

## Midland Man Injured In Truck Turnover

Charles R. Chappell, 34, of Midland received back injuries and a possible broken shoulder when the truck he was driving turned over Wednesday, June 10, at 4 p.m., near Jonesboro.

Chappell was driving a 1965 International truck tractor and semi trailer for Central Texas Iron Works loaded with 5-20-30 foot steel beams. Highway Patrolman David Jund reported that Chappell had fallen to sleep and drove off an embankment on the south side of Highway 36 11.3 miles north of Gatesville. The accident reports note that Chappell woke up and attempted to turn the truck back on the roadway. The truck cab did make it back to the roadway but the heavy load of steel forced the truck to turn over scattering the steel beams in the southbound lane of the highway.

The truck cab and trailer remained and came to rest in its wheels.

Chappell was taken to Coryell Memorial Hospital by Erwin Ambulance Service where

he was admitted with back and shoulder injuries.

Damage to the truck tractor and steel was estimated at \$6,000. No charges were filed.

## Quick Thinking Aids Youth Bitten By Rattler

Quick thinking and quick action Thursday afternoon could well be termed as life saving efforts for 12 year old Connie Penny.

Miss Penny, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Penny of Pearl, was on her way to 4-H sewing lessons about 1 p.m. Thursday when she was bitten by a rattlesnake. She and her brother Don were crossing a pasture near the Eugene Franklin home at Pearl when Don stepped on what he thought was a stick in their path. As Connie moved on along the path, a rattler struck her right leg just above the ankle.

The youth said she was excited at first but quickly remembered warnings never to run when bitten by a snake. She and her brother walked on to the Franklin home where Sharon Dever wrapped the child's foot in ice and applied a tourniquet made of a stretch belt. Help was sought at Pearl to carry Connie to Coryell Memorial Hospital. At Pearl, Lyman Scott lanced the bite, and attempts made to extract the poison by mouth by Mrs. Maggie Franklin. County Commissioner, Otha Medart, brought the girl to the hospital.

Returning to the place of the accident, Jim Campbell noted that the longer snake was believed to be the one that bit Miss Penny. The snake was said to be acting sick which is characteristic of a rattler that has bitten.

At last report, Miss Penny is said to be doing well at Coryell Memorial Hospital.

## Eight Member Study Committee Named

Judge Norman C. Storm, President of the Central Texas Council of Governments, has appointed an eight member committee to study and evaluate Central Texas Council of Governments' relation to other Planning and Development Organizations in the Central Texas Planning Region.

The Central Texas Economic Development District, under the guidelines of the Economic Development Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce, encourages and assists in the redevelopment of the general economy of the 12 county area. Its activities are funded through Federal grants and loans to enterprises which will improve business, employment and industrial capability for the area.

The Study Committee from representatives of the Central Texas Council of Governments consists of the following persons:

Bell County: Major E. Blair, Chairman, City Councilman Killeen, Clark Potter, City Councilman, Belton; Mayor Jamie Clements, Temple.  
Coryell County: Mayor Bob Miller, Gatesville; Mayor George Leonard, Copperas Cove.

Hamilton County: Judge Herman Standifer, County Judge.

Lampasas County: Judge R. L. Northington, County Judge.

Mills County: Judge Cecil Egger, County Judge.

At the last meeting of the Executive Committee of the Central Texas Economic Development District, a similar Committee was appointed to study its relationship to the two Councils of Governments and Judge Storm, President of the Central Texas Council of Governments was notified of the action by a letter dated June 1, 1970.

Though the Councils of Governments' work is oriented to assistance and implementation of State and Federal programs through local governments and the Economic Development District leans toward the expansion of private business to improve the area, both agencies have recently expressed a desire to more closely coordinate their activities. Such coordination where possible would greatly enhance the benefits each can provide according to the officials.

Presently there are two organizations in addition to the Central Texas Council of Governments charged with planning and development responsibilities in the 12 county Central Texas State Planning Region defined by the Governor's Office.

The Central Texas Council of Governments, with headquarters in Belton, has planning responsibility and review authority in the six western counties of the 12 county area including Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam and

# Felipe Orta Draws Five Year Sentence At Dallas In Locker Murder Case

A 19-year-old San Antonio youth, Felipe Orta, was assessed a five-year prison sentence Saturday after a Dallas jury ruled him guilty of murder without malice in the Nov. 9, 1969 shooting death of State Highway Patrolman Travis Locker near Waxahachie. Mr. Locker was a former Jonesboro resident.

The sentence was the maximum the jury could impose under the murder without malice finding. The state had asked that Orta be sent to the electric chair for murder with malice.

Orta was charged along with Amadeo Guerra, 17, and Ernest Guzman, 16, in the murder of the patrolman, who was the father of three children.

Orta testified he was attempting to stop the shooting when it occurred just outside of Waxahachie after the officer stopped the car driven by Orta for speeding on Interstate 35.

Orta claimed Guerra fired the fatal shot.

Earlier in the trial Sgt. William McDonald, stationed at Fort Hood, said he saw Or-

ta fire a slug into Mr. Locker as he lay on the ground pleading for his life.

Orta said he, Guzman and Guerra were en route from Dallas to San Antonio when they picked up two hitchhikers, Sgt. McDonald and Army Cpl. Richard Bulow. A short time later, Patrolman Locker stopped their car, apparently for speeding.

The occupants were ordered out of the car and Orta testified that Mr. Locker was questioning Guerra when they suddenly started fighting.

Orta said he and Guzman went to aid Guerra and were hitting the patrolman on the ground when a shot was fired.

The defendant said he then heard Guzman shout in Spanish, "Sonny, you shot me. You shot me."

Orta said he and Guzman called Guerra "Sonny."

Orta said he saw Guerra with a pistol in his hand pointing at the downed patrolman.

Patrolman Locker said, "No, please don't shoot me," the teen-ager testified.

"When I saw Sonny was going to kill the patrolman. I

grabbed for the gun," Orta said. He said he touched the pistol and it discharged, sending the fatal bullet into Mr. Locker.

After Orta's testimony, the defense attorney called Guerra and Guzman to the witness stand. With the jury out of the room, he asked Guerra if he was at the scene when Mr. Locker was shot to death and if he indeed fired the shot that killed him.

Guerra repeatedly refused to answer the questions on the grounds it would tend to incriminate him at his trial at a later date.

The judge refused to allow the attorney to ask Guerra the same questions when the jury was brought back into the courtroom.

The trial, shifted from Waxahachie to Dallas on a change of venue, lasted three days.

Patrolman Locker, a veteran of nine years with the Department of Public Safety, was reared at Jonesboro. He

was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy E. Locker and the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Walker of Jonesboro.

The child died Thursday morning in the local hospital. In addition to his parents, he is survived by a brother, Todd Luke Walker, and a sister, Dana Sue Walker, both of Houston; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Ellis of Gatesville.

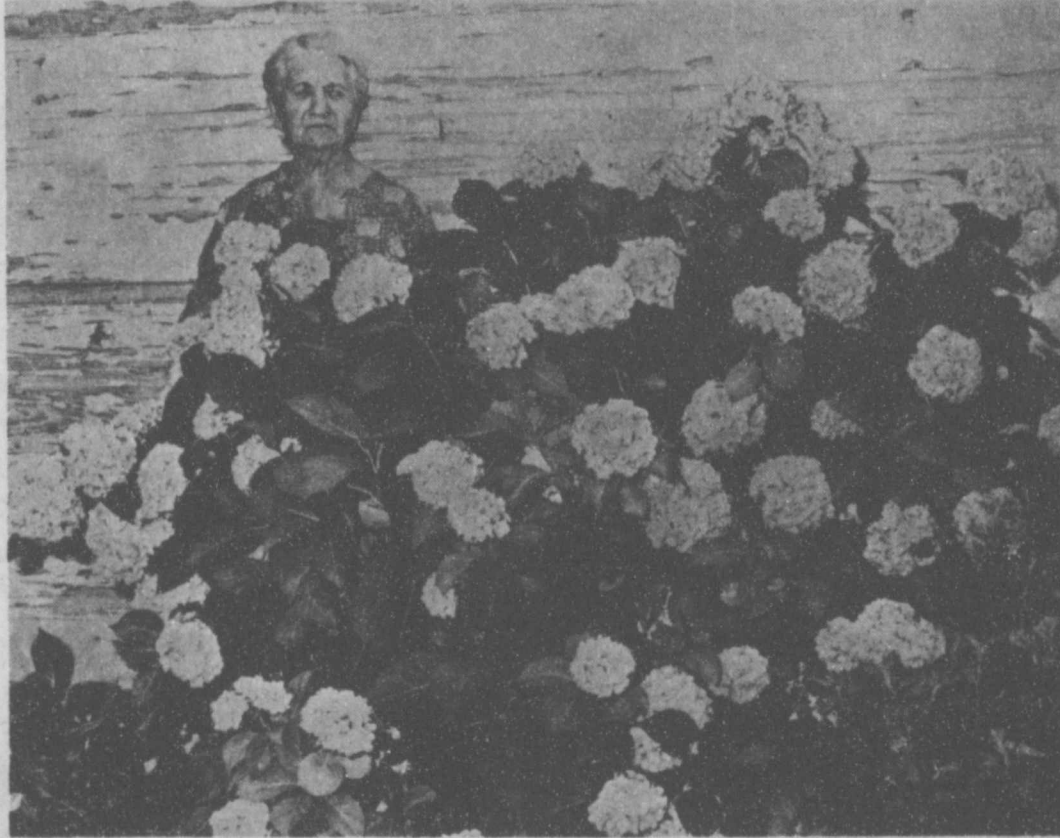

McHargue of Mound (pictured above) is the owner of the colorful plant. This massive plant measures about four and one half feet in height and about seven feet in spread.



Giant clusters of tiny blooms fill the bush with a color chart from pinks and blues. Clusters range in colors from soft pinks to violets to deep blues. Their size ranges from four inches to about 11 inches.

According to Mrs. McHargue, the plant is approximately five years old and began from a section given to her by Mrs. H. B. Waldrep of Oklahoma. Mrs. McHargue says the plant grows to a similar size each spring. She has planted several other hydrangea plants on the east and south sides of her home in Mound, but only the plants on the north flourish. At the left of the above plant, Mrs. McHargue has another hydrangea planted which was a gift this spring.

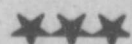

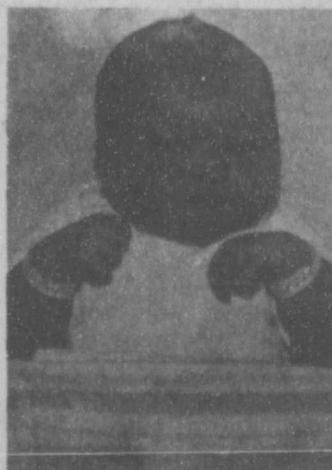

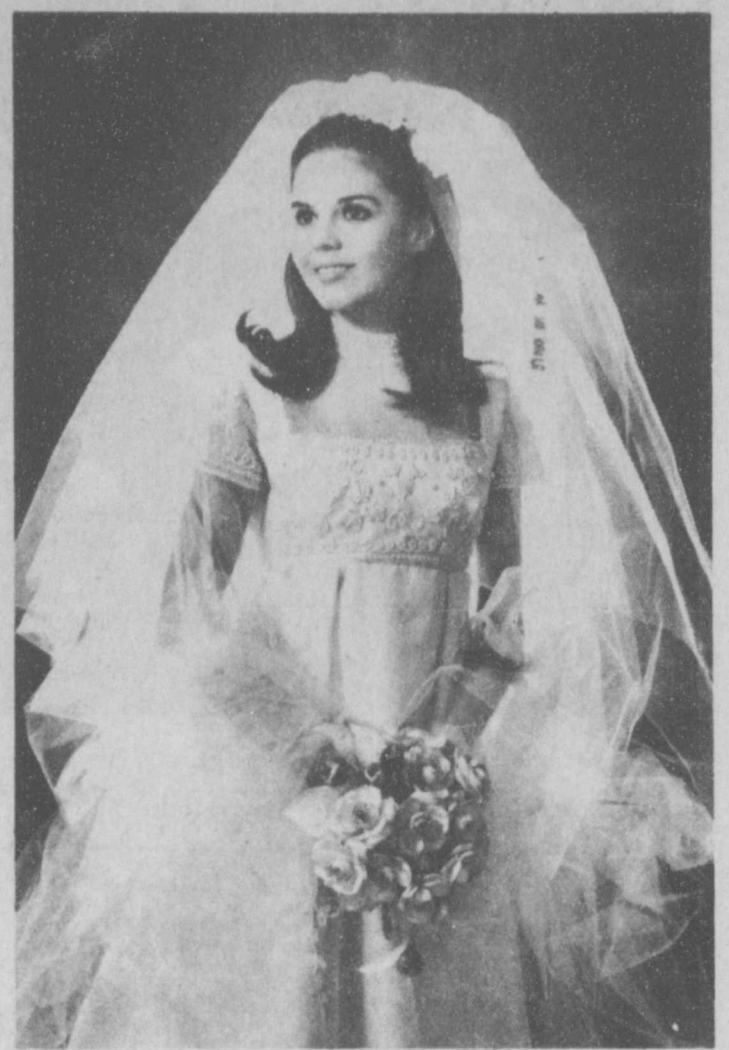

### Guar--New Crop With Good Outlook

For Texas farmers wanting another cash crop, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has the suggestion they investigate the possibilities of growing guar.

And now is the time to investigate, for the two processing plants in Texas, at Vernon and Kenedy, are now contracting guar crops, and word from them is that they need about 250,000 more Texas acres planted to guar, White said.

He also points out the fact that about 40 million pounds of guar gum were used in the U. S. last year, but only about 10 million pounds were produced in this country.

Guar is that stalky plant introduced to this country from India and Pakistan which rotates well with cotton, sorghum, corn, and vegetables.

"It has been described," Commissioner White said, "as being without peer as a soil-improving summer le-

gume and its influence on succeeding crops as truly amazing."

Growing guar does not require buying new types of machinery, the agricultural commissioner explains, because it can be planted and cultivated about like cotton, and the guar beans can be harvested with an ordinary grain combine with little adjustment.

And it can be planted on diverted acres (except cotton acres), another factor that makes it more desirable as a Texas money crop, White said.

Guar makes a good cattle feed (contains about 35 per cent protein, only slightly less than cotton seed meal), and guar gum usages are legion, including use in explosives, adhesives, paper products, batteries, bakery products, cosmetic lotions, to name a few.
