

Jumps 6'8 1/2"

Kafer Katapults To UIL Record

Gary Kafer jumped into the University Interscholastic League record books as the UIL Record holder for all classes in the running high jump.

Kafer, Gatesville High School junior, cleared 6 feet, 8 1/2 inches as a crowd of 350 turned to the high jump after all running events had been completed.

Records fell all over Memorial Stadium Friday as class 2A and 3A competition was held.

The high jump pit began seeing action at 7:00 p.m. as 16 jumpers, eight from each class began jumping.

A high wind blew through the stadium much of the evening making jumping a little touchy. Jumpers began to fall out at six feet and by the 6'3 1/2" mark jumping had narrowed to the top jumpers over the state.

Kafer began jumping back at six feet but missed his first try at that height. The small gathering of Kafer Clansmen became tense and surprised at his first attempt.

Kafer, undefeated since last year's State Meet, jumped steady through the three hours of competition. He felt confident throughout the long waiting periods that he could jump near his early season performance in Memorial Stadium, 6 feet 7 3/4 inches.

Kafer was soon recognized by competitors and spectators as the jumper with the best form. Several jumpers employed the "Flosberry Flop" style of jumping. Flosberry, University of Oregon jumper, goes over the bar backwards. His style came to the limelight in the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City where he was a 7 foot jumper.

Coach Jack Moss looks for Kafer to improve with age and physical maturity. Moss noted that next season he should be even better than now and with college training programs Kafer can be a seven foot jumper. The 1972 Olympics are not an unrealistic prediction.

The competition moved slowly through the heights as more

and more boys were taking three jumps at each height. The slow movement of the competition seemed to take the edge off Kafer and it appeared he was set for a "so-so" night.

Jumping with Kafer in 3A were Clifton Fruge of Andrews, John Brown of Brownfield, Jim Payne and Jeff Smith of Corsicana, Johnny Pemeton of Donna, David Huff of Cy-Fair Houston, and Mark P. Smith of Sweeney.

The jumping competition narrowed to Brown of Brownfield, Fruge of Andrews, Jeff Smith of Corsicana, Pemeton of Donna, Kafer and Mark Smith of Sweeney at 6 feet 3 1/2 inches. Then at 6 feet 4 1/2 inches Kafer cleared the height and then watched as all five jumpers tried three times unsuccessfully to stay in the competition.

"Home free" with a sure first place finish Kafer passed at 6 feet 5 1/2". Class 2A still had competition at this point with Johnny Mayo of Taft and Buddy Ward of Crane.

Mayo and Ward both made 6

feet 5 1/2 inches with Ward actually leading the competition with fewer misses.

Kafer and the pair of double jumpers advanced to the next height, 6 feet 6 1/2 inches. The 2A competition was the center of attention as both boys missed their first two tries. Kafer cleared the height in two jumps giving him a chance at the state record. Ward of

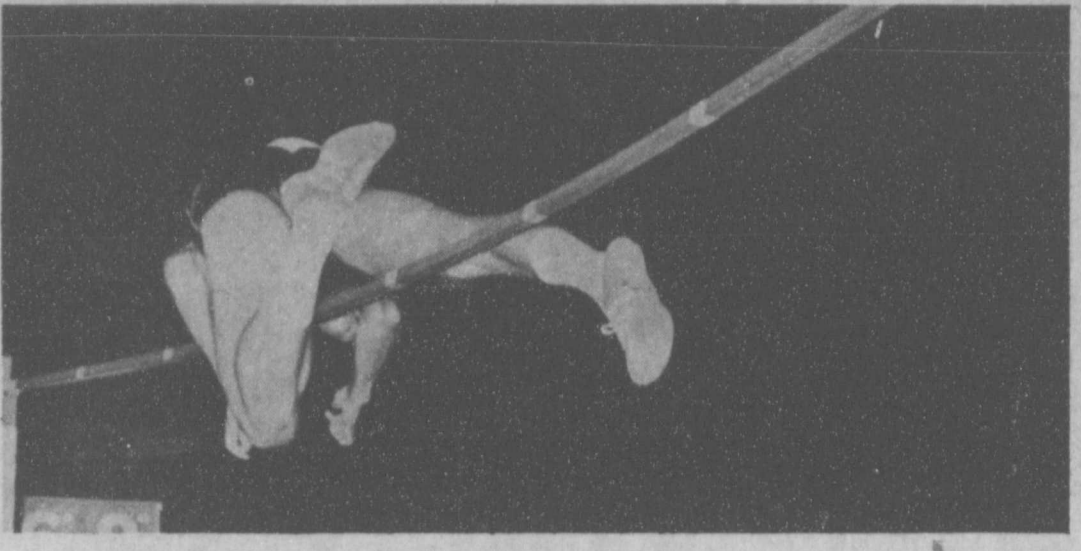
Crane missed at his last jump at the height but could still win on fewer misses should Mayo also miss at his last jump. Mayo did clear the height however to win his class.

Competition for the UIL record then narrowed to competition between Class 3A Kafer and Class 2A Mayo.

The two boys passed the bar immediately to 6 feet 8 1/2 inches, 1/4 inch above the old mark set by Riley Odoms of West Oso, Corpus Christi in 1968.

Mayo jumped twice in succession missing both times. Then Kafer took one jump clearing the bar but pulling it off

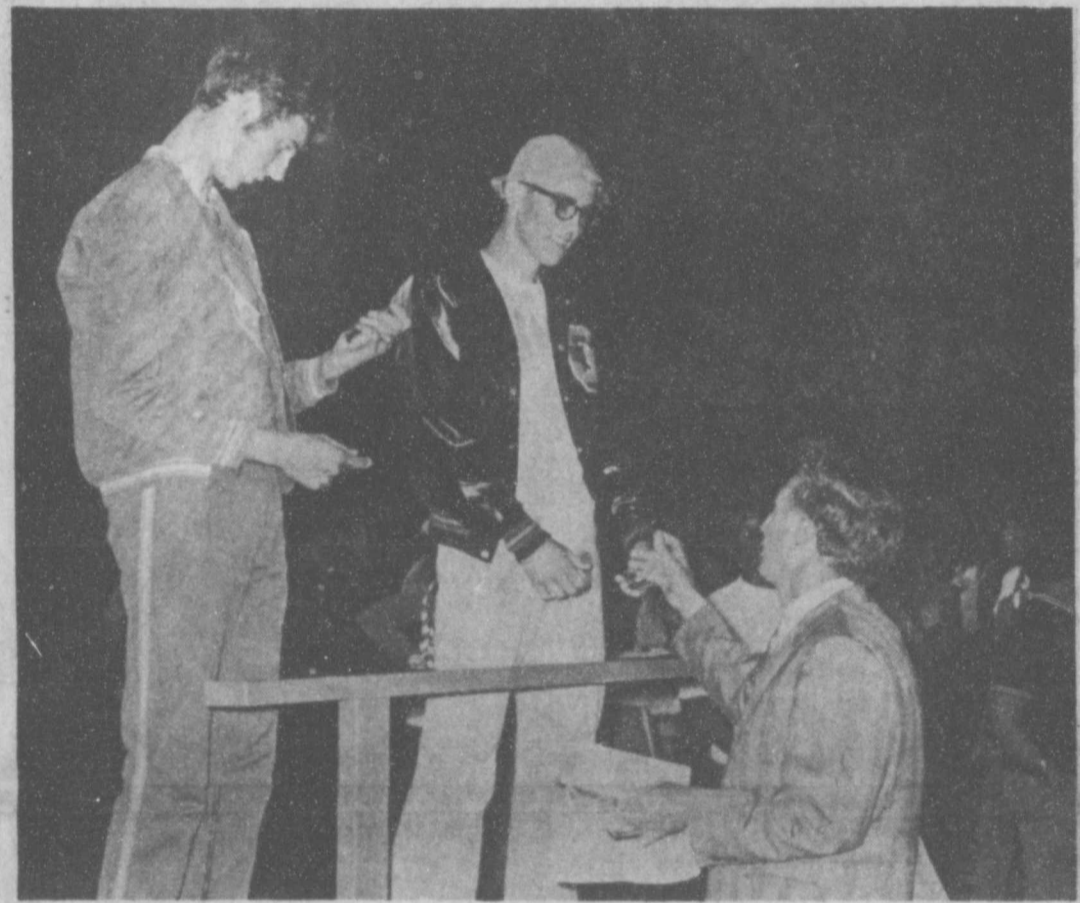

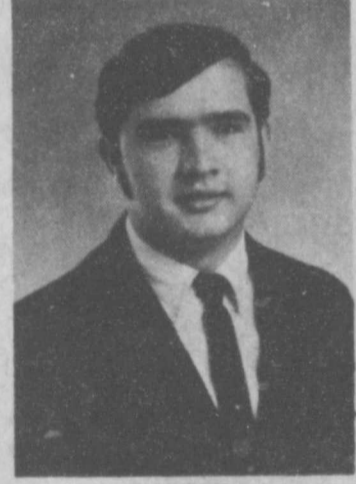
Accepting the First Place Medal

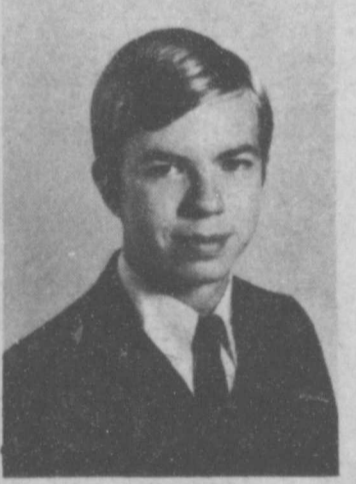

Pipeline Easements Through Coryell Recorded

Santa Fe Pipeline Company has begun recording Right of Way Agreements at the County Clerk's office reports Rebel Hensen.

Seven agreements were re-latest week totaling \$1517 and covering over 2249 acres across Coryell County.

The proposal pipeline will stretch on a straight line from the extreme southeast corner of Coryell County near Whitson to near Ireland on the northwest corner of the county. The line runs just north of the Gatesville State School for Boys between the Hilltop School and Mountain View.

Approximately 35 miles of pipeline will lie in Coryell County.

LTC Opens Bids On Clubhouse-Camp

LTC Corporation executives opened bids from three contractors for construction of a Clubhouse, bathroom and lodging for 48 persons at a Thursday meeting.

The Corporation is building a nine hole golf camp, Camp Cottonwood, south of the Gatesville Country Club. Officials of the massive recreation project hope to open in July 1970 for a short season of youth golf and recreation programs.

Apparent low bidder for the construction program is Billy H. Pollard, Gatesville plumber and contractor at \$103,460. Other bids included Barrett Construction Company with \$104,220 and Dan Pruitt with \$126,000.

The LTC Board of Directors withheld awarding of the contract until Monday night to review the bids.

LTC Manager Johnny Arrea-

ga, noted that construction on the project would begin within 10 days of contract signing. The Contract calls for completion of the 4,000 sq. foot clubhouse and one cottage within 56 working days with the remainder of the project to be completed within 98 working days.

LTC has just completed sodding and planting of all nine greens on the new course. Irrigation of the course is now in full swing.

The new nine is designed to combine with the Country Club course giving Central Texas golfers another fine 18 hole layout.

Golfers will play golf on the LTC course by mid July. The LTC Clubhouse facility should be completed prior to the opening of the new nine holes.

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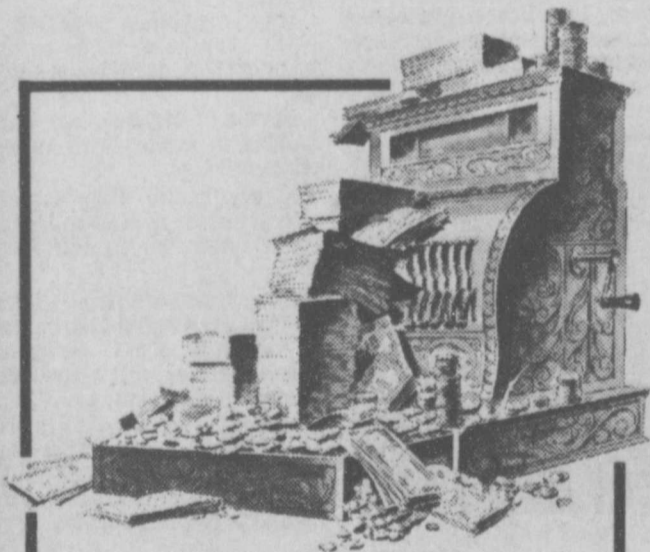

Healthy Baby Week Begins On Mother's Day

Healthy Baby Week, May 10 through 16, is becoming an old friend. Each year, beginning on Mother's Day, the occasion reminds us that the fight to prevent birth defects is gaining ground.

For more than a decade, The National Foundation-March of Dimes has been alerting the public to the fact that about 250,000 American babies are born with birth defects every year. On the positive side-and that is the spirit of Healthy Baby Week-the March of Dimes focuses our attention upon the preventive weapons that medical science has forged against such tragedies.

Each year, there is broader participation in this national public health education program by major service organizations, business and community leaders. We too wish to help make families aware of the boons of modern medicine.

Prenatal care is essential for every pregnant woman because modern medical techniques often can control or prevent a damaging health problem for mother and child. The new rubella (German Measles) and Rh vaccines also can spare countless thousands.

Support of Healthy Baby Week means that quality of life at birth for tomorrow's generation, and their descendants, is closer to achievement.

TEXAS SAW 127 TORNADO SCENES IN 1969

The sky grows dark and threatening, and off in the distance a dull roar can be heard as a funnel cloud dips from the sky.

A tornado has formed and threatens damage to life and property.

That sort of scene, according to the Texas Safety Association, occurred 127 times in Texas during 1969. The statewide safety group points out that the tornado continues to be Texas top weather worry.

According to the safety association, tornadoes can occur at anytime of the year, but they occur most frequently in Texas between March and October. During May of last year 65 tornadoes were reported in the state.

The damage from the 1969 storms amounted to \$2,341,750 and there were three deaths in Texas.

The Texas Safety Association says the U.S. Weather Bureau, State Civil Defense and Disaster Relief, and the Texas Department of Public Safety have prepared a list of rules to follow in case of tornado disaster.

The safety association points out that to know these rules may mean the difference between life and death.

Here are the tornado safety rules:

- The safest place to be during a tornado is in a cave or a storm cellar. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should be kept fit for use, meaning free from water, gas or debris, and perforated equipped with a pick and shovel.
- If you are in open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Remember that tornadoes move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour as a general rule. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine to avoid injury from objects being hurled through the air.
- If you are in a city or town seek inside shelter, preferably along the inside walls on the lower floors of a steel reinforced building. Stay away from windows.

If you are at home in a frame house, the southwest corner of the lowest floor (preferably a basement) offers greater safety. People living in brick

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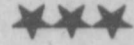

TELLS IT LIKE IT IS... In a recent Catholic newspaper a timely topic was captured in verse by Mrs. R.L. Wupperman. Just read it and believe it! "When I was a student I was quiet; I didn't riot, I wasn't unwashed; I wasn't obscene; I made no demands on prexy or dean. I sat in no sit-in; I heckled no speaker; I broke no window; few students were meeker. I'm forced to admit with some hesitation, all I got out of school was an education." I think you readers will agree with Mrs. Wupperman that this is a timely topic.



Some wise men say, "Don't try to do two things at once." I say why not! Tips from a noted physical education specialist point out some really clever ways to get rid of ugly fat on your regular rounds---whether at home, at work or even while sitting on a bus.

When the old alarm clock rattles at daybreak, you are likely to stretch anyway, so S-T-R-E-T-C-H. While still in bed stretch your arms and legs. Now, out of bed! Reach toward the ceiling, then relax by dropping your hands toward the floor. Remember, keep your tummy in at all times. With this exercise completed your circulation will perk up and you will feel a bit more like tackling the day's chores.

When you brush your teeth, take the chance to strengthen your tummy muscles by standing tall and holding your tummy

in. When you bend over, hold that tummy flat and keep that back straight. Excellent exercise for firming the thigh muscles can be done while putting on stockings. Stand on one foot, raise the opposite knee toward the chest, put on stocking. Now repeat with the other leg. Feel slimmer?

For strengthening back muscles and improving posture, try sitting or standing tall while combing your hair. Be sure to hold your chin in and keep your elbows back or well to the side. Going through a door? Stop for a minute, place your hands and forearms on the door frame, and lean forward from the heels two or three times. Keep your chin in and body in a straight line from heels. This exercise will firm up the bustline.

You can firm up at the table too. Even while you eat, the "spare tire" you have developed can be exercised off by a simple posture exercise. Keep your hips at the back of your chair and lean forward from your hips, not waist. If you make sitting straight a habit--whether while eating, typing, writing or whatever--your stomach muscles will show the results. Many exercises for floor sitters can trim down the figure while watching T.V. For the chestline, sit cross-legged on the floor, arms crossed in front of your chest. Fling your arms upward and sideward stretch and repeat. Want those hips to go down? Stand in the doorway, holding the door frame for support and swing your left leg forward and back, keeping legs and body straight. Now do the other leg!

Away from home? Why not exercise? Sitting on a bus, in a theater or at your desk beautify your thighs by a simple rule. Never cross your legs at the knees. Sit erect and push the small of your back against the seat, keeping your knees together crossing your ankles if you like. When picking an object from the floor or ground, bend from the knees keeping the back straight. Place your weight on one foot and on the ball of the othe. Keep your legs together. This will firm up your thighs.

Now, one-two-three go! Let's see some healthy looking Coryellians soon!

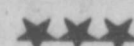
Where to from here? Who knows. The Webers will pick the roads they like that lead home to Akron, then after a month home, where there they go again!

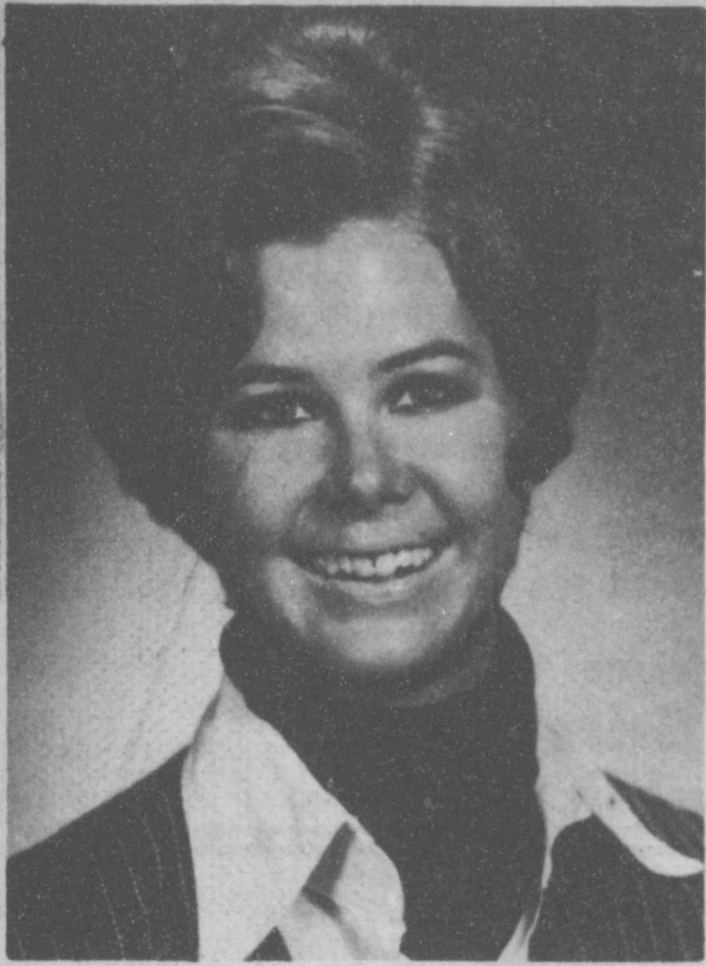

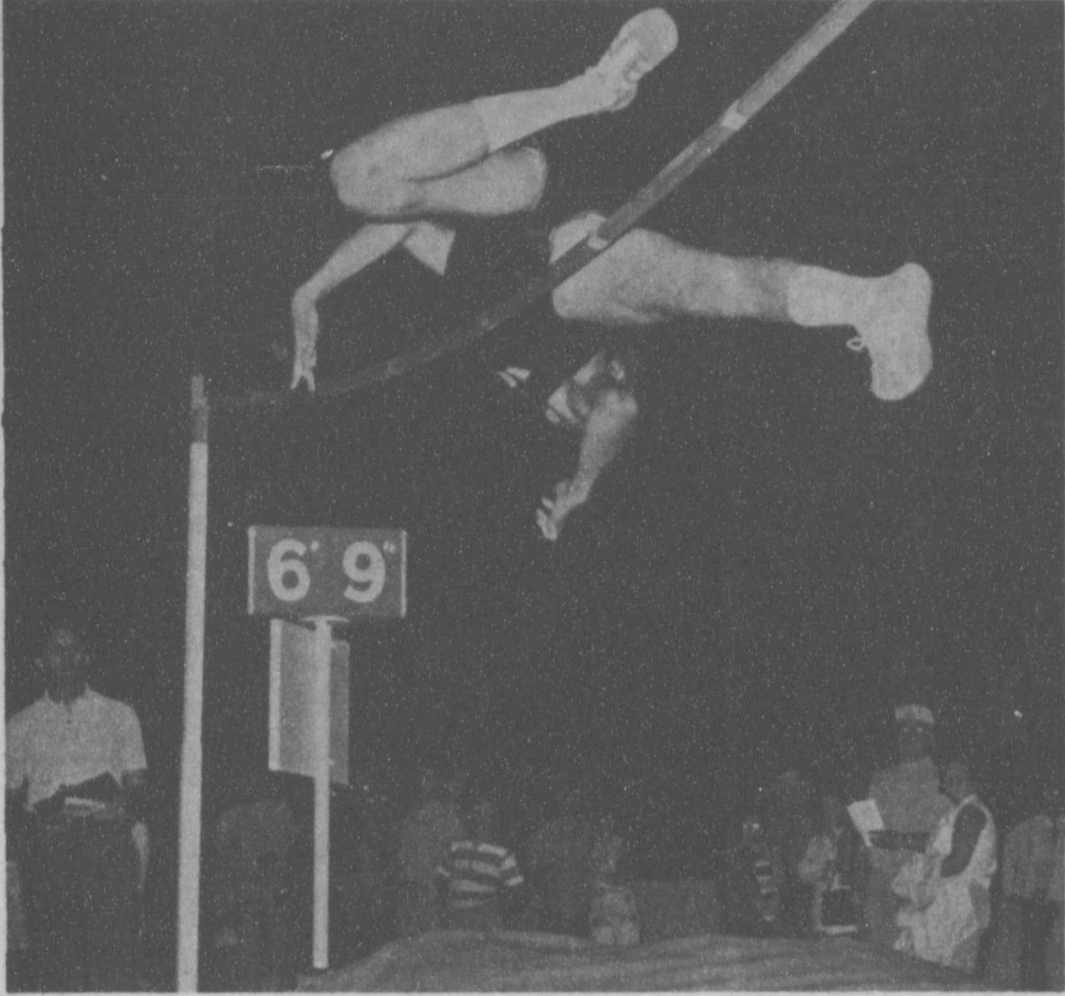

Highlights and Sidelights

U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough and State Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler were upset victims in the May 2 Democratic primary to Lloyd Bentsen and State Rep. Robert L. (Bob) Armstrong.

Scene of political action now shifts to the general election where Bentsen faces Republican Senate candidate George Bush, Gov. Preston Smith, unopposed in the Democratic primary, is confronted with GOP Paul Eggers. Bush and Eggers won nominations easily over Robert Morris and Roger Martin in the Republican primary.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin won third term nomination handily over Judge David H. Brown and faces Edward M. Yturri, GOP in November. Democrat Ben Ramsey had no difficulty with Connie Lawson and is unopposed in November. Truman Roberts defeated Earl W. Smith for Court of Criminal Appeals. James G. Denton appeared to be the Supreme Court contest winner over Matt Davis and Hawthorne Phillips. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, unopposed in the Democratic primary, is challenged by Byron Fullerton, GOP, in November. Four other GOP candidates will wage token campaigns for statewide office against Democrats.

CAPITOL PRECAUTIONS- Tighter security measures may be ordered for the historic state capitol--always wide open to visitors in the wake of a violent anti-war demonstration there last week.

Three 82 year old etched glass panels were smashed when a mob of 200 obscenity-shouting youths stormed through the rotunda. A tear gas grenade was tossed into the north corridor as police chased the demonstrators back through the building and onto the University of Texas campus.

Twice within the next two days, the capitol was evacuated due to telephone bomb threats. Riot equipped Department of Public Safety officers took up stations inside or patrolled the grounds as demonstrations continued on the UT campus.

Governor Preston Smith said damage and disrespect may force tougher security, though the capitol has been the scene of many undisturbed peaceful demonstrations in the past.

COURTS SPEAK- State Supreme Court agreed with lower courts that 6,972 acres of Victoria County oil land belong to private owners, not the state, in a prolonged land vacancy dispute. Had plaintiff in the vacancy action been right, Texas might have recovered up to \$100 million in mineral rights.

Dallas grocery chain stores were rejected by the High Court in their effort to obtain a sales tax break due to trading stamps given their customers. Chain wanted to deduct the cost of stamps before figuring the sales tax owed the state.

Third Court of Civil Appeals affirmed \$40,813 in damages to Temple brakeman injured in a collision, Topeka, Santa Fe

Railroad braking accident, but cut the award \$38,650 below the trial court verdict.

EDUCATION POLICY APPROVED- State Board of Education adopted the policy that contributions of ethnic and racial groups should be taught. Board also proclaimed that literature books must be free of offensive language and that life science texts will present evolution as a theory rather than a fact.

Per capita state aid to local districts was increased from \$114.40 to \$117.65 per student for the current school year. Board authorized application for \$1.8 million in federal anti-poverty funds to help train 900 migrant workers for city jobs, approved a \$2 million special vocational program for poor students and empowered the Texas Education Agency to seek a \$50,000 federal grant to continue technical assistance to school districts with desegregation and other ethnic problems.

APPOINTMENTS- Gov. Smith named Preston H. Dial Jr., judge of the vacant 175th district court in San Antonio after Dial was nominated for that post in the Democratic primary.

Randall B. Wood, native of Edom, is new director of elections in the secretary of state's office, succeeding Mrs. Mary K. Wall who retired.

Gov. Smith has named R.L. Thornton Jr. of Dallas to board of regents of Texas women's University and Dr. Paul C. Witt of Abilene to State Board of Examiners in Basic Sciences.

Robert A. Hansen of Sioux City, Iowa, will become superintendent of Texas School for Blind on June 1.

Fifteen-member state textbook committee has been picked and held its first meeting May 8 to begin a five-month series of hearings on new textbooks.

President Nixon appointed Byron Fullerton of Austin to national advisory council on education professions.

State Comptroller can write rules by which Texas Tech University art works can be temporarily exchanged with other universities and museums.

Texas Tort Claims Act does not cover school districts except as to motor vehicles, but limitation does not apply to Junior College districts.

Penal code article pertaining to seizure and confiscation of devices prohibited in Espiritu Santo Bay and other waters pending trial, and destruction of the prohibited devices on conviction for possession or use, is constitutional.

NURSING HOMES ASK RAISE- Nursing home operators, claiming they face financial crisis, want authority to levy a

\$25 a month supplemental charge for welfare patients in addition to the state allocation. Plan seeks a six per cent increase in state payments for patients requiring skilled care or a total of \$381 a month. State costs in other categories would decline if families pay the supplemental charge.

Meanwhile, State Board of Public Welfare, which took the request under study, heard new federal family assistance legislation backed by the president would cost Texas \$57 million a year more than present programs.

WELFARE- State Board of Public Welfare announced that only 12 counties have not decided on a course of action on the Dallas federal court order that 90 Texas counties must begin food-aid programs for the poor. These 12 include: Archer, Bailey, Blanco, Castro, Gregg, Kendall, Llano, Mills, Oldham, Parmer, Presidio, and San Saba Counties. However, Blanco, Llano, Mills and San Saba County officials reportedly were working actively on the problem.

Another 31 counties had refused to operate food programs, so the State Department of Public Welfare planned to operate commodity programs at federal expense in Aransas, Baylor, Bosque, Bowie, Clay, Collin, Colorado, Coryell, Deaf Smith, Denton, Edwards, Ellis, Fort Bend, Gillespie, Gray, Grayson, Roberts, Rockwall, Rusk, Uvalde, Wheeler, Wise and Wood Counties.

keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach.

Advanced preparation should be made for shutting off electrical circuits and fuel lines if the tornado approaches the plant.

Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

6. Above all, keep calm. Persons have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado.

Even though a warning is issued, the chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are slight. As a rule, tornadoes cover such a small area that relatively a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should be familiar with the safety precautions

however, in case a tornado does approach.
7. Keep tuned to your radio or television station for the latest information when tornado warnings have been issued. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your call may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports, or to relay messages to radio stations for broadcast to thousands in the critical area.
The Texas Safety Association

also says there is sometimes confusion over terms used in the reporting of tornadoes by the weather bureau.

The bureau, says the association issues Tornado Forecasts for a relatively large area in which weather condition will be favorable for one or more tornadoes to develop.

A tornado alert occurs when one or more weather stations locate an area of turbulence or cloud formations which indicate the probability of a tor-

nado.

Tornado warnings are announcements that a tornado has been sighted and reported. The warnings tell where and when the tornado has been reported, and lists the names of communities toward which the tornado is moving. These warnings cover a short period of time, usually less than an hour, and are for the purpose of advising persons in the path of the storm to take immediate safety precautions.
