

## RUN-OFF IN PRECINCT 2 SET SATURDAY

The June 6 Second Democratic Primary will feature only one race in Coryell County with the run-off election of Commissioner, Precinct 2.

Luke Austin and Cloyce Duncan made it to the run-off election in the May Primary as the two top vote getters in a five man race for the Commissioner's job.

Austin, a Copperas Cove businessman, received solid support in Copperas Cove in the May Primary. Duncan was the only one of five candidates in the May election to receive support in both cities.

County Clerk, Bubba Henson, is estimating 800 voters will turnout for the election. Henson estimates 325 voters will mark ballots in Voting Precinct 5 (Copperas Cove) and 475 voters will mark ballots in Voting Precinct 2, (Gatesville).

Both voting boxes contain over 1,000 registered voters. Henson estimates call for about 40% of the eligible voters to make the trip to the polls.

In absentee voting Henson termed the activity as "average for a two man run-off election. Voting had reached 31 by the end of personal appearance voting Tuesday and three mailed ballots are still out. The mailed vote must be received before Saturday, June 6 through regular mail service.

## First Performance Of Jaycee Rodeo Set For Tonight

As the clamor of the basketball audience fades into oblivion--at least for another year--Gatesvilleites turn their thoughts toward the rugged dirt and grit excitement of the rodeo arena.

The excitement of the rodeo arena--the murmurs of anticipation before the colorful grand entry, the saucer-sized eyes of 'little cowboys and cowgirls' seeing a real western idol, the hush and anxiety following a cowboy's 'encounter' with a bull, the

crunch of pop corn, the rosey, pink hands sticky from cotton candy and a veritable 'sea' of cowboy hats still the same in 1970 as it was in the Old West.

Gatesville boasts one of the most exciting and action-packed rodeos in the Central Texas area and this year's contest will be no exception say rodeo officials.

The rodeo, opening Thursday at 8:30 p.m. will mark the 32nd contest in the long Gatesville rodeo history and officials expect sellout crowds.

Sponsoring the western show is the Gatesville Jaycee club, local civic organization for young men.

Spectators at the Thursday night opening show will be treated to an extra per-

formance as Fort Hood Sky Divers, Captain Eddie Parks, Major Jim Hanke and Warrant Officer Ed Avery will dive from the sky with the rodeo arena as their target.

Henry Brim indicated this week that the jump would take place at about 8:00 p.m.

During each nights rodeo Clinton Harlow will delight spectators as his famous Sheep Dog and Monkey Act is executed.

This year's rodeo will include seven events--5 timed events and 2 riding events.

The first event out of the chute will be bareback bronc riding. In bareback riding, the youngest of the three riding

## Pearl School To Dedicate Marker

An official Texas Historical Marker will be unveiled at the "Pearl School" on June 13. The dedication ceremony will be conducted by three long time Pearl residents Fred Robinson, Tom Jones, and John Doyle.

The Coryell County Historical Society headed by Bob Cummings has helped to get the marker for the Pearl Community.

The 18" by 28" marker reads as follows:

PEARL SCHOOL  
(1884-1958)  
EVOLVED FROM A LOG CABIN WITH PUNcheon FLOOR AND WITH SPLIT LOG BENCHES TO A MODERN PLANT WITH A GYMNASIUM. FURNISHED ITS FAIR SHARE OF EDUCATED CITIZENS.

IN EARLY DAYS, A ONE OR TWO-TEACHER SCHOOL, FIRST TRUSTEES WERE J. H. HARRISON, V. V. KARNES, AND FRANK ROBERTS. IN

1907, WITH A NEW BUILDING, FACULTY INCREASED TO THREE; IN 1917, TO FOUR; SEVEN-TEACHER HIGH SCHOOL IN 1934.

SINCE SCHOOL'S CONSOLIDATION WITH EVANT DISTRICT (1958); THIS BUILDING MEMORABLE FOR YOUTHFUL ASSOCIATIONS HAS BECOME PEARL COMMUNITY CENTER AND IS OFTEN VISITED BY EX-STUDENTS.

On the back of the marker is this: SPONSORED BY PEARL COMMUNITY CENTER, A. B. FREEMAN, PRESIDENT; C. E. FREEMAN, VICE-PRESIDENT; GORDON SHOOK TREASURER.

Gribble has been working on the police course for the past four weeks. The 160 hours of instruction includes instructions from DPS, FBI, Killen Police, and professors at CTC.

The course will become mandatory for all law officers September 1, 1970.

Completion of the course classifies a student as a certified police officer.

## Gas-Oil Leases

Oil and gas leases again picked up in activity in the Pldcoke area and western parts of the county this week as approximately 7,489 acres were leased by Jones and Lyons.

The largest lease covered 1,679 acres and the smallest 40 acres. Jones and Lyons assigned the leases to City Service Oil Co.

Oil and gas leases were very active up until the end of 1969 but in the past five months activity has slowed.

## Farmers Will Recieve Reminder On Certification

All participants in the 1970 feed grain, wheat, or cotton programs are to be sent a reminder flyer on certification and compliance with these farm programs, according to Robert L. Melbern Chairman of the Coryell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

"It would be a good idea

for a farmer to stick that little black-and-yellow leaflet in a spot where it will catch his eye everyday reminding him to come in early to the County ASCS Office to certify compliance," Melbern said.

The leaflet reminds farmers that early and accurate

## Grand Jury Returns 37 Indictments

A total of 37 true bills of indictment were returned by the June 1970 Grand Jury which met for two days this week.

The Grand Jury, foremaned by Paul Bromser, is Judge Truman Roberts last grand jury as he will become Judge of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals in January of 1971.

In their report to the Judge the Grand Jury cited Roberts for his clear concise and direct instructions of the grand jury on their duties. The grand jury inspected the jail and found it to be very clean, orderly and apparently well kept. Local law enforcement officers were cited for their work.

The jury wished Judge Roberts a fond farewell. Foreman Bromser said "we feel that our community is a better place to live due to your work over the years."

Judge Roberts answered the jury noting mixed emotions and feelings about taking the new job. The 52nd District Court was Roberts post for the past nine years.

He noted to the grand jury that Coryell County has had a good growth factor over the past 10 years and due to increase crimes in the last three to four years probably the grand jury would have to be recalled later this year.

Roberts noted that Coryell's growth might cause changes in the district court. "With that growth factor the time will come when Coryell will be a district itself," he predicted. The present district covering three counties, Coryell, Hamilton and Comanche was drawn up in 1901.

The judge turned his attention to the qualifications to fill his post noting that he knew of no man who possessed all the qualifications of the position but intelligence, hard work and character will soon have the Governor's appointee realizing the responsibilities of the job.

"I have set as Judge for many counties over the state," said Roberts, "and there is no more efficient law organization than Coryell County." Roberts then cited the Sheriff's department, police departments, District Clerk staff and other county offices as tops in efficiency.

The grand jury investigation included charges against

32 persons. Arraignments in all cases was set for June 15.

Leonard W. Alldredge, Jr. was indicted on two charges of rape and incest with bond being set at \$5,000.

Daniel R. Sanchez, Gregory D. Williams, Ralph Milton Pfeister, Gordon N. Gieg, and Fred Wilkinson each were indicted on charges of possession of marijuana. Bonds were all set at \$1,500. Wilkinson was also indicted on charges of giving marijuana to a minor under 19 years of age.

Marvin Roy James was indicted on charges of assault with intent to murder in connection with a mid-February assault on Edward Amesquita. The grand jury also returned

## DR. CHAPPELL TO RETURN FOR METHODIST GROUND BREAKING

In 1913 Dr. Clovis Chappell was pastor of the First Methodist Church in Gatesville. At that time he led the church in a building program in which the present sanctuary now being used by the church was constructed.

Now, 57 years later, the Gatesville congregation has invited Dr. Chappell back to conduct a preaching mission and share in the ground-breaking ceremonies for a new church plant. Dr. Chappell will be preaching at the church on Sunday, June 7, at 10:50 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. Ground breaking ceremonies will be held at the new church lot at 6:30 p.m. on the 7th. Dr. Chappell will also preach on June 8 and 9 at 7:30 p.m.

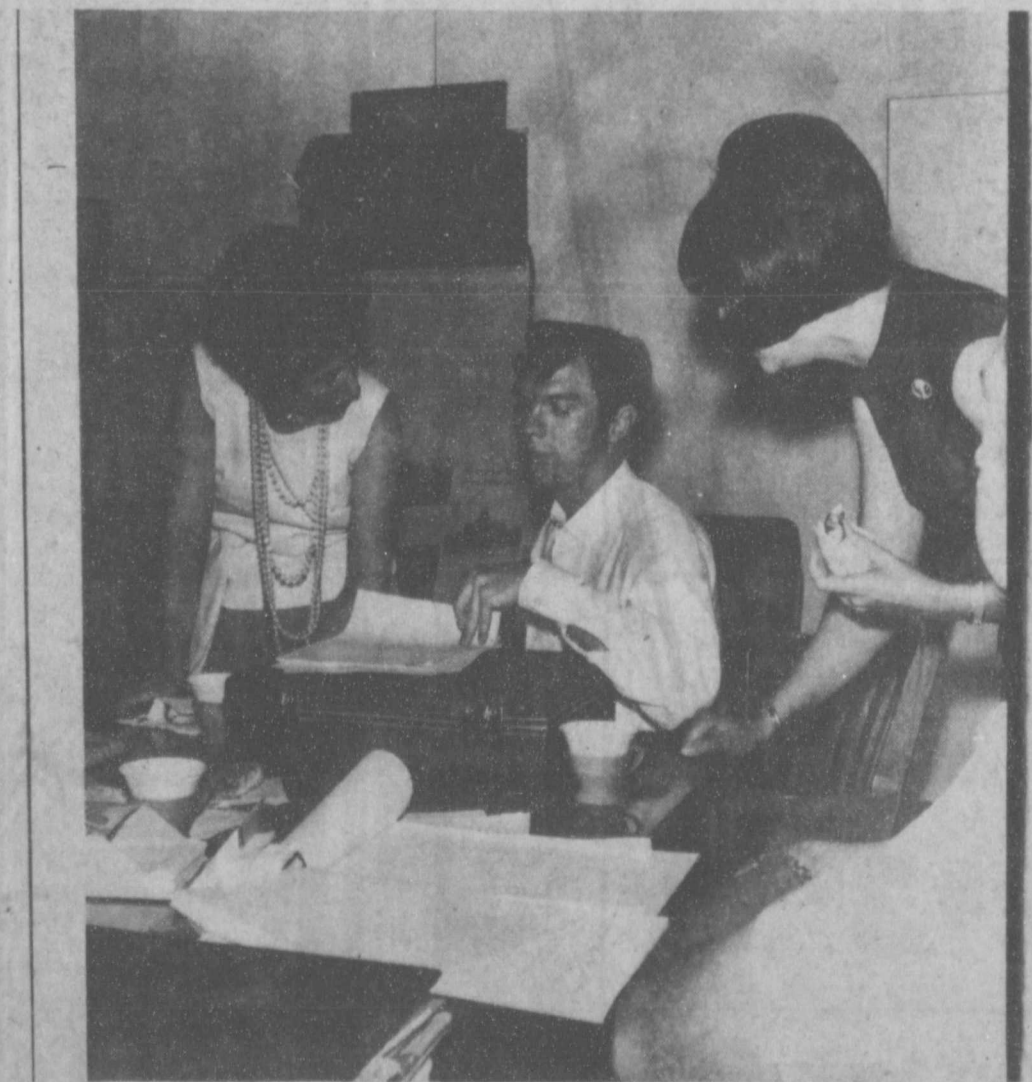
Clovis Chappell now lives in Waverly, Tennessee. He continues to preach each week in various missions. In the Central Texas Conference, he served as pastor of the Poly Methodist Church in Fort Worth and the First Methodist Church in Georgetown as well as the Gatesville church.

In a poll of its subscribers taken by the "Christian Century" a few years ago, Dr. Chappell was chosen as one of the most effective preachers in the United States. When Dr. Andrew Blackwood, former professor of Homiletics at Princeton University, made his list of the 40 outstanding preachers of the last 4 centuries, his list included Dr. Chappell.

The ground-breaking ceremonies will be for a new church plant being built on a 5 acre tract in the 2600 block off East Main. All persons are asked to bring shovels to share in the ground breaking. The project will cost \$365,000. The architects are

### PUBLIC INFORMATION

The people in the Gatesville school area have shown great interest in our schools, and the recent bond election. Many complications are involved in voting bonds and actually getting construction under way. The following time schedule is given for your information:

1. After a bond issue is approved by the people nothing can be done for 30 days. This is the law. It is allotted time for contests.
2. After 30 days expires the district can present to the Attorney General and to an approved Bond Law Firm for validation of transcripts, field notes of district, plat of district, board orders, bond orders and other forms or "red-tape".
3. If all legal angles are cleared the bonds will be printed.
4. Bonds will be advertised for sale. This requires 20 days.
5. If the school board accepts a bid on the bonds the architects will advertise for building bids. This requires 20 days lay-over.
6. After the 20 day period the board will meet with the bidders and architects to consider construction bids.
7. If the school board accepts a construction bid the contractors usually requests 30 days to get on the job.

If no problems are encountered that would cause a delay construction could begin in September or early October. If interest rates are too high or building bids too high this could cause further delay. It is hoped by all concerned that the above schedule will work without any conflicts.

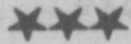
She won first place in the District 27-A contest and first in the Regional competition at Victoria with a perfect paper! Lee is the first Leander student to compete in a state UIL literary meet.

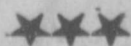

Following a wedding trip to Salado, the couple are making their home in Gatesville.

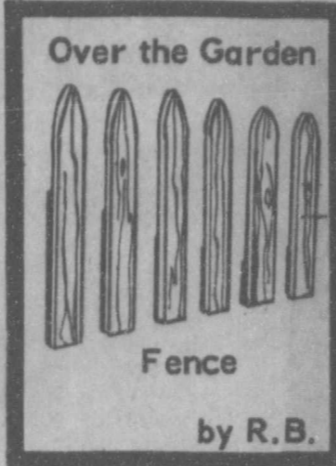

The abundance of spring flowers is about gone from our gardens and fewer cut flowers will be available during the hot months ahead to decorate our homes. This is a good time to consider using wild flowers for our indoor bouquets. The many daisy like flowers of the huge composite family are now coming into full bloom.

Several of these, such as the Indian Blankets, the coreopsis and the lovely star thistle or centaurea are prize garden specimen in northern gardens where they demand a little extra care to thrive in an unfamiliar environment. With our roadsides and fields overflowing with them we can feel free to pick enough for an attractive arrangement without endangering the species. Besides being plentiful, most of these flowers make long lasting cut flowers.

Coreopsis, Thelesperma and Mexican-hats make lovely light wiry arrangements, while the Indian Blankets, cone-flowers and Maximilian sunflowers are just right for pottery and heavier ceramic containers and bright summer colors. Hundreds of varieties of grasses are going to seed, each with a different shape, color or size seed panicle to add interest to a vase of flowers.

Let your imagination loose; don't be tied to the concept that "flowers" have to come only from a controlled garden environment. Fresh flowers for the house can be available almost all year around in our area.

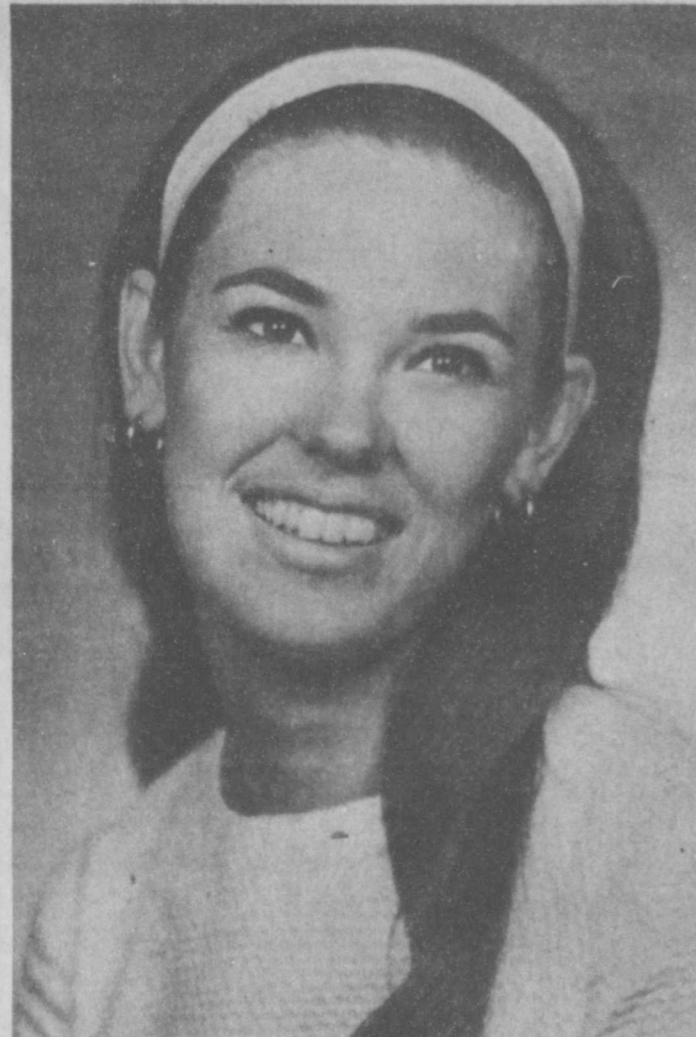

certification means earlier farm payments this year. Farm program payments are expected to begin soon after July 1 and be completed by the end of August.

Processing and computing of the total payment earned by a participant is begun as soon as he certifies he has complied with program provisions.

The flyer also lists four important items for producers taking part in the 1970 farm programs:

"Do plant within your allotment, base, or permitted acreage on all farms in which you or your family have an interest."

"Do be sure you certify to correct acreage. Once you certify your acreage it can't be adjusted."

"Don't guess your acreage. If in doubt, ask for measurement service. Errors found on spot checks can be costly."

"Don't certify if you're not positive that planted, diverted, and conserving base acreages are correct."

The ASC Committee Chairman said it would take producers less than a minute to read the flyer--but that it could be the most important minute of their farm operations this year.

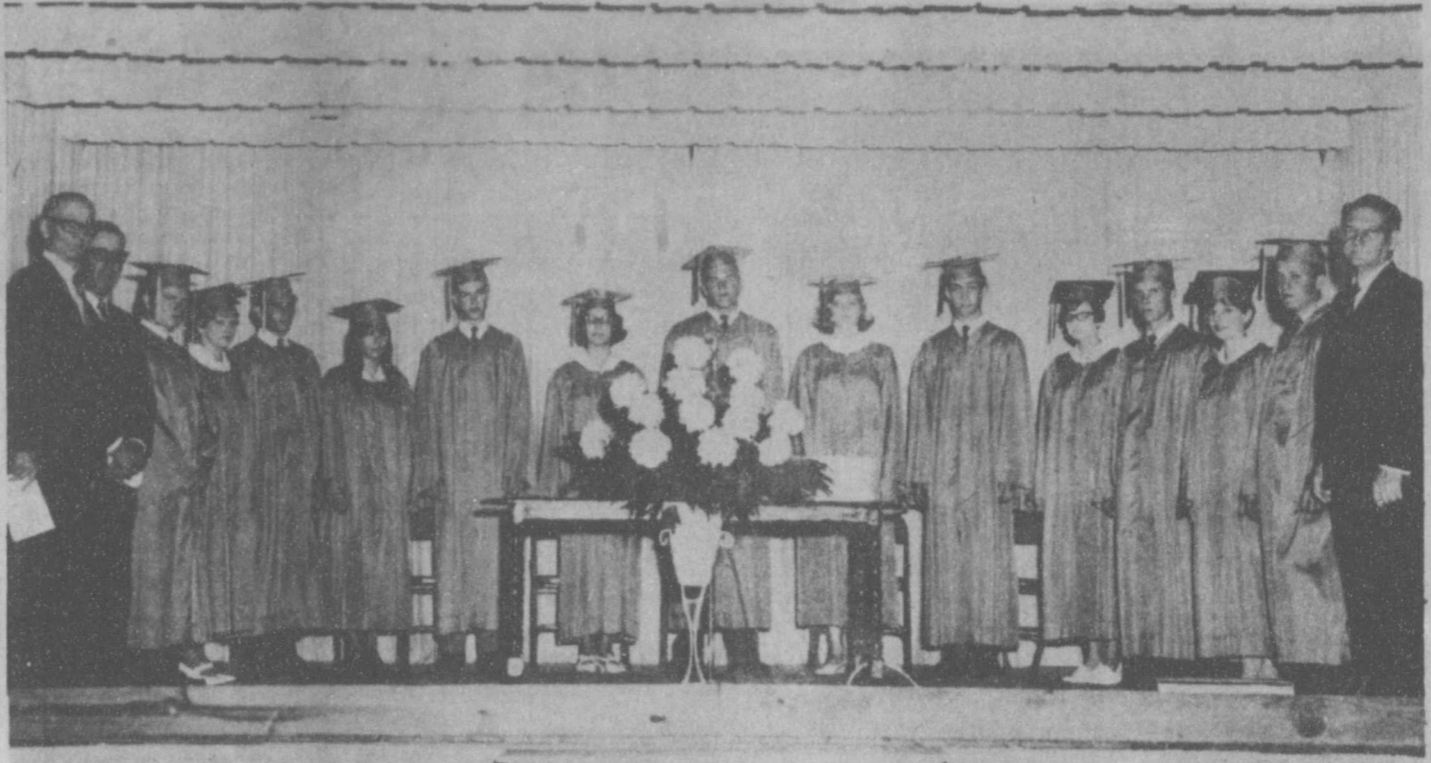

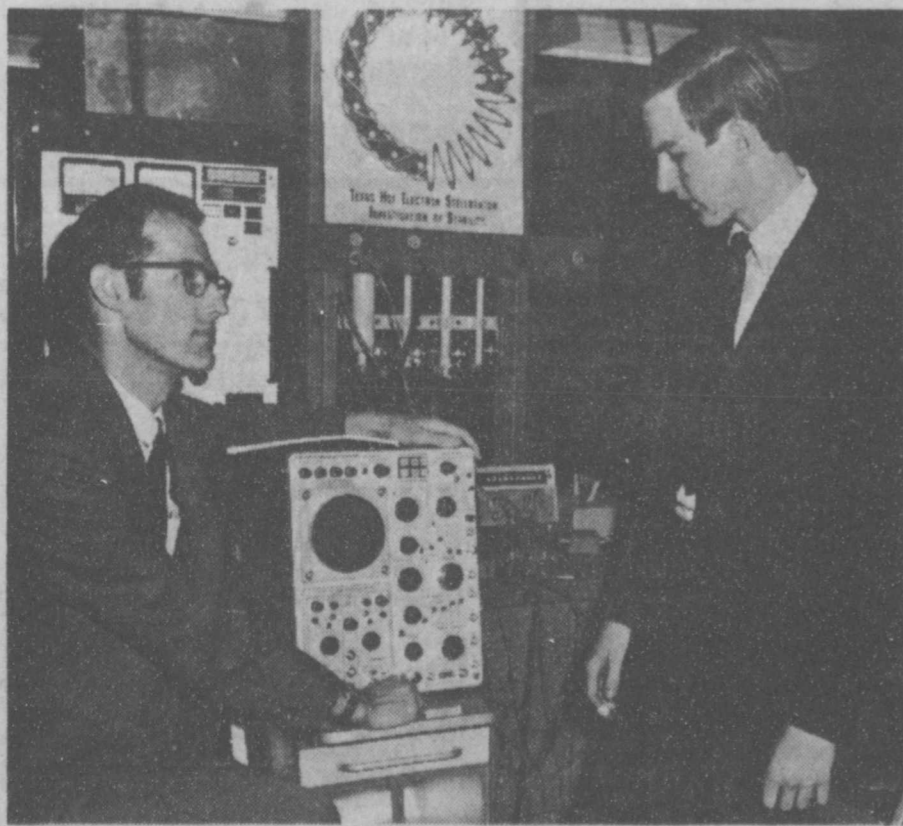

The main point of judging is 'how they ride' not if they ride.
