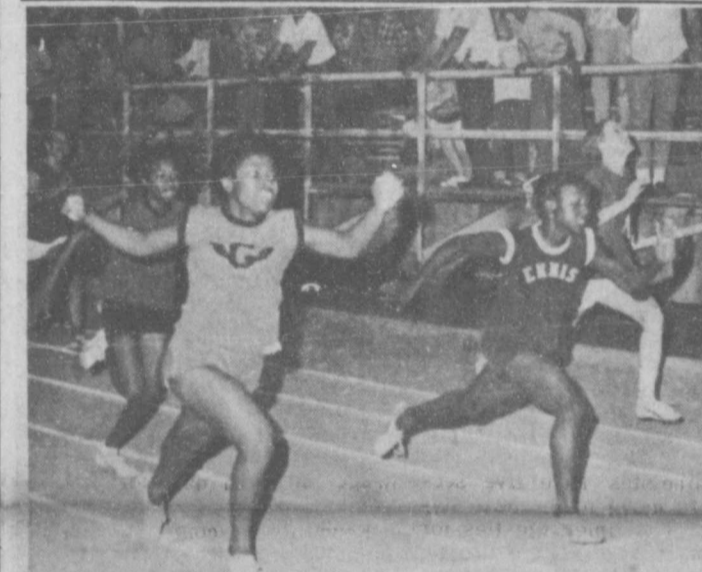
"Everybody is working as one" added Harrington. "This oneness is what it takes to win District and State Championships."

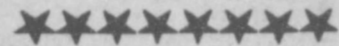

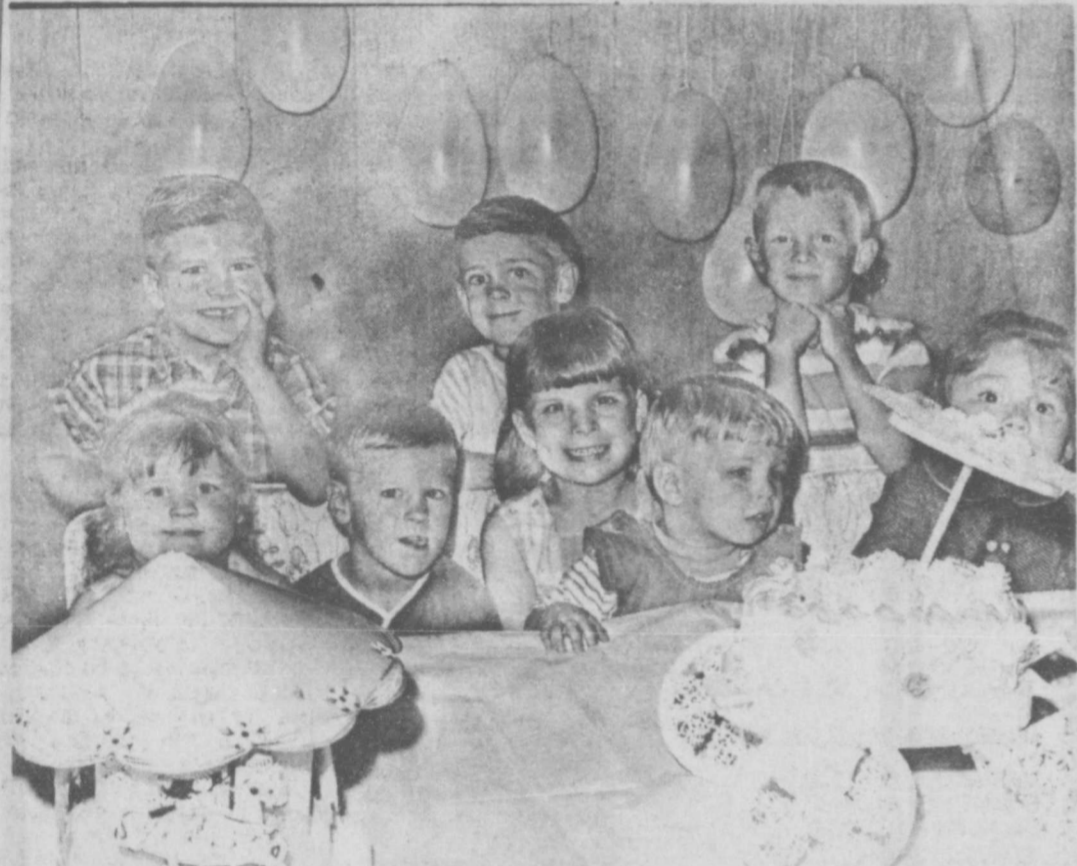

New Library Looking Good

Have you been by the new Gatesville Public Library lately? Things are taking shape at Gatesville's new knowledge center.

Recently I toured the \$76,843 facility with newly appointed head librarian Mrs. Jewel Whigham of Gatesville and present librarian Mrs. A.E. Rosser also of Gatesville.

We entered the building from the attractive rear entrance of the renovated Chamlee Building. The rear entrance exterior is designed to match the Main Street entrance. Access to the library will be easy from either of the two 50 foot wide drives from Saunders Street and North 9th Street. Pavement of the drives and parking area is expected to be completed soon.

At the rear entrance, the librarians pointed out the cement walkway which forms a "am-petheater" for children's story hour seating. The local garden club will landscape the patio area.

Located in the rear of the library is the fashionable meeting room in which any club may hold their meetings. Mrs. Whigham pointed out that the auditorium area can be isolated from the library itself by locked doors. This enables the clubs to meet after library hours without the library doors unlocked to the entrance hallway. Rest rooms, a small kitchen and water fountain are located off of the hallway.

The garden club will furnish the auditorium and will use it for their regular meetings.

The library proper is a spacious room with two beautiful rock walls made by the renovation of the old structure. The librarian's desk and check-out counter will be located at the left rear of the room near the night book depository slot.

Shelving for the 30,000 books has arrived at the library and other furniture and equipment is scheduled to arrive this week. Furnishing costs were set at \$9,306. Mrs. Whigham and Mrs. Rosser are readying the old library stock for moving.

"There are many items that we do not have and need to run an efficient well-equipped library," said Mrs. Rosser. She listed records, a record player, cassettes, a cassette player, a coffee pot, 16mm. projector 35mm. projector and films to show in each, as a few of the items needed.

The formal opening of the new facility will be during Gatesville's Centennial Week in August. According to the librarians, the library doors will open to the public in May.

Mrs. Whigham was appointed to the head librarian position April 14, by the Gatesville City Council. She will assume her duties in July. She plans to enroll in a few library science courses at Baylor this summer.

Mrs. Rosser will assume her duties as assistant librarian at that time.

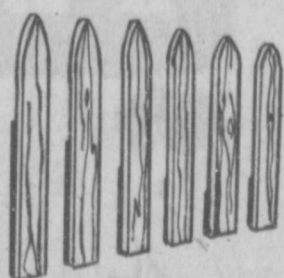

Over the Garden

"Rain, rain go away, come again another day," we used to sing when we were children. There was never a convenient time to have a rainy day then. Now that I'm a gardener by avocation and realize that rain is the very life-blood of a garden I would like to turn that chant around if it would do any good. I do keep my fingers crossed, though, hoping that the government will stay out of the rain making business. I'm sure they could never please more than one tenth of the people at any one time if they did succeed in making it rain where and when they decided.

With all the showers of the past week going by on the far horizons I have been busy mulching my garden to hold the moisture already in the ground and to make the most use of the water I add when it gets too dry. Almost anything can be

used for mulching purposes. Hay, straw and grass clippings are perhaps most frequently used. For a neater appearance peat moss, sawdust or cocoa hulls might be best. One of the easiest to obtain items in this area is cotton seed hulls.

Most mulching materials are better to use after they have been composted or at least piled over the winter so any danger of heating is past. Fresh materials, such as grass clippings should never be used up close to plants. These may be put in the walkways between rows at anytime however. News and other paper wastes are also good to use between rows, if they are anchored with soil or rocks to prevent blowing. These will keep the weeds down and provide dry walkways during rainy times.

I put my mulch down over wet ground, if it hasn't recently rained I drag out the hose. After a week of hot drying wind and cloudless days the unmulched portion has a hard crust while under the mulch the soil is cool and damp. This method seems to carry the harvest of fresh vegetables over a much longer period of hot summer weather than bare ground gardening.

Charles Wise Reports On Psychocybernetics To Woman's Forum

The Woman's Forum met Monday at the National Bank Civic Room with Mrs. Thomas G. Stewart as hostess. The theme for the program was Man's Mind. The speaker was Mr. Charles Wise whose subject was "Psychocybernetics."

Mr. Wise used the book Psycho-Cybernetics by Dr. Maxwell Maltz as the basis for his information. Dr. Maltz is a plastic surgeon who noticed that the personality of some patients did not have a positive change following plastic surgery which made them "whole." This was the background for his writing the book.

"Psycho" is a combining form meaning life or soul. "Cybernetics" has to do with teleology or goal striving oriented behavior of mechanical systems. Cybernetics explains what happens and what is necessary in the purposeful be-

havior of machines. The idea behind psychocybernetics is that a person can change his life into a successful and fulfilled one.

Dr. Maltz refutes the idea of a sub-conscious mind as we have always thought of it. He says our fore-brain is like a programmer of a computer. We are a goal-striving people and man does have control over this. A person is what his self image is. All of his actions, feelings, behavior and abilities depend on his self image. The self image can be changed whenever you desire. There are success and happiness prone personalities. You can make your self image into whatever category you want.

The sub-conscious or fore-brain is a mechanism directed by the mind. It is impartial so therefore it computes impartially. Whatever you feed into it will come out. We must

have our goals very clear so that these goals will be fed into the fore-brain properly. It is similar to the working of a computer. If we have a clear objective that we program into the computer, then we can become what we want. As Napoleon Hill said, "We become as we think."

Our goals can be changed by new habits of thinking and different ways of thinking up new goals. We must use our imaginations to think and experience new thoughts which we want impressed on our fore-brain. In a sense psychocybernetics is self-hypnosis. But in order to do this, we must know the truth about ourselves. Our aim is to find the real self. We must be truthful and understand our real self if we are to be happier.

On the subject of worry or tension Dr. Maltz advises one to do all he can to correct the situation and then worry no more about it. He says that the ingredients for a happy, successful person include a sense of direction—have goals. Be understanding so you can have good communication with others. Have courage to act. Do not be afraid of mistakes. Have an interest and regard for other people. Do not be afraid to be yourself. Remember that each of us is created in God's image.
