

Kalyn Now In Custom Trailer Business

Kalyn Manufacturing Co. Proved to be a very flexible industrial firm since the new plant was completed in March of 1969.

The company attempted to market boat trailers at their new 10,160 square foot manufacturing plant but in October of 1969 the company began building custom trailers for livestock and special equipment storage.

Bob Coward, general manager of Kalyn, noted surprise at the reception of the Kalyn Custom Trailer. He noted that many of the companies sales were out of county and some out of state. An estimated 75% of the Kalyn trailers are purchased by out of town clients.

Coward noted the primary problem with custom trailers was almost undefinable market with no distinct line of distribution.

Kalyn's original product, boat canopies for Deck Boats, is still a major product of the firm. Presently the canopy production employees three persons full time. Kalyn recently expanded their canopy sales, by supplying cloth canopies to Stern-Craft of Louisville. The Louisville firm produces a large type boat and will produce about \$10,000 in canopies annually.

Anchor Plastics Inc. of Gatesville is still the primary purchaser of canopies for their deck boats.

The trailer business has grown steadily according to Coward and presently the firm averages three trailers per week. All types of trailers are produced including livestock, equipment utility, house frames, and even wild animal trailers.

A new paint building is presently being constructed just west of the plant to make more room for manufacturing in the main building. The trailer works employees four persons. There are two administrative employees of the plant.

In the first eight months of trailer manufacturing the plant has produced 42 custom trailers.

Local Gatesvilleite Instructor Trainer

Mrs. Jo Lynn Jackson, manager of the Gatesville Pool, now holds the title of Instructor Trainer for the local chapter of the Red Cross. Jo Lynn obtained this title by attending the National Aquatic School, June 3rd to the 15th.

A special group from various states attended the school in Pine Cove, at Tyler, headed and directed by Bud Bradley of Marlin. Attendance to the Aquatic School for Instructor Training lessons is by invitation only. The local chapter of the Red Cross must see the need for an Instructor Trainer in the vicinity and appoint one for invitation. The qualifications for this position are that you be at least 17 years of age and hold a current Senior Lifesaving certificate. Upon completing the course and holding the title Instructor Trainer, Jo Lynn can now teach ALL methods of teaching swimming and life saving.

To acquaint you with the many hours of work and skill put forth by Jo Lynn, here is an hour by hour account of a day at the Aquatic School. The day begins with rising at 6:30 and breakfast at 7:00. Following breakfast until 8:45 is a seminar on Introduction to Red Cross. From 8:45 until 10:30 is the Sea Section. Here the Water Safety Instructors discuss better teaching methods for the pool, problems that arise and correct each others swimming strokes. Handicap Instructing followed until 12:00. This class dealt with exceptional children, the blind, deaf, mentally retarded, orthopedic and spastic. Being the favorite of Jo Lynn a detailed description of this class was given. The future Instructor Trainers were told to treat these children normally. They were also to identify with these children and the best way to do this was to experience these handicaps. Jo Lynn along with the class, was blind-folded and told to walk 600 yards ahead to the water while obstacles were put in their path. The class swam blind-folded for further experience. Then a discussion was held to discuss the problems that arose and think of water games for the blind. For another category of the handicapped, the legs and arms of the students were splinted. Here they could determine for themselves all the problems of the orthopedic. And a final plunge into the water with a complete body brace. Patients was the key word in the section for handicapped children. Simply because it may take an instructor up to four weeks to bring the child even close to the water. After a break for lunch its back to the Sea Section for review and discussion. Then Canoeing Instruction until 6:00. Jo Lynn was presented a Small Craft Badge for this section. Canoeing may prove to be of special interest to the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of Gatesville. To complete the days activities, supper and a study hall.

Col. Speirs Asks Motorist To "Drive Friendly" July 2-5

AUSTIN -- Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today cautioned motorists that traffic accidents during the Independence Day period from 6 p.m. Thursday, July 2, to midnight Sunday, July 5 may claim as many as 46 lives in Texas.

"I am urging all Texans to adopt the 'Drive Friendly' theme during this holiday and to avoid unsafe practices which contribute to accidents," Speir said.

The DPS director listed the chief factors contributed to traffic crashes as speed too fast for conditions, driving while drinking and driving on the wrong side of the road, often as the result of fatigue.

Speir said all available Highway Patrolmen will be on duty during the holiday periods, augmented by uniformed officers from other DPS services. Also, the DPS will conduct its "Operation Motorcade" program of tabulating and announcing traffic accidents three times daily in

an effort to bring about increased awareness of the added dangers of holiday travel.

In addition to Department of Public Safety, trained truck and bus industry men will take to the roads to participate in a unique Holiday Road Patrol.

Some 45 to 50 road patrol cars manned by experienced members of the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors will be on the highways to aid motorists in trouble. The program is sponsored by the Texas Motor Transportation Association, a statewide organization representing the motor

carrier industry. Junior Chamber of Commerce organizations in many parts of the state will operate rest stops for motorists along heavily traveled highways.

News media, business, and trade groups are also participating in the traffic safety program and the DPS director lauded their contributions.

"We especially appreciate the close cooperation of newspapers, the broadcast industry, and the outdoor advertising companies in helping focus public attention on safe driving," Speir added.

Jackson On AUSA Board

During the general membership meeting of the Association of the United States Army last Tuesday H. K. Jackson of Gatesville was elected to the AUSA Board of Governors.

Charles Powell, formerly of Gatesville, was elected to the Board of Governors from Belton.

The Hood AUSA is the second largest chapter in the country with 5,437 members. Approximately 1,000 members and guests were on hand at Fort Hood's Prichard Stadium for the general membership meeting.

Guest Speaker for the meeting was Frank Pace, national president of AUSA.

Pace, a former secretary of the Army, warned his audience in his speech that military security of the nation is being endangered by attacks from within. He warned against reducing our level of military strength below a danger point. He said that the instinct to destroy this country still exists in the enemy camp.

"It's time we told the story of the United States Army and its contribution to this civilization we call the United States," he said.

He said that military research and activities have produced many civilian benefits in terms of technical and scientific advances. He said that the Army's basic training also gives young men vocational skills.

He warned against reducing our military forces below what he called "an acceptable level" in Vietnam and added: "We have fought the finest war that has been fought in the history of this country in Vietnam and we ought not to be ashamed of it."

Opposing an Army which would depend completely on volunteers, he said that he has always looked on military people as "civilians in uniforms." When he was secretary of the Army, he said, he always preferred the term "civilian leadership" over the commonly used "civilian control" of the U. S. military.

Pace, an Arkansas lawyer and World War II Air Corps veteran who has been an assistant postmaster general, and was President Truman's budget director, was introduced by III Corps and Fort Hood commander, Lt. Gen. Beverly E. Powell, as "one of our great secretaries of the Army."

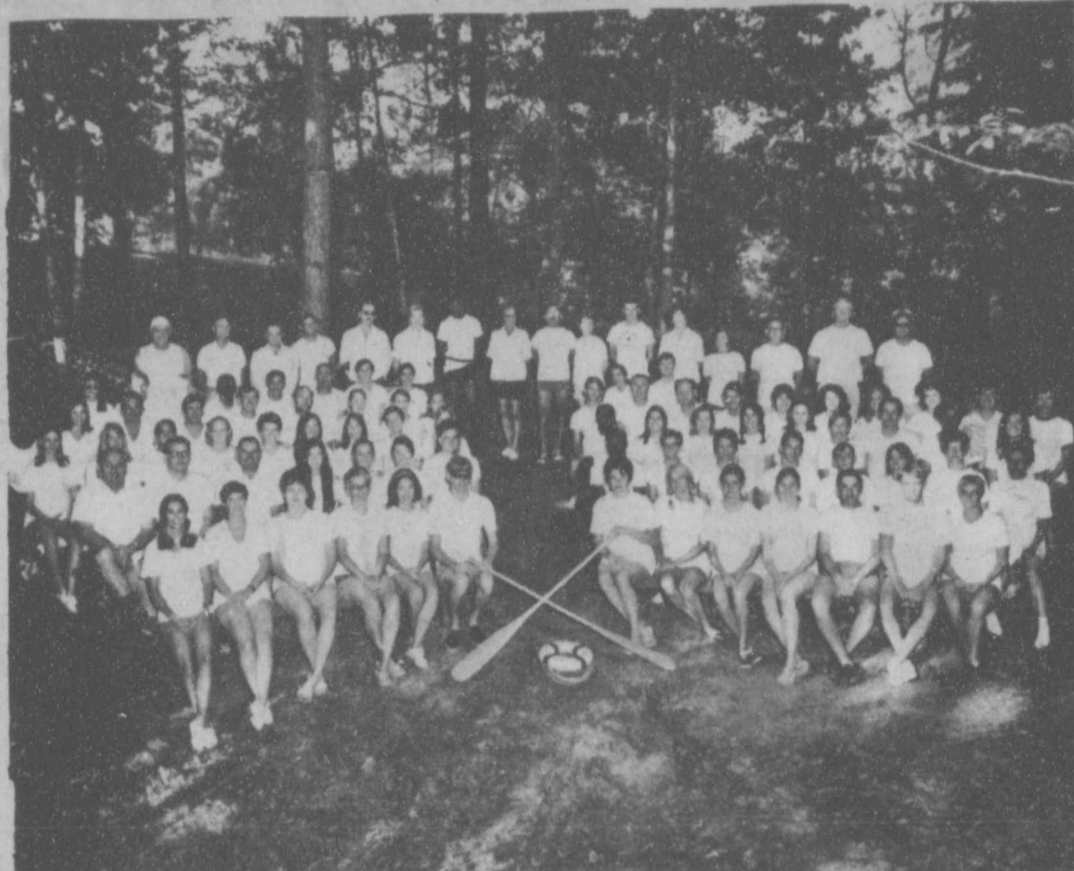
Mrs. Clemons Rites Held Friday

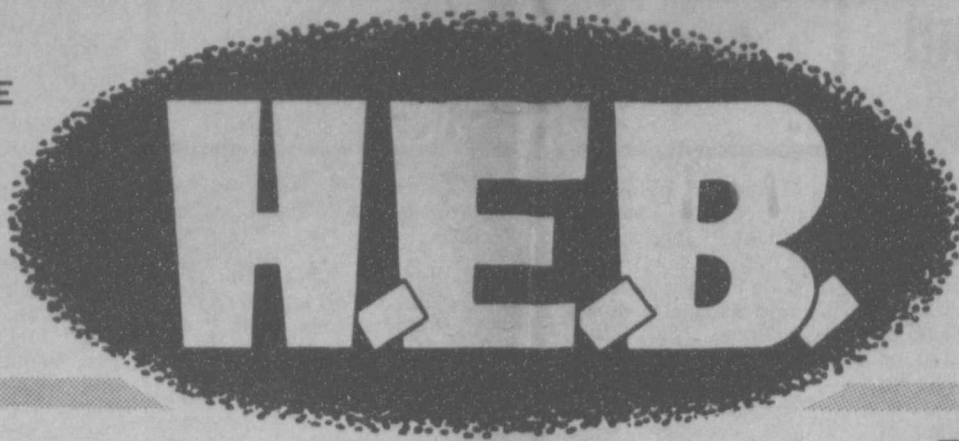

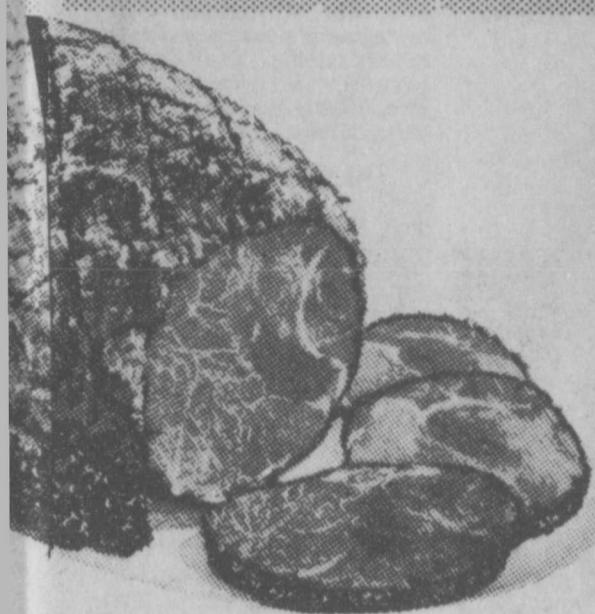

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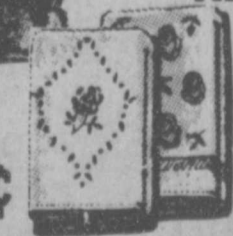

CALORIE COUNTERS BEWARE...For those who are dieting we recommend grapefruit juice, but for you who are "fat 'n happy," check these old recipes submitted by Mrs. Ira Coop of Purlmela. According to Mrs. Coop, the recipes are "rich and delicious" and off-limits to dieting citizens. A veteran of the culinary arts, Mrs. Coop has served the following cake recipe for half a century.

PORK CAKE

- 4 eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup molasses
- 1 cup shortening
- 1 pound unseasoned Pork (ground)
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 scant cup of fruit juice or sour milk
- 1 1/2 cups pecans or other nuts
- 1 1/2 cups raisins
- 1/2 teaspoon each of cinnamon and nutmeg
- Flour (enough to make a reasonably thick batter)

Beat eggs, add molasses and other ingredients, one at a time mixing well. Add flour to mixture and bake in a

large pan in a slow oven until done. (About 45 minutes or 1 hour.)

OSGOOD PIE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 cups raisins
- 4 eggs
- 4 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice (lemon if preferred)
- 1 1/2 cups pecans
- 1 teaspoonful of vanilla extract

Cream egg yolks and sugar. Add other ingredients. Fold in uncooked crust and bake in a slow oven approximately 45 minutes.



McGREGORITE SAYS CHOCOLATE'S WHERE IT'S AT...I received a nice letter this week from another slave to the stove, Mrs. Walter Gaskamp of McGregor. "This recipe is for chocolate lovers. It is the best ever--no calories at all--just pecans, chocolate and marshmallows" says Mrs. Gaskamp.

CHOCOLATE HASH CAKE

- 4 eggs (beaten)
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 sticks margarine (melted)
- 1 1/2 cups Self-Rising flour
- 4 tablespoons cocoa
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 cup pecans

Cream sugar and melted margarine. Add eggs, vanilla and dry ingredients. Mix well. Bake in 13 X 9 X 2 inch pan at 350 degrees for about 35 minutes. When cake is done put marshmallows on top of cake and melt (soften). Remove from oven, spoon on frosting and then swirl.

FROSTING

- 1 small pkg. miniature marshmallows
- 4 tablespoons cocoa
- 4 tablespoons margarine
- 1/2 cup pet milk
- 1 box powered sugar

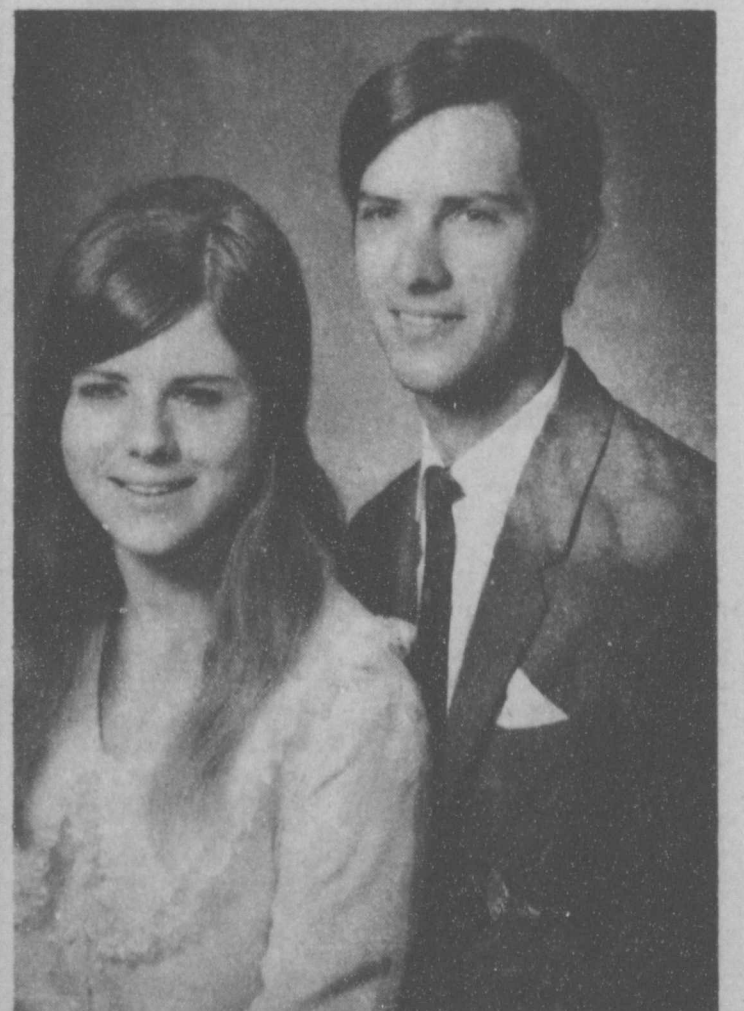
